She requested prayer for peace, understanding and grace in light of the chaos in our nation's capital the previous Wednesday. I remember thinking, "Wait a second, the paint on the New Year isn't even dry yet, so much for a fresh start." Come to think of it, our Christmas Eve service was less than 3 weeks ago, so what happened to the "heavenly peace" we sang about in the candlelit glow?

The problem is there are two types of peace: earthly and heavenly. Earthly peace is seen as mutual harmony between people or groups. Heavenly peace or peace with God is a reconciliation between a heavenly Father and his earthly child made possible through the sacrifice of his beloved son Jesus Christ. Again, it's peace with God. God is not at war with us. We have separated ourselves by our selfishness and disobedience. You remember that whole sin thing. We go our own way, do our own thing, and tell God we'll be in touch from time to time. Meanwhile, our Abba Father refuses to retaliate, waiting instead for us to return. Why? PS: The Burlington Food Pantry provided food to 89 families this past Wednesday.





This section will come and go periodically going throughout the year, but for the next few weeks or so, we are sharing a serialized short story from Marie Celkupa describing her time volunteering with the Christian Appalachian Project in 2008 and 2009. Let's pick up where we left off with:

#### Appalachian Adventures - Marie Celkupa

Eventually, the room was cleared out and the floor was repaired. Young people volunteering for Youth Fest came in and painted the rooms. This was probably the first time the teens had ever painted, and also the first time the rooms had ever been painted. The living room furniture was put in the front yard, where it is to this day. I found a pretty sofa and matching chair in our warehouse and brought them out to Miss Margie's house. I previously had bought a recliner for Margie, and all of this furniture was brought to the storage unit, waiting to be retrieved after the rooms were painted, The lack of furniture bothered Miss Margie not at all, and she very cordially invited us to sit on the coffee table in the living room, which was the only piece of furniture left, with the exception of the television.

When the bedroom was painted and the floor repaired and new linoleum installed, we found a hospital bed in our warehouse and brought it into Miss Margie's new bedroom. I bought a mattress pad, pillows, comforter, sheet sets, and my friend and I had such fun making up this bed! I told her, "I am so happy that you now have a nice pretty bed!" and she replied, "Not as happy as I am, I never had a new blanket or new sheets In my whole life." Unfortunately, this story will not have a happy ending. Margie does not have long to live. She still goes to the hospital every week to have her abdomen drained, more than 6 liters were drained last week. Her house will never be neat and dean. It will always be cluttered, She had an exceedingly poor childhood, and was married at 15. Before that, she shared a bed with her four siblings. She told me that she had never had anything that was new, and

The good news is that Margie now has a bed of her own at last. She has clean sheets and a pretty new comforter. Her portable potty has been moved into her bedroom, to give her a small modicum of privacy. We planted some flowers, and she now has a nice view of petunias and pansies from her bedroom window. I thought to myself, this will have to be enough.

whenever she gets anything, she cannot let it go. That explains why everything is so cluttered.

I have been asked to provide instructions on how you can view our Church Services on YouTube on your own TV. I will attempt to do that here with the caveat that like many thing, there are multiple ways that it can be QQQQQ done. I will explain how to do this if you are a Comcast subscriber with one of their X1 Set-top boxes.

To begin make sure your television and cable box are turned on.

Next press the XFINITY button on your remote control.


When the menu appears on the bottom of the screen,

Use the arrows to select "Apps"

When the new Menu appears, use the arrows again to navigate

To YouTube and press the center button.

If you have a Voice Remote, you can also open the App and find our service by speaking,



Once the App is open you can continue to search for videos using your voice remote, or you can select Search to find videos using the on screen keyboard.
