Greetings Everyone — Today is the Fifth Sunday of Easter also known as Cantate Sunday. Eastern Orthodox Christians refer to it as the Sunday of the Samaritan Woman. Additionally because it is often used for an annual sermon about hymns and liturgical music, it is sometimes nicknamed "Sing-song Sunday."

This week's artwork depicts Christ and the Samaritan Woman, and it was painted by Jan Joest who lived in the latter half of the 15th century into the early 16th century. Joest was a Dutch painter known for his religious paintings with his greatest works being scenes from the life of Christ where were made between 1505 and 1508 on the high altar in St. Nicholai's Church in his home town of Kalkar which is in modern day Germany. One of the features of Joest's work is the exquisite transparency of his coloring and the subtle and delicate modeling of the faces.

There was a scene in an episode of M*A*S*H* broadcast in 1982 in which Charles Winchester spoke to Hawkeye Pierce about the distant relationship he (Charles) had with his father compared to Hawkeye's with his. The scene ended with Charles saying, "I always assumed that that's how it was in every family. But when I see the warmth, closeness, the fun of your relationship...my father is a good man, he always wanted the best for me. But where I have a father, you have a dad."

So how are you with God? If you are following Him to get something, you will inevitably be disappointed. If you are following Him because of an ongoing, vital relationship, you will walk confidently.

Brennan Manning states, "The Abba experience is the source and secret of Christ's being, his message and manner of life. Until we meet the father of Jesus ourselves and experience him to be a loving, forgiving Daddy, it is impossible to understand Jesus' teaching on love. Jesus experienced God as tender and loving, courageous and kind, compassionate and



forgiving, as laughter of the morning and comfort in the night. Abba, a colloquial form of address used by little Jewish children toward their fathers, and best translated as "papa" or "daddy," opened the possibility of unheard of intimacy with God. In any other great world religion, it is unthinkable to address almighty God as "Abba".

Is God someone we visit with on Sunday or is he someone you wake up to each morning and say, "Good morning Papa, I'm ready for adventure!" Is our prayer time pious, repetitive and distant, or vital and emotionally engaged? It truly makes all the difference.

I have considered at times that my relationship with God was not what it should be because I was raised by a single mom and missed out on a father-son relationship. I have come to realize that I have been blessed instead in knowing a variety of men throughout my journey: coaches, teachers, family friends and relatives, neighbors, and folks met on the way, that have opened to me facets of an Abba, Father God, the last of which I lost last week when Barb's father passed away. He was an "everyman" who had wants and dreams that he put aside for the greater good of his family. He put aside himself and gave to all. He was my first "dad."



As we move on this week, remember that we have a Father God who knows our greatest strengths and greatest weaknesses. He knows our beginning and our end, he knows us better than we know ourselves. In total love, he allows us to meet him in our own way. He waits on our road with arms wide open in grace.

Jesus reminded us to come as little children. So, why not pause and put aside our pride and humble ourselves. Then cast your eyes up the road and call out, "Papa I'm here!"

We are pleased to announce to you that with the recent re-opening of the Florence Wawa that our WaWa/Sisterhood food mission is once again up and running.



For anyone not familiar with this food mission, every day a PPC church member goes to the WaWa located at Rt 130 and Cedar Lane. The good folks at Wawa donate all the leftover sandwiches, snacks, etc accumulated over the previous 24 hours. We then take this food to Sisterhood Incorporated located at132-136 East Broad Street in Burlington,



On a typical day we transport two to six large insulated bags of food to the Sisterhood. Sisterhood then distributes the food amongst their various programs. This includes after-school programs in the winter and daycare programs when school is out. Quote from the Sisterhood website: "Our support services are open to individuals of all ages and counseling, clothing and food are always available free of charge."

Topping: refrigerate overnight or	several hours before:	
3 sticks margarine 1 1/2 cup sugar - half brown	3 cups flour 1 heaping tsp. cinnamon	
Cake		
3 T. butter 1 cup sugar	pinch salt 1 cup milk	
2 cups flour	1 ten vanilla	

1 1/2 tsp. baking powder

Crumb Cake

1 tsp. vanilla

Mix in order. Put in greased 11 by 14 inch pan. Add topping. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 - 45 minutes. When cool, sprinkle with powdered sugar
