Pentecost Sunday - May 31, 2020

Greetings Everyone — Today is Pentecost Sunday. In researching the day, I found a simple write-up by Wendy Thomas Russel for PBS Newshour. I am going to borrow liberally from her. From a historical perspective, Christianity didn't start with Jesus' birth, his death or even his storied ascension to heaven. It started with Pentecost — the day the "Holy Spirit" entered a room holding Jesus' apostles and entered each of them, an event which — as Wendy's minister uncle tells her — "makes the church the church."

Although Pentecost is chock full of religious significance, it is a holiday not widely celebrated. Sort of the opposite of Hanukkah, which is widely celebrated but not religiously important. Pentecost is a bigger deal in liturgical churches, which follow a formal, standardized order of events (like Catholics & Presbyterians). "Non-liturgical" refers to churches whose services are unscripted (like Baptists).

Pentecost literally means "50." At his Last Supper, Jesus instructed his 12 disciples to go out into the world to

minister and heal the sick on their own. It was at that point that they became "apostles." Fifty days after Jesus' death, the Holy Spirit (part of the Holy Trinity — God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit) descended onto the apostles, making them speak in foreign tongues. This "Pentecostal" experience allowed the apostles direct communication with God, which signaled a major shift in the religious landscape and laid the foundation for what would become Christianity. The book of Acts, Chapter 2, Verses 1-47 provide the accounting for this event. The first four verses follow

The Coming of the Holy Spirit

2 When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. 2 And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. 3 Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. 4 All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.





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When Don't We Obey the Governor?

Last Sunday, May 24, a pastor in South Jersey decided to purposely disobey the Governor of New Jersey and have parishioners attend worship. His justification was that it was his Constitutional right to hold services. I assume he was referring to the First Amendment: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." I suppose he felt that the Governor's restriction on gatherings greater than 10 was prohibiting the 'free exercise' of religion. In fairness to the pastor, he declared that there would be every effort made to keep people safe.


My first reaction was that the pastor was placing the Constitution above the Scriptures. I was thinking of Romans 13: "Obey the government, for God is the one who put it there. All governments have been placed in power by God. So those who refuse to obey the laws of the land are refusing to obey God (New Living Translation).

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Does that command to obey the government have no Biblical caveats? I remember well the civil right marches of the 60s, which I applauded, and at the end joined. Those demonstrations were often in defiance of many Governors of the Southern states. Even more to the point, we certainly applaud those who died opposing the edicts of Adolph Hitler's Nazi regime. How were these acts of disobedience Biblically informed?

In the next line in Romans 13, Paul states, "The authorities do not frighten people who are doing right, but they frighten those who do

wrong. . . The authorities are established by God for that very purpose, to punish those who do wrong. So you must obey the government for two reasons: to keep from being punished and to keep a clear conscience." I believe the Biblical instruction is clear. As long as government edicts are issued for good – for us as Christians that means judging them by Scriptural authority – we are commanded to obey. I judge that the Governor's decision to limit gatherings to just 10 for now is for our good – a Biblical good protecting our life and that of our neighbors, and that it should be obeyed.

This requirement of staying apart for a while puts an added responsibility on each individual Christian. Are you setting aside time with our Lord each day: reading Scripture, meditating on it, and spending time in prayer? If you are not used to these disciplines, I would suggest:

- You read a Psalm each day and a chapter from the New Testament.
- Find at least one verse from the Scripture that speaks to you and meditate on it.
- Prayer can take the tried and true form of ACTS

Supplication for others and for ourselves.



Of course, these disciplines are also important even when we begin meeting again. Pentecost Sunday, May 31, is our annual reminder that each Christian has the Holy Spirit, and can be – indeed must be – responsible for his or her own connection with our Lord.

If you can find a service being streamed on Sundays, that will be helpful. In addition, in our day with so many ways of reaching out to others, we have no excuse for not contacting our Christian friends, encouraging and praying for each other even while we are social distancing.



May God keep us spiritual healthy even while we pray God keeps us physically well.

Bustleton's Best—Church Cookbook Recipe of the Week

Good Morning! After those delicious Ribs and Make Ahead Potatoes last week, I am finally hungry again. Since it is Sunday morning, it is time for breakfast, and Kathy Koenig's Sausage Biscuits are just what I am looking for. As Jed Clampett used to say, "Wooooo Doggie!!" These are some good eating biscuits. So, it you want any of these deee-liscious vittles, Y'all better get right over, or they'll be gone. Ya' heah!



Sausage Biscuits

Kathy Koenig

1/2 Ib good quality bulk sausage 2 T milk
1 1/2 C buttermilk baking mix 1/4 t salt
4 oz. coarsely grated Cheddar cheese (about 1 c.) 1/8 t dried thyme
1 large egg 1/8 t ground ginger

In a 6 inch skillet, cook sausage 6 to 8 minutes over moderate heat, breaking it up with a spoon until meat is no longer pink and most of the fat has cooked out. Drain in a strainer. Heat oven to 350. In a large bowl, combine biscuit mix, cheese and cooked sausage with a fork. In a small bowl, beat remaining ingredients with another fork; add sausage mixture and blend well with hands. Shape mixture into 28 balls, using about 1 tablespoon for each. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased baking sheet; flatten each ball slightly. Bake 20 minutes or until lightly browned. Makes 28 biscuits. Biscuits can be made ahead and frozen. Reheat before serving.

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


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Church Signs For Today
