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

You don't remember it because it only lasted one meeting. We publicized it, and announced and prepared for it, and when the night came only one person showed up. That person was Leo Forsberg. For nearly 2 hours, Leo took Barbara and me on a journey through his life, from young lad in Kansas, to first jobs, to wartime service, to meeting his late wife Barbara, to veterinary school, to a call to ministry, to stops in various churches, to how God had guided and provided, and finally to Providence Presbyterian Church. The group never met again, but the "meeting" that night served its purpose. Through time spent with Leo, I came to know Christ more richly and that evening was a blessing to Barbara and me.




As I have ventured to build my spiritual house upon the Rock, a lot of folks in our church have supplied much needed building material over the years.

Bruce Springsteen once sang in regard to education, "I learned more from a three-minute record than I ever learned in school." Well, I have read books and listened to tapes. I have tried to read through the Bible (Leviticus and Numbers always cut me down). But any true growth in my spiritual life came from being sowed into soil that others

have made fertile by their lives lived simply before God and before us. These folks were ordinary evangelists, one and all. They shared the ride with us, and made our journey a little bit richer.

You might not know much about Senegal, but I heard a news report which noted that when a Senegalese person dies, the community says that a library has burned. That's quite a



statement "A library has burned". Our lay services have given us glimpses of the "library" of stories that fill our sanctuary. Some stories hover in the air as history, and others continue to be written in our hearts in real time.

The greatness of our church is not determined by if we just preached the word. You don't need a church for that you can just buy a tape. You need a church to have the opportunity to learn of and express the love of God, so you will experience more of it yourself.

This week, why not pray about those who have mattered, those who have left their fingerprints on your Christian journey. Give gratitude to God for those who have passed on and maybe reach out to those teachers and farmers, elders and young folks who continue to till the soil of your spiritual life and tell them how they have made a difference. I'll be golfing on Tuesday with someone who over the years has proved to be my spiritual mentor, and I apologize Governor Murphy, but I will give him a hug of thanks.

Blueberry Mousse

2 1/4 C blueberries 1/2 C sugar 1/2 T. Gelatin 2 T. lemon juice 1 C heavy cream 1/2 t cinnamon

Combine blueberries, sugar, gelatin, lemon juice. Cook low until gel dissolves and berries are soft. Blend or process and refrigerate until syrupy. Whip cream until stiff. Fold into berry mix. Spoon into stemmed glasses. Serve with whipped cream, cinnamon and few berries on top.
