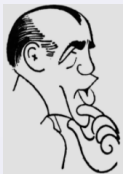

February 9, 1964 was a transformative day in America. It was my 5th birthday. Unfortunately for my mom, I was not the catalyst of the transformation. Sorry to say, she would have to settle for an average curly haired kid who made a slight dent in the history of the Postal Service.

No, the revolutionaries were four lads from England who appeared in hazy black and white on the 14" TV screen in our living room. They introduced a whole new world to us that evening. They didn't look like me. They sure didn't sound like me. Heck, they didn't sound like anything I had ever heard. Before that night all I had heard coming from the radio in my mom's '63 Ford Galaxie was Tony Bennet, Frank Sinatra, and Andy Williams. This was different. This was exciting. This was Rock & Roll. And God smiles and says, "Welcome home child."

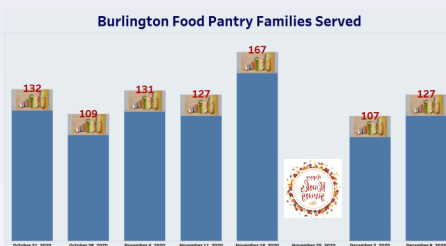

And if you find yourself sitting in the comfortable seat of small faith and simple religion, it's time to heed the call of the ancient prophet James Brown and "Get up offa that thing, heed God's call and you'll do better."

For All of us — Safety and God's blessing as we continue live worship services.

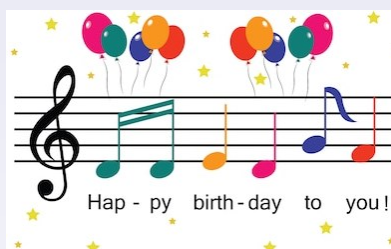

| 2 T vanilla | 1 C cup walnuts |

Please call or text our reservation line at (609) 534-0833 NO SOONER THAN Monday, December 14.

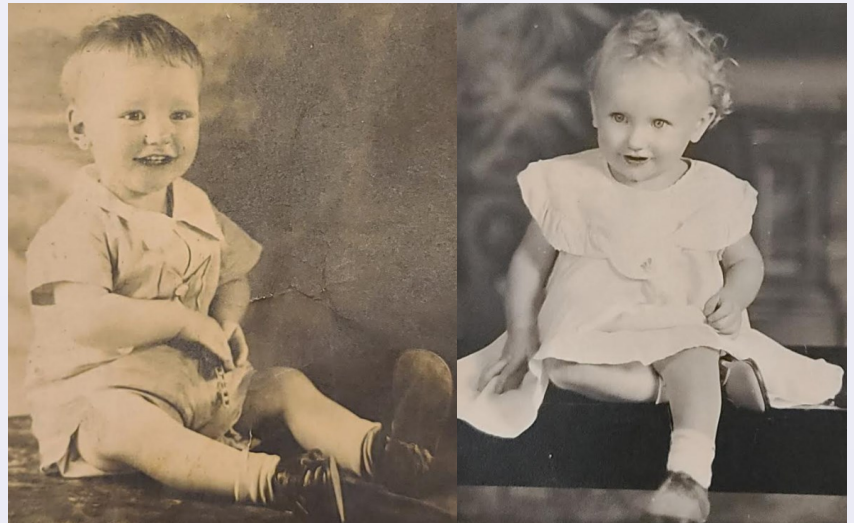
That line may still be used to make reservations for the regular Sunday service at any time.

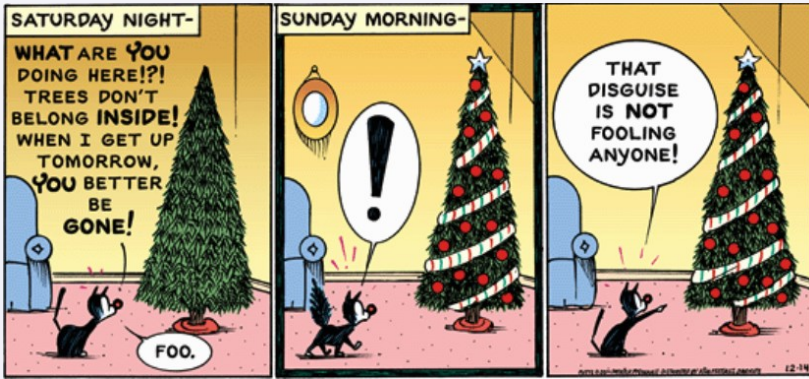
