A Philosophy Of Freedom And Social Responsibility

Walter H. Annenberg - Philadelphia, PA - ca. 1950s

I feel humble when I am asked to add significance from my own experience to the numerous ideas that have been advanced by inspired and divine leaders of old and recent times. But I also feel a tremendous and awe-inspiring kinship with these men of all ages who have uttered their beliefs, not only for themselves but for the benefit of all mankind. And I am impressed with the fact that through all these beliefs, as I see it, runs one great truth: the importance of the individual.

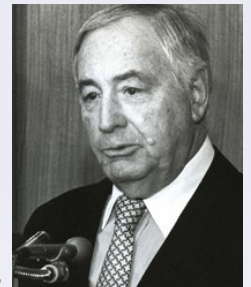
I believe in man, in his courage, his vision, his desire to do what is noble and best, his dependability. When daily I survey the newspaper with which I am associated, the Philadelphia Inquirer, I am impressed with the abundance of Information that constantly testifies to the indomitable will of man. No disaster, not flood nor fire nor famine—no, not even war—can overcome him.

Because I trust in the essential greatness of man, it follows then that I believe that man must have an area of freedom in which to develop his fullest potentialities, including not only his creative ability but also that insignia of his maturity, social responsibility. I believe in freedom because only when men have the freedom to seek truth can they work toward the kind of life they desire.

In the field of political freedom I stand for a state which never claims to have found the final truth and does not, therefore, stifle all other ideas. I stand for a government which expresses the free will of individuals and which is not a nation to which individuals are subservient. We should guard against the abridgement of freedom in our country, especially the vulnerable freedoms of press and of education. Present-day events, like the alarming suppression of La Prensa, warn us that these are the first freedoms to be attacked by dictators. And in the field of personal freedom, no irrational prejudice or discrimination should curb the rights—the equal rights—of all men.

I believe in social responsibility, that a man's service to others must be at least in ratio to the character of his own success in life. When one is fortunate enough to gain a measure of material well-being, however small, service to others should be uppermost in his mind. Freedom and social responsibility form the basis of my own personal philosophy. Upon them, I believe, depends the very dignity of man.

Walter H. Annenberg was a philanthropist, art collector, and former ambassador to the United Kingdom from 1969 to 1974. At one time, he presided over a vast communications empire that included TV Guide and the Philadelphia Inquirer. Annenberg's philanthropy was largely focused on education and the arts, including the establishment of the M.L.

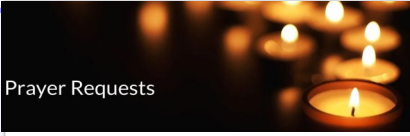

CHICKEN DIJONNAISE

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tbsp. butter
- 1 tsp. olive oil
- 1 large whole skinless and boneless chicken breast, split in half
- 3 green onions, chopped 1/4 inch
- 1/2 cup chicken stock
- 1 cup Sauce Supreme
- 1 tsp. chopped fresh tarragon
- 1 tsp. Dijon mustard
- salt and pepper to taste

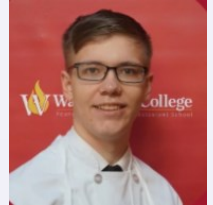
PREPARATION

- Heat butter and oil in sauté pan over medium heat. Add chicken and onions; cook for 12 minutes. Turn chicken and do not let onions burn.
- When chicken is cooked, remove from pan and keep warm.
- Add stock to pan and cook for 2 minutes over high heat.
- Stir in Sauce Supreme and tarragon.
- Adjust seasoning and allow to simmer 4 minutes.
- Stir in mustard, return chicken to pan, and simmer for 3 minutes over low heat.
- Serve. *Plating and presentation style is an individual component and an excellent opportunity to make visual impressions.*

SAUCE SUPREME

INGREDIENTS

- 3 tbsp. butter
- 3 tbsp. all-purpose flour
- 2 cups chicken stock
- 1/2 cup heavy cream
- 1 tbsp. chopped parsley
- salt and pepper to taste

PREPARATION

- Heat butter in saucepan over medium heat. Add flour and mix well; cook for 1 minute.
- Whisk in chicken stock, season, and cook for 12 minutes over low heat. Stir occasionally during cooking.
- Strain sauce.
- Whisk in heavy cream.
- Stir in parsley.
- Adjust seasoning and consistency.

2-1/2 cups
