Malcolm - U. Pitt - Richmond, VA - Broadcast During The 1950s



About 5:00 a.m., on the morning of June the 6th, 1944, my phone rang. A very close friend was calling to tell me that the Normandy invasion was being broadcast

over the radio. He knew that our only son was in this invasion and he realized that our hearts were heavy with concern over this event. In a moment my wife was on her knees, and I quickly followed her example. I prayed for our son's safety, as no doubt many other parents, and somehow I felt that if God only would only answer my supplications I would accept more graciously any turn of events or reversals that might confront me. Our prayers were answered, and I have felt deeply the impact and the influence of this experience on my life. Though wounded, our son was returned safely to us. Surely I owed God a debt I could never repay.

It has been my privilege to work with young people nearly all of my life. I have coached in preparatory school and college, and directed a boy's summer camp. When those who have been entrusted to my care or supervision have had problems that I might help them solve, then I have particularly considered it a privilege to work with them. I knew that I could become easily prejudiced, and very often was. I was and still am thoroughly capable of becoming discouraged. But with each experience I try to remember that this isn't God's way, and I was letting him down when I permitted myself to become depressed. I told a defeated basketball team once that God didn't count failures, but He did count how we got up and carried on after each failure. I was just talking to myself through the players. I hope that someday I will be a strong enough leader to exert an influence that'll make all boys with whom I am associated feel that the Golden Rule is just as important a fundamental as shooting a basket and hitting a baseball, running with a football, or mastering the art of skillful and unselfish camping.

My experience with youth has meant far more to me than it has to them. In athletics, we are constantly emphasizing fundamentals, but without a thorough knowledge of the same it is next to impossible to be successful. The home is where these fundamentals in life are first taught, and the athletic field of competition furnishes another opportunity for the furtherance of these ideals.

The summer camp for boys, when the youngsters are away from home for the first time, offers another challenge to those who are engaged in this type of work. It has made me think, and it has made me realize my own shortcomings more than ever. *Continued on Pg. 3...*

healthy and still delicious oversight in judgement. First we remember to judge not this editor lest ye be judged. Then immediately turn to page 91 for the last recipe in your Church Cookbook which is Honey Brown's Pecan Pie. I apologize to anyone out there who may have a nut allergy. Please refer back to the sentence about judging. Thanks. This may be the final recipe in our book, but remember the closing words of John 2:10 "...But you have kept the best until last."



Thank You Honey!

1 unbaked pie shell 3 eggs 1/2 C whipping cream 1 C sugar 1 t vanilla

Pecan Pie

2 Tbsp. butter

1 T sherry 1/2 C dark syrup 1/8 t salt 1 1/2 C pecans (plus enough to decorate top)

Put everything into the blender in that order, except for decorative pecan halves. Blend for about 10 seconds. Pour it into the pie shell and bake at 400 for 25 minutes, then decorate it with the pecan halves. Bake for 10 minutes more. (If the middle seems shaky, bake for another 5 minutes.) Cool before serving. Serves 8 to 10.
