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The Past, Present and Future of our Historical Country Church "The Providence Presbyterian Church of Bustleton"

Part 1 The Past

In 1866 after Mr. Fox left the Providence Presbyterian Church, Henry Butler was installed as the pastor. Our church has had a long line of dedicated men of God who took the responsibility of over-seeing the Providence Church. Some of these men were pastors and others were pulpit supply. During the period from 1866 to 1906 there were seven pastors that served our church and its congregation. The following years from 1907 to 1926 our church was supported by pulpit supply. All the pastors and the majority of the pulpit supply stayed at the manse. Our church was truly blessed to be able to have pastors and pulpit supply during these difficult times.

On May of 1927, we once again were blessed with a minister, John Talbot. Rev. Talbot served the Providence Church for seven years from 1927 to 1934. Towards the end of his tenure as minister he orchestrated improvements to be made on the manse and the social hall (originally our little house of worship). The social hall was used as a Sunday school for the children, a meeting hall, and a social gathering place for the people. It was during Rev. Talbot time, as pastor, that it was decided to add on an addition to the social hall and to do repairs and upgrading on the manse. The projects completed in early 1940. All the work was done by the people of the area who also generously supplied a lot of the materials needed.

Rev. Osborne came to us as a student and served as pulpit supply after Rev. Talbot in January, 1935. He was installed as our pastor on July 2, 1935 and served until October, 1936.

Rev. William David Glenn also came to our church as a student from Princeton Theological seminary. He served as pulpit supply for 6 months and was ordained and installed as Pastor of the Providence Church July of 1937.

Our church, the Providence Presbyterian Church of Bustleton, through its existence has been fortunate in the loyal service of devoted men of God. It is with regret that with each great work and accomplishments these men of God have contributed and dedicated their time and caring to its church and congregation, that there are not many records of their tireless efforts that have made our church the success that it is. These inspired people have handed on the torch and it is ours to bear and to pass on to those after them. Our church with all the ups and downs that we have encountered and will continue to encounter has been a successful church with the help of God, the devoted pastors, pulpit suppliers, and the people. For we have always been able to have worship service and for the longest time a Sunday school since its organization.

Sunday school at the Providence which was held in the social hall became very difficult. The area around the church was growing and it was predicted to grown even faster. The school presently had about 100 pupils and a teaching staff of 12.

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They could not imagine adding a single new class; there just was not enough room. They did not want to start having to turn children away due to lack of space to teach them. Also there were other factors involved. Toilet facilities were primitive and unattractive. There was insufficient room for hats, coats, and boots. The building again was in need of renovations – though extremely well built it just was too small.

Any social event held in the hall meant that all the Sunday school equipment needed to be carried out of the hall and brought into the minister's garage. Then after the event all the equipment had to be carried back into the hall again and the classes re-assembled - a lot of work and effort. It became obvious to all that a new Christian Education building was needed.


It was while Bob Carter was pastor of the Providence Presbyterian Church (1951 – 1953) that the talk session began over a new Christian Education Building. It was discussed with the elders over and over again. They outlined the pros and the cons but could not come to a decision. There were plans and alternate plans, one suggestion after another but nothing could get resolved. The congregation was coming to the conclusion that all it was - was talk.

Dick Hasler was our pastor at the time (1957 – 1960), when in January, 1958 things started to come to a head on the new Education Building. The Board of National Missions came to our church with a Campaign Director to show us the way to go about raising funds for our project. They met with our session and the Board of Trustees and after careful consideration; they found and agreed on a proposed figure of 3 per cent of each family's annual net income for a period of three years that they could raise the money needed to build the education building.

Seven years later, in June 1965 the building we had all needed and prayed for was finally ours. Total cost was \$48,000 and that included the interest of \$2,600. Mortgage burning on the Providence Presbyterian Education Building took place Friday, October 8, 1965. The Providence Presbytery Church was debt free. We owed nothing on the church, manse and now the education building.

This could not had been possible if it were not for all our church families working together, everyone that was connected to the campaign that worked diligently and with God's inspiration and guidance.





