That week we fixed everything! We put a new roof on, fixed her bathrooms and installed new toilets, repainted her deck, fixed her windows, painted all the interior walls, made a ramp up her deck so she wouldn't have to try and get out of her wheelchair, and the list goes on.

As the week progressed I really started to get to know this lady. She started to really open up to me. She would tell me stories about her grandchildren, and her husband that had passed away five years ago, and what it was like growing up in the "olden days". This lady had such a kind heart that it amazed me to hear how none of her family had come to visit her since the passing of her husband.

That summer had really taught me a lot. Some people are less fortunate than others and when you can give a little to someone that doesn't have much it is the greatest feeling in the world!

As the week came to an end I was very upset to be leaving. It seemed like time had flown by so fast. The last day of the trip we had a picnic at the campsite we were staying at. The people in charge had invited the owners of the houses to come and celebrate with us. Needless to say my newly found friend had arrived and was in tears when she saw us all there. After the celebrating was done she pulled me aside and told me how lucky she was to have such a great group of workers to help her this week.

She told me that I was a special young lady who would always have a special place in her heart next to the rest of her grandchildren's places. She started crying as did I then gave me a hug and thanked me for being there and listening to her. She then left and I didn't see her for a year. Since then I often go and visit to see how she's doing.

Since Pastor Diane Curtis left in July of 2019, it has been a rough several years not only dealing without a minister but what the world has been up against, the Coronavirus disease COVID - 19 and inflation which has effected everything we buy, especially food and gasoline (highest level it has been since 1981). COVID - 19 shut down businesses, schools, and churches, and many people who had previous health issues who contacted COVID - 19 lost their lives. Our church was shut down March, 2020 and reopened around October, 2020. We decided to initiate going virtual with our church services and once the church reopened we continued being virtual. This way if some of our members and non member who felt more secure and safer watching the service on their computer or phone can have that option rather then go into church for Sunday service. A lot of work, trial and error went into getting the system up and running. It was with the perseverance of Chris Vitale, Jack Harkins, Phil Leifels, & Rick Cheslo to make this possible. Prior to our church being open, thorough cleaning is done in the church and CE building, masks were required and temperatures taken when entering the church along with hand sanitizer stations. In person attendance for Sunday services, once the church opened, were and have been very low. Offerings have been down but we have managed to stay slightly ahead. For this we are so appreciative and thankful.

Prior to COVID we continued to hold our pasta and roast beef dinner and other events. Every summer Chuck and Ginny opened up their home for our church picnic.

As I write this, I realize that all of our church activities and gatherings ceased during the pandemic for about 20 - 24 months. Our Crafty Women continued to make an assortment of gifts during the pandemic, of which they sold after church services (once the church opened up) and during holidays. They make the most unusual and beautiful crafts. I was quite surprised that during our difficult months the ladies from selling their crafts brought into the church for missions \$ 1,752 in 2020, \$ 1,461 in 2021 and \$860 so far for 2022 (and we are only 6 months in the year). These ladies are something else, very gifted and talented. Thank you Crafty Ladies!




