Sunlight beaming on my skin, a light breeze brushing through my hair, the scent of jasmine in the air with a background harmony of songbirds chirping and the trickling flow of a creek: all this reminds me of the countless weekends spent gardening in my backyard with my parents growing up. I would end each day utterly exhausted with dirt under my fingernails and grass stains on my jeans. These are memories I would not trade for anything.



It was not until fifth grade when I had begun my own garden that I realized how truly amazing it felt. My original garden consisted of the two empty troughs that sat on the side of our house. The finished plot was amazing and had taught me so much before I had even planted my first seed. Each step of the gardening process has something to offer: from planning, to preparation, to sowing seeds, weeding, watering, fertilizing, thinning the plants, and finally harvesting. Each one of these steps gave me something more than just dirty hands and a healthy diet. I believe in gardening.

I begin each season with preparation, making sure the soil is fertile and the area is ready to be planted. I learned the benefit of preparing is that the better the soil, the stronger the plants will be. The planning is extremely fun; it is like grocery shopping months in advance. Buying these little packets of seeds enabled me to envision the finished product sitting on my plate. Continuing in the process: weeding, watering, and fertilizing taught me so much about dedication and hard work. These tasks were monotonous, but crucial. With today's "instant gratification" society, gardening was just what I needed to combat this new and ever growing trend because throughout the whole season I learned patience. Another huge part of gardening is the letdowns. There is no gardener that will say they have never had a rough season due to bad weather, rodents or insects. This is a common occurrence that taught me optimism and humor. Without the let downs, the successful seasons would not be as powerful. The final step is harvesting, which is my favorite part. Picking a fresh, ripe vegetable from something that was originally a tiny seed is extremely rewarding. There is nothing sweeter than a vegetable I have grown myself. Imagining all the hard work and time that went into it really makes one appreciative.

I believe in gardening, because gardeners learn so much from what they love. The entire process is extremely rewarding. Whether you end up with homegrown vegetable or improved personal qualities, no matter how each season ends up, you will at least have something to show for all your work.





We are still collecting plastic bags from the store, your pantry and your front door, i.e. produce, store, and ice bags; Ziploc & other recloseable bags, cereal box liners, bread bags; and newspaper sleeves, dry cleaning bags, and bubble wrap, for a recycling project. COVID-19 vaccines available in the United States are effective at protecting people from getting seriously ill, being hospitalized, and dying. As with other vaccine-preventable diseases, you are protected best from COVID-19 when you stay up to date with the recommended vaccinations, including recommended boosters.

Updated (bivalent) Pfizer or Moderna boosters are a single dose vaccine available and recommended for individuals age 6 months and older at least two months after their previous COVID-19 vaccination.

Children ages 6 months through 5 years who previously completed a Moderna primary series are eligible to receive a Moderna bivalent booster 2 months after their final primary series dose.

Children ages 6 months through 4 years who are currently completing a Pfizer primary series will receive a Pfizer bivalent vaccine as their third primary dose.

The updated (bivalent) booster provides increased protection against Omicron variants.

Getting a COVID-19 vaccine after you have recovered from COVID-19 infection provides added protection against COVID-19.

People who are moderately or severely immunocompromised have different recommendations for COVID-19 vaccines.

COVID-19 vaccine and booster recommendations may be updated as CDC continues to monitor the latest COVID-19 data.
