

October - National Animal Safety and Protection Month

Celebrated each
October to raise
awareness about the
ethical treatment
and welfare of all
animals that are both



domestic and wild. Some ways to help animals include veterinary care, microchipping your pets, having animal emergency plans, learning basic first aid, and protecting wildlife and their habitats.




October 11th - Urban Wildlife Conservation Day

This day recognizes urban wildlife refuges that provide access to nature for city dwellers. The

purpose of this day is for people to connect with nature and to encourage outdoor recreation, and to also promote conservation efforts for nature and their habitat. Ways to participate include hiking and birding.

October 12th - Animal Road Accident Awareness Day





on the side of the road. Often animals will survive if they receive medical assistance. Always report an injured animal on the road. Drivers should reduce speeds especially during dawn and dusk and scan for wildlife.



October 14th - International E-Waste Day

Created in 2018 by the Waste from Electronic (WEEE) Forum to raise awareness about electrical and electronic equipment waste and to encourage people to recycle. This year's theme spotlights Critical Raw Materials (CRM) that are only found in a few areas of the world.




October 16 - Global Cat Day & Nat'l Feral Cat Day

Created in 2001 by Alley Cat Allies to raise awareness that cats are community members and every community should have policies and programs to protect them. Programs such as the trap, neuter, and release (TNR) for feral/stray cats. Adoption doesn't always work with feral cats, but is an option for stray cats.

October 17th – International Day for the Eradication of Poverty

The United Nations 2025 theme is "Ending Social and



Institutional Maltreatment by ensuring respect and effective support for families." The theme highlights how social stigma, discrimination, and negative institutional practices hold back people in poverty.



October 21st - National Reptile Awareness Day

This annual celebration promotes the appreciation and conservation of reptiles around the world. The day highlights the ecological importance of reptiles and the threats they face from habitat loss and illegal trade. There are over 11,00 species of reptiles in the world.

October 23rd - International Snow Leopard Day

The annual celebration raises awareness and promotes conservation efforts for the Snow Leopard and their mountain habitats. There habitats include the high



mountain ranges across 12 countries of Central and Northern Asia. They are listed as Vulnerable with less than 6,390 left in the wild.

October 25th - National Make a Difference Day

Created in 1992 by the USA Weekend Magazine and Points of Light. It has become one of the

largest days of volunteerism in the US. This day promotes acts of kindness, community service where people come together to volunteer and raise funds to help with the urgent needs of our society.



October 25th - Pit Bull Awareness Day

Created in 2007 by Jodi Preis, of Bless the Bullys to help promote positive perceptions of pit bulls through education and advocacy instead of just negative stereotypes. One of the myths is that pit bulls are inherently aggressive. Like all dogs their behavior is shaped by their environment and in a loving responsible home they are friendly, loyal, and affectionate.
