OUR MINISTRY IN THE CONGO (DRC)

On Sunday January 7, 2024, FUMC member Blaise Lolika shared about his recent trip and the dire conditions in his birth country. He and wife Nathalie's non profit, Global Assistance for Women and Children (GAWC) cares for innocent victims of severe trauma, such as this 5 year old and her mom (*left*). The child's father was beaten to the point of death, when he tried to shield his daughter from attack. Other tragedies were witnessed on this trip.

Our church's support has worked to show the most vulnerable that they are not abandoned! Blaise and Nathalie say thank you and request continued prayer:

- For health to continue the work. Blaise asks for divine help in dealing with trauma and pain, and for Nathalie's health and their 4 children.
- For GAWC team members on the ground, who risk their lives to give shelter, comfort, and desperately needed nutrition.
- For the Congolese people to be able to control their own future. Warring interests of neighboring countries and the theft of natural resources have destabilized the country and hurt its good citizens.
- For more donors from many sources to join the ministry. \$2,000 a month in 2024 is the current goal, in advance of another trip to bring hope and healing.

Winter, a Time for Reflection

Dear Friends,

This has been a most beautiful year! In **January**, two lovely granddaughters from Maine came to live in our guest house. Isabelle promptly found a barista job downtown that kept her busy mornings and evenings. She cared for her ferrets between times. We had to screen two crawl spaces under the house to prevent javelina and ground squirrels from moving in also.

Dozens of Meyer lemons ripened in **February**. Then the cassia took over. These seven-foot bushes, densely covered with brilliant yellow blossoms, form a hedge across the front of our house that can be seen from two blocks away. The fragrance is subtle and lovely. The Peruvian tree cactus by the front door put out spectacular huge white blossoms at night. Unfortunately, the bats that were expected to pollinate them didn't arrive. We also have seen fewer bees and birds.

In **March**, Judith dried purple and white pansy blossoms that were three inches across! At least a bazillion yellow and orange African daisies and California poppies covered huge swaths of both front and back yards. Then Mother Nature put long pale pink penstemons among them. What mortal would have dared that color combination? Bruce was the first to spot the seven-foot spar shooting up out of an agave in our back yard. It literally grew over night.

April also brought grapefruit blossoms so thick they looked like it had snowed. The hoop house sprouted triple pink poppies thanks to seeds from our sister-in-law, Loy. Several chairs in the front and back yards help us enjoy all this beauty when the heat and mosquitos permit. We froze many bags of spinach, chard and beet greens from the garden. They will be breakfast smoothies later. One prickly pear cactus burst out with eight hot pink blooms on each pad and another one had salmon pink flowers that were especially lovely against the deep blue sky!

May brought out the oleanders. In our yard they are 12 (poisonous) feet high with clumps of white flowers. Stephen and Perry put up the awning over the pond before the paloverde tree could shed its blossoms and cover the water like a yellow sheet. Pale lavender snapdragon-like flowers popped out of the desert willow outside our living room window. Judith gained a pacemaker that gave her back some valuable energy.

In **June**, several 5-petaled red-orange stepelia bloomed with many fist-sized buds coming along behind. They smell like rotten meat to attract flies needed for pollination, and look like a hand opening one finger at a time until they are nine inches across. We do not know why the insides are covered with fine white hairs.

Two large yellow canna lillies opened at the pond in **July**. The night blooming cerius vine on the paloverde tree blossomed big and white with yellowish centers. On July 17th, Tucson enjoyed its first

summer rain. It was a windy, gully-washing torrent stripping leaves off trees and giving us a badly needed 3/4 inch. Some parts of Tucson experienced almost two inches! If that weren't enough, on the 29th we had hail! Granted, it melted before Judith could get her camera out, but it was scary hitting the windows. The wind knocked two verdin nests to the ground. They are grapefruit sized balls of twigs with a thumb-sized entry hole on the lower side. Inside is soft and fuzzy. We enjoyed seeing a cooper's hawk dip in our back yard pond and hummers take long baths in the front fountain.

August is a synonym for heat. The water from the cold faucet is warm enough to shower in. We leave it on the counter to become room temperature before drinking it. Waiting and watching the clouds build, hoping for lightening, listening for thunder and sighing when the cooling rain falls somewhere else, became a daily routine.

A **September** surprise! One perfect yellow water lily joined us on the 8.th. The gila wood peckers demolished April's prickly pear fruits. Nuts on the jojoba bush burst open. Since Judith no longer uses them in mesquite bread, the birds got a treat.

Just when we thought Nature had no more surprises this year, in **October** the beige stepelia, that has bloomed for each friend to whom Judith gave a cutting (but not for her), quietly produced several huge buds! Who knew they only come on new growth?

November found us enjoying two new house plants, a Christmas cactus with indescribable blossoms and a magenta Oriental lily. Both are hot house gorgeous and we hope to be able to keep them that way. Those of you who don't live in the desert, did you know that the winter sun shining through cactus needles makes them look red?

In **December** we notice the lizards are gone. Surprisingly, the bird feeder suction cupped to the kitchen window hasn't had any visitors yet. But we are hopeful. Bruce's ultra low blood count continues to show radiation induced bone marrow cancer. His doctors say the clinical trial is working, but it sure is slow. For fun, he does zig-saw puzzles. Judith keeps busy working on a Japanese crewel embroidery piece started in the late 1970s, a new quilt combining the log cabin pattern and appliqued butterflies, and spinning a tri-colored Jacob sheep fleece that's been in the cedar chest since the 1990s. So many textiles, so little time!

Life in Tucson is still very good for both of us and we hope it is for you, too.

Stay safe, be well, and pray for World Peace in 2024.

Animal & Environmental Holidays for January 2024

January – National Pet Travel Safety Month Pets are our companions and are often part of our travel plans. Some travel tips include to always kennel or to use a safety harness to keep your pet safe during vehicle rides. Never leave a pet alone in a parked car or allow pets to hang their head out the window in a car while driving.



Jan 10th - National Cut Your Energy Costs Day Created by the Canadian Energy Efficiency Alliance (CEEA) to encourage homeowners and businesses to help reduce energy costs. Ways to cut energy costs include weatherproofing your home, solar power, turn down thermostats, use LED lights, carpool/public transport, turn off lights, and unplug appliances.



Jan 14th - Feast of the Donkey

The donkey that journeyed with the Holy Family is honored today. There are several accounts of donkeys in the Bible; Jesus rode one on Palm Sunday when he went to Jerusalem, a donkey is said to be present at Jesus' birth. Take time to read about the donkeys of the Bible.



Jan 19th – Tenderness Toward Existence Day This day is dedicated to exhibiting kindness, compassion, and understanding toward all living beings on Earth whether it be humans, insects, invertebrates, animals, or plants.



Jan 20th - Penguin Awareness Day

There are about 18 known species of penguins. They are cute flightless birds that are peaceful but face many dangers. Threats include predators, habitat loss, reduced food availability (due to commercial fishing), disease, and climate change. They need our help to keep from going extinct.



Jan 21st – Squirrel Appreciation Day

Wildlife rehab specialist Christy Hargrove created this day in 2001 to foster kindness toward these cute creatures and to raise awareness of how important they are to the environment. There are about 285 squirrel species in the world.



Jan 26th – World Environmental Education Day Created in 1972 by the UN Conference in Sweden for the Human Environment. The goal of this day is to raise awareness about participation on both a local/global scale to identify environ- mental issues and to actively help solve them by conserving/protecting the environment.



Jan 27th – National Geographic Day On January 27, 1888, the National Geographic Society was formally founded. Today, the National Geographic continues to pursue its mission "to increase and diffuse geographic knowledge while promoting the conservation of the world's cultural, historical, and natural resources." Today we honor over 100 years of the "National Geographic Magazine".



Jan 28th - Int'l Reducing CO₂ Emissions Day Created by the United Nations to help reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The amount of Co2 that is coming from human activity that includes using fossil fuels, agriculture, and transportation needs to be reduced to help battle climate change. Recycling, adjusting your thermostat, & LED bulbs would help.



Jan 31st - International Zebra Day

There are three types of zebras in the wild; Grévy's zebra, plains zebra, and the mountain zebra. They are known for their black and white stripes. This day is about spreading awareness to help protect zebras. The Red List of Threatened Species lists the Grévy's zebra as endangered.
