"Learn the Nuances"

When I was young, I did not know the difference between Chicago and New York styles of pizza. On one occasion, some college students at church wanted to treat the youth group to a pizza party but they started arguing about which pizza was better. To me, cheese pizza was cheese pizza. Or so I thought...

I'm embarrassed to admit for a long time, I knew no difference between African Americans and Blacks. I thought they were referring to the same people. In fact, in my early 20s, I stopped using the word "black" when referring to people out of the (naive) idea that I was helping to stop discrimination by not associating people with a color. I shuddered the day I found out I was committing a grave injustice by doing so. My intentions were good, but I was ill-informed.

I learned through the grace of my dear friend Bill Thomas that African Americans does indeed refer to all persons from Africa. But just as Syrians, Russians, and Koreans are all considered "Asians" (as in, from the continent of Asia), "Africans" also refers to diverse ethnicities. Look no further than Elon Musk, an African American who clearly does not resemble what most have in mind when we say African.

More importantly, "Blacks" refer to those specific persons who were forced into slavery, whose language and cultures were stripped away. Descendents of slaves can no longer trace their lineage back to Africa. So, "African-American," though it may

SOUL KITCHEN

3-Ingredient Mug Nutella Brownie

https://www.biggerbolderbaking.com/microwave-mug-nutella-brownie/

Ingredients

1/4 cup + 1 Tbsp (90g) nutella 1 large egg, gently whisked 2 Tbsp all-purpose flour

Directions

- 1. In a large microwave-safe mug, whisk the nutella and egg together.
- 2. Add the flour and mix into a smooth batter.
- 3. Microwave for roughly 45-60 sec, keeping a close eye on it so it doesn't overflow or overcook. When the brownie is set and firm on top, it is done.
- 4. Let cool a few minutes before eating.

seem to be more politically correct or culturally sensitive, it is not. In fact, it is more harmful because it then also robs our Black siblings from their heritage. Again, since the arrival of their ancestors, the only remaining heritage they can claim as their own is to be Blacks in America. The best I think we can do is to honor them by naming them as such. If calling someone Black makes you cringe, if it makes you uncomfortable, let us use that discomfort and unease to root out racism and discrimination. Let us share what we know as to enlighten others. Let us not simply change the word without having been challenged nor having done the hard work to eradicate the injustice that is at its core.

If Chicago deep dish pizzas and New York thin crust pizzas can have their own standing in our minds as valid and distinct dishes, then surely we must learn the differences and nuances that take hold of our sibling's identities. I challenge you to learn the nuances and enjoy the grand beauty of the diversity in God's creation.

[An important side note: For similar reasons, we refer to the natives in America who we killed, took away their children and their land as Indians. Native Americans (whom the Indians are a part of) refers to all natives in all of the Americas.]
