QUEER VOICES

IN MEMORIAM

Just over 5 years ago, on June 12, 2016, 49 people were gunned down and another 53 were injured in a horrifying terrorist attack at the Pulse nightclub in Orlando, FL. It was the deadliest incident ever in the history of violence against LGBTQ+ people in the US, and the deadliest terrorist attack in the US since September 11, 2001. The gunman, who doesn't deserve to be named, was motivated by revenge for American airstrikes in Iraq and Syria.

Because Pulse was hosting "Latin Night" that Saturday, more than 90% of the victims were Latino, and they ranged in age from 20 to 50 years old. So many lives cut short!

Just hours after the attack, thousands of people across the nation began donating blood for the injured survivors. 28,000 pints were collected by the regional blood bank in the week following the shooting.

On June 25th, 2021, President Biden signed legislation designating Pulse as a national memorial. "A place of acceptance and joy became a place of unspeakable pain and loss. We'll never fully recover, but we'll remember," he said. The memorial represents "an absolute determination that we're going to deal with this every single solitary day, and make sure that we're not in a position to see this happen again."

Rainbow Cake Roll
