"Taking the Longer Path"

A part of me wishes that we would no longer need to talk about the pandemic. I can sense the fatigue in our community by the amount of activity I see on our streets, in markets, and our parks. I've been taking long walks on Saturday mornings at Sabino Canyon. It's nice to be in our desert landscape under the blue skies and drinking in that morning crisp air. But I'll tell you, when I'm wearing my mask on these walks, I am again, a minority.

We had hopes that by Thanksgiving Sunday (which is this coming Sunday), we would be able to gather for in-person service, at least in small group configurations. But alas, the spread has increased. Just 3 days ago on November 13th, we hit nearly 4,000 new cases. Those are numbers that are on par with ones we experienced this summer, which peaked at 4,797 new cases on June 30th.

Needless to say, our journey back to "normal" is still some time away. Without undermining the seriousness of our challenges, I am still convinced that grace abounds.

One of the joys I have during the pandemic is my increased time outdoors. Meetings and visitations, if they are necessary, are often outdoors. I go on long walks and I even commute by bike when possible. But it's not just my increased time outdoors that has changed. I began to take longer paths. I will go up a hill to visit with a colleague. I will walk Tory through a longer wilderness trail. I will bike a longer, but more scenic route home. It dawned on me, taking the longer path is not always bad.

I certainly long for our time in worship together. I miss our fellowship, the enticing treats, the smell of Pastor Allan's famous soups. I miss singing our hymns! And praying together. I miss the sound of laughter in the corridors, and the chimes that ring from our bell tower. I miss the warm handshakes and even warmer hugs, especially from Ms. Jae Hammond (who shares her greetings to all our members. She prays for all of us by name if you did not know.)

At the same times, I am so grateful for the ways we are able to connect. I am glad that this pandemic has renewed our congregational care ministries and our callers. I am glad for the consistent and more frequent releases of this newsletter. I am grateful for the cards that I get from our congregants in response. I am excited about our renewed hearts to help the faith community at Fuente de Zida Methodist Church in Mexico. (More on this later)

Even at home, I am grateful for the increased time I have to spend with my children. (I am thankful that across the country, there hasn't been a school shooting since March.) I am grateful that my kids take prayer seriously, and prayers for healing seriously. (I should add,

my son prayed for my thumb to heal from the cut that sent me to urgent care. The area of the cut began to tingle that night. Today, just over a week since he prayed, I am bandage free. Hallelujah!) My wife and I are constantly discovering the wonders of an Air Fryer. She has embraced the arts and crafts now that she's basically our children's at-home teacher. I even feel that this pandemic is changing my personality a bit, and I'm hopeful that it will be for the better.

All this to say, taking the longer path has its blessings. I encourage you also, if you have been putting somethings aside, to embrace the longer route home.

Join a ZOOM weekday class. Watch and worship on our Sunday Morning Live gatherings on Youtube. Learn to video record and join our virtual choir. (More on this after Thanksgiving.) Volunteer if you can in a local cause you are passionate about. Participate in our outreach or help us prepare for a new opportunity.

If we had not done so because we thought to wait for normal to arrive, I think we might be missing out on the joys, the graces of God provides. Let us take the longer route home, and discover the many joys we have in living in the love of God.

SONG FOR **THOUGHT** "Crown Him with Many Crowns" **M. Bridges and G. Thring**

Matthew Bridges published in his second edition of Hymns of the Heart (1851) the hymn Crown Him with Many Crowns, which originally had six stanzas. Later, in 1874, Godfrey Thring composed and published a new version of this hymn. For this reason, many hymnals combine three stanzas from Bridges and one from Thring in modern editions. The text is based on Revelation 19:12.

The composer and organist Sir George J. Elvey wrote a tune called *Diademata* in 1868 for this text. The word Diademata is derived from the Greek word "crowns". Enjoy!

Lyrics:

Crown him with many crowns, the Lamb upon his throne. Hark! how the heavenly anthem drowns all music but its own. Awake, my soul, and sing of him who died for thee, and hail him as thy matchless king through all eternity.

Crown him the Lord of life, who triumphed o'er the grave, and rose victorious in the strife for those he came to save. His glories now we sing who died and rose on high, who died eternal life to bring, and lives that death may die.

Crown him the Lord of love; behold his hands and side, rich wounds, yet visible above, in beauty glorified. No angels in the sky can fully bear that sight, but downward bends their burning eye at mysteries so bright.

Crown him the Lord of years, the potentate of time, creator of the rolling spheres, ineffably sublime. All hail, Redeemer, hail! for thou hast died for me; thy praise shall never, never fail throughout eternity.

OPENING PRAYER - Psalm 19:14

Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable to you, O Lord, my rock and my redeemer. Amen.

READING

Matthew 25:14-30

REFLECTING

Take a minute or two in silence.

Allow your thoughts to rest on a word, a phrase, a memory from this passage. Journal or share your thoughts from this moment of meditation on the passage.

RESPONDING

Respond to the reflection through the guidance from the Holy Spirit.

MINUTE MEMOIR - by Paul Cho

Unlike the oil from last week's reading, something we cannot share, the talents we read in this week's reading is something we ought to share. Moreover, talents are given to us as gifts, as opposed to the oil which we had to prepare in advance.

Assuming you are familiar with the classical understanding of talents and using our talents in service of God for the love of neighbor, let us reexamine the fault of the 3rd servant. I'd argue that it was not because he buried the talent. Rather, that he misunderstood the character of his master, and in fear, he hid the talent. It was his lack of understanding the true character of the master that was the problem and his hiding the talent was a response to the fear he felt because of his misunderstanding.

Perhaps we are also guilty of misunderstanding and misrepresenting the true character of God. Even if we ourselves do not intentionally do so, our culture has widely accepted the notion of a fierce and powerful, judgement and doom, fear mongering God. We should really be focused on the character of love in our God. "Perfect love casts out fear." (1Jn4:18) We ought to be advocates, witnesses, and spreaders of the fact that our God is one of compassion and love. Perhaps this is the true talent we have been entrusted with, and our task is to multiply this love in and through our lives.

RESTING

Dwell in your reflection and response. Take time to offer God praise and glory. Repent and seek forgiveness. Offer joys and the concerns, adding in your personal prayers. Lastly, offer a thanksgiving for God's grace and mercy.

CLOSING PRAYER Wesley Covenant Service Prayer

I am no longer my own, but yours. Put me to what you will, rank me with whom you will; put me to doing, put me to suffering; let me be employed for you, or laid aside for you, exalted for you, or brought low for you; let me be full, let me be empty, let me have all things, let me have nothing: I freely and wholeheartedly yield all things to your pleasure and disposal.
