
Presidents' Message

EARLY HISTORY OF THE DEPARTMENT

She Named It "The Park of Edgewater"

As the Department reflects 100 years of service, we look back and we reflect on the rich history of our small community. The Edgewater we know today is very different from its beginnings. The Siwanoy Tribe, originally used the shoreline as a fishing camp. Over the years, the land was owned by many different people, including Edward Stephenson in 1792, until in 1851 George Townsend Adee, for

whom Adee Drive is named, bought it from Edward LeRoy for \$20,000. Adee built a mansion in 1856 for his sons and his wife, Ellen Louise Henry, who named the estate "Edgewater" and would refer to it as the "Park of Edgewater" to make it sound fancy to attract wealthy tenants. Today, the mansion houses the volunteer fire department and community athletic association. In 1910, the Adee family sold the land to Richard Shaw, an Irish immigrant, who used the property to board horses for the wealthy and run a stock farm.

Mr. Shaw was active in St. Ann's Episcopal Church in Morrisania and in the early teens allowed their cadets to camp in the area later designated as B Section. Eventually, others noted the tent sites and requested permission to camp on the estate. Mr. Shaw charged a nominal fee of ten dollars per season and ran a small general store from his mansion, supplying the various needs of the campers. Contests, such as running races, obstacle courses and pie-eating contests soon developed between campers, and although principally for adults, it eventually led to the creation of the Edgewater Athletic Association. Soon campers were requesting the same site each year, and asked permission to put up more secure structures, and a summer bungalow colony developed. The earliest cottages were built along the shore

around Sandy Pier in C Section, and circa 1918, other homes were constructed in B Section, as both of these areas boasted a beach. Most of what was to become A Section was still farmland and cows were still grazing in today's E Section where Mr. Ferreira had a little dairy. Campers would have to bring their own container to the milking area, where it would be filled for a small charge. With the help of these early campers, Richard Shaw was eventually able to purchase the land, which came to be called Edgewater Camp.

The Formation of the Fire Department

By 1920 houses were in evidence throughout the waterfront area of B Section and in much of C Section, so it was decided to establish a volunteer hose company in case of fire. Thus, in 1922, a handful of winter campers met in a wooden shed attached to the mansion one night and formed the Edgewater Camp Volunteer Chemical Hose Company, though the organization would be official incorporated as the Edgewater Camp Volunteer Hose Company No 1 Inc. The first elected chief of the fledgling Department was Herman O'Neil and the company operated a hand drawn carria as its first apparatus. In the 1930's the Department would purchase its first motorized apparatus from the Rockefeller estate, a 1924 Ford Model TT American La France Chemical Engine.

There was no system of roads other than the entrance road, known as Adee Drive, and Dock Street, which led from the Mansion to Sandy Pier. The veterans returning from World War I recalled their company camps, and the letter system was used to differentiate the different areas of the community. A for Able, B for Baker, C for Charlie Company were used at first, and then D and E were added as Edgewater Camp grew. This system remains in place today and is used by the residents and mail service despite the streets having subsequently being given formal names. This unique layout remains one of the key reasons why the Department plays such a vital role to the community, as NYC emergency response vehicles rely on the EPVFD to navigate to emergencies.

The Department would see much change throughout the years. During World War II, many of the volunteers would go on to serve in the military, and the Department would become part of the civilian patrol, seeing its ranks swell to over 100 members. The wooden shed that acted as the first apparatus room was replaced with a much larger brick and cinderblock structure, which now consists of two bays and a radio room. By 1950 almost the entire community were full-time residents, and eventually Edgewater Camp became the Park of Edgewater and home to about 675 families. At this time the Department



changed its name to the Edgewater Park Volunteer Hose Company No. 1 Inc. As the community continued to develop the Department would change and adapt to serve its needs. The Department obtaining apparatus with 4-wheel drive to navigate the sand dunes, an area which would become notorious for mysterious brush and car fires. The Department would later obtain water rescue equipment in service to its beach front nature. In the 1960's, after the taking down of the old dance hall, the firehouse became the center of community events, functions, fundraisers, community meetings and the like. Over the years, the firehouse has been

key to the building of the community's youth into strong civic minded adults. The firehouse has and will always continue to adapt and evolve to meet the results of the community.

Notable EPED Responses Through History

Throughout the course of its history, the Department has responded to thousands of calls for help both big and small. From "oxygen" calls, to water rescues, to fires and evacuations, the Department has been there to help. Here is a summary of some of the more unique and noteworthy responses of the Department through the ages.

Tanker Washing Ashore (A Classified Story) – 1944

A story that never appeared in any newspaper concerned a ship that ran aground in Edgewater. It was during World War II and strict security measures clamped down on the episode – news photographers could not publish the picture and FBI agents circulated through Edgewater Park, confiscating any snapshots which might have been aid and interest to the enemy. It was 20 years before the story could be told. During the war, Allied shipping used the Long Island Sound to evade Nazi submarines and American pilots were picked up or dropped off at City Island. All kinds of foreign ships, camouflaged or painted dull gray, came and went on mysterious errands, and at night, they passed without running lights, departing like ghosts along the blacked-out coastline.

One stormy night in the winter of 1944, a tanker dragged anchor and drifted across the bay to end up with its bow rammed into the A- section sea wall, next to Alden Park. People on the front row woke up in the chilly pre-dawn to the muffled sound of ship's bells, and a lively argument in Norwegian between an angry first mate and a flabbergasted sailor. By happy coincidence, the first Edgewater te at the scene was Norwegian-born and he told the mariners where they were, and that they would be stranded there, high and dry until the tide came in again. In a short time, the beach was swarmed with port officials, Coastguardsmen and security officers. The Norwegian crew were not allowed ashore, so the "square-heads" tossed down some European cigarettes and some cans of beers were thrown up to them, until the security men kept everyone at a distance.

The captain and first mate were permitted to come down and use the telephone and buy some supplies. For the rest of the day, there was more Norwegian heard on the waterfront than English, and some of the residents dined on canned salmon from 'the old country' that night. Then a tug appeared at high tide and towed the tanker free. So, Edgewater had a brief international interlude until the tanker THORDIN steamed off to continue the war. – *Article excerpted from 1964 Alarm*

Edgewater Shopping Center Fire – 1979

Many residents of the community will recall when Edgewater had its own shopping center. A full compliment of stores meeting all the needs of the community's' residents. Such stores included the Braren's Deli, a stationary store, bakery, hardware store, candy shop, laundromat, barbershop and more. On August 14th, 1979 an arsonist started a fire in the candy store which spread quickly through the cockloft of the shared commercial structure. Unfortunately, despite the best efforts of the EPVFD fighting the 5th alarm fire, all stores were lost that evening, never to return.



Nor'easter (No Name Storm) - 1992

Since the community's inception, Edgewater has always been susceptible to hurricanes and storms. In the 1950s' flood waters damaged multiple homes along the seawall. However, on December 12th and 13th, 1992, Edgewater would find itself under siege by a winter nor'easter that took the entire NYC metro area by surprise, as the weather service had indicated the storm would be out to sea. As such, the community was not ready for the winds and 10ft plus storm surge that followed. Boats that were still anchored offshore were thrown into homes, severe flooding left residents scrambling to evacuate. The EPVFD became an emergency Red Cross shelter, members would go house to house to check on residents, and then later spend weeks pumping our resident's homes and basements.



<u>September 11th, 2001</u>

The attacks on September 11th, 2001, changed the world forever. On that day, the Department would see its role expand, providing mutual aid to the FDNY. With many of FDNYs resources dispatch to ground zero, EPVFD was tasked with acting as the 1st due engine for the Throggs Neck area. In the days that followed, EPVFD members would be among the many fire companies that took part in the search operations and debris removal at ground zero. We still feel the effects of this event today with multiple responding members suffering health conditions from their exposure to ground zero.



Super Storm Sandy – 2012

On October 29th, 2012 Edgewater was once again faced with a storm threat. Just as with the nor'easter 20 years prior, the EPVFD became the hub for emergency response in Edgewater Park. Members conducted tours in 12 hour shifts for 5 straight days. Prior to the storm, EPVFD went door to door to encourage residents to evacuate, once again the firehouse became an emergency shelter housing dozens of residents. In the weeks that followed, the firehouse served as the FEMA Disaster Assistance Center ensuring that residents had ready access to the disaster assistance they needed. This setup worked so well for FEMA that the firehouse today remains the designated FEMA site for storm events that occur in Throggs Neck. With funding barriers finally out of the way, the governors office will soon begin work on upgrading the firehouse's facilities to ensure the site is up to this task.



"Mr. Firehouse"

One hundred years ago in December of 1922, a group of men from Edgewater Park, then known as Edgewater Camp, made history. With the campsite becoming a year-round home to more residents, this small band of men recognized the need for year-round fire protection in the burgeoning community. On a cold night in December, they met in a small wooden shed attached to the mansion we know today as the firehouse. There, they decided to charter the Edgewater Camp Volunteer Hose Co. No. 1. Herman O'Neil was one of the founders of the Department and would serve over 50 years serving in many roles. He helped craft the first formal set of By-Laws, adopted in 1925. He was the first elected Chief of the Department; prior chief's being appointed by the organization directors. The Department's Class 1 Commendation is such named after the man who was known as "Mister Firehouse". He set the bar for what it meant to lead the Department. Many have come since to carry the burden of Chief, each leaving his mark on the Department.

Honorary Chiefs Tribute



The title of "Honorary Chief" was first given to Richard Shaw Sr., in honor of this contributions to the founding of the Department in his role of the landlord of Edgewater. Since that time, the titles of Honorary Chief, and Honorary Deputy Chief have been bestowed to individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the advancement of the Department. Here, we pay tribute to our Honorary Chief's, past and present.


Many years ago growing up in Edgewater I always admired the volunteers and how they responded to help residents in their time of need. As I got older I was able to join them in 1972 as a Firefighter, Lieutenant, and Chief. It's where I gained my love of the Fire Service. Its influence on me is why I joined the ranks of the FDNY in 1982. Graduating Valedictorian of my Proble Class I was given a choice for my 1st assignment and chose 58 Truck in the Bronx. From there I moved on to my next assignment in Special Operations as a Hazardous Materials Specialist assigned to Haz-Mat 1. Through this assignment I attended many specialized schools during my entire career, it included the fire service academies, the military, and universities where I learned about a wide variety of subjects relevant to my job. As time marched on I was selected to join the adjunct faculty of some of these institutions teaching around the country when not working in the city. I helped write several training manuals, protocols and doctrine at the National Fire Academy as well as other institutions in the US. Because of the knowledge and specialized skills the FDNY allowed me to attain, I was assigned to Federal Task Forces that responded to disasters around the country. The Bridgeport L'Ambiance Plaza collapse in 87, World Trade Center Bombing in 93, the Oklahoma City Bombing in 95 and the Atlanta Olympics in 96 are the more memorable events. After these events I thought these would be the worst that I would see & respond to in my lifetime; little did I know what would follow. All my hard work paid off because in 1995 I was selected as the city's top employee for outstanding public service receiving the 100 Years Association Award which was presented to me by Mayor Giuliani. As the department expanded its counter terrorism I was detailed to help form a new Hazardous Material Battalion within the Special Operations Command. On September 11, 2001 I responded to the WTC arriving just as the south tower collapsed. After carrying one survivor to safety, I was heading into the north tower when it began to come down. I managed to survive the collapse and worked my way out of the debris along with some others. Unfortunately some of my brother firefighters weren't as lucky; 343 perished that day with my firehouse suffering the greatest loss of 19 that day. Many came to help that day including Edgewater Park Volunteer Hose Co.1 doing what they do best; helping others. Shortly after 9/11 I became the Health & Safety Officer for all unformed firefighters and dealt with health issues related to 9/11 for 3 years before returning to the field. DEPARTA My career ended in 2008 because of 9/11 related illnesses but I can never for sacrifice of some of my brother firefighters during my time on the job. I would those experiences and opportunities had it not been for my start in the opportunities had it not been for my start in the Volunteers. The New York City Fire Riders Motorcycle Club are a non-profit organization who raise money and support organizations within the FDNY, U.S. MILITARY, and many other charities.






An Old Time Stampede

Do you think all stampedes took place out West? Let me tell you the story of the Great Cattle Stampede of Edgewater that was triggered by a Mr. McNamara, now long departed from this earthly scene.

In "the old days" there was no bus line to Edgewater and the early residents got off the trolley car at Bruckner Boulevard and hiked in from there. One night, this man worked late and it was pitch dark as he got off the trolley car and started the 2-mile walk into Edgewater. Passing the gate house, he crossed the meadow which is now E-Section but in those days it was the cow pasture. The cows were peacefully bedded down in the clover, but in the pitch darkness Mr. McNamara did not see one, and walked right up on the back of a sleeping cow,

The next moment the cow reared up with a startled MOOO and the rest of the herd lumbered to its feet and stampeded off in all directions. Mr. McNamara was tossed off — and when he landed, he heard a terrific racket as the cows plunged thru the orchards of E-Section or blundered down the swamps where the D-Section is now. A few of the cows, bellowing in fright, galloped around the bungalows, kicking over tent-ropes and scaring the campers half to death.

The next morning everyone was talking about the Big Stampede, but Mr. McNamara never let on how it started.


