"… Coming 'round the Mountain …'

You have likely heard that "Advent" means coming. Its Latin roots are ad ("to") - venire ("come"). Even in its everyday use, such as: "the advent of space travel ...", the word speaks of an arrival, especially of something momentous, that has been anticipated or awaited.

So, *Advent* (with a capital "A") enunciates the anticipated, prophesied, foretold arrival of something more than momentous. The Israelites had long anticipated the arrival of

the *Messiah*. And while there may have been nearly as many understandings of what the Messiah would be and accomplish as there were people, it appears none of them anticipated God incarnate! God, come to earth.

God took on a clever disguise, looking like one of us, a rather common one of us. An infant. Born in a stable. Not from a wealthy family. No political lineage. Joan Osborne sang "What if God was one of us ...," however there's no "what if." God came as one of us, fully human. But, also fully God, fully divine. God came to walk among us to reveal God's nature to humanity, to reveal God's intention for humanity, and to reveal God's kingdom in-breaking upon us.

During Advent 2021 what is it that we are anticipating the arrival of? Are we anticipating the probability of being awaken

one night to be told "For unto you is born this day a Savior"? Are we anticipating God incarnate to be walking along beside us, revealing God's self to us? Are we anticipating someone who will turn our 21st century world upside down?

I suspect that what we anticipate may heavily influence what we wind up finding, or possibly preclude us from discovering what lies outside our anticipation. The challenge is to anticipate, but in the process to be open to what is coming. The challenge is not to believe we have a good handle on what to anticipate for it has come some 2020 times already.

As we anticipate what gifts we may be unwrapping come Christmas, may we also anticipate the one that has no wrapping, ribbon or bows. A gift that will exceed our ability to predict, and challenge our ability to comprehend. A gift that is light, that is life! A gift that will cause us to discard our old lives for the new life that is held out before us, by the very one who saves us. Let us be open this Advent and Christmas to the arrival of the beyond momentous gift of Christ - for the 2021st time!

NOTES FROM SESSION NOVEMBER 16, 2021

The regular meeting of the Session of the First Presbyterian Church of Helena was called to order on Tuesday, November 16, 2021, at 6:35 PM via Zoom. Reverend Scott Wipperman opened with prayer and moderated the meeting.

Pastor Scott Wipperman presented the devotional using Galatians, Chapter 6, Verse 2.

There was a quorum with the following Elders present: Linda Bench, John Coefield, Sheryl Eriksen, Rose Leavitt, Barb Leland, Carol Stebbins, Karen Witte, and Mary Stiles. Also in attendance: Pastor Scott Wipperman, Clerk of Session John Gneckow, Deacon Candace Coefield, CP Butch Plowman, and Worship Chairman Dianna Goodman. Kathy Chambers and Mary Wright were excused.

APPROVAL OF DOCKET: A report by the Covid Task Force was added to Committee Reports. Reopening Worship was added to New Business. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve the docket as amended.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve the minutes of October 19, 2021, as presented

PASTOR'S REPORT: Pastor Scott reported that October was another "in the black" month with income of \$21,399 and expenses of \$19,450. Our YTD shortfall is \$28,257 compared to \$16,470 last year at this time. We are 80% of the way through the year and have spent 67.82% of our budget.

Advent begins Sunday, November 28. We will continue to exercise caution and take precautions with Covid during the Advent season.

CLERK'S REPORT:

Clerk's Report: The Clerk reported that FPC received a thank you from Helena Food Share for a recent donation from our Mission Committee.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Administration Committee: Elder Linda Bench reported, and a written report was submitted. Our accountant needs help transporting information between the church and his office beginning in January. The committee is also looking for people to serve on the committee.

Committee members are concerned that a Faith Budget of \$41,095 is unattainable and needs to be reduced to \$15,000 and the Personnel Budget is the most likely place to make a reduction of this amount. **ACTION ITEM**: The Administration Committee requests the Personnel Committee to review its currently proposed budget for 2022 and develop options for Session to consider to reduce the Faith Budget for 2022 to approximately \$15,000; the expectation is that this will require reductions in portions of the Personnel Committee budget by approximately \$26,000; it appears this can best be done via the following actions: 1) Reductions in hours for staff member(s); 2) Temporary elimination of Staff position(s); 3) Changes to Pastor's Terms-of- Call or some combinations of these actions. Approved.

Building and Grounds: Elder John Coefield reported, and a written report was submitted. The security system has been installed but is not yet activated. After the system is activated, anyone entering the building outside of certain hours will have to enter a code to turn the alarm off. What hours the system will be turned off for church access is yet to be decided.

The elevator service company and church cleaning company have both indicated that they are increasing their rates for 2022.

Christian Education Committee: Elder Mary Stiles reported and a written report was submitted. Pumpkin Patch made money this year. The Friday night teen fellowship and the Kid's Fall Fellowship continues using Tik Tok and Instagram. **ACTION ITEM**: To approve Merle Korizek as a member of the Education Committee. Approved.

Congregational Fellowship: Elder Linda Bench reported, and a written report was submitted. Fellowship Time following worship has been discontinued on recommendation of the COVID task force. To-Go treats will be available after worship. No coffee will be available.

Mission Committee: Elder Karen Witte reported, and a written report was submitted. The United Way backpack promotion for the Homeless program is continuing. FPC is also soliciting food or monetary donations for the Food Pantry. As part of the Matthew 25

journey, tea, cider, or hot chocolate packets will be provided to the congregation to quench both their thirst and thirsty souls while reading their Advent Devotionals.

Memorial Committee: No activity to report this month.

Nominating Committee: Elder John Coefield reported and a written report was submitted. The committee members have met twice during November. Potential candidates are being contacted about serving as either an Elder or Deacon and some have already indicated their willingness to serve.

Personnel Committee: Carol Stebbins reported and a written report was submitted. Staff evaluations are done. The committee has been updating the church's Personnel Policy.

Worship Committee: Chairperson Dianna Goodman reported and a written report was submitted. Advent begins November 28. Because of Covid concerns, Hanging of the Greens will be done by the Goodmans and primarily limited to the Sanctuary. Les and some choir members are practicing music using the chimes. Advent Devotionals are available. There are different varieties to choose from.

Covid Task Force: Pastor Scott reported and a written report was submitted. The Task Force is monitoring the situation in the Helena area.

A motion was made, seconded, and approved that FPC return to singing hymns albeit while wearing masks. FPC will purchase K95 or M95 masks for worshippers to wear during the service and while singing.

A motion was made, seconded, and approved to allow the card game Hand and Foot to return to church on Fridays beginning December 3. The card players will be required to wear masks and no eating will be allowed. Masks will be provided.

Deacon Report: Deacon Candace Coefield provided a report of Board activities for October. Butch and Pearle Plowman are continuing to serve communion at Touchmark despite the increase in

COVID cases in the Helena community. They are not sure if that will change soon.

Old Business: Discussion and finalization of the 2022 budget was delayed until the December Session meeting to allow the Personnel Committee to address the motion passed during this evening's Session meeting.

New Business: Dianna Goodman opened a discussion on her perspective of the future return to church normalcy. No proposals were presented beyond the above noted motion to allow singing of hymns during worship.

There being no further business, it was moved and seconded at 8:22 p.m. to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried. Elder Rose Leavitt closed the meeting with prayer.

Submission Deadlines for the Bulletin and Newsletter



To allow for the production and review of worship bulletins and the monthly newsletters we want to reiterate some submis-

sion deadlines for items to be included in those. It is always appreciated if material can be received earlier than these deadlines, but these deadlines need to be met for inclusion in a particular issue.

The deadline for worship bulletins is the most straight forward deadline: items for inclusion need to be into Bruce by Tuesday at 10:00 am for inclusion in Sunday's bulletin, preferably in an electronic form. Given that the last day of the month moves, submissions for a newsletter needs to be made by 10:00 am on the sixth business day before the end of the month. For instance, if the 30th or 31st is the last day of the month and it falls on a Tuesday, then six business days before the 30th/31st would be Monday the 22nd of the month. For the January Mustard Seed, submissions need to be in by 10:00 am on Monday, December 20th. Church holidays may require that submissions be made even earlier for both bulletins and newsletters.
