Thank you to the person who wrote an article in the February Blueskin News about our track cutting around Warrington. While we are happy to do this locally (as we live here) we are actually part of a wider group of volunteers known as "The Green Hut Track Group". The group is financially supported by the DCC, DOC and other related parties such as the High Country Trust with funding, to buy machinery and fuel. There are no paid employees.

We meet every Wednesday (weather permitting) and while there are about 25 - 30 members in the total group, being voluntary, a usual muster is about 12 - 15 people depending on the volunteers' other commitments. At present we have two lady volunteers. The area we cover includes the Silver Peaks, Flagstaff, Swampy and Silver Stream catchments. Presently most of the group is working hard on the tracks in the Silver Peaks in relation to the up coming Three Peaks foot race.

While the majority of the volunteers are residents of Dunedin who can work all over the region, our local section concentrates on the tracks north of Dunedin such as those off Mountain Road, Pipeline, Burns, Rustlers and Careys Creek (and of course the beach tracks.)

We are always happy to have others join us. While regular turn out is expected, it is not a compulsory commitment every Wednesday, as we all have busy lives. Come and have a go.



We live by a humpback highway, where gentle giants commute north for the winter to give birth in the warmer Pacific, then the Southern Ocean and Antarctica to feed. You may be lucky enough to spot one at any time

of the year, but there are certainly creatures closer to home that we can investigate.

The Marine Metre Squared Project - Ngā Tini o te Waitai (MM2) is a citizen science project by the New Zealand Marine Studies Centre. It's an easy way to survey the plants and animals living on our seashore and contribute to scientific research.

Ngā Tini o te Waitai means "the multitudes of the sea water". Waitai is salt water or sea water. Tini means crowds or a great number. Tini also connects to Tinirau, who in Māori mythology

descended from Tangaroa (god of the sea) and is the father of fishes. Used in conjunction with the Marine Metre Squared name, it environment and what we are hoping and look after through this project.

Schools, individuals, parents and children are all encouraged to take part in surveying our local intertidal zone, and getting to know our neighbours: amphipods, isopods, brittle stars and sea cucumbers to name a few. Coastal health is crucial to the health of our kai moana, and us, and the more people who get involved with science and Matauranga, the better. Check out MM2.net.nz.

### 11th Waitati Music Festival a success!

Mr. Bland would hopefully be super proud that he gifted Bland Park in his will to our community, for the purpose of recreation as over 1,000 people including babies, children, tweens, teens, grown-ups



and never growing ups had such fun on Saturday 25 January at the 11th Waitati Music Festival.

Music poured from three stages, colourful artworks decorated the whole field and as well as musical entertainment, people were invited to join in with crafty workshops, paint on two vehicles, hut weaving, watch chainsaw sculpting, clowns, dancers and spray artists at work. Although we had a nervous lead in due to 50% of ticket sales occurring in the last few days (weather watchers!), by lunch on Friday we had sold enough tickets to cover the minimal costs and were able to relax slightly. A further flurry of sales resulted in a total of 700 tickets sold which has meant we have been able to better support all bands, performers and artists.

Our Zero waste plan enabled diversion of 95% of the items placed in the bins away from landfill because a team of people sorted, cleaned, recycled and composted. There was also a reduction in total weight of waste and we believe this is due to the adherence of our no glass policy - thanks to everyone for helping with our zero waste mission.

Sponsors, grant applications and volunteer labour are the reasons why the ticket price is low for a festival of this size. We want to thank everyone who helped, especially the DCC (yes you read that right!) who gave us consent to hold the event, eventually waived the \$1,800 consent application fee, and awarded us a community events and a waste minimisation grant. We also want the thank the Otago Community Trust, Waikoutiti Coast community board, Community Organisation Grant Scheme (COGS) and Creative Communities NZ who awarded us grants. Donations were gratefully received from the Waitati Equestrian Center, Emmerson's, Arc Brewery, Fire Watch Otago and Cargills Contractors, along with in-kind donations from Gravity Events, Hire Pool, Unity Sound and Dakins.

As leader of the gang, I would like to thank our brilliant committee members for taking specific lead roles and working tirelessly to plan, gather resources and build teams to make the festival happen and run safely and smoothly (including security, ticketing gates, medics, waste warriors, kidzone, stage leads and infrastructure builders). Thanks also to the volunteers that help on the day in exchange for a ticket.

### For the Love of Walnuts

#### The humans of Blueskin Bay love walnuts.

There are not many walnut trees available for public nut gathering in the bay. Seacliff has a beautiful grove of stately walnut trees, but their nuts are very small and you need to be super quick to beat the possums and rats to them.

The walnut tree outside the Blueskin Library has huge walnuts; it is a variety called Wilson's Wonder, which have large thin shelled walnuts with a lovely flavour, but is not all that well suited to our damp climate, and the black outer husk is inclined to get stuck to the nut shell and it makes them go mouldy easily.

If picked up and cleaned you can get some good edible nuts, but very brown hands (as a teenager I used to fantasise about soaking myself in a bath of walnut skins to try and develop a suntan). Wilson's Wonders do very well in the dry Central Otago climate, but not so well here.

The library walnut has been getting itself in trouble for being too close to the library and shading its windows, and too close to the boundary with the house next door. I am hoping it will just be pruned rather than felled as they take years to begin fruiting (going nutty). I do wish that we had some plantings of better walnut varieties for our climate, somewhere public where community members can get a dose of lovely walnutty omega 3 for free.

It is hard to find a place big enough for a walnut tree, where the tree won't impact gardens, roads and buildings. I was thinking ... how about Bland Park? Perhaps a wee grove in the far south-eastern corner, or a lovely line of them up the Southern boundary?

Walnut trees are low maintenance, they work well in public spaces and their generous nut bounty is so good for people with benefits to cholesterol levels, heart function, gut health and brain power.

Walnuts generally fruit better with a pollinator, though they can still manage to get fertilised by wind blown pollen. The library tree must have a lover somewhere in the Waitati village to mate with.


"Rex" is a commonly planted South Island, commercial variety, but though prolific, it has small nuts, another possibility is "Lara" which has a high yield and larger nuts.

We've had a wonderful start to the year with lots of families attending. It made me realise how lucky we are having such a kind, approachable and helpful community. I feel quite at home at playcentre, but we were all new to playcentre at one stage, so I asked some parents what questions they had before their first visit. The main questions were: What is playcentre about? Where do we park? and Will people be welcoming? (They will!)

Playcentre is a community run centre providing a space for 0-6 year-olds to play, learn and grow with their whanau alongside other families from our community. At Blueskin Playcentre we also pay through fundraising for an Early Childhood Educator.

Kimberleigh is our lovely Educator. She's great at setting up different optional activities for the week. For example, for Valentine's Day, the children were able to decorate their own heart-shaped biscuits (admittedly, my son ate half of his before he'd even started decorating!) and make heart-shaped ladybirds, which were cute.

The best place to park is in the gravel carpark opposite Waitati Kura, and then to walk down the shared school drive until you reach the playcentre building. Open the black gate, stroll along the covered deck, where there are coat pegs to hang your things on and plenty of space to leave a pram if you have one, then pop your shoes off, open the door, and come on in!

There's no cost to playcentre and it's pretty informal. You might imagine it's a lot of mums there, but actually there's also many dads and grandparents too.

### The Flying Fox Fair

The original Flying Fox was built sometime in the late 70's early 80's by Paul Clements. Murray Grimwood arrived in Waitati around the late 80's and Murray added a metal brace.

Fast forward to 2023. The fox was getting lower and lower to the ground. Peter Norrish our caretaker replaced parts to keep it going but we noticed one end of the flying fox lifting out of the ground. It was at that point, we had to close it down. Paul Clements, along with the Fire Brigade, heard about our poor fox and offered to make a new one. Several months later, we learnt that because of new safety rules, we would need to find an Engineer to sign off any new flying fox, which meant going to a commercial company.

We got invoices from playground businesses and started applying for money. Thanks to Sam Pickford, we have found a local engineering firm, Otago Engineering, AJ Grant who makes flying foxes and are able to work with us to install the flying fox like the original one.

It wasn't until we were studying Identity (Tuakiri) at school with the students that we discovered how much the kids missed their flying fox. We decided a Fair would be one way we could get the money together that we still needed after receiving grants.

The Fair on Sunday 16 February was just magical. The sun shone hot and bright. From the bouncy castle, toffee apples and candyfloss, to the variety of goods on sale, a digger, horse rides, raffles and animals. Most of all, as with all good gatherings, was catching up with friends and family. Thanks to the community for supporting us. Thanks to our amazing parents, grandparents, students, Board, and Kaiako for pulling together to make a truly amazing Waitati Fair. It was Andy Becroft that said the Fair echoed of past Waitati School events.

I am unsure how much money we made at the time of writing this article, but I am confident we have enough to finish installing a new flying fox. If the old one lasted 45 years, we can be sure future generations will enjoy this new Flying Fox.









### **Swingers Lane**

Nestled in the bustling CBD of Waitati lay a masterpiece of kiwi ingenuity and childhood joy. What began as two swings and a nice wee bench in the shade, has now become seven swings and three superbly crafted benches.

Among these seven swings you will find various branches (or perches) to jump from, whereby the difficulty (or danger) increases. This includes the dangerswing (follow the arrow) and deathswing (swinger beware, follow the ladder) perches.

There are still many complaints about roadside vegetation maintenance. We pass these to DCC when we receive them and they are usually resolved, but council finances are stretched, and the vegetation issue is well over budget. You can phone DCC on 477 4000 to lodge a complaint and, if you do, please make sure you receive a reference number so that your issue can be followed up. The DCC 9 Year Long Term Plan will be out for consultation for a month from 1 April and it includes a proposed increase in funding. It will help to highlight the vegetation problems if you make a submission to the plan - quite easy using the form on the council website - www.dunedin.govt.nz

How are things for you with Route 1 bus service - Dunedin to Palmerston. In the Otago Regional Council forward plans there is a suggestion to increase fares. How would this affect you? Please do let us know.

We still have money in our Discretionary Account. If you, or someone you know, has a community project that could do with some funding assistance, then you can complete a funding application form which can be found on the DCC website, or give any board member a call if you need some clarity. 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

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


