



Waikouaiti Coast **Heritage Centre**

October seems like it was a busy month for the heritage centre, what with the Labour weekend plant sale and hosting a large group of Dunedin gardeners for morning tea. One of our volunteers also gave a presentation in Dunedin to an audience of heritage enthusiasts.

Our plant sale was a huge success as usual, even though we had to move everything indoors due to inclement weather, nobody seemed to mind that it was a bit crowded at times. The Devonshire teas in the main bank chamber were a hit as well, it was lovely to see the room full of people sitting chatting over a cup of tea/coffee and enjoying a creamed scone made by Bev. Jan and Sue had three raffles running as well. Overall, we raised just under \$4500 on the day. This sum was added to the following week with about 45 keen gardeners here for morning tea, so of course we took the opportunity to offer remaining plants from the sale to them.

We hope to continue being busy in the lead up to Christmas, we have more stock arriving, so do call in and see what we have to offer, this includes a number of 2025 calendars and a range of lovely tea towels, ideal for posting to friends and family, along with lots of other gift ideas.

We plan to be open every day in the week prior to Christmas, and there's plenty of parking here too.

The Halo Project Predator Free team have been hard at work servicing the automatic selfresetting AT220 trap network in the Karitāne Coast area recently. Since these traps were last serviced in April, they have removed another 1,472 possums and 1,461 rodents. This brings the total predators removed from this area by these devices to 6,166! The circles in the map show the number of predators removed by each device since they were installed in late 2023.

The Source to Sea team have been getting stuck into pest plants, surveying at biodiversity hotspots such as Aramoana, Heyward Point and Ōtama Kaipapa/ Doctor's Point. They have identified an abundance of pest plant species that are considered a threat to our native fauna,



in line with the Otago Regional Council Regional Pest Management Plan. You can read more about these pest plants by visiting www.orc.govt.nz/pesthub.

The Source to Sea team are eager to hear from community or business groups who would like to participate in a pest plant removal volunteer day. These events are happening until winter 2025 and present an opportunity for team building in the sunshine, with a delicious sausage sizzle lunch provided! Reach out to info@ haloproject.org.nz if you'd like to join them.

The Halo Project highly recommends an application called 'Aotearoa Species Classifier'. They use this app to identify pest and native plants when completing their surveys. A photo of the plant is uploaded, and an identification is suggested, alongside a probability score of how likely the identification is of being accurate. Encouragingly this app can also be used to identify animal species! You can download it from the 'app store' on your phone.

The East Otago Playgroup in Waikouaiti runs weekly during school term time on Wednesdays 10am - 12pm at the Plunket Rooms in the East Otago Events Centre and a number of parents regularly come over from Blueskin Bay to attend this. We have a regular delivery of certified organic produce as well as some locally sourced spray free options. I've been busy building up the inventory and have added some organic canned goods, some NZ made cereals, Tio Pablo (a NZ made Mexican range), new gelato flavours, and Juicies. We've also got some new cleaning, health and wellbeing products, including Solid Toothpaste, Finding Wellness cleaning products and essential oil rollers, and the Kara Kawa range (soaps, solid shampoo, etc.). There's loads more new things in store and more on the way.

Our dream is for the store to be YOUR local grocery store, providing healthy staple and treatyourself options, while also stocking great locally made gifts. We're keeping our margins on the low-ish side and our products varied in the hopes that we can meet everyone's needs. I want the shop to be for the community and I want it to support our sustainability efforts.



Hat-Holding Democracy

Our gorgeous, noisy, cheeky kaka, swooping around noisily in juvenile gangs, they are beautiful to see, but I have a NIMBY issue with them just not in my backyard. Our neighbours thought they would generously share their walnuts with the kaka, but instead the kaka gang swooped by and stripped, cracked, scoffed and left the tree bare...bastards.

I refuse to ever put food out for them. A couple of years ago I put left over crackers, seeds and crusts out for the seed eating birds. Having been attracted to our garden they repaid my kindness by turning our silver beet into lace work (very pretty thank you birds), and ravaging pea plants, bean plants and corn seedlings among others...bastards.

I only feed the honey sippers now.

When there are berries in the garden, they have to be covered long before they even start to ripen or the black birds eat them up before you even know you have ripe fruit. Even with covers, blackbirds are born clever and can live for a maximum of 21 years. They learn where your raspberries are and have a little foraging map in their heads that says "oh, those raspberries must be getting ripe on Orokonui Road, I might check them out". Then they use every trick they have learned to get in under or through the nets. We were taking to a woman on the beach today who called pukekos "ferrets of the bird world". Ferrets kill chooks for fun, pukekos rip apart your vegetable plants for fun...

I love birds but I also love my food crops.

Here are some maximum life spans of common local birds to show how clever it is possible for them to become over a few seasons, and will keep returning to the scene of the crime at your place for years, and teach their kids too.

Blackbird 21 years Thrush 11 years Kereru 15-20 years Sparrow 12 years Starling 17 years Rosella 10-20 years Magpie 21 years Kaka 42 years (in captivity) Pukeko average 9 years

Grape netting is fairly readily available 2nd-hand from all those Central Otago vineyards. It needs mending, I use fishing line to mend it so the mends lasts longer.

I saw some clever supports for berries made with steel rebar topped with pieces of black polythene hose to make hoops as a non snag netting support.

I usually use warratahs with tin cans sitting on the top of each to drape the netting over before pegging it round the bottom with tent pegs. I have a bad habit of stealing all our camping pegs and using them in the gardens which causes relationship issues when we go camping.

I also use fibreglass bendy poles as hoops covered in insect mesh to keep out birds (including pukekos), white butterflies and many other little insect bastards.

When it comes to garden netting, treat it like covid... go hard and go early.

The High Mountains of Portugal by Yann Martel (author of Life of Pi Booker Prize winner)

Raw Spirit In Search of the Perfect Dram by Iain Banks

Bonnie Raitt: The Glow 1979

From the pile- classic Bonnie Raitt, slide guitarist blues queen, the voice of a black American soul/blues singer in the body of a skinny red haired white woman. With a hard arse band featuring Little Feat's Bill Payne on keyboards, David Sanborn on sax and the legendary Paul Butterfield on harmonica. This is no blues record, pure R&B, Soul, and Jazz. Standout tracks are Isacc Hayes: Your Good Things About To End and the Bill Payne lead funk with her slide guitar fitting right in there - The Boy Can't Help It. Both available on YouTube.

Marc: Emerson's this year acknowledged the South German tradition of 'Oktoberfest' by brewing three German style beers **'Das Bock'** is a strong beer available only at the tap room but worth the trouble of seeking out. It has a good depth of flavour, with the right measures of sweetness and malt - recomended. (I can fully endorse Marc's sentiments here!)

Wilding a film from the British and Irish Film Festival Isabella Tree and her husband Charlie Burrell strive to breathe new life into their ailing estate by returning it to the wild. 

REVIEW

This comprehensive history of St. Barnabas Anglican church, Warrington, is one of the most detailed accounts of any church in New Zealand from its foundation to the present day.

It is a testimony to perseverance and achievement. It takes us from the origins of Captain and Mrs. Pitt, who donated the land over 150 years ago, right up to the members of the present congregation and their Priest-in-Charge, the Rev. Dr. Jeremy Nicoll. With Stuart Strachan's assistance, the information has been obtained from a variety of sources including Vestry Minutes, Parish and Diocesan Records, Hocken Collections, Newspapers and, of course, the many letters and reminiscences left by the individuals, past and present, who have contributed to this wonderful history.

There is a real insight into the lives of the founding families, the Pitts, the Smiths and the Gellibrands, their struggles and successes, their sorrows and their joys. Through the imaginative writing of Roger Barker, the narrative transports us to the very times in which the clergy and parishioners were living.

An outstanding feature of this history is how much so many people have given generously of themselves down the ages to the present times through their involvement with the church. Their loyalty, devotion and active roles in the parish are still contributing to the life of St. Barnabas today.

[It is usually a 10 Year Long Term Plan but, due to some uncertainty about the incoming Government's statements relating to 3-Waters, all local councils decided to have an Annual Plan last year, followed by the current 9-Year Plan]. Apologies if this all seems like a bit of gobbledygook, but it's one of the joys? of being involved in local government.

We have two major issues in our northern region. These are the future of the Wastewater Treatment Plants for Warrington and Waikouaiti/Karitane, both near the end of their useful lives and with Resource Consents expiring. The solution will cost many millions, and I'll give you more details early next year.

We are also addressing the issues relating to roadside vegetation. You may be aware that, when Council decided not to sell Aurora Energy, it was made clear that there would not be any money available for 'nice to have' projects. We will be presenting some suggestions to Councillors in the next few months.

We still have money in our Discretionary Account. If you, or someone you know, has a community project that could do with some funding assistance, then you can complete a funding application form which can be found on the DCC website, or give any board member a call if you need some clarity.

I take this opportunity to wish you all a safe and happy Christmas and may the New Year bring what you desire.



Our very own Warrington Sealions

As local residents we are proud to be an important player in sealion conservations.

Each summer our local mum Joy gives birth to a pup on the Warrington Spit. Now her daughter Hope has been returning to Warrington to pup and other sealions are visiting and even delivering pups on our lovely sandy beaches in amongst the protective pine terees

Residents will be watching for notices erected to remind about their presence for the 4 - 5 weeks of the Christmas holidays. Department of Conservation summer rangers visit and coordinate local volunteers to monitor their position and keep signage current.

We can all help these special creatures to have peace while they pup by reminding visitors to stay 50m away from marine mammals, have dogs on leads as signage advises.

Pinch points are the carparks - which unfortunately is where the sea lions often choose to be! Visitors need to stop and leash the dog, before opening a car door. Visitors may allow



their dogs to bounce out of the car and immediately approach the resting animals. While they are extremely unlikely to hurt people, a barking dog is easy game for sealions and the bacteria in sea lion saliva would be lethal to land mammals such as dogs, who have no resistance to the marine bacteria.

Sea lions are sand animals and walk on four "leg- like- flippers". Females are sandy colured, males are dark and huge. They will naturally interact with humans who shout, wave arms or towels, or shoo them - but otherwise they are disinterested and happy to rest on the sand. On the other hand, Fur seals wriggle along the ground, hang out on rocks, not sand and are more likely to scarper, heading at pace towards the sea, when disturbed.

> always Check, Clean and Dry any clothing and equipment to prevent freshwater pests hitchhiking from

> > one waterway to another.

When you leave a waterway, check there's no plant material attached to your boat, trailer, clothes or footwear.

Let's all do our bit to protect Otago's waterways.

CAN I SWIM HERE?

Every summer ORC's environmental monitoring team checks 36 popular swimming spots around Otago for bacteria and/or algae to see if they're safe to swim in

SWIM SMART CHECKLIST:

- Avoid swimming for 48 hours after heavy rain, as runoff can be washed into waterways.
- Follow any warning signs.
- · Check the water is clean and clear.
- Stay away from any pipes, culverts, and flocks of birds.
- · Check for hazards.
- Learn how to spot toxic algae and know the hotspots for blooms in Otago.






