I wish you all a very happy Easter, keep safe, warm and well. Bernie




ANZAC Commemoration 2022 Waitati Cenotaph – 25 April

Blueskin Garden Club members are keeping in touch by email and the occasional outdoor get togethers.

Recently a group of us met at Long Beach. We walked along the beautiful beach admiring plants growing in cracks in rocks, wildlife and checking out the large caves. A great place just over the hill to visit and take the children for a play on the domain or enjoy the new playground equipment.



Tomorrow Lyne is holding a plant stall. Normally extra plants would be sold at markets, the flower show or Blueskin On Show Day. Due to these all being on hold or cancelled Lyne has kindly offered to sell her plants and monies raised are to be donated to the Cancer Society in lieu of the Relay For Life being cancelled. Thanks for your generosity Lyne.

Autumn has arrived and there are signs of colours changing although mostly the temperatures are still encouraging plants to grow before harvesting. There's still time to sow spinach, lettuce and turnips, onions should have their foliage bent over to hasten maturity or lift and enjoy. Silverbeet likes salt so when the tide is out gather some seaweed and put in ground 30cm below where the seeds are to be sown.

Loganberries, boysenberries, tayberries and cultivated blackberries need to be pruned after fruiting. Cut from the base of the plant all canes which have fruited and train the young canes in their place. Mulch with manure or compost half a metre out around the stems. Spring bulbs are now appearing in the shops so look out for some and plant soon to enjoy in the spring. MAYBE we will have a spring flower show this year and your blooms will be ready to pick and bring along for display? Who knows whether this year we will have a show after 2 year's absence – we live in hope. Happy gardening, harvesting, pickling, preserving and sharing all that your garden has provided.

I arrived in New Zealand at the end of 2010 for a 'holiday' and quickly grew roots, after taking on a team leader position, in a large multicultural school in Porirua Wellington. Originally from Liverpool, North of England, I believe I still have an accent, though my family overseas say I sound more 'like a kiwi'.

Opening of Mahi-ā-ringa **Ceramics Studio**

Waitati is a passionate and highly creative village. The idea for a ceramics studio came about from Passion projects at Waitati school. Passion Projects run once a fortnight for a whole day.

Chris Slabbert taught ceramics for a Passion Project back in 2020. Joining Chris for a session, I was immediately taken with the peace, the space and the opportunity for creativeness. During Covid the school has been focusing on wellbeing. Working with clay certainly brings an opportunity to become grounded. At the heart of learning is the creative process. Creativity is a way of thinking deeply about the world. However, It soon became apparent that the time to drive to East Otago High School to access their kiln took too much time (Thank you EOHS for generously opening your kiln to us). So being the dreamer I am, I suggested we build a ceramics studio.

Fundraising, applying for grants from the local community council ensued. Money from the PTA and generous donations of goods from the local ceramic community meant we quickly bought the kit. Then parents dug in and true country style, lined the walls, built shelves and made a garage into a beautiful studio.

The vision for Mahi-ā-ringa, includes the creation of a community space for parents to come with their children to work with clay. A committee to run workshops and look after the space will be created. This will provide a creative space for use after school and weekends for the wider Waitati Community.

The name Mahi-ā-ringa - work with hands seems direct and appropriate. We would like to get a sign made. Thank you to the Waikouaiti Community Board, the Waitati School PTA and the Dunedin City Council for supporting this project through funding.


Our first workshop is happening on Otago Anniversary Day. If you are interested please contact the school.

Covid Rules, 4 April:

Food Waste

Wasting food is a terrible thing. Food is a precious resource, and all resources are precious now that there are 7.9 billion of us. So when you have excess food in your garden, eat it, store it, preserve it, or give it away, even if it is only the apples on your ugly old tree in the backyard.

There are various facebook pages dedicated to exchanging or giving away unwanted stuff, and if you are a less "online" person, try putting your excess in the Waitati anti scurvy pantry, behind the Blueskin library, giving away to friends and acquaintances, or even just a box and a sign outside your gate.

I was generously gifted two buckets of beautiful dessert grapes recently. We ate our way through a few, made a couple of waldorf salads, but what to do with the rest? I thought about wine but decided in the end to make raisins. It took ages, days and days to get them dry enough to store. I pulled the grapes all off their stalks and put them on the trays on the dehydrator. I only switched the dehydrator on during the daytime, when our power comes from our solar panels and is free. If you don't have solar panels, it would be a lot more expensive to use an electric dehydrator.

It is possible to sun dry grapes by laying them out on trays; if they are outside on your deck they will need to be covered with some insect mesh and bought inside at night and if it rains. You could also use the inner of a small tent which is insect proof, and throw the tent fly over it at night.

I have since found out that to speed the drying process up you need to split the skins, either by halving the grapes (bugger that – too much work) or blanch them by dropping them in a pot of boiling water for less than a







minute, then straining them through a colander – this splits the skins. It is also better to use seedless grapes as the seeds stay the same size, but the grape shrinks away and the seed tends to dominate your raisin experience. I don't mind the seeds and you don't really notice them if you're using your raisins for baking.

To check for dryness squeeze some of your raisins with your fingers, if they still feel juicy, they need to be dried more, but try not to over dry them into hard little crunch husks either.

Store your raisins in a glass jar with a lid. We got 3 kg of raisins from the most part of two buckets of grapes. The satisfaction level was high and the biscuits I made with a handful of organic, local raisins were excellent. They would work really well in bircher muesli too.

This is just one example of avoiding food waste – it is fun to research and experiment with food preserving methods, and if you can't be bothered some other energetic lunatic (like me) may be interested in your garden excess.

The Halo Project is recruiting a new Source to Seafield team leader and rangers in time for the start of the new planting season.

In her new role as volunteer coordinator, Jeanne is planning a dozen weekend planting days for volunteers throughout the year, starting at Waihemo Shag River estuary on Sunday 1 May.

We are all looking forward to starting work at Long Beach, our new project. A 9-hectare area of DOC recreation reserve, at the southern end of Long Beach, will be restored to native dune habitat, with a wide range of common and rare native plants. We have 34,000 plants to go in this year alone. Plus, a walking track for your enjoyment.

We'll need volunteer help with all stages (site preparation, planting and maintenance). We'll hold regular weekday working bees starting in May, followed by weekend planting days on 15 and 28 May, and 12 June.

A huge thanks to everyone who helped us set up the nursery and pot up 22,000 plants over summer. We re-potted harakeke, mānuka, manatu lowland ribbonwood, horoeka fierce lancewood, koromiko hebe and teucridium.

The term is continuing to gather momentum with lots of interesting learning occurring in the classrooms and plenty of exploring and investigating happening in and around our local environment, particularly down at the beach. The school orchard has had a bumper crop of apples, plums, pears as well as the occasional feijoa and passionfruit which the children have enjoyed grazing on during the school day.

School Swimming Pool

Our school swimming pool is continuing to get a lot of use this term, with all our children enjoying swimming every day as part of their physical education programme. The new heat pump has been keeping the pool temperature sitting between 27 - 28 degrees which has been ideal, especially for our junior children as they continue to develop their water confidence and swimming skills.





Proposed Enrolment Scheme

During our first BOT meeting for the year, we had representatives from the Ministry of Education share with us the news that Warrington School has been directed to put in place an enrolment scheme. As the Warrington community continues to grow with all the ongoing and planned building work, there will be considerable projected population growth in the area, which they believe will put pressure on the current school capacity.

At the end of last year our roll reached 62 children which meant that we were running at 108% over our allocated building capacity. The Ministry views an enrolment scheme as the best way of managing roll growth. We'll be working alongside them to plan, consult and have the scheme in place for the beginning of the 2023 school year.



Last Man Standing by David **Baldacci**



VOLCO (Part 3)

Refugees.

The late Bruce Shephard told me, some years back, that he was unimpressed that some people had regarded him as a hippy in his "Opera House" days. He said that hippies don't get anything done.

So I won't describe the Friends of Volco Trust (formed sometime in the mid 90s) as hippies, just in case. Bill Dacker, in his pocket history of the place, describes them as "refugees from city living".

Volco founders, Dorothy and Lloyd Morris, were keen to help young people get the experience of organic/biodynamic rural living. What began as a James K.

Baxter inspired commune at Whare Manuka in the 70s, eventually re-established up hill in the Big House in the mid 90s, and further, to the environs of the cottage near Mt Kettle Quarry (which, absurdly, is not on Mt Kettle but on Mt Cutten). Here and about, a hardy group lived in a litter of scattered bivouacs, tents, caravans and huts.

This small community was always in flux, with some stalwarts, but others passing through. Three of the huts remain today, as reminders of how basic life was for their inhabitants, with floors of earth flagstones, timber, and uninsulated walls made of salvaged materials such as wiggly tin, odd windows, bits of board and fabric.

Those living in the "Big House", which Dorothy added to the property after Lloyd died in 1996, were somewhat more comfortable. It has 9 bedrooms, and all the conventional conveniences.

Some of the Volco dwellers still live in and around Waitati. You may even know some, but not know you know. #

It's Official!

It has been confirmed that there will be bus services at the weekends for our north coast communities. The formal name for the service is **'Route 1: Palmerston to Dunedin'.** The exact timetable will be published shortly. It will be on the Otago Regional Council website, plus notices in bus shelters and revised paper timetables.

The ORC were hoping to start the service at the end of the first week in April, but driver shortage due to Covid may have an impact on that. There is still a possibility for a Friday evening service but full costings for that have not been finalised.

It took many months of growling at DCC to have the footpath reinstated on Orokonui Road between the footbridge and Harvey Street. The work is mostly complete and will provide a safer area for children walking to and from school. Please let me know of any other footpaths you feel need attention. (We may already have them on our 'hit list'.)


With the firefighting water tanks now installed at Michies Crossing and Warrington Esplanade, all that is left is to plant shrubbery around them. That work will start soon.



Simnel Cake

Bake this classic Easter simnel cake. Top with 11 balls of marzipan – said to represent 11 of Jesus's disciples, leaving off Judas – or with spring flowers

Ingredients

250g mixed dried fruit (a mixture of sultanas, currants, raisins and candied mixed peel)

1 orange, zested and juiced

500g pack marzipan

250g pack butter, softened

200g light brown soft sugar

4 eggs, plus 1 beaten to glaze

175g plain flour

100g ground almonds

1 tsp baking powder

1 lemon, zested

2 tsp mixed spice

1 tsp vanilla extract

100g glacé cherries, halved

3 tbsp apricot jam

Method

STEP 1

Put the mixed dried fruit in a bowl with the orange juice and zest and 2tbsp water. Cover and microwave for 2 mins, then leave to cool completely. Alternatively, heat gently in a pan, stirring now and then until the liquid has been absorbed and leave to cool.

STEP 2

Heat oven to 150C/130C fan. Roll out a third of the marzipan and use the base of a deep 20cm cake tin as a template to cut out a circle. Wrap any offcuts and the remaining two-thirds of marzipan and set aside for later. Butter and line the cake tin with a double layer of baking paper. Beat the butter and sugar together until creamy. Add the eggs, flour, almonds, baking powder, lemon zest, mixed spice and vanilla (all in one go) and mix until well combined. Mix in the cooled soaked dried fruit and fold in the cherries.

STFP 3

Scrape half the cake mixture into the tin. Top with the disc of marzipan, then the remaining cake mixture, and level the top with a spatula. Bake for 2 hrs. Check it's cooked by inserting a skewer to the centre of the cake, if any wet mixture clings to the skewer, return to the oven for another 10 mins, then check again. Cool in the tin for 15 mins, then turn out onto a wire rack and leave to cool completely.

STEP 4

Brush the top of the cake with apricot jam. Roll out half of the remaining marzipan and use the base of the cake as a template to cut out another disc. Place it on top of the cake and crimp the edges, if you like. Roll the remaining marzipan into 11 equal-sized balls for the apostles. Arrange the apostles in a circle on top around the outside. Leave to cool will keep for up to a week in a sealed tin.


