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Editor's Note

So, let's talk about the weather. It seems that rain, reigns. Whether it's Tāwhirimātea, Lumo (Tibet), Asiaq (Greenlandic Inuit), Surupa (Hindu), Anitun Tauo (Filipino), Bunzi (Kongo), Dodola (Slavic) or Tefnut (Egyptian) or one of the many other deities associated with rain, they are out there making their presence known.

Of course we welcome the rain for many reasons - for one, it will feed those stunning spring blooms (see page 8). It can also cause a multitude of problems and many in the community will be acutely aware of recent flooding, slips, potholes and other damage (see page 17).

Meanwhile, wildfires rage uncontrollably in the US and across Europe. Many in drought-stricken areas will also be desperate for rain right now. If only we had the super power to redistribute water more equitably - not in plastic bottles - as billions of litres does from Otakiri Springs to China, but in aid.

Rain, the water that we eventually drink, is a precious resource and how we manage this is currently under reform. Three Waters, addressing drinking water, wastewater and stormwater, is causing quite a torrent of debate (see page 15). The time has come for us to face the fact that we have not been particularly good guardians. The world needs us mere mortals to pull together and create restorative solutions to address water quality and its distribution.

So yes, it has been raining. Quite a lot. Look for rainbows this month, keep your gumboots handy and be mindful of our water.

It's as simple as that

Let's keep supporting our local businesses



We sit down at every meal and list the things which we didn't grow at home or buy trade from local producers. The challenge is to make the list as short as possible, just for the hell of it really, but it annoys me that there is always pepper on the list.

I wish I could get my hands on kawakawa berries locally, as they are true relative of pepper, but they don't thrive in these parts. The alternative is horopito peppercorns from the native pepper tree. You can use the dried leaves as a seasoning, but horopito berries dry so nicely into little black 'peppercorns' which can be used in a pepper grinder.

I've been observing the trees for a couple of years trying to figure out when they flower and fruit, but the flowers and fruit are so nondescript and tiny, it is hard to tell at a glance, they also don't seem to do it all at once. I have narrowed it down to autumn as your best bet to go pepper hunting.

If you look up under the branches you will see the tiny black berries growing on the stems close to the leaves. They are about the size of a peppercorn or smaller.

The berries need to be dried so you can grind them like pepper and they have a peppery citrusy flavour.

There are a lot of trees growing in the bush around the sides of Mopanui. Those that get full sun seem to produce more fruits.

Horopito contains a couple of potent antioxidant flavonoids: quercetin and taxifolin which reduce internal inflammation and can also be used when infused in oil as a topical painkiller. Maori traditionally used the leaves for toothache or for external pain as it has a numbing effect.

Apparently horopito is also a very effective treatment, taken internally for Candida fungal infections.

Now I have solved the pepper problem, I'll have to look into making some local salt- I'll get back to you on that one, it will probably be in the too-hard basket, but we'll see.



Special Visitors to St Barnabas

Although at the moment St Barnabas is locked when unattended because of local circumstances, it is our proud tradition to leave the church open to visitors and for private worship.

Two of our most remembered visitors came by on 23 March 1960. These two women, one from Dunedin and one from Gore were convalescing at the then James Powell Rest Home, our next-door neighbours. It must have been a popular way for the convalescents to get some fresh air.

These two visitors enthusiastically filled in a book, giving their full names, marital status, place of residence and age. All of which, they scored out almost at once; one of them adding at the foot of the page "Sorry thought this was the Visitors' Book."

Since then, we have not left the Burial Book out on display. It is intended only for the names of those who are staying on in the graveyard, and not for those who are only passing through.

The Burial Book has been in use since 1875. The first burial service was held on 10th November 1875. This was the funeral of Joe Edwards who had been a bell ringer at St Barnabas, and whose wife used to clean the Church. The service was conducted by Captain Pitt who was a lay reader in the Church. All the burials since then have been recorded in that same book.

Our first service was on 11 November 1872, and we will celebrate out 150th year with a special service on 13 November this year. I'm sorry I got the date wrong last month.





Bernie's Sunday Breakfast Drop Scones

225g plain flour

- 1 level tsp salt
- 2 level tsp cream of tartar
- 1 level tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 1 tblsp caster sugar
- 2 eggs

I tblsp golden syrup (Tate and Lyle's is best)

250ml milk

Whisk all ingredients together to make a very thick batter. Heat heavy based pan and lightly grease (a dab of butter and then wipe with kitchen roll). Drop tablespoons of the batter into the pan, the batter will bubble, when the bubbles start to burst flip the pancakes. They should be an even pale brown. Allow approximately 3 minutes for first side and 2 minutes for second. Remove from pan and place in folded clean tea towel to keep the steam in. Serve warm with butter and jam or golden syrup.

The lack of a safe way to walk or cycle to Doctor's Point.


What makes me glad? What keeps me well? What spins my wheels? What rings my bell?





STV System — Understanding Single Transferable Vote

STV means that voters are able to rank candidates in order of preference.

In a nutshell, it is in the title —Single Transferable Vote. Pick the person you most want to be elected onto the council, and in case they are not voted in, the second person you would most like to see on council and so forth. STV means that you have one vote, but can indicate your preferences for all the candidates. For your vote to be eligible you only need to vote for one person. You can number as many or as few candidates as you want. The number of vacancies and votes determines the quota a candidate must reach to be elected. What happens is the popular candidates get voted in straight away, they set a percentage of the vote the other candidates need to obtain. This quota is worked out by the total number of valid votes divided by the number of vacancies plus one. To be clear — Do you need to rank all the candidates? No, just pick a few people whom you would like to see representing you. Keep it simple. Single Transferable Vote.


Learning the craft of traditional Tudor style carpentry he then branched out, starting his own business creating artistic garden frames and chainsaw carved sculptures.

Confusion Rains

I'm confused. I'm conflicted. I'm a dyed in the wool Labour man (Labour/Green under MMP). Things just seem more equitable under Labour than National. Mind you, much has happened over my 62 years. Keith Holyoake's National as we severed ties to Britain. The stabalisation by Big Norm Kirk's Labour party. National's tumultuous "life isn't meant to be easy" Rob Muldoon years, displaced by David Lange's 4th Labour government, their No Nuclear stance overshadowed by Rogernomics' introduction of neo-liberalism. National's Jim Bolger and Jenny Shipley implementing Ruth Richardsons "mother of all budgets" to punish the poor. Helen Clarke's Labour terms re-establishing some modicum of equilibrium before John Key bribed National back to power with tax cuts for the already wealthy. Now Jacinda Adern's task-laden Labour terms, stymied by Winston Peters, distracted by Covid, attempting a world first co-governance stategy, under threat by Keyclone Christopher Luxon and National's penchant to redistribute wealth to those least in need. But if there's one issue bound to deliver a government that mimics an evangelical airline company, it's the proposed 3 Waters reforms. My experience suggests Labour governments make good people-centered decisions. Is this one?

To help clear my confusion, I flipped the question. Is not implementing these reforms a better idea? I look at the groups vehemently opposed and see self-interest at best, alt right conspiracism at worst, a smattering of blends in between. The claim these reforms are a Nanny State assett grab is a smoke screen and fails to account for dereferral of debt and obligatory repair/replace needs of \$billions. But we still pay. This burden, taken off the rate payer, only falls to the tax payer. What the groups most opposed fear is a diminished ability to pump water onto pastures to grow dairy cows, to feed Fontera's coal-fired evaporators. And, I suspect an elephant in the room. Does Labour's co-governance strategy encourage water ownership claims under Ti Tiriti O Waitangi? The argument that nobody owns water, it just falls from the sky, is easily de-bunked by Tikanga Maori's post-rainfall deification of rivers, streams, lakes, and the ocean. These entities are easily proven historical Taonga and therefore hold special significance within any interpretation of Ti Tiriti. If co-governance frameworks expand, cultural and environmental importance over water ways increase, while capitalst exploitations exponentially decrease. Vested interests obviously see 3 Waters reform as the thin edge of an ideological wedge. What's also apparent is the lack of any real opposition to these reforms by National. Better ACT wags that dog, and let the disinformation juggernaught suck up the votes.

And so, I've decided. After much research (talking with people), I will support these 3 Waters reforms and am happy to have discovered that many other people feel the same way.

At my request Henry's got some North End Visitation Quadruple in. At 10% ABV it is to be approached with caution, but it is


just the beer for winter, a complex blend of malts and fruit to be savoured with a good book in front of the fire.

Throughout the year we deal with many requests from our community, and much of what we do 'flies under the radar' and we don't seek publicity for these. There are many issues around roads, footpaths, vegetation, trees, consents, etc. and we just attend to them as they arise, always liaising with appropriate DCC Staff.

There have been some notable exceptions – who can forget the issue of 'lead in the water' which became a major item on TV and radio for a while? It almost seems like a distant memory. After many years of lobbying, we finally got a weekend bus service for our area. There will likely be some tweaks required to the timetable, but the new service seems to be well received in the community.

It is pleasing that we have individual Board Members representing us with their involvement in many aspects of life in our community. We have Mark and Andy pushing ahead with the upgrade of the Truby King Recreational Reserve. Sonya and Mandy are very active in the area of Community Emergency Response groups. Geraldine and Andy represent us with great work that is being achieved by One Coast - led by local resident Judy Martin. Mark keeps abreast of progress with the re-planting of the dunes along Matanaka Drive in Waikouaiti and liaises with the local contractors. Andy has been busy lately with many issues around Karitane Harbour. Mandy keeps us up to date with all that is happening with 'Keep Dunedin Beautiful'. Sonya keeps a close eye on many issues around Waikouaiti. Andy is our representative on the Moana Gow Pool Committee. Geraldine is the eyes and ears of all that happens in Warrington. 
