From your Overseas Correspondent

This is a bit of cautionary tale - pay particular attention if you have dual citizenship! How can you leave New Zealand on a expired British passport which contains your Permanent Resident's Visa? How can it happen that once in the UK you can no longer leave to come home or go anywhere else? How can it happen that to renew your British passport you need to have to have a valid Australian passport? Well I'll tell you - I have no idea!!!

So I'm in the UK and have arranged to go visit my brother in France. Arrive at airport bag drop, show my passport and they say it has expired! Issued in June 2014, it says expiry date is June 2025, but it seems since Brexit you only get 10 years from date of issue, ignore the expiry date. So actually expired June 2024. Fine I say, so will go and renew my British Passport on fast track will have a new one in two days. Phone UK Passport Office they say great but by the way do you have dual citizenship seeing as you live in New Zealand? Yes, I say, I have Australian Citizenship but passport has expired - that's unfortunate, says man on end of phone, as you need a valid Australian passport before you can renew your British one. Ooops, I say, then mention that old Australian passport is in married name Yeo not Cornford. Man sighs, you really do have a problem! New Special One Name Policy, means you can't have passports in two different names! Also by the way you can't travel back to New Zealand on your expired passport! So I phone Australian Embassy in London can I get Australian passport renewed and change the name on it to Cornford? Yes we can do it here, you need original copies of Birth Certificate, Marriage Certificate, Divorce Certificate, Australian Citizenship Certificate, proof of residence in New Zealand etc. etc etc. I attempt humour, Death Certificate too? Australian woman on phone is not laughing! And it will take at least four weeks from your interview in London for it to be delivered.

So I have a passport interview booked for Thursday 8 August at the Australian Embassy. My documents are en route from New Zealand, that's another problem, according to the tracking information they have been in transit with the airline since 23 July and it's now 29 July! I would hate to be a passenger on that flight.

What I am really grateful for is that the New Zealand customs staff who checked my passport before I left Auckland were as unaware as I was of the new expiry rules. As it is I get to sit in the sun and worry rather than sitting in front of the fire in Warrington worrying and wishing I was sitting in the sun! Altogether it's really a bit of a pickle, and seeing as there is little chance that I will be back in dear old Warrington before September now, I will update you on my foreign meanderings in the next issue!!

Green Hut Track Group

Walkers and particularly dog walkers will have noticed that the beach tracks at Warrington have recently been tided up by Mike Fitzgerald and myself. We are part of an organisation known as the Green Hut Track Group.

The Green Hut Track Group is a group of volunteers who tidy up all the tracks in the Silver Peaks and Silver Stream catchments. The organisation began about 25 years ago, initially to encourage both men and women who had recovered from heart problems to get them off their bottoms and out and doing some exercise.

The group has some financial support from the High Country Trust, DCC and DOC to buy equipment such as weed eaters, saws and gardening tools along with fuel.

We have formal agreements with the DCC and DOC regarding maintenance and will continue to maintain these tracks.

Currently the group has some 20 volunteers available but as the work is voluntary with no compulsion expected, the average weekly turn out on a Wednesday is about 8-10 persons.

Most of our volunteers are in the older age group but all ages and levels of fitness are welcome.

As well as the beach tracks we in Warrington have been maintaining tracks such as Carey's Creek, Pipeline, Burns and Rustlers. Locally we have recently received a new member from Warrington, Mike Bardwell. We are always keen to accept new volunteers.

Jacinta Arianna Ruru

Pūrakanui powerhouse and wonder wahine

If you're looking for a role model for your daughters or someone to put upon a pedestal look no further than the amazing Dr Ruru **MNZM FRSNZ**

Ruru was born in Australia and is of Raukawa, Ngāti Ranginui and Ngāti Maniapoto descent.

Scholar, academic, mother, professor, and author Jacinta Ruru has lectured at a OTAGO university since 1999. She went to the university 25 years ago as the only Māori person lecturing in law that is expanded now to 6. Her more than 100 publications consider Indigenous peoples' rights, interests and responsibilities to own and care for lands and waters ki uta, ki tai (from the mountains to the seas). Her work celebrates mātauranga Māori and seeks systemic change to decolonise research, knowledge, learning and practice.

Her accolades also include fellow of New Zealand's Royal Society Te Apārangi, winner of the Prime Minister's Supreme Award for Excellence in Tertiary Teaching, Fulbright Ngā Pae o te Māramatanga senior Māori scholar, and Tedx speaker

In 2016 Jacinta was the first professor of law. She gave her inaugural speech "Toitū te Whenua, Toitū te Mana",

providing inspiration to students and staff at the University of Otago.

Ruru addresses the challenges for Māori and points out less than 6% of university of staff compared with 15% of New Zealand population.

In 2017, Ruru was selected as one of the Royal Society Te Apārangi's "150 women in 150 words", celebrating the contributions of women to knowledge in New Zealand.

She is the co-director of Ngā Pae o te Māramatanga (NPM) the New Zealand's Māori Centre of Research Excellence (CoRE).

In 2019, she was awarded an inaugural University of Otago Sesquicentennial Distinguished Chair in recognition of her outstanding research, teaching and service.

Jacinta was on the panel that wrote the controversial report He Puapua, In 2020.

In the 2022 New Year Honours, she was appointed a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit, for services to Māori and the law, and later that year received the University of Otago's Distinguished Research Medal

In March 2024, she was appointed the University of Otago's first deputy vicechancellor Māori.



And in July was awarded an Honorary Doctor of Laws from Newcastle University,

The honorary degree recognises Ruru's work on indigenous people's rights and indigenous law especially in relation to land and water management and legal personality of the environment.

Listed as the 11th most powerful person in the South Island -That is Jacinta Ruru!

WAITATI BOOK CLUB by Ian Melvin

Still as they say it's the quality of the company that matters rather than quantity. And so it proves, as we enjoy meandering through a rambling discussion on a range of germane



topics, including of course 'the book'. Big thanks to Martin and Robin our genial and accommodating hosts.

THE BOOK

All the Pretty Horses: Cormac McCarthy "one of the greatest American novels of this or any other time" The Guardian. You will get no argument from me. All present were strongly in favour of this book, Peter reading excerpts that had found favour with him, Paul saying by email it was the highlight of the year so far, and so on. I will paraphrase Neil Young here and say if you haven't read McCarthy I guess you'll want to soon! He is confronting, challenging, and offering deep insights into the nuances of life, culture and the human condition, at the same time keeping your attention on the divaricating plot that takes you places and offers conclusions that are totally unexpected.

OTHER BOOKS

Ross - 'My reading recently jumped from The Scarlet Papers by Matthew Richardson (2023) - a well plotted fictional spy thriller, carefully threaded into our relatively recent spy history (Philby, Burgess etc) - into 1260 pages of **Victor Hugo's Les** Miserables (1862). It was a bit of a culture shock. The former, with a well developed central character was largely plot-driven and direct, while the latter staggers through a complex multi charactered interwoven story where ten pages can often be spent examining motives or background politics behind the next aspect of the story.'

Both books are equally engaging but totally different.

Scott - Ballast Point Brewing: Californian Chardonnay Barrel Aged Saison 7.8% alc/volume, not a fan of Saison style beers, so this is an exception.

Not something to drink as refreshment or for thirst, but excellent to accompany discussion (so as not to drink too rapidly) or as a pre-dinner tipple. Has a sharpness to it, but has the fat of a strong beer alongside and marries both well. Best consumed in moderation.

The Chieftains: Long Black Veil 1995 a collaborative album with various artists, Sting, Mick Jagger, Sinead O'Connor, Van Morrison, Mark Knopfler, Ry Cooder, Marianne Faithful and Tom Jones. Traditional style Irish music with a twist, went gold in USA and Australia and unsurprisingly double platinum in Ireland. Stand out track for me is the unlikely sounding collaboration with Ry Cooder 'The Coast of Malabar' try on YouTube www.youtube.com/watch?v=BQOHDztmCTo

Waikouaiti Coast Heritage Centre

During July we had two ACT party ministers visit us during their travels up the South Island which began in Invercargill. Those visiting were Mark Cameron who is the spokesperson for Rural Communities (amongst a range of other responsibilities) and Todd Stephenson who is the spokesperson for Arts, culture and Heritage. In addition, we were pleased to also have Sophie Barker (and her daughter Charlotte) join us. Sophie is a DCC councillor with a range of responsibilities, she has taken quite an interest in our activities, for which we are most appreciative. Our visitors enjoyed a tour through the old bank building and were impressed with our new (3 years old now) purpose-built heritage facility. We of course, took the opportunity to outline the process to reach this goal and also our continuing plans for restoration of the old bank building. In addition, we discussed the ongoing difficulties of small volunteer run museums in NZ, including our facility. After a sumptuous morning tea (thank you Bev) they left in their pink van heading for Oamaru and Waimate.

Thank you everyone who completed our survey, either online or the hard copy version. We had 338 responses with 114 indicating they wanted the verandah to remain and 224 requesting it be removed. As a result of this survey the verandah will be removed at some stage during the restoration process. A more detailed summary of the survey results will be on our website and Facebook page.

Finally, a reminder about our AGM on Saturday 24 August at 2.30pm in the Heritage Centre. Allan Anderson, a well-known local fisherman is going to talk about the Matanaka Sea Cave system illustrating his talk with photos, taken during the years when he escorted tourists through the caves. Many locals are unaware of this amazing cave system which, at 1.5km long, is the largest of its type in the world. The presentation will be followed by afternoon tea, we hope you will join us.



Kā Kete Wānaka o Ōtepoti



Until now I have never understood why North Islanders find feijoas a bit overwhelming. I have always found them pretty precious. When I was a child there was a feijoa tree in our huge old commercial glasshouse. Unfortunately it was a lonely only, and because they need a pollinator, when it miraculously produced 2 fruit after 25 years, they were the most precious 2 feijoa fruit ever. My parents bought them down to Seacliff for me, and I left them sitting on the windowsill to admire. I was gutted when I discovered my former North Island dwelling flatmate ate them both, with no reverence at all!

So, now that we have a few young feijoa bushes ("unique" variety) producing a decent amount of small feijoas, I do actually end up with more than I can eat (Alex doesn't like them much).

I've made feijoa wine, which took hours of peeling each little fruit as they were too small to scoop, and this turned out to be a nice drop, but more of a dessert wine, so we won't go through much of it. And I just eat quite a few, but this year supply was exceeding demand, and because of the dry summer the fruit are very small. I have had some lovely feijoa flavoured sweet bought cider, which I assume is made by adding feijoa syrup to the cider, so I figured it would be fun to give making feijoa syrup a try. I was not looking forward to another marathon peeling effort, but then I found that many people make feijoa cordial out of only the skins. Wow, this is fantastic news, so the skins can be used too, so I just have to chop up the feijoas without peeling first.

So here is my sort of vague recipe.

- 1. Chop up a heap of feijoas; I probably had about 3 kg.
- 2. Put them in a big pot, add a chopped lemon or two, cover with water, and bring to the boil. Then reduce to a simmer until the fruit break up. Mash them a bit to make this happen faster.
- 3. Strain your mushed up fruit and juice through a jelly bag.
- 4. Measure out the juice into your big pot again and add 700g of sugar per litre of juice.
- 5. Bring to the boil while stirring in the sugar, and simmer for 5 minutes.
- 6. Pour into sterilized bottles with the kind of lids that will pop down when they seal (Barkers cordial bottles are perfect).
- 7. Place your cordial bottles in your pot again and fill it with water as close to the top of the pot as you can manage without having it boil all over your stove.
- 8. Bring to the boil, and reduce to a simmer, leave simmering for 20 minutes. This will preserve the cordial so the bottles will keep for a couple of years. If any lids don't pop down use them immediately (life is tough sometimes).

We tried some with ice and soda, and it was delicious. It will be a lovely summer drink. I have yet to try it with cider, but I have high hopes. And then as a cocktail with gin...So the tiny feijoa glut problem is solved.

By the way, at the time of writing there are feijoas on the bushes in the riverside Orokonui road community orchard. Help yourselves if there are still some left.

The theme this month is roads and what travels on them.

Since the incoming Government announced that they were to going to reverse some of what the previous Government had introduced by way of Speed Management, we still have no idea about how that will affect our North Coast area. DCC cannot finalise their recommendations until there is some clarity about the topic. We'll keep you posted.

For many years we have been advocating for the northbound bus from Dunedin to pull into Waitati to drop passengers off, rather than have them alight beside the highway outside Blueskin General Store. It is a pity that it has taken a recent incident involving a vehicle hitting a school pupil to convince Otago Regional Council to accede to our request. At the time of writing this, it appears that the necessary changes will be made.

There is also an issue with the northbound bus stopping at the bottom of Jones Road, Evansdale. A recent change in bus drivers has seen some long-standing residents being told that the bus will no longer stop there and that they will have to get off the bus further south. In our view this is potentially dangerous, and we will be meeting the recently rearranged ORC transport team in a week or so to try and resolve the matter. At that meeting we will also be discussing the issue of a bus going into Warrington. This follows on from our article in last month's Blueskin News.

The condition of Shortcut Road, and the general condition of roads and footpaths has not escaped our notice, and these are included in our ongoing discussions with Dunedin City Council staff.

We are now into the new DCC financial year, and our Discretionary Fund has been topped up. If you, or someone you know, has a community project that could do with some funding assistance, then you can complete a funding application form which can be found on the DCC website, or give any board member a call if you need some clarity.


