Warrington School Junior Room 4 Year Old Sessions


We are having loads of fun during our little Explorer's Group sessions which are held from 9am - 11am during the term.


WHAT MAKES ME SAD AND GLAD

A failure and a success.

Sometimes, when I go on about something as if it is a great idea and everyone should go out and do it ... it turns out that I'm wrong.

Just days after submitting my article to the BSN about planting onions in autumn so they grow into proper big round "Pukekohe long keepers", the onions I had planted started to go to seed. We have been eating giant spring onions in every meal ever since. Which is OK I suppose as there is not much



in the garden in October, but I really want to crack this onion-growing thing. Next year I'll plant the seedlings just before winter, and struggle to keep the wee baby onions weeded until spring without accidentally pulling them out. Gardening is definitely a lifelong learning curve. Take notes and keep a garden diary, and remember where you went wrong last time (this last one gets harder the older you get).

So, for something completely fresh and different, I was out for a walk in the drizzle recently and thought I would challenge myself to pick a salad in the wild. There are loads of edible things about, and spring/early summer is a good time to eat them while they're small and more delicately flavoured. Also as stated earlier, between the end of winter crops and the beginning of the summer harvest there is a lean time in the garden, called the hungry gap and wild foods are the way to fill the gap.

My foraged salad consisted of samphire shoots – these grow on the sandy patch by the Waitati River, where it turns the corner just before Black bridge. It is a sort of succulent and sends up tasty, salty little asparagus like shoots in spring. I added some soft feathery new fennel fronds, from by the Estuary track just down river from the foot bridge, some tender young dandelion leaves, and sorrel leaves. There are plenty of wild onion plants around so I pulled up a few of their little white onion bulbs, and also some new growth of chickweed. For colour I added some calendula (French marigold).

The whole salad tasted surprisingly good with a sweet mayonnaise, and Alex didn't even notice that we were eating weeds. You lose some and you win some.

We're thankful to have been in the position where we could still engage and operate. And we're grateful for all the support from landowners and volunteers to get to where we are now.

Halo's highlights include setting up landscape-scale stoat control across 12,500 ha, from Flagstaff to Aramoana. The aim - ground-feeding and holenesting native birds (eg. robin kakaruwai and kākā) are safe to spread across the landscape, far beyond Orokonui.

A large-scale trial of automatic traps is going well, showing real promise as an efficient way to control possums. Possums cause so many problems for wildlife, habitat, people and property, that we had to take up the opportunity to keep numbers down following OSPRI's TBFree possum control. This would not be possible without the support of rural landowners and urban residents. ORC and DCC. Thank you all!

Otepoti and beyond has also benefitted from 43,000 native plants and fencing at important riparian sites. Planting at Waitete Bush alongside Waitati Stream and SH1 is complete, with the help of numerous volunteers and groups including the East Otago Catchment Group, Honda, Monowai Ecological Ltd, DOC, ORC and Frank O'Neil, the landowner.

Now that planting is done for the year, the Source to Sea field team turn to caring for those thousands of plants.

Waitati School **Enrolment Scheme**

To avoid overcrowding or the likelihood of overcrowding, the board of Waitati School has implemented an enrolment scheme. Under this scheme, students will be enrolled if they live within the home zone. Details of this scheme and the precise description of the home zone may be viewed on the school website www.waitati. wordpress.com or at the school office.

Please note that siblings of presently enrolled students who live out-of-zone must also apply. Siblings of currently enrolled students do not automatically get a place at Waitati School.

There will be three enrolment periods. The first enrolment period runs from the first day of Term 4 to the 19 Nov (18 Oct - 19 Nov 2021) Ballot 20 Nov 2021. The second enrolment period runs from the first day of Term 1 to the last day of Term 1 (31 Jan - 14 Apr 2022) Ballot on 15 April 2022. The third enrolment period runs from the first day of Term 3 to the last day of Term 3 (25 Jul - 30 Sep 2022) Ballot on 1 October 2022.

Application forms are available from the Waitati School office. Please email: office@waitati.school.nz

If the number of out-of-zone applications exceeds the number of places available, students will be selected by ballot. If a ballot for out-of-zone places is required, it will be held the day after application deadlines. Parents will then be informed of the outcome of the ballot within three school days of the ballot being held.

Ecosanctuary fire

A huge thank you to all who called the fire brigade and alerted them of the fire that threatened Orokonui Ecosanctuary recently! With such great community support the fire was managed quickly and the threat was overcome. We couldn't have done that without you! A huge thanks also to the fire department for their prompt action and ongoing support in helping us to establish exactly how to prepare for fire and to mitigate the risks that we're able to manage.

Just as there is a halo around the sanctuary to ensure the safety of sanctuary wildlife in regards to pests and trapping, the fire department has helped us to understand that, so too is there a halo regarding fire risk or safety. This is where our community can help again!

The best way you can help to ensure that our community and the sanctuary is fire safe is to ensure your own property and fire activities are safe. You can look on the website www.checkitsalright.nz which will explain whether or not your activity is restricted and how to reduce the risk of fire danger.

The fire department has helped us to understand that some activities can be of greater risk than others such as scrub-cutting, chainsawing, grinding or even lawn mowing! All of these activities can produce a spark, and combined with dry vegetation and strong winds, this can result in an out of control fire! These activities are restricted on 'fire spike days', or days when a range of environmental factors increase the risk of fire. With changes in the climate leading to more hotter, drier weather, we all need to be mindful of the risk of fire, especially now as we are heading into summer. The Fire Department let us know about fire spike days via their facebook page www.facebook.com/fireandemergencynz or via their 'fire danger today' street signs!

Thanks for reading this update and for being such an awesome community! We hope never to encounter a fire like that again, but if you do see fire please call 111!

Waikouaiti Coast COMMUNITY BOARD UPDATE

Bus Users - I need your help

If you are a bus user, I would appreciate your input. I have previously reported that NZTA (Waka Kotahi) did not provide the 50% subsidy as requested by ORC (Otago Regional Council) to upgrade the north coast bus service. It seems likely that ORC will fund their share - but that has not been confirmed, since the report which was due to be discussed at the November ORC Council Meeting has been deferred until their December meeting. (I don't know why).

The ORC 50% will not be enough to fund the fully upgraded timetable we had requested, but it will likely be enough for one of the following two scenarios:-

- a) Two (2) extra weekday return services between Palmerston and Dunedin plus a Friday night service.
- b) Extend the current weekday timetable to Saturday and Sunday.

We would like to know what you think. (This item will also be published in the Waikouaiti monthly POWA News).

If you are a bus user, can you please email your preference to my email address: info@calmarine.co.nz before 7 December. We will then present this information to ORC prior to their December full Council meeting.

Our last meeting for 2021 was held on 24 November and there were quite a few requests for grants funding. We'll provide a summary of all 2021 grants from our discretionary fund in the first 2022 edition of Blueskin News. There is still some money available, so if you, or anyone you know, has a community project that could benefit from a grant then please contact Rebecca Murray at the Dunedin City Council (477 4000) or speak to a Board Member. Our next Community Board meeting will be held on Wednesday 2 February. The venue will be dependent on the Covid19 situation that prevails at the time.

From a book lent by Jacob -Tikanga Wakaaro, Key concepts in Maori culture by Clive Barlow. A book every one should read!


