Blueskin Bay's Dairy Factories



The land around Blueskin Bay was pretty rough after clearance by the first European settlers. It was only suitable for resilient cows such as Ayrshires. They provided good meat and milk that when not used domestically was converted to butter and cheese as a small-scale cottage industry. The cows were hand milked and the cream separated using a skimming pan before being put into a hand cranked butter churn. Hygiene levels were poor so the butter did not have a long shelf life after it was transported to Dunedin for sale or barter.

The Bay could have become more productive if there was a milk processing facility using the latest innovations like centrifugal separators and engine-driven churners, within a more hygienic environment. There was a vast export market opening up with the first refrigeration ship Dunedin leaving Port Chalmers in 1882. In that year Blueskin residents agreed that a dairy factory would facilitate an expansion of the local economy but nothing eventuated. In 1887 another meeting attempted to form a dairy co-operative, financed by the sale of shares to users. No consensus was reached so later that year the Seacliff/Omimi/Warrington farmers went their own way, building a co-operative factory at Omimi. It was always very productive, for instance producing 58 tons of high quality export cheese during the 1890-91 season. It closed in 1949 largely due to a huge rise in wool prices during the 1940's-50's.

The farmers of the southern end of the Bay eventually organised a co-operative dairy company, building a factory at Manse Street that opened in 1895, just when dairy prices were low. After only three years of financial struggles, the company was sold. The new owners used the factory only to separate milk with further processing in Dunedin, the protein-rich whey returned to the farmers to feed their farmhouse pigs. It provided farmers with good incomes until its closure in 1922.

A Merton dairy factory serviced that area from 1899 to 1948. Others existed at Flag Swamp, Waikouaiti and Goodwood showing that the east coast of Otago was a very rich dairying region. After factory closures, milk still produced locally was transported to Dunedin's Cadbury chocolate factory.

In more recent times the successful Evansdale Cheese Factory was established by Colin (Colleen) Dennison in 1981. It has retained its name despite moving to its present location at the former Cherry Farm Hospital site at Hawksbury.



Blueskin Rainfall Event Monitoring Project

Kia ora community, this project has finally started for real.

The school holidays recently were rather damp at times - fantastic! Metvuw had been predicting steady rain for a couple of days. Just what we wanted! Volunteers got ready to collect samples of water from the Waitati River and Careys Creek during this rain.

The project aims to find out what levels of sediment, nitrogen and phosphorus are in the water when the river is swollen by lots of rain, so ORC can consider this when compiling their model of nutrients potentially entering Blueskin Bay via rivers and streams.



If you saw people hanging over the Waitati River bridge on Harvey Street with a bucket on a rope, or heading down to Careys Creek, under the bridge to Warrington, that was our people collecting water once an hour, every hour, for 36 hours. As the rainfall started late in the afternoon, this meant two night monitoring sessions within the 36 hour period. Next time we hope the rain starts at 8am!

The rain was fairly low intensity (averaging about half to one millimetre of rain per hour) but continued the whole time we monitored. The Waitati River rose within a few hours and became discoloured with suspended sediment, but it took Careys Creek over 12 hours to rise and eventually become discoloured.

A huge thank you to all the volunteers, who worked as a great team, like a well-oiled machine. Apparently, everyone really enjoyed themselves, throughout the night and all - chatting with their interesting fellow volunteers, eating chocolates and watching to see what the sample looked like each time they collected the next.

The results are yet to come back, but after watching the river so intently for so many hours it will be fascinating to see the results. There is enough funding to sample one more rainfall event, so you may see us out there again soon.

Letter to the Editor

I was a Trustee of the Blueskin Resilient Communities Trust from 2010 to 2019 and retain an interest in its activities. As a result I was looking forward to attending their AGM for the 2020-21 year.

I was therefore surprised to find that, according to a report in the October Blueskin News, an AGM had already been held. It seems that no public notification of the meeting was made and it appears that only the three current trustees attended - referred to in the report as their 'voting members'.

It's been suggested that the Covid regulations in place at the time were the reason for this restricted attendance.

That's surprising given that many other organisations faced with a similar dilemma either organised their AGM on Zoom (or a similar app) or delayed their AGM until restrictions on the number of people who could attend because of Covid were lifted. The Charities Commission were reported to be receptive to applications for a delay in reporting given the Covid restrictions.

The reports generated for this AGM should be available on the Charities Commission website but BRCT is listed there as being deregistered as a Charity on

October 4. Deregistration occurs either because the organisation chooses to do so or because it no longer meets the requirements for registration. Either way the deregistration of BRCT raises a number of issues relating to the \$30,000 grant they have received from the DCC. what they intend to do with the Climate Safe House and the future of the company they own: Blueskin Energy Ltd.

If ever there was a time for an open and public AGM it would seem to be now.

Some 'sunshine' seems to be needed and that can only occur if a public AGM or meeting is held where appropriate questions can be asked and answered.

Transparency and accountability are central to the operation of all organisations and charitable trusts, but the operation of BRCT currently seems to be particularly opaque and the only opportunity for its operations to be publicly examined by Blueskin residents appears to have been sidestepped.

Can I respectfully suggest that a publicly notified AGM for BRCT be organised as soon as possible or a similar public meeting. At such a meeting the Trust's activities in the 2020-21 year and their current intentions could be reviewed and discussed.

November Cockle watching in Blueskin Bay

Katie Fenton, a Marine Science student of Steve Wing's at the University of Otago, has contacted Blueskin Bay Watch to notify the community that she will be carrying out a field manipulation in Blueskin Bay at the end of November, running up to just before Christmas.

She will be looking at the survival of juvenile cockles with and without adult protection, and how predation rates by oystercatchers change under different treatments. It is a similar project and area to that run by Nichola Salmond in the Wing lab in 2020.

The research sites will be marked out to be kept clear of foot traffic and human predation. We look forward to hearing the results of Katie's project.

Summer is stoat season

With summer coming we are entering the peak activity time for stoats. We're prepared for this with our network of stoat traps (you'll see along roadsides). Over summer, staff and volunteers check them twice as often to increase their catch. Traps work best when their entrance is clear of vegetation, so, an easy way to help us reduce predator numbers is to remove grass or weeds covering the ends of trap boxes.

Possums love our summer vegie gardens and fruit trees. If you already host a Halo possum trap but need a hand with checking or entering data on TrapNZ - we are happy to help. We need the information which active traps can provide, whether they are catching possums or not.



We also provide chew cards for you to find out what predators you have lurking in your backyard and sell subsidised rat traps to people within our project area. Please email info@haloproject.org.nz or ph 022 026 2115.

Source to Sea planting days

Together with landowners and volunteers, we've planted over 21,000 native plants to improve freshwater habitat.

The places we are planting are all special. They are places where natural habitat values can be reinstated, such as shelter for birds, spawning habitat for fish, filtering of ground water, connecting isolated vegetation (creating wildlife corridors). The process of revegetation also provides learning opportunities in communities.

WAIKOUAITI COAST COMMUNITY BOARD UPDATE

Last month I mentioned that the Otago Regional Council had not received the 50% funding they had requested from NZTA/Waka Kotahi to be able to implement the improved bus service we have been asking for. At our last Community Board meeting we asked the ORC Transport Manager to request the ORC Councillors to approve full funding. If this was not to be forthcoming, we asked that he request at least part of our proposed upgraded timetable to be funded in this financial year. The next ORC full council meeting will be held on 24 November, just a few hours before our next board meeting on the same date. We will be contacting all ORC Councillors prior to that date and asking them to support our request for our proposed improved bus service. Please feel free to also lobby the ORC Councillors about this matter.

We have been advised that the issue of traffic speeds at the Waitati Curve on SH1 is 'on the list' of items for consideration by NZTA/Waka Kotahi, but their main current funding is being directed to safety improvements on the highway between Palmerston and Herbert. They have been collecting speed data at the Waitati curve and we should have the results of that soon.

From 1 July our Discretionary fund got topped up by \$10,000. If you, or anyone you know, has a community project that could benefit from a grant then please contact Rebecca Murray at the Dunedin City Council (477 4000) or speak to a Board Member. Our next Community Board meeting will be held on Wednesday 24 November at the East Otago Events Centre in Waikouaiti. As always, you will be most welcome to speak at the Public Forum at the start of the meeting. Please give me a call and we can book you in.



Kā Kete Wānaka z Ōtepoti



The above etching appeared in the 'Illustrated Australian News' in 1874, and the following is an excerpt from the accompanying article.

"Progressive as the place has been in the past there cannot be a doubt about it's advancement in the future, and we feel assured that as soon as the railway to Dunedin is formed, it will prove one of the most attractive places for villa residences and sea bathing the province possesses, for there are fine sands sheltered from gales of wind by a long spit, which nearly closes up the mouth of the bay, and makes it look at high water more like an inland lake. Tourists to Otago should never omit paying a visit to Blueskin, for the drive from Dunedin through such varied and lovely scenery will be thoroughly enjoyed by all admirers of nature's beauties, and there are good hotels where travellers meet with excellent fare, civility, and attention". Indeed, when the railway from Dunedin was formed, the Blueskin area advanced rapidly through the ease of getting goods, materials, and services on site. Trainloads of holidaymakers and picnickers would arrive, groups of people from Dunedin would stop at the Evansdale station, picnic in the Glen, then return home that evening

We may both be vaccinated, but I sure as hell don't want to catch that damn virus. It may not kill us but I do so hate having a cold or flu and being miserable and sick.

During the most recent lockdown we managed to avoid going into town to buy food, and when we actually do get the virus on the loose down here I'd like to hunker down at home for a few weeks and just eat what we have on hand.

With this idea in mind, I have been planting a vegetable garden which is so extensive and comprehensive that I have almost run out of space behind the rabbit proof fence

We have hardly bought any vegetables in the past year except mushrooms, kumara, and onions. I failed at mushroom growing, having killed a "just add water" kit purchased from the Blueskin market. I'm not even going to attempt kumara, but onions are possible so I am having a go at growing a big main crop to store. If I can grow enough onions for a year I'll be so smug and satisfied.

In Autumn I raised loads of Pukekoe Long Keeper onion seeds in trays. When they were big enough I transplanted them into a big, sunny garden bed. I left a decent gap between each plant as I read that they don't bulb up unless they have plenty of space.

I have kept the plants weeded all winter and now they're looking really big and healthy, so all I have to do now is keep them watered and weeded until autumn.

Onions love a good long growing season, so I have done everything I can, except maybe plant twice as many next year.

I'm growing a heap of leeks too, so if something unexpected happens to the onions, or the virus comes before the onions are ready, I'll at least have something oniony to cook with.

If there is anywhere that deserves to be described as a "hidden gem" it is the Truby King Reserve in Seacliff.

The site of the renowned (now former) asylum for psychiatric patients, it is today a historic and recreational reserve, managed and maintained by the Dunedin City Council. Although the Reserve is used regularly for gentle recreation, especially in the summer months, by groups and individuals, it needs a significant sustained effort to bring the Reserve up to a standard worthy of its potential. Of particular note is the "Enchanted Forest", planted under the direction of Truby King himself and including many noteworthy specimen trees. Sadly, these have been neglected of late, infested with weeds and with some in need of careful remediation.

The DCC has recently completed a review of the Reserve's Management Plan. The review confirmed the need for major work to be done and - in response to submissions by the Waikouaiti Coast Community Board and the local Seacliff Truby King Reserve Committee - has set up a Truby King Reserve Management Committee.

The main purpose of the Management Committee is to ensure local community involvement in what should be an exciting opportunity to make the Reserve the asset it truly deserves to be.

To this end we are putting out this call for supporters - people with an interest in any aspect of the management of the Truby King Reserve and/or the willingness to participate in the practical work of improving its amenity, recreational or other value. We will create a mailing list of supporters, to keep everyone informed of news, working bees and other items of interest.

Parihaka Day

Although as a child I'd always enjoyed Guy Fawkes Day with a bonfire and fireworks, I now believe Parihaka day has more relevance for residents of Dunedin/Ōtepoti.


The Parihaka village was supported by many Taranaki Māori. Their leaders Te Whiti O Rongomai and Tohu Kakahi were early proponents of passive resistance and looked upon as prophets. However most of the settlers in the surrounding areas were frightened by them, considering the village a potential trouble spot. Over time many of the Maori ploughmen who worked the land were arrested for removing surveyors pegs, when their unpaid fines eventually totalled \$8000 they were shipped as prisoners from Wellington to the South Island /Te Wai Pounamu. On arrival at the Dunedin gaol, their one request was they be allowed to honour their Sabbath,

the 17th of each month. This was denied them, and they were told to celebrate Sundays instead. Living on hulks and in gaol, they built the Peninsula roads, the gardens and much of the cities infrastructure, also using quarried rock to build the seawalls.

On the 5 November 1881 Native minister John Bruce lead over 15,000 armed militia to the village, both leaders Te Whiti and Tohu were arrested along with most of the menfolk, and Parihaka was destroyed. On their arrival here, a number of them died and prisoners continued to die from cold-related ailments. Their bodies are buried in both the Northern and Southern Cemeteries, and their descendants have since placed memorials in both cemeteries. After several years, survivors returned to Taranaki but much of their lands had been lost to settlers.
