Saturday's breakfast was make it yourself toast and marmalade!

But Sundays were different, Ma took us kids to 8am Mass at Frimley Church and Pa made breakfast - the only time he ever cooked anything. Baked eggs and boiled eggs, warm rolls both soft and french crispy types, salted butter for us kids and unsalted for the grownups and the two tall mustard coloured coffee pots one filled with steaming coffee and other with hot milk. It was a leisurely affair filled with conversation, plans for the next week, items in the news, whether homework had been done, general family talk - and the usual small differences of opinion. For all of us remaining it is an abiding good memory.

Now after 60-odd years we have reinstated it here in Warrington. It's 10.30am, cups are warming, there are croissants or french toast or pikelets, homemade jam and plenty of good coffee. People arrive, usually 7 or 8 of us but sometimes more. We sit outside if the weather permits and then a far-ranging conversation begins. This Sunday we discussed preserving, barking dogs, the best way to catch a rabbit in the garden and whether it could then be eaten, how a lack of knowledge of computers could interrupt marital bliss, old cars and motorbikes and much more. No phones just good company, try it!

Opera House Update

Thank you to everyone who came to our Christmas picnic and consultation day on Saturday 10 December. Thank you to everyone who helped and especially Dougy and the Moonrocks. Over 30 people came to see us and talk about our plans for the Opera House land, buildings and garden. We asked about fundraising ideas and future plans for the next 5-10 years. We also asked about selling the white house section as well as what to do about the Opera House itself.

There was a lot of support for keeping the Opera House and using it for community purposes "turn it into a hall, retaining history in multi-purpose flexible alternate community use - Woo Hoo!, accommodation for host artists, community groups, workshops, a good community resource if it was safe". This makes lots of sense to the trustees because it is the most beloved, iconic building and it would also mean the Opera House could continue to support the Garden.

There was a lot of love for the Garden and we were stoked to hear people talk about how good it is looking. Suggestions included "enhancing what's already there with seating/picnic tables in the different garden nooks, plant a nut forest, hazel and walnuts and some fruit trees". But there was also a desire to make it safer "Fix the road edge, make it safer and inviting for the public."

So we have launched our Fence Fundraiser on Pledgeme www.pledgeme.co.nz/projects/7409-sponsor-a-safetyfence-waitati-community-garden where you can sponsor a fencepost with a steel cut-out designed by Anita Desoto (see examples below) and have a plaque with your choice of words on it. You can even buy two, one for us and one for you. If we can build this fence this year, the Garden will be much safer for kids, dogs and their walkers to enjoy the apple, pear and plum trees, the picnic spaces and events.

This is our big Garden project for 2023, the Fence and the Fruit trees.

We asked about the possibility of selling the white house section to raise money to help with development of the Garden, Opera House and social housing. Those who came were saddened by the prospect but mostly said it was a wise decision "sad as it is I think selling this land to provide capital for the rest, i.e. community space and garden, sell the White House, sad to see it go but potential revenue to develop small holdings for small transportable dwellings and a cost effective mutual space, use money to fix rest of the property". Some also suggested using the section for housing "build more tiny houses or have sections people can

rent for tiny houses, space for tiny house, caravan or house bus, living off the grid". We are looking at what selling it might entail, and we will let you know what we decide.

And then we had some really encouraging feedback about the Trust and the project as a whole "do a fundraiser to create a community space honouring the past and planning for future generations, keep it sustainable for the Trust, i.e. manageable, small focused projects that will add to whole vision, as an advocate of tiny home living, I love the idea of a tiny home village, creating a beautiful, place for folk to live in their own moveable homes, keep doing what you are doing – bringing the community with you, slow planning and redevelopment".

So now the trustees are working on keeping the Garden looking good, the Pledgeme Fence fundraiser, grant applications to restore the fruit trees in the Garden and preparing for events like the return of the Barden Party Shakespeare. We will also work on options for selling the white house section and seeking help to demolish the remaining shacks. We are also excited by the idea of building a natural wild children's playground on the land reclaimed over Lake Beatrice. There is lots to do in 2023.

Zucchinis by Hilary Rowley

Don't get your zucchinis in a tangle. They grow like a mess in a teenager's bedroom - a sprawl at ground level, with hidden things growing ominously underneath.

Zucchinis have a talent for hiding themselves under the leaves until they are monster marrows, and the plants take up a lot of space. Karen Jacquard (a former Blueskin bayite) showed me her very impressive, small, town garden and one thing which really impressed me was her vertical zucchini.

Put a warratah or sturdy stake in the ground right next to your zucchini plant, and as it grows tie a piece of stretch fabric, like a slice of old t-shirt, around the plant and the stake, so the plant grows up the stake instead of sprawling. Each new growth will need another tie. You end up being able to see what is going on under those big leaves and can pick the fruits before they get too big. You can even remove the older, lower leaves as you go. An added bonus is more air circulation, therefore less fungal problems.

If only it was as easy to sort out the teenage bedroom mess problem. (Tying to the stake has long ago gone out of favour).



While on the subject of zucchini, we came back from holiday to find a bit of a zucchini overgrowth problem, so I have been trying to find ways to deal with them.

I use them to make cooked dog food to supplement their raw meat diet. It uses up loads, as they are mostly water and cook down to less volume, with some tasty herbs and meaty bones for flavour.

Another is zucchini pasta. I found an electric spiralizer in an op shop for \$5 (I know right, good score!), but you can make it using one of those potato peelers with a julienne cutting blade. Cut your zucchini into pasta strips, submerge briefly in boiling water, until it comes back to the boil, strain and mix with a fresh basil pesto sauce, or a classic tomato pasta sauce. It is delicious, low carb and uses quite a lot of zucchini.

You can also slice the zucchini into long strips with a regular potato peeler and use the strips to assemble a lasagne, minus the pasta but with your usual lasagne ingredients.

Luckily the season doesn't last all year or we would be sick to death of them.

My next experiment is going to be zucchini flour. Watch this space.



Bob Marley's Birthday

Robert Nesta Marley (6 February 1945 - 11 May 1981, baptised in 1980 as Berhane Selassie) was a Jamaican singer, musician, and songwriter. Considered one of the pioneers of reggae his musical career was marked by fusing elements of reggae, ska and rocksteady as well as his distinctive vocal and songwriting style. Marley's contributions to music increased the visibility of Jamaican music worldwide, and made him a global figure in popular culture to this day. Over the course of his career, Marley became known as a Rastafari icon, and he infused his music with a sense of spirituality. He is also considered a global symbol of Jamaican music and culture and identity, and was controversial in his outspoken support for democratic social reforms.

The Treaty of Waitangi

New Zealand's founding document was also signed here in Dunedin harbour near Taiaroa heads, not in February but months later on 13 June 1840. It was signed by two local chiefs, Karetai and Korako.

Karetai (1805-1860) was born and raised on the peninsula at Otakou, he wore a dark heavy facial moko, had a proven war record and his leadership helped to prepare his people for a rapidly changing world. He was a respected leader of the early bicultural community.

Karetai signed the treaty, on behalf of his people, on board HMS Herald in the Harbour on the morning of June 13 1840. He also signed South Island land deeds including the 1844 Otago purchase which preceded the New Edinburgh settlement.

Community Fruit Harvesting is a nationwide, volunteer-based effort to pick unwanted fruit from private properties and distribute it to our communities. We live in a time of systemic inequality - some have little access to fresh food while others have more than they can handle.

Here in Ōtepoti Dunedin, the group 'Our Food Network' has built up a large database of backyard fruit trees belonging to folks who are unable to pick or use the fruit, but who are happy to share. OFN takes responsibility for organising volunteers to go and pick that fruit and deliver it to Food Banks, to community pantries, or to individuals or community groups who take the time to process that fruit into jams, jellies, crumbles, pickles and preserves which can then be given out freely.

This is a massive job. We need lots of helping hands to make it work! If you'd like to help pick, process, or redistribute fruit around Dunedin, contact our coordinator on 021 0273 1251 or email communityfruitotepoti@gmail.com. If you have, or know of, trees with unwanted fruit, please get in touch and we'll try to organise some help to get it picked. Please note that we cannot take damaged or rotting fruit, or fruit that is of a very low quantity or quality for eating or processing. We also cannot pick fruit that is not reasonably safe to reach.

We have a facebook group you can join - Community Fruit **Ōtepoti** which is a great place to keep an eye on upcoming events.

Until then, may we be blessed with bountiful crops to share, e ai ki te whakatauki: "Nā tō rourou, nā tāku rourou, ka ora ai te iwi." (With your food basket and my food basket, the people will thrive).

Need help improving habitat on your property?

The Halo Project - Source to Sea has funding and resources available to help landowners plant, fence and restore waterways, wetlands and forest habitat in Coastal Otago.

So far, we've helped 25 landowners achieve their restoration goals. Together we've fenced 11km of forest, riparian and wetland habitat. In 2022 we planted 134,088 native seedlings with the help of landowners and volunteers!

The Halo Project is a not-for-profit organisation. We seek funding from community and corporate grant schemes, and landowners contribute up to 50% of project costs through cash and in-kind contributions. Every agreement is adapted to best suit the landowner's capabilities. Examples of landowner contributions have included planting, fencing, committing to plant maintenance, and cash contributions towards plant costs. Together we have created future forests!

Decisions on the 2023 habitat restoration will be informed by our Guiding Principles.

These are:

- · When habitats are connected, biodiversity benefits greatly
- Education and advocacy are enhanced by restoring sites that the community can see, hear about, or be directly involved with

- · Restoring sites of importance to Māori aligns with the kaupapa of the Halo Project
- Landowners who have made previous restoration efforts should be acknowledged and rewarded. A landowner's motivation and willingness to contribute factor into our decision making
- Formal protection (covenants) of sites should be promoted, and will be supported
- Biodiversity should be promoted at all stages
- Wetlands are threatened and highly valuable habitats, and should be promoted at all stages
- · We can achieve greater outcomes by selecting sites that are easily accessible

Applications will be accepted until 14 February 2023 but get in quick! All applications will be assessed as they are received because we are eager to make the most of fine weather for fencing.

Ronald Herbert Wing 4 April 1928 - 30 December 2022

A memorial service for long time resident of Blueskin Bay, Ron was held at Hope and Sons chapel on 16 January.

Ron was born in Dunedin and grew up during the depression. He was together and resourceful from an early age and very much into



tinkering. A jack-of-all trades and a master of most, he was a joiner and carpenter, and wharfie at the Port.

In his younger years he played cornet in a band. He had sound equipment and hired out Wings audio systems to the Stock car races, complete with commentators tower. This sound gear is now used by the Blueskin A and P Society, a lasting legacy of Ron. His last job was to service picture theatre equipment around the region.

When Ron married Marg he moved to Ravensbourne and built a house in Manuka Street. Initially 2 bedrooms, it soon needed to house 8 children, they extended several times, the 5 boys had the big room that spanned the length of the house.

He enjoyed taking the family away on holidays, including the family milking goat all the way to Nelson, or frequently camping at Bucklands Crossing. He was known to cook up roadkill rabbits. And to brew incredible cider and very potent wine.

The bach at Doctors Point was a favourite spot and they moved there permanently when he retired. North-facing and elevated he grew veges, berries and flowers. Huge dahlias, gladioli, roses, hydrangeas and tulips, something for very season.

He was a provider, a problem solver and a progressive person. As a 50 year member of the Lions Club in Port, he played a big part of setting up Housie and other fundraising events over the years and organising and attending many conventions over the years

Ron had been everywhere and loved to explore places on the doorstep like Tuapeka Mouth, or under the bridge at Thornbury, Aparima. He was one of the earliest members of the Motorhome Association, member 598. He owned many buses during his life including a 1948 Bedford, and later a Leyland Tiger. The Motorhome Association was a big part of his life especially during retirement and he was always heavily involved in admin and organisation. At gettogethers, he made a point of welcoming solo folk with a shared meal.

In the last 15 years without Marg he set up a group called the Freewheelers, planning regular adventures and getogethers for his companions.

You may be travelling solo but you need never be alone. RIP RON

of learning at Waitati School. The teachers are so excited to see the lovely faces of our tamariki. The trees have missed your gentle hugs and wee feet climbing on their branches. The loose parts wait in the old shed ready for your hut building and the sandpit has missed the many holes and sandcastles.

In the first few weeks of school we are hoping to install our Creatives in School Project from 2022. The Creatives in schools programme is a wellbeing programme delivered by the Ministry of Education in partnership with the Ministry of Culture and Heritage Te Manatū Taonga and Creative New Zealand.

Our project which we were lucky to have been selected for, is made up of three huge wooden pou (logs) with ceramic tiles spaced over them that tell pictorially the Kai Tahu Creation Story. Over the first six months of 2022, the students and teachers worked with David Milne, local ceramic artist to learn the art of working with clay while at the same time, learning about our local Kai Tahu Creation story. The creativity of working with clay, helped everyone to grow in their understanding of this foundational story, treasured in our region. We are so grateful to Rua McCullum, Kaitoko at Puketeraki, for patiently working with us. Thanks to Chris Slabbert for his lead in this project. It has been a collaborative project including all the ākonga at Waitati School, teachers plus some of our community who had designed special tops for the Pou.

The installation is being placed in the Orokonui entrance pathway of the estuary. This completion of this project is a wonderful way to begin the year. I hope many of you enjoy the sculpture on your daily walks.

For 2023, we embark on another Creatives in school project, where we will be developing our wetland to include an outdoor classroom, fire pit and place for free play. This space is where we recently planted 400 native trees (thanks Halo Project) in an attempt to try and encourage the wetland back. How wonderful to have a place for native birds and insects on our school doorstep.

You might have seen on Facebook, but we had our first ever landing of kaka at Waitati School last term. We were so excited, we nearly scared them away. Just after Christmas, a kaka came to visit me at the school house. So lucky."

Auckland poet and academic Siobhan Harvey says that "...Wilson charges her work with an electric wordsmithing which makes each poem thrum."



Born in Dunedin while living in Central, Robbie was one of 3 boys and 2 girls. Growing up they lived in Benmore and Roxburgh before moving to Māori hill. Robbie's dad worked at the Manapouri dam and they moved around going where the work was, they eventually settled in Tauranga once he left.

Fun and bright and kind to his siblings, Robbie never stayed still growing up. He was good at sport - diving, swimming and especially rugby - and was an Otago under 15 rep and later played for Bay of Plenty.

Always handsome, his hair was a work of art, he pushed boundaries at high school, not allowed hair below his collar he grew it above the collar, up and out, big, big hair!

Tragically, both mum and dad were diagnosed with cancer when he was a teen, the family lost the house and savings to a bad investment, a year later mum passed away. The family was separated Robbie going to live with his grandma, which was not a good time, he didn't finish school, but went flatting. This is when he meet his first wife, Anya.

His older sister convinced him to go back to school and do bursary and eventually University Entrance exams. He moved back to Dunedin to attend Art School, and though he did not finish his degree, this was the start of a lifelong love of art.n Robbie was an artist. His work was always evolving and he challenged himself with different projects, animal series and the human form.



He was very private about his work, but open to let anyone know that his proudest achievements were his children, Casey, Jesse, and Kohl.

He lived in Waitati nearly 40 years, keeping to himself, gardening, painting and doing the things he loved. A regular attendee of Artsenta in town he made many friendships there and showed his work as part of their annual shows, but never a solo show. The family hope to exhibit some of his work locally later in the year.


available to address any queries you might have.



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
