Sugar water is a vital source of nourishment during winter, but you should put out just enough food to last a day and then when finished wash and sterilise the container. To make the nectar just add cup of sugar to 2 litres of water, put in a clean, sterilised container and wait for the birds to arrive

The Enchanted Forest

Some days the local beaches are just heaving with small children, delicate old people, people picnicking, small neurotic dogs, really big aggressive dogs, people who are terrified of dogs... so it is easier just to take our dogs for a walk somewhere else. One of those places is Seacliff reserve or the Enchanted Forest as I prefer it to be named.

I misspent a big chunk of my youth living in Seacliff, wild times were had, and some wonderful times were had in the Enchanted Forest; playing tennis, gathering walnuts, a very memorable community picnic on the now totally overgrown lawn tennis court, a community fete, parties at Clifton house, winter solstice events, playing cricket, a brutal town versus country punks softball match, planting trees, building fences, community fire wood days... good fun in lovely surroundings.

It is great to see that the Forest is now being cared for so well, and is now regularly mowed by the DCC, with many tracks being mowed and cared for. The orchard in the corner paddock is beautiful. Apples, chestnuts, acorns, pine nuts have all been planted there, and it is a pleasure to wander around and sample the different apple varieties. We picked up some windfalls to add to our cider, but the walnuts seemed like they were being eaten by rats the moment they hit the ground.

I helped plant four stone pines back in the day and was sad to see that only one had survived. There was no sign of any pine nut bearing cones, but it is early days yet.

We always make a pilgrimage up to the corner where there is a plaque in memory of the 37 women who died in the terrible 1942, Ward 5 fire, one of whom was Alex's Grandmother who was suffering from post-natal depression after giving birth to her 11th baby. I am so glad that care of those with brain illness has come such a long way since then. I am still impressed though, at how some of the care received by patients at Seacliff was exactly on the button with modern knowledge of brain health. Plenty of outs doors recreation, good fresh food all grown on site by the patients themselves, plenty of fish caught by the hospital's own fishing boat. There were some brutal practices too, but I think if Dunedin's hospitals still had the model of good, fresh, local food, instead of the awful

precooked in Auckland muck, there would be much faster recoveries, especially in those who must stay in hospital for a long time.

If you have not been to Seacliff for a while, I recommend going for a stroll on a sunny afternoon or packing a picnic and some sports equipment. It really is a credit to the community.

Kia ora koutou, good morning to all you glorious Okāhau Dune Project friends and volunteers! Your question may well be: what the hey happened to the ODP? To which the answer, broadly speaking is: Covid happened!

But we are gearing up for planting a second site this July, much as we did last year, and will reconnect with kura from our area - Pūrākaunui, Waitati, Warrington - when the stars are aligned and we can do some mahi together freely with the beautiful pikao plants.

Speaking of which, some beauties were potted on by a small group of vollies earlier this year (January), a day we ran with the idea that we would extend it to the whole group (which was sadly not to be). These were plants that akonga from Pūrākaunui and Waitati Schools had earlier potted up from seedling trays into small "tubes" and they are really gorgeous specimens now - ka pai! Warrington, Waitati, and Pūrākaunui Kura in action with ODP:

If anyone is interested in being a planting leader this year for our public planting day please get in touch. 

Did you know that the Commonwealth War Graves Commission based in the UK, looks after war graves of those killed on Service for Commonwealth countries. At the Waitati cemetery, there is one grave the CWGC maintains. This work in New Zealand is under the auspices of the Ministry for Culture & Heritage.

This is the Ferguson family plot - William Murray Ferguson, 40920. He was a Private in the Otago Regiment who died at Waitati on 15th December 1918 from injuries received in France. Also remembered on the Headstone is his brother John Ferguson 24/138, Sergeant, NZ Rifle Brigade, killed at Passchendale on 12 October 1917. (recorded on Tyne Cot Memorial). Their parents Kennedy Brown Ferguson and Emma. The Ferguson brothers are also on the Waitati Cenotaph.

The tune in my ears is instilled, I hear



Do you want to save the Waitati Toy Library?

Toy Library was closed at the start of the Covid 19 Lockdown in March 2020 and has not reopened.

A meeting was held on the 30 November 2021 to discuss the future of the Toy Library. After much discussion it was decided that unless any member of the community wishes to call a meeting, elect office bearers and form a committee, that Toy Library will formally close, assets will then be distributed as per the rules set out in the Constitution.

In November an interim committee was formed to complete all outstanding paperwork and reporting associated with Toy Library. This is now complete. The hard work is already done. If anyone would like to step in and restart Toy Library now is the time. Our next steps is to begin to dispose of Toy Library "assets". Toys, storage containers, computer, printer and remaining cash reserves. Once this occurs the organisation will be formally windup.

To be run, Toy Library requires a volunteer committee made up of 4-6 people including a President, Secretary and Treasurer. According to the current Constitution this committee needs to meet six times a year. In the past, toy hire sessions have been run by member volunteers, but some toy libraries employ people in this role. There are enough funds in reserve for the Toy Library to operate for a year without fundraising.

Mānawatia a Matariki -Celebrating Matariki

A traditional Māori Matariki story told by Dr Rangi Matamua - "Not all the children of Ranginui (Sky) and Papatūānuku (Earth) supported their parents being separated. Tawhirimātea, the God of Wind had strongly opposed the separation but had been overruled by his siblings. In return Tāwhirimātea waged war against his siblings defeating them all except Tūmātauenga, the God of War. Tū was angry with Tāwhiri for what he had done, so to punish him he tore his eyes out, smashed them and threw them into the sky. They remain there to this day as the star cluster Matariki. Thus, this is why the wind is so changeable as he is stumbling around blind."

Matariki is about reflecting on the past, celebrating the present and planning for the future. When Matariki rises this year between June 21st and June 24th, it will signal the beginning of the Māori New Year. A time to spend with whānau and friends to enjoy kai (food), waiata (song), tākaro (games) and haka. This year on Friday the 24th of June it's the first public holiday in Aotearoa to celebrate Matariki.

You can celebrate Matariki by getting up early in the morning, just before dawn to watch it rise. Burn a small fire (smoke) and a small pot of kai cooking (steam). Gather around the fire to talk about the stars and what stars you can identify. Our ancestors would read the signs of the year in Matariki which would determine what lay ahead for us and you should take a moment to appreciate Te Kāhui Matariki (the Matariki Star Cluster). We then say our final farewells to our whanau and friends departed since the last rising of Matariki by saying their names. Once you have acknowledged the dearly departed, lift the lid of your kai pot letting the steam and smoke from your fire rise together into a dawning sky - feeding Matariki and the Gods. A karakia or waiata is shared followed with a kai and korero to be enjoyed together.





New Network Ready for Possum Breeding Season

Thanks to all landowners and project partners who have made it possible for us to set up a possum control network. This has taken a lot of hard work installing 412 automatic traps on farms, in forest and scrub, on mountainsides... across 10,000 ha from Heyward Point to Pine Hill. But well worth it, enabling native habitat to regenerate and provide ample food and shelter for wildlife.

The new network covers rural land, so it's still as important as ever for residential backyard trappers to check your traps. It's breeding time now, so possums are out and about, and vocal!

In the early 1930's during the height of the depression, the idea was mooted to drain Blueskin Bay, and use unemployed labour to turn it into prime dairy farming ground. According to the 'Star', the Bay consisted of 1600 acres, of which an estimated 1000 acres could be reclaimed. The Public Works Engineers had assessed the site and foresaw no engineering difficulties in the operation. In addition, they thought Hoopers, and Papanui Inlets could be reclaimed as well. Thankfully none of the above went ahead, just imagine the Blueskin covered in black and white dairy cows.

The sign promised more,


but all there is is a stubbly yard with a witches chimney, 2 orange cones, a faggot of sticks,





WAIKOUAITI COAST COMMUNITY BOARD UPDATE

It is pleasing that we have some 'pleasings' this month. It is pleasing that the long-awaited weekend bus service has finally started. It has been a long road getting this established. The first runs were on Saturday 28th May and it was also pleasing to see that there were passengers on the buses, despite the brief notice that the timetables had gone 'live' on the Otago Regional Council website. There had been a delay in getting the service started due to illness among the ORC bus drivers.

It was very pleasing to see that the silly out-of-the-limit signs on Shortcut Road have finally been removed and replaced with much more sensible 60 km/hour signs. We have been chasing this for years but getting DCC to change speed limits on roads is a long and tortuous process. Shortcut Road is one of the most expensive unsealed roads to maintain in the whole region, but I understand that the road will receive some treatment after the spring and, hopefully, driving on the corrugated 'washboard' of a road will become a thing of the past.

It is pleasing that the DCC vegetation and footpath contractors have been catching up on overdue maintenance. It was nice to see the footpath on Orokonui Road reinstated and giving the school children somewhere safe on their walk to school. The footpath at the lower end of Doctors Point Road has also received a much-needed upgrade. Their challenge will now be to keep up the maintenance and we will be keeping a close eye on this as the months go by.

July 1st marks the start of the new DCC financial year, and our Discretionary Fund gets topped up to \$10,000. 
