
Wonder Community Awareness Respect Equality Knowledge Achievement Wellbeing.

Halo Project

The Halo Project would love your help to monitor and learn about the local kororā/little blue penguins that reside along our coastline!

They are opening their bi-annual, burrow searching events to the public for the first time to help raise awareness of these vulnerable creatures. This will enable our community to effectively advocate for these animals by better understanding their density, location and vulnerabilities.

This is a great opportunity to visit some stunning spots, connect with passionate people and spend a couple of hours doing something unique and rewarding - the data collected contributing to our long-term population monitoring.

Kororā/little blue penguins spend a lot of time on land each year to breed, raise their young and moult. During February and March, they are 'moulting' which means they are growing an entirely new coat of feathers. While they are regrowing their feathers, they are unable to swim for food which can put them at risk of starvation. We can support them by keeping dogs on a lead and away from penguin habitat - rocky shorelines, crevices and caves, and supporting predator control in coastal areas.

Kororā/little blue penguin facts:

- They are the smallest penguin in the world at around 30cm tall, weighing approximately 1kg.
- They are the most common penguin on the shores of Aotearoa.
- They are primarily nocturnal on land, returning to their nest sites at dusk.
- Their conservation status is 'at risk-declining'.
- The main predators of penguins are sharks, sea lions and leopard seals.
- They often return to where they are hatched which makes our coastline a very special place.









Market Power

I first lived in Dunedin in 1977. I was part way through an apprenticeship with the New Zealand Electricity Department, heading to become the worst electrical fitter in NZED history. The day Elvis died (16th August), 2 tradesmen bound me with electrical tape and locked me in a cupboard. The lesson escapes me.

Despite failing to grasp electricity (except accidentally), I fondly remember those 4 years working in Te Wai Pounamu's isolated spots. Benmore, Aviemore, Waitaki dams. Over Dansey's Pass to sub-stations at Livingstone and Naseby. The Roxborough dam. Time at Manapouri power station, traversing mountain roads to Doubtful Sound to witness West Arm's water surge into Fiordland (they had drilled a 10 km tunnel!). Controversial when built, Manapouri remains an incredible feat of engineering. All this means I retain a keen interest in NZ's electricity sector. Oh how things have changed.

Neo-liberalism, introduced in the 1980's, disbanded the NZED and created a mish-mash of de-centralized entities. Transpower remains government owned, while Genesis, Mercury and Meridian have 51% Government shareholding. Contact is 100% private. Swept up in the frenzied belief in the power of the market, privatisation was employed to improve NZ's electricty

sector - make it more efficient ... more profitable ... cheaper for consumers (how's that going?). Finance Minister Bill English said during John Key's reign "... one of the theoretical strength's of the market is its ability to clear away inefficiency".

And our coalition government are at it again. They have repealed the Investment in Decarbonizing Industry Fund, believing a comprehensive emissions trading scheme (read ... The Market!) will entice industries to decarbonize. Once again they are abdicating responsibility to a "theoretical strength", while ignoring the obvious - capitalism and its markets are driving us toward climate catastrophe.

US economist James Carville famously said in 1992, "it's the economy, stupid". Yeah well... I'd say to him and his ilk, "it's the environment, stupid".

The 9th Wild Dunedin Festival is Coming in April. The Wild Dunedin team are thrilled to announce that our popular Festival is on again in the school holidays 19 - 28 April.

This year our Festival is focusing on huarere/weather. What makes Dunedin's weather special? How can I plan my vegetable garden and orchard for the changing weather? Why are clouds important for Orokonui Ecosanctuary? These and many other questions will be answered for you along with the opportunity to visit many home and community open gardens including Jason Ross's garden at Waitati and the Puketeraki Māra Kai, workshops on composting and permaculture, deals on wildlife tourism trips, and much more.

Because it's in the school holidays, the Festival is a great opportunity for friends and family to visit Dunedin for 10 days of fascinating events celebrating Ōtepoti as the wildlife capital of Aotearoa.

Old favourites such as Suzy Cato's event for children with the Wildlife Hospital, Wildlife ER, sessions on bees, including one at Blueskin Nursery, yoga, plogging, diving in a kelp forest, deals on indoor bouldering, bird watching and sessions on bird photography - there's something for everyone at this year's Festival.

A highlight of the 2023 Festival, the hugely popular Art Play in Nature at Chingford Park is on again, bigger and better. Artists Janet de Wagt, Pamela Brown and Kerry Mackay will work with all ages to create a giant tapestry/collage on the Bridal Lawn using nature's materials such as autumn leaves, twigs and cones. Conservation groups, musicians, displays, and food and coffee will make for a wonderful day celebrating nature.

Libraries, Tūhura Otago Museum and Toitū are all hosting many events, there will be fine dining at three restaurants, boat trips, a session on making gin, and opportunities to help yellow-eyed penguins. Bookings are open for a Wild Night Masquerade at Larnach Castle with transport provided from town, in support of yellow-eyed penguins.

Shadows On The Floor by Frank **Beaufort**



New Album - London Labour and the London Poor,


"The first attempt to publish the history of a people, from the lips of the people themselves – giving a literal description of their labour, their earnings, their trials,

and their sufferings, in their own "unvarnished" language; and to portray the condition of their homes and their families by personal observation of the places, and direct communication with the individuals."

(Mayhew's Preface to 'London Labour and the London Poor')

Rachel Dawick is a New Zealand folk artist whose previous album, 'The Boundary Riders', was finalist for the NZ Tui Award Folk Album 2015. She returns after living in London for the last four years with her new folk album and book 'London Labour and the London Poor', based on Henry Mayhew's work from the mid 1850's when he took to the streets to interview east Londoners. releasing these interviews as part of a series of articles in the Chronicle Paper and later as a three volume book. The songs focus on the voices of the people themselves - ranging from Jack Black, the Queen's Rat Catcher, the teenage Mudlark, the Rhubarb and Spice Seller, The Acrobat, the Punch & Judy Man and many more - all to recreate a snapshot of life on the streets. This socio-political work by Mayhew is a fitting album for today's times as the same issues arise, voices that seem to echo the past. This album will be released in New Zealand over March - May 2024 before being released in the UK at the end of 2024.

Dawick's previous album and book 'The Boundary Riders' explored the 'hidden voices' of the working class women who left the UK to NZ in the 1800s. This three year research into local archives and hidden stories of NZ's working class women was released on 19 September 2014 (NZ Women's Vote Day 1893).



The album took her on a musical journey from Tui Award finalist for best NZ Folk Album in 2015 to being selected as one of forty Musical Theatre at the BEAM festival in London on 8 and 9 March 2016 - a showcase of emerging British Musical Theatre Writing. Since 2017 she has been part of BML (Book Music Lyric) as a lyricist and composer in London developing her skills in Musical Theatre Writing, before finding herself in London during Covid teaching in schools. It has been here that she has developed her material and developed a picture of London past and present.

Waikouaiti Coast Heritage Centre

Here at the WCHC we are settling into another year of visitors, building restoration and a probable change of long-term volunteers.

In 2023 we saw over a thousand visitors come through our doors, a first for us, not unexpected as each year since opening the new building we have seen a steady increase in numbers. We have particularly enjoyed having groups coming to Waikouaiti to visit the heritage centre and to see and learn about the district. Our recent group was from the Taieri, who were most effusive in their praise of both our premises, wishing they'd had more time to spend with us.

Work continues behind the scenes on the restoration of the old bank building, we recently had an expert in heritage tiling come to appraise our roof as well as a builder to examine our roof timbers and give an estimation on the verandah renovation (or not). There has also been a suggestion for a regular monthly day for cleaning the interior of the building. If this interests you (a couple of hours only) then please contact me or call in to the Heritage Centre. We are also extending an invitation to all locals to undertake a FREE guided tour of the building on Easter Saturday (10am - 3pm). An opportunity for a before and after restoration experience.

Finally, our probable change of longterm volunteers relates to Bill and Kay Lang, who have been hugely influential in our achievements over the past twelve years. All going well they plan to return to Australia later this year to be closer to family. John Scott has kindly agreed to take over the role of Collections Manager, John is well known for his facebook page illustrating the history of the East Otago area. Other volunteer members of our group have taken on roles that either Kay or Bill have had responsibility for. As always, we encourage more local people to join our group becoming involved in learning about the area's history and meeting interesting heritage centre visitors. WARNING Hot and dry weather

Fire and Emergency New Zealand's Otago District Manager Phil Marsh asks that people are cautious in these conditions and do not carry out activities that pose a fire risk, such as mowing, welding, and driving through long grass. "But if you must mow your lawn or undertake any farm activity that's likely to generate sparks, do it first thing in the morning when it is still cool," he says.

People can also take simple steps to make their properties easier to defend against fire. These include:

- Clearing flammable material from 10m around homes and buildings.
- Moving firewood stacked against houses
- Clearing gutters of dried leaves etc that will easily catch fire
- Clearing flammable material from under decks
- Trimming trees and bushes and removing the trimmings
- Keeping grass short (using a trimmer with a nylon line is safer in these conditions than a mower or trimmer with a metal blade that could create a spark)

The Treaty of Waitangi is a flawed document.

Throughout its 184 years there have been debates, interpretations, rulings, judgements, and protests over its meaning. The process is evolving and nuanced and has brought many benefits.

What makes me happy?

- Being part of a 1500 strong hikoi that marched to the Octagon on Waitangi day in support of the Treaty.
- Hearing te reo scattered in everyday language.
- Being part of a NZ that can say sorry for its past wrongs and attempt reparation.
- Hapū that walk the talk like Kati Huirapa who have demonstrated great commitment over many years to protecting the moana from Karitane to Blueskin Bay.
- Books that are uplifting and speak to me (This pākehā life: An unsettled memoir by Alison Jones)
- Marae that open their doors in crisis (cyclones, earthquakes, covid)

What makes me sad?

• People who feel threatened by Māori initiatives and wish to derail the Treaty process. Māori initiatives are rarely exclusive. From the earliest days of the Waitangi Tribunal that stopped sewage flowing into the Manukau harbour to present time where Ngai Tahu is leading construction of a Health hub in Caversham, they bring benefits to many.

So let us celebrate our founding document with all its flaws, remembering that it provides just one of many pathways leading to the same outcome: respect and dignity for all.

Our ceramics studio opens once a week for children with Steven our local ceramic artist coming in to teach the children and of course we have Bee Club once a week, thanks to Pete. Our Year 7-8's are going to Stewart Island in a couple of weeks which will give them a rich experience of another New Zealand environment. While there they will begin their 2024 William Pike Challenge adding in several outdoor challenges and community service.

We continue to learn read and writing and learn math every day. The explicit teaching allows children confidently learn implicitly in a rich environment using their self directed skills.

George Street Orchard Inspiration

I joined a New Zealand edible gardening face book group a year or so ago, but I got annoyed by all the people chatting about things it is impossible to grow down here. Braggers! They were discussing their banana crops, kumara growing techniques, and the diseases of passion fruit vines. "In my dreams" I thought, and created a South Island edible gardening page, hoping to avoid kumara envy.

For my most recent birthday my sister gave me a voucher for a guided tour of the George street orchard. I saved our trip for when I thought there might be a good range of fruits to see. We went for our tour a few days ago, and if I could only use one word to describe this orchard, it would be "inspiring".

Rory Harding has planted a huge variety of fruiting plants in the backyard of his big brick house on George Street. The garden is surrounded on all sides by brick wall (which must hold a lot of warmth), but it is shaded by a 2 story motel on the North side, and the 2 story brick house on the West side, and yet still manages to be a super-intensive and productive garden.

Some apples are grown using the espalier method, and every bit of under story has something productive growing in it.

His method of finding the right place for each tree and shrub is to move it around, or buy another one and plant it in a better position. He then chops down and chips the remains of any which don't live up to expectations. They then become part of the mulch layer.

I was super impressed with the passionfruit vine, which was growing in the sunniest corner of the garden and had a feijoa tree as a forest canopy layer to protect it from frost.

There was also a grafted avocado tree in this corner. He had tested avocadoes grown from seed (which can take 30 years to produce fruit), to see if they could cope with the climate, before forking out for an expensive grafted plant which will fruit much sooner. Rory also had a mandarin in this favoured corner (I bet he wishes he had more favoured corners).

The funniest thing for me was to spot some kumara growing happily in a sunny spot of ground used as a vegetable patch between the trees. I am not sure that he will get much of a crop, but I am pretty impressed all the same. I am surprised there wasn't a banana tree tucked away somewhere, though there was a hardy variety of pawpaw or papaya. I am pretty sure that if it is possible to grow something in this garden, then it would already be thriving there.



I might try a passion-fruit vine somewhere at ours, perhaps under the veranda. I'd love to try a mandarin. Art least we have a lot more space, but I think we also have more frost.

I guess you just have to try, experiment, move things around, and find that ideal spot. I might even try growing some kumara and brag about it on my Facebook group.






