So I will now rethink my self-reliance and call it co-dependence, forget any thoughts of feminist guilt and continue baking cakes for my male friends who are too busy with No.8 wire.

# **Halo Project**

The Halo Project Predator Free team are working hard to reduce the already low possum numbers in the 10,000 hectares surrounding Orokonui Ecosanctuary to zerodensity. This winter the team will be primarily focusing in on the Aramoana, Heyward Point, Pūrakaunui areas.

Their toolbox includes:


- 1. Surveillance and detection
- 2. Community engagement for sightings
- 3. Targeted control operations
- 4. Intensive backyard trapping

This toolbox builds on their landscape-scale trap network as they define remaining possum hotspots and work with the community to target these areas. This is why they need you! Here's what you can do to help:

- Use a torch to spotlight for possums
- Report sightings & sign such as noises, poo & scratches as soon
- Help spread the word
- To report a possum go to www.reportapossum.nz or leave a message on 03 395 9753.

## POSSUM BEHAVIOUR:

- They are nocturnal and feed at night.
- Often follow the same track, forming flattened paths about 20cm wide.
- Have an average home range of 200m in forest and multiple nest sites.
- Have favourite trees that are visited regularly, leaving extensive scratch marks in their bark and heavy browsing of leaves and fruit.
- Possums eat the leaves, flowers and fruit of native plants. Two of their preferred trees are fuchsia, māhoe.
- Their dislike of wet weather makes control much more successful during fine weather.





# **Id-gaf Politics**

# The Good Old Days

For many years I have talked about (been slightly obsessed with) the idea of a much better bus service for the North Coast. Dunedin to Palmerston.

We are fortunate to now have a weekend service which may or may not be running at the ideal times. But we need a more regular week day service of five runs each way rather than three and one which comes down Coast Road and picks up passengers from Warrington and maybe even Seacliff. A lot of new houses have been built in Warrington in the last few years and are more on the way, I see no good reason to exclude us from the bus route. But any further improvements to the service have been completely ruled out by the Otago Regional Council. In a recent joint planning document of the DCC and ORC, The Draft Dunedin Future Development Strategy, the issue of extra services for outlying areas was denied in favor of more regular services for city suburbs (more, mostly empty busses buzzing around Dunedin in the middle of the day?). Page 63, "there are no plans to extend coverage (buses) to unserviced areas and limited changes to services that run to outlying areas".



Why do I want more bus runs and who would use them? Currently there is one early bus for workers and school kids which leaves Palmerston very early and not another one until late morning. I am sure there are many people who have shopping or appointments in town who would like to get to Dunedin before lunchtime but do not want to use the early service. Likewise coming back from town apart from the very popular 3.35pm

bus there is not another one leaving Dunedin until after 6pm. I am sure there are people who would love to see a 5pm bus which would allow young people to do activities in Dunedin after school or be much appreciated by workers who finish work late afternoon, allowing them to get home at a reasonable hour.

There are many reasons for a better bus service: to get more people out of cars, better for the environment and our carbon footprint. To provide a better service for both the young and old who are transport disadvantaged (too young or too old or too poor to drive). This is often a reason people move away from Blueskin Bay, they have teenagers who want to spend more time in town or they are older people who are worried about maintaining their independence both are hampered by a very poor, irregular bus service.

I was shocked to discover that nearly 100 years ago we had a pretty good (but slow) bus service which included Seacliff and Warrington. I think we need to keep on complaining loudly and submitting to the ORC, until they respond to our demand for a better bus service.

## Breakfast At Tiffany's by Truman Capote.

Marc (edited version) 'The book portrays a wily woman utilising her vivaciousness and good looks to avoid poverty, in an age where opportunities for uneducated women were few', but Golightly somehow seems bigger than her story - the character elicits sympathy rather than empathy, the story lacking perhaps authentic grittness.'

Martin (edited version) 'Narrated by, effectively, a young Capote, we follow Holly on a journey of self re-invention in Manhatten during WW2. The style is not too dissimilar to Raymond Chandler in places. In the end we never really find out what happens to her which, as is apt, gives us the chance to ponder her fate wherever and with whomever. Thoroughly enjoyable.



# How many brains?

We've known the spine has neurons in it for a while. However, recently, scientists discovered that the neurons in our spine learn and remember movement.

I wonder if, like the main brain, they need sleep to store it better for memory. It does kind of explain why we get stiffer when we have a sore back, though. As many sore backs are not traceable to a biological cause, maybe it's more in the spine brain. Maybe our spine brain doesn't want to move much because it remembers pain.


I find pain and sore backs fascinating after recovering from long-term excruciating back pain. Pain has so many attributing factors. Trauma, both physical and emotional, plays a part. Something else I learnt this month was that trauma can be passed on biologically. So, you inherit the trauma of your parents, their parents, etc., which I find fascinating as well. And to be fair, a little scary;

I feel like we need way more therapists in the house to be deal with all this intergenerational trauma.

I've been meditating more. That helps.

Something else I learned this month was that more movement and range of movement lessen back pain (start small and gradually increase). Is this because we're teaching the neurons that we can move without pain?

There was a pain conference in Dunedin a few weeks ago. Again, the word fascinating comes to mind. A fine bunch of folks as well. But if anyone tells you pain is all in the mind, well, yes, the mind does interpret our pain receptors, but when I was told that I was like (insert swear word in here), it's DEFINITELY in my body.



Pain is more complex than being just in your head. Ask any neuroscientist; the brain is a complex wee beasty. And then send them my way I'd love to have them over for a chat. And, to end, as we started, neurons aren't just in the brain; our spines can learn and remember, the heart has a little brain, and the stomach has a brain, we haven't caught up with octopi yet, but we're getting closer. Octopi. Nine brains. Nine.

We and this world we live in is a thoroughly interesting place.

# New Zealand spinach, kōkihi

"Oh yes, no worries, I will make a spinach and feta pie for the pot luck dinner", but when I went to pick the spinach and silver beet I realized I did not have enough to make a decent sized pie. In amongst the silver beet in the garden was some puha, so I decided to add that into the mix too, but there was still not enough.

The puha reminded me that there is always plenty of NZ native spinach, kōkihi or Tetragonia tetragonioides, around in coastal areas, so I took the dogs for a walk on the beach and found some growing there. It was easy enough to pinch out the tips from the sprawling plant, don't bother trying to eat the big leaves or stalks they are a bit tough, but the tips are tender and tasty.

There used to be loads of kōkihi growing in amongst the sand dunes at Warrington beach, but again, it is an important plant to stabilize sand dunes so only pick the tips as this encourages more growth and they are nicer to eat.

My spinach, kōkihi and puha pie was a total success, and didn't taste at all weird.

An added bonus on this wee foraging expedition was that at this time of year there are berries on the kōkihi plants. I accidentally squashed one between my fingers and was rewarded with an amazing bright magenta-coloured stain. I picked a few of these and took them home to experiment with. I squashed them into a piece of merino fabric (wool and silk are particularly good at taking natural dyes). I thought I might end up with a pattern of pink spots from where each berry was squashed into the fabric. I don't actually know much about this process, so I plunged the fabric into a hot water and white vinegar solution to see if it would work as a mordant, and instead of spots I ended up with a bright pink piece of fabric. I might try heat setting it to see if it makes the colour bond to the fabric.

The berries are edible, but they just taste like spinach, which is a bit of a surprise, considering the colour. But I might end up with a pair of bright pink mitts to keep my hands warm on future foraging forays.


## Fares are changing - Bee Prepared

From the 1 May 2024 bus fares will change for those with a registered Bee Card.

- · Children under five are still free.
- · Fares for children 5-12 years: FREE (with correctly registered Bee Card).
- · Fares for youth 13-18 years: Dunedin \$1.20, Queenstown \$1.50 per one-way trip.
- · Fares for adults 19+: Dunedin and Queenstown: \$2 per one way trip.
- · No change to the free off-peak concessions for SuperGold card holders (\$2 during peak times with a registered Bee Card, free fares off peak).
- · No change for Community Services Card holders (half price adult fares with a registered Bee Card).
  - · Cash fares for those aged 13+: \$3 Dunedin, \$4 Queenstown, \$10 Queenstown airport.

Half price fares for ages 5-24 are ending due to the government's decision to stop funding these subsidies.

If the word Qigong is new to you, you might be curious to know what it means. Originating in China, Qigong (pronounced Chi-Gong) is a practice that uses moving and still meditations, breath, and intention to help you get into a deeply calm, relaxed state.

There are many different styles of Qigong and the style I practice and teach is called Yuan Qigong.

An important element of Qigong is Qi (Chi), our body's life force. Qi is the most important element in Chinese Medicine, and in Acupuncture, in fact many describe Qigong as a branch of Chinese Medicine.

There are many reasons to practice Qigong. The first is Self-Care, I practice almost every day (and have done for 18 years) and find that I have more energy, am more relaxed and that my day just goes better when I do.

Another is if we are working at trying to solve issues we have in life, for example, a health issue, or physical pain that we haven't been able to solve by other means. I am by no means suggesting that we shouldn't use conventional medicine or other modalities. However, in my opinion, learning to look after our state of being, and internal energies through meditative practices like Yuan Qigong is a very important key for wellbeing and still not well understood or practiced enough.

A third is relationships, I find when I am calmer, I am not so reactive, and I can think more clearly.

A final, is personal growth. Yuan Qigong can help you to get into a deeply calm, relaxed meditative state and you can learn how to take this state into your personal life. At another level, it is even possible to see and change thought patterns that we might have that are affecting our lives. If this or any of the other points above resonate with you, I encourage you to come a join a class and experience it for yourself.

You might have read an article about our day -retreat, run with some other Dunedin and Waitati Yuan Qigong teachers. We had a good turn -out for this event and it was nice to meet some new people. Classes will be held on Tuesdays 5:30 -6:30pm at the Waitati Hall and we will be starting on the 21st of May.

Costs for this class will be:

- Casual \$12.00 (Student/Beneficiary \$7.00) or

## Ruth's Community Involvement in Her Own Words

1969 joined the Warrington Indoor Bowls Club and played continuously. 1971 was elected on to the Warrington Indoor Bowls Club committee.

1973 (approx) was asked to join the Warrington School committee. On being asked to join I was told I might have to write the odd letter but this was surreptitiously coercing me into being secretary. The reason for this was because the committee apparently wanted someone who would be in the community for a number of years. I was secretary for 13 years. Both Cliff and I contributed to coaching rugby and netball. Was also involved with fundraising for the school pool. Served in 2003 on the School 75th Reunion committee.

1977 Involved in the setting up and working as supervisor Warrington Play Centre through to 1982

I have spent two periods of time on the Warrington Hall Committee the second term being from 2011 to 2023. On both occasions improvements to the facility were part of the activities I was part of.

1982 took over the Blueskin Guide Company leadership role. The membership of active girls increased from about 9 members to 25. During the following 16 years I gained a variety of guiding gualifications which contributed to my own growth but more importantly gave me knowledge to help the young girls to develop useful life skills. I attended many guiding events including National trainings, three jamborees, one of which I was responsible for the 'first aid post" and one Ranger National camp. I also established the Blueskin Ranger group. 1985 Became the Eastern Districts Indoor Bowls Sub Association secretary, a task I continued with until 2019.

**2002** became a member of the newly established East Otago Community Health Trust. Secretary from 2004.

**2012** Joined the Blueskin Bay Garden Club and was elected to the committee the following year, taking over as treasurer.

2012 Joined the Dunedin Branch of the New Zealand Society of Genealogists and joined the local committee in 2014. Was secretary from 2016.

2016 became secretary for the Otago Indoor Bowls Association






