# The Halo Project Community Newsletter







The Halo Project has been busy. The Source to Sea team has been hosting volunteers to plant native seedlings at Potato Point, supplementing the planting completed in 2022. 8,400 seedlings have been planted here this year, which brings the total to 14,800. After monitoring we are stoked to see the 2022 seedlings are thriving with a survival rate of 99%.

Source to Sea staff hosted the Nature School children for a planting day, and helped with Te Ara o Te Whiri Kawe planting day at Apes Road in Karitāne where they achieved their goal of 3000 plants in the ground!

The team is also celebrating finishing the planting at the Gums in Osborne. 24,500 native seedlings have been planted over two years in partnership with mana whenua and Ngā Whenua Rāhui. These plantings connect the Pūrākaunui estuary habitat with the forest on the hills conjoining Orokonui Ecosanctuary.

The Predator Free team have been servicing the network of automatic self-resetting AT220 devices in Flagstaff. This is strenuous work, on rough terrain but worth it when you look at the data. These devices removed 258 possums in the six months since the previous service.

AT220 devices have been installed under cliffs in Heyward Point and in the sand dunes near Aramoana, these removed 11 possums in two weeks. Overall capture rates have dramatically dropped through this area and detection operations show very low possum numbers.

In July the total predators removed across the entire Halo network were:

On Saturday's the 19th of August the Waitati fire brigade held their 58th Annual General meeting. I was invited to attend and had the pleasure of speaking. This was a great opportunity to acknowledge the mahi of our amazing volunteer team.

Lindsay Scott marked his retirement after 30 years of service. Thank you Lindsay for your dedication. 29 years of service for Dave Hardisty and 54 in total for Paul Clements.

Charles Abraham was bestowed with the regional and district 'Royal Honours'.

Voted on and recognised by his colleagues Jens Stedeler received the Fire fighter of the year award 2023.

Jodie Williams was this years recipient of the Piston broke award for his recent attempts tho really get stuck in with the response vehicle.

We welcomed new recruits, Damon Campbell and Jon and Jamiee Visser. Plus the Awards acknowledged special activities with Paul receiving a sports council award for encouraging participation in sport , recognising his contribution around the country as a 'southern influencer' particularly for organising Basketball tournaments.

This year already they have attended 38 Medical call outs and 16 vehicle accidents. This is compared to 2 vegetation fires, 2 structure fires and 5 other types of fire.

78 responses in total (there were a few other rescues, special services, false alarms and non recorded events) Medical calls increased by 24 from last year, indicating a change in our community needs.

That means more than once a week these amazing people are helping in our community. I am incredibly grateful we have a brigade here.

#### Kia Ora Whānau, Waitati School has had a very successful Matariki Wearable Arts Performance. This was held at the Waitati Hall on the 27 July.

Ākonga created wearable costumes based on their Turangawaewae, their place of belonging. These ranged from Maunga, Awa, sea creatures, bridges, Takaroa, Manu and a Waka. As each child walked down the red runway, a self-written piece of descriptive writing was read out about their art. It was a stunning display of creativity in true Waitati style. This was followed up with a Matariki waiata sung by Alexia White. Then a delicious hangi was enjoyed by all. It felt so good to be together and focused on what is important, our children. A special thanks to the Dunedin City Council for the grant towards the Kai and to all our helpers.

This week a small group attended the Enviroschools Ecological Building workshop. This handson workshop taught the learners how to make Adobe Brick, Living Willow, Cob, Wattle and Daub style buildings. This year for our Creatives in Schools project we have developed an outdoor classroom in the swamp. The final activity was to create a model of the building concept that the akonga would

like to make. One of the ideas was to add a door to the building using the Wattle and Daub method. Another idea was a living willow archway but using natives. Talking about the Swamp, you may have been privileged to read the first two editions of our very own Blueskin News called the 'Swamp Gazette'. This endeavour is led by a small group of students who have a passion for writing. Keep your eye out for the third edition.

The children have enjoyed the Three Peaks Cross country - in very cold conditions. It is always good to meet with local schools to see how fast we are. They are also enjoying swimming lessons each Friday afternoon at Moana Pool. Thank you to Oceana Gold for providing funding.

One of the positives about small rural schools is that we can quickly adapt to our learners' needs and passions. The opportunities we give them include learning which is authentic. We use projects and play to promote Deep Connected Learning which builds future focused skills. For example, ecological buildings, bee keeping, gardening, music, and art, all of which are available by choice to students. They can opt in, have a quick look, stay and do more, and if it turns out to be their thing, continue on to make it a life-long passion. We are so grateful that Waitati School has amazing grounds with resources in which children can have a go at learning a wide range of things. We also offer small learning ratios, and a range of inclusive learning styles.



If you have a child who would like opportunities to not only try different activities but to access them throughout the year, and you don't have a school yet, please check us out. We have an amazing Year 7-8 programme and have room for more of this age group in 2024.

# **Warrington Hall**



# **Healing Our Land with Trees**

I've read two amazing articles about people completely changing their environments by planting trees. If you're not already out there planting they might inspire you to give it a go.

In Brazil a man named Antonio Vicente bought 31 hectares of land razed by grazing cattle. His land's water supplies had nearly dried up. Vicente planted 50,000 trees and now has 8 waterfalls on his land. Vicente says "Maintaining forests are essential for water supplies because trees absorb and retain water in their roots and help prevent erosion."


'India's Forest Man' Jadav Payeng has single-handedly reclaimed an island in Assam, India. He started planting after being stirred by a freakish sight on the island - dead snakes piled on sand in scorching temperatures, perished for lack of shade. He estimates he has planted hundreds of thousands of trees with the help of the wind, birds and other animals and the Brahmaputra River. Now under one of his oldest trees, a 30 year-old teak tree, there are fresh scratches on the bark where a tiger has scratched its claws. Deer, monkeys, elephants and many birds now live in the forest he has created from an island of sand.

# WAIKOUAITI COAST COMMUNITY BOARD UPDATE

On Sunday 2nd July there was a snow event which resulted in the Northern Motorway, Mount Cargill Road and Blueskin Road all being closed to traffic overnight, effectively preventing drivers from the north getting through to Dunedin. A number of local folk did an outstanding job in making Waitati Hall, the Marae and some local residences available for stranded travellers to stay overnight, together with others who brought blankets and other supplies. To my mind, it was evident that the online notices from NZTA and DCC advising 'Road Closed' were inadequate. There were families from overseas stuck at the 'Road Closed' sign at the Waitati end of the motorway and not having a clue about what to do next. It was fortunate that some local folk attended to that and ushered them back to the hall. I have asked NZTA & DCC to look at the idea of notifying drivers at Palmerston and Waikouaiti that the road is closed south of Waitati and where they can go if they are stranded. I await the outcome of this.

For some time we have been keen to hear from Dunedin City Council about the current status of, and future prospects for, the Warrington wastewater treatment plant - first established in the late nineteen eighties. The DCC holds resource consents to discharge to air (expiring 1 November 2023) and to land (expiring 1 February 2024). Two pieces of work are happening in relation to the treatment plant. Construction has begun to install a Moving Bed Biofilm Reactor (MBBR) and this should be completed by the end of 2023. Once commissioned, the MBBR is expected to improve the discharge water quality. Work is also underway to assess long-term wastewater treatment and disposal options for the Warrington community. This project is outlined on the DCC website - 'Northern wastewater schemes discharge consent study'.

Our next formal meeting will be held on Wednesday 20th September at 5.30 pm in the Blueskin Bay Library Meeting Room. At such meetings we consider various grant applications that have been submitted. Details on how to apply for a grant can be found on the DCC website. If you would like more information about applying for a grant, feel free to contact any board member.

# Parsnip story

It's a race against time at the moment to eat all the parsnips in the garden before they start getting woody and going to seed with the coming of spring. Carrots are the same.

My most hated vegetable combination ever is mashed carrots and parsnips- I think it is the colour more than anything.

When we were designing clothes, the fabric reps would come by with samples of fabric we could choose from. Every time a swatch turned up with a fabric, usually a wool mix, the colour of mashed parsnips and carrots, I'd be gagging and tossing that hideous swatch aside in horror.

All this was based on a childhood dinner memory. I suppose Mum was trying to get rid of the parsnips and carrots in the garden before they went to waste. I understand the reasoning, but I still can't stand the

I've found a much, much, better thing to do with parsnips, even children love it.

Dig up some parsnips, wash them well, and then peel strips of them, as long as possible, using a potato peeler. Keep peeling until you can't get any more. I'll leave quantity decisions to you, but they are tasty, so do a few.

Toss the parsnip slivers in oil on a large roasting dish and sprinkle them with sesame seeds. Spread

them out fairly evenly and roast in the oven. You will need to toss them about a bit with some tongs so they cook reasonably evenly. You want the end result to be crispy and golden.

Serve in a pile with a sprinkle of salt and some aioli. Even fussy little buggers (and old buggers) will enjoy them. If only Mum had known about this, I might have been able to make jerseys from orange marle wool knit.

Oh, and once you have dug out all your parsnips, it is time to plant them again in another spot, as they have a very long growing season.

Parsnip seeds don't keep long, so buy fresh seeds every year. Plant the lot then thin out any excess. They are notoriously hard to germinate, but it's probably a result of trying to grow two year old seeds.

I suppose if you must, mash your parsnips and carrots together, you might find them beautiful and delicious, just don't bring them anywhere near me.
