Also thanks to the Blueskin Garden Club members who picked, bunched Daffodils, baked and looked after the stalls.








MARK BROWN





The first half of 2022 has been a time of quiet progress for all things at the Waiputai Hub. The Trust has experienced support for the Hub via the generosity of funders, friends, and whanau for which we would like to give some thanks.

Funding from the Lotteries Commision has enabled us to start offering the hub to community groups for free. Removing the cost of a venue from being a barrier to holding activities that bring people together to reduce isolation is one of our primary goals. We thank the Commission and the confidence they have shown in our venture. The offer is there to community groups, and we currently have: Darts on a Monday evening 7-8.30pm; Ping Pong on Tuesdays; Home School group 12pm-3p.m; 6 - 7.30pm Pilates Thursdays; GUKE Group (Guitar, Ukulele and singalong) every other Fridays, 7-8:30pm, and the brand new Blueskin Community Orchestra rehearsing on Sundays 4-6pm.

We still also have plenty of available spots during the day so if you have a dream for a group or activity, or just want info about our activities. Email us at waiputai@gmail.com so we can help.

Also, our thanks go to The Dunedin Masonic Society, which generously awarded our grant application for a "Grounds improvement" package of 2 new picnic benches, a new BBQ for community use or private hire, and a mower to keep the grounds in tip top condition. Responsibility for our outside space is shared between the DCC and the Trust. We hope that the regular visitors to the space enjoy the benches, and remind everyone, the hub is available for hire for children's parties, family gatherings, or to host a community event. Other news to share, includes the 10-week Botanical Drawing Class. 12 participants met each Sunday, 9am -12.30, and under the guidance of



Wayne Everson, Artist, lecturer, and teacher, received a comprehensive drawing and watercolour tutorials that ranged from drawing lines, creating 3d shapes, drawing visual perspectives, using colour, copying great artists work' for practice, and, finally, producing an original final watercolour painting (Images shown in photos). This was a fantastic 10 weeks that had everyone experiencing success.



Wayne has taught this course at Olvestone House in Dunedin for many years and has agreed to offer this same opportunity to locals in our own community. The inspired group at the Hub plans to continue to meet once a month to share their continued work in botanical art, and, next year, to complete an advanced course which would culminate in an exhibition.

Community: BRCT has been divisive. True, wind farms are contentious but publically calling your Community rent a crowd and NIMBYs, accusing them of vandalism and death threats and, more disturbingly, blaming the demise of the wind turbine project on "allowing Trumpian elements in the community a voice" doesn't exactly promote Community. True the opposition has been equally as derogatory, though in a less public manner. Get a proper job being the mildest. Community?

Trust: Long standing friendships have been broken and strained. Trust?

Water under the Bridge? Let bygones be bygones? Well yes, let's put BRCT and its \$1M plus of wasted dollars to rest but please let's learn from their failures. Let's not allow those who orchestrated this contentious, divisive, expensive failure that is BRCT to move on and rewrite their involvement as e.g. "a record of successful projects and community engagement"*** Please let us poor Waitatians not endure another survey or study. Please let's demand the DCC insist the likes of \$30,000 place-based funding be used for something other than another BRCT questionnaire, another survey, another report. Let's do stuff. Let's put solar panels on poorer Blueskin residents' rooves to ease their power bills?"

Community art for the masses, or is it a sculpture?

If you've been meandering down Doctors Point beach towards the cave lately and turned your head right just as the cliffs begin, you may have noticed a driftwood structure (or is it art?). Constructed around an outcrop of rocks that form two walls, an unknown array of constructionists, artists, play people, younglings and more, have used what has washed ashore, been cast adrift, or found in the sand, to transform this geological formation into a shelter of sorts, complete with entrance and roof.

I first took my part as a constructionist during the initial lock down in 2020, adding to a few pieces of already perfectly placed driftwood art (or is it a sculpture?). Since then, the structure has taken multiple forms constructed by passers-by and de-constructed by the forces of nature. Its current incarnation is its most sound yet, having survived multiple storms and high tides.

For me, it adds some purpose to my regular beach walks. I wonder to myself as I exit the carpark if its still standing? What has been added and by whom? and I always offer a piece of beach debris to the shelter on my way past. I like to think that this ever-changing sculpture (or is it architecture?) brings some joy and wonderment to those on the beach, and maybe encourages the adding a little bit of one's own finding to this community living art sculpture.



OTHER BOOKS

Notes from an Apocalypse: A Personal Journey to the End of the World and Back by Mark O'Connell

A cheery title (not) but this is an incisive, engaging and compassionate journal of the end of times. I'm still only 2/3rds of my way through it, even though it's a short read, but particularly appreciated the chapter on Aotearoa New Zealand titled "Bolt-hole". You might too.



I've got a wee adage which makes me overcome a reluctance to do something or push me out of my comfort zone.

It goes like this: If you are standing next to a river, pool or the sea and are reluctant to jump in because it might be cold...remember you have never regretted a swim ever.

It may not work for you, but it works for me every time (especially if taken literally) because I love swimming so much.

I try to go swimming every day if I can. Mostly I go to Moana Gow pool at Hawksbury village as it is open all year round and only cost \$200 a year for a key fob to get in the door any time of the day or night. Port Chalmers pool is beautiful, bigger than Moana Gow, but only open in summer. St Clair saltwater pool is also only open in summer, but it is so warm and lovely it makes you feel like you have gone for a tropical holiday. Moana pool in Dunedin is so big and interesting with heaps of stuff going on; my favourite part is the deliciously jetty spa pool to relax in afterward.

All of these pools are about the same distance to travel to from Blueskin Bay so you can really take your pick.

The pool at Hawksbury is entered via a ramp instead of steps so even if your body can't manage steps or ladders you can still go for a swim, it is however, not deep enough for aqua jogging if that is your thing.

Swimming is an aerobic exercise-great for your heart, lowers your blood pressure, and uses every major muscle group, without any pressure on aging joints, so you can do it even if you have dodgy knees and hips.

Regular swimming also improves memory, cognitive function, immune response and mood. Swimming may also help repair damage from stress and forge new neural connections in the brain. So swimming actually makes your brain younger.

Something I've noticed though is that very few middle aged and older men swim. The only reason I can think of for this is that there may be a reluctance to take the aging body out in public in a pair of budgie smugglers, but have no fear; the pool is not a beauty contest (you should see the rest of us). It is perfectly fine to wear board shorts and a rash vest, some people even swim in spring wetsuits.

The pool is such a level playing field that some of the fastest and fittest swimmers are in their 80's, and that is just so very inspiring.

Remembering St Francis of Assissi.

It seems Francis was a bit of a lad. As a young man he was wealthy and privileged, and liked to party. His father was a wealthy silk merchant, so he had the best clothes. His Mum was a French aristocrat, so he got all the invites. He was dashing and brave, fun and witty. He was christened Giovanni, but his dad, Pietro, called him "Francesco" ('Frenchman') and paid his bar tab, his tailors' bills and everything else. He went with the army to fight Perugia and was captured. It took a year, but his father ransomed him. It seemed Pietro would indulge his son in everything, but he could afford it.

Sadly, this fond relationship final broke. Pietro would let his son do anything, except give stuff away. His reckless life finally paled for Francis and he took to give everything away. His father couldn't cope with that, disinherited him, and so Francis took to the roads as a wandering preacher. His view was that God had made the world, and in the world we could get glimpses of God. For this reason care of the world was vitally important.

Francis was tremendously successful, charismatic, charming, welcome pretty much everywhere (he went to Egypt and tried to convert the Caliph); the friend of rulers and Popes while succeeding in remaining itinerant and poor. He knew his own faults and limitations, so that when the Franciscan Friars grew from a bunch of friends to a full-blown religious order, he put someone else in charge.

We remember him now as a friend of nature. He saved the people of Gubbio from a predatory wolf. But in his own way: he negotiated a deal whereby the villagers fed the wolf, and he didn't eat them. In 1979 Pope John Paul 2 made Francis patron saint for the environment.

Council elections: making the most of your STV vote

Dunedin voters will again be using STV at the October elections to elect a new city council. Gavin Beattie outlines in this article how voters can use their STV vote to help achieve the result they want.

The single transferable vote (STV) electoral system is, as its name indicates, a single vote that is transferred between candidates according to each voter's preferences. This is in contrast to the old first-past-the-post (FPP) system, where the voter has as many votes as there are vacancies.

The STV system is quite different, and is a fundamentally fairer system. This is because all voters have a better chance of contributing to the election of their preferred candidate(s). It is also because votes are not 'wasted' by voting for candidates who are either, popular enough not to need all the votes they receive, in order to be elected, or who are not popular enough to get elected. In these cases votes are transferred, partially in the case of candidates already with enough votes to be elected, to the voter's next preference.

Not only is STV fairer, it can also provide representation proportional to the communities of interest voters relate to. This will result in greater diversity around the council table. These communities of interest may include different age groups such as under-represented young people; different ethnic groups, including Māori; different rural and urban communities; as well as a wide range of special interest groups such as environmental and conservation interests and the disabled.

Dunedin voters can achieve proportional representation as a result firstly of the election being held at-large across the whole city. Then, by voters understanding that under STV, there is no incentive to vote in any way other than for their true preferences for the candidates on the voting paper.

This understanding is based on the fact that votes are always allocated in order, firstly to a voter's first preference (i.e. number 1 on the voting paper), and then it can be transferred to their second preference (number 2), and then to their third preference (number 3), and so on. In this way, a voter's lower preference for a particular candidate can never override that voter's higher preference. In other words, there is no incentive to vote other than according to your true preferences.

Put another way, there is no incentive to vote negatively or 'tactically' with a view to keeping a particular candidate out. The voter simply ranks other candidates higher than the candidate they wish to keep out.

Arising from this, two frequently asked questions are: how many candidates should I vote for (i.e. rank)? And, should I rank at all, the candidate I least want to be elected?

Voters can rank as many or as few candidates as they wish. As long as your voting paper has a single number 1, a single number 2, a single number 3 and so on, your vote will continue to be counted. The more preferences you identify, the more you maximise the power of your single transferable vote.

Some voters rank all candidates. Some rank candidates equal to the number of vacancies there are. Some may rank candidates up to the point where they have no further preferences among the remaining candidates. Some may rank candidates up to the point where they cannot bring themselves to vote for a particular candidate, i.e. their least preferred candidate.

The number of ranked candidates is up to each voter. As long as there is a continuous sequence of singly numbered rankings (i.e. 1, 2, 3 etc.), you can contribute to the election of at least one of your preferred candidates. In doing so, you will have a say in electing a council that is more representative of the diverse communities that make up Dunedin City.


