Caldwell High Boys' Soccer Brings Home the 6A State Banner photos by Jennifer Martinez

In the continuing tradition of Caldwell schools punching well above their weight, the Caldwell boys soccer team has won the state championship in Idaho's toughest division, 6A.

Head Coach Rhys Yeakley said he noticed the determination of this team right away. He could see the boys running at Brother's Park in the off season and they showed up on day one in good shape and ready to get to work.

Caldwell High had been in the second highest division for a while when last year it was bumped up to 6A. The team struggled with the move, ending the season without qualifying for the state tournament.

They set some goals at the start of the season, their highest goal being to make it to state.

Once they achieved that goal things fell into place for them. Yeakley says the matchups they got were exactly the ones he would've picked, and their good fortune felt like divine providence to the team who truly believed in themselves and each oth-

Eric Phillips won the Caldwell Mayor's race with 57.1% of the vote over current Mayor, Jarom Wagoner (30.3%), and current City Councilmember Brad Doty (12.6%).

Scott Tilmant won City

Council Seat 1 with 37.7% of the vote over Brandon Weast (29%), Carlos Hernandez (28.6%), and Jorge Arancivia

Chuck Stadick retained City Council Seat 2 with 47.8% of the vote over Randy Neary (31.5%) and Dennis Staack (20.8%).

Diana Register kept City Council Seat #3 with 64.5% of the vote over Marisela Pesina

Horacio Hernandez is a senior at Canyon Springs, a team captain, and the team's goalie. He made a number of great saves over the course of the state tournament and was the Idaho Statesman player of the week for Oct 20 - 27.

This team has meant a lot to him. He'd always heard that "if you really believe in something you can achieve it" but he hadn't heard it from people in circumstances like his and he didn't really buy it.

Now he says that "if you really set your mind to something and you have a good group of people with you, people with the same mindset as you" you can achieve more than you think. "It gives you a different perspective and not just in soccer, but in other parts of our lives.'

Hernandez is currently working with his coaches to find a college that will be the right fit for him, so he can keep playing soccer and keep achieving.

Junior and Team Captain Sergio Gaxiola says that after last year's not-so-great season, a lot of people doubted the team and their potential. And all of those doubts fueled them. The doubts "inspired us. we knew we had to prove the doubters wrong, we wanted to do that for us and for the community of Caldwell.'

He said the biggest difference from last year to this year, was the attitude of the team. This year, "everyone came with positivity" and "we come to school, we get good grades, and we motivate each other to get better and better".

Gaxiola will be a senior next year, and is already planning to go to college and study Computer Science and Business (and play soccer!).

In addition to the state championship, the team and the fans won the 2025 Boys 6A State Soccer Sportsmanship Award. The athletic director from each team competing at state takes note of how the teams and their fans interact with the refs and their opposing teams and vote on a winner for the award.

Hernandez says he was really proud that they won the Sportsmanship Award, because it showed that it wasn't just the team that came out with a new attitude this year, it was also the fans.

Caldwell's size is right on the cusp between the 6A division and the 5A division and next year the school will be moving back to 5A.

Coach Yeakley says that this year's 6A State Championship is no reason to get overconfident about next year even though they will be in a lower division. There are no guarantees and no free rides.

Congratulations to this inspirational team, we look forward to seeing the good things the future brings for you on the field and off.



Caldwell High Students Perform "The Great Gatsby"

The Caldwell High School Theater Department celebrated the 100th year of F. Scott Fitzgerald's book, "The Great Gatsby", with a moody stage production of the play.

The play opens with the well-to-do Daisy Buchanan (Joryn Wright) greeting her distant cousin Nick Carraway (Rachel Noonan), a young man who has come to New York to make his fortune.

A central conflict in the show emerges right away as Daisy's husband, Tom (Jayson Dix), is revealed to be a loud brute who cheats on his wife.

We soon learn that Nick's neighbor, the excessively wealthy businessman Jay Gatsby (Brandon Bake), has been in love with Daisy since they dated years before and wants to win her away from her boorish husband.

Act 2 has many misfortunes in store, though, as Daisy accidentally hits and kills Myrtle Wilson (Samantha Worthen), Tom's mistress, with Jay's car on the way home from the city.

Myrtle's husband George (Cole Kopke) learns the car belonged to Gatsby, finds him and kills him before taking his own life. Money is not enough to keep tragedy at bay.

Nick decides to go back home to the midwest where people have less money and glamour, but are less callous and miserable.

Over the course of the play we also meet Jordan Baker (Saphron Garza), Nick's girlfriend and professional golfer; Wolfsheim (Sophie Miller), Gatsby's business partner; Mr. and Mrs. McKee (Sophie Miller and Allie Massie), friends of the Wilsons; and Mrs. Michaelis (Allie Massey), witness to the collision that kills Myrtle.

Director Lance Morris explains that the mature themes of the play gave the actors a chance to dig deep and develop complex characters and emotional performances that go beyond hitting their marks and saying their lines.

And the young performers delivered. The dialog was dense, but the actors did a great job getting their lines across. And the well-paced play moved along quickly to its sad conclusion.

Mr. Morris explains that students were responsible for

more than just the acting. Students took ownership of stage management, set design and painting, sound design, house management, costumes, hair, makeup, props, sound and lights.

They started work on the production way back in August and the students spent nearly every day since after school working on different aspects of the production.

Their hard work and preparation came thorugh in the polished final product.

I asked some of the actors if they were planning to pursue theater after high school. Brandon Bake is planning to attend BSU in the fall and major in Film and Television Arts. Rachel Noonan, who was in the cast and did the play's hair, makeup, and costume design, is planning to attend Wesleyan in Connecticut next year because they have a renowned theater department. She is especially interested in costume design.

On October 22nd, Shared Stories celebrated the expansion of their book store with music, beverages and treats and a ribbon cutting with chamber members, city dignitaries, friends and our community present.

Wagoner Mayor dressed the crowd saying that Shared Stories is a great additon to our community. Dr. Jocele, owner, told the crowd that this dream of owning a bookstore was a long time coming. She said this "nerdy girl" from Jordan Valley had a love of books and dreamed of having a bookstore and that she loves bringing people to-gether and this bookstore allowed her to do both.

George Decker (worker bee husband of Dr. Jocele), who manages the daily activities of the store, put it this way, "I've always said, I see us as a community service. Nobody opens a book store to make a million dollars. Every town of a certain size deserves a book store." So Dr. Jocele and George put together their love of books to create this new business in the name of service to our community.

We now have two wonderful bookstores that complement each other, Shared Stories and Rubaiyat Book Store (314 S. 6th Ave, Caldwell) run by Sazja Fletcher.

Shared Stories first opened in April of 2024 at 106 S. Kimball right near Indian Creek Plaza and firsttime business owner Jocele Skinner and her worker-bee husband, George Decker, realized their business dream. And after a little over one year in business, they have now doubled their space bringing this bookstore to life. Employee Sarah Pinchock says "we have expanded the store and now it is bigger and better!" The new space is filled with light and is a wonderful

space! The store carries all genres of books and has novelty book clubs to match many of them, including clubs for fiction, nonfiction, cookbook, romance, romantasy, poetry, sci-fi, graphic novel and even a silent book club. Coming in

January they will start up a gardening book club.

West Valley Medical Center Earns Another 5-Star Rating from CMS





Domes Project - DevCo Residential Group Breaks Ground in Caldwell

On October 20th Dev-Co Residential Group broke ground at 821 N 16th in Caldwell, where the Domes Church was located, to kick off construction of their affordable housing project on that site.

The three white geodesic domes were a Caldwell landmark for many years and used to be quite a sight from the freeway.

In 1977, the domes were built to house the First Assembly of God Church. Not long ago, the land was sold and the iconic Domes were demolished sometime after January of 2024 to prepare for this new housing project. The church relocated to 110 S. 5th in Caldwell.

Upon completion of this project, there will be 152 new one, two, three, and four bedroom apartments available on the local market, offering quality and affordable housing to the community.

This project will feature amenities including a playground, fitness center, dog park, community room, and solar carports, which are designed to offset 80% of the site's electrical load.

Boise Fry Company held the official ribbon cutting for their new Caldwell location, 2110 Blaine Street, on October 15th.

If you haven't been to a Boise Fry Company be-fore, I'll tell you they aren't serving up your grandpa's burger and fries. To order your fries you first get to choose your potato: red, russet, gold, sweet, or purple (yes, that's right, purple). Then you get to choose your cut: regular, homestyle, curly, shoestring or po'hall string, or po'ball.

Remembering Richard Renstrom, Motorcycle Historian, 1935 - 2025

Richard Renstrom called himself a motorcycle historian, but that description feels like too small a package for all of his achievements. From his house on Arlington Ave, Renstrom wrote over 800 magazine articles, published over 5000 pictures, and wrote six books. His work was published in the US, Japan, Australia and all over Europe in more than a half-dozen languages. As far as I can tell he is still Idaho's most published non-fiction writer.

In addition, Renstrom was appointed by Governor Smylie in 1967 as one of the founding commissioners for what is now the Idaho Commission on the Arts. He was named the Idaho Employee of the Year in 1968 by Governor Samuelson while a manager at the Idaho Department of Employment here in Caldwell. He was named Writer of the Year by the Idaho Writer's League twice (1968 and 1977). He chaired the Advisory Committee of the Caldwell Memorial Hospital from 1968 to 1971.

Renstrom co-founded the Idaho Vintage Motorcycle Club, which is still going strong and will hold its 50th annual club rally and show in Caldwell, March 20-21,

2026. He started a small business, Classics Unlimited, that imported and sold vintage motorcycles from around the world (and he even sold a part to actor Steve McQueen).

Renstrom's interest in motorcycles began in the early 1950s when he started collecting motorcycles as well as motorcycle books, articles, and photographs. He started freelance writing in 1962 when he was working at the Idaho Department of Employment. He said it was difficult getting into freelancing and it required a lot of work. On top of his day job he would spend 30 hours a week researching and writing.

He was very successful as a freelancer and gave a lot of credit to his wife Betty (Chambers) Renstrom. He said that no articles went out without a critique and edit from her.

He also credited Ted Trueblood, a successful outdoors writer who lived in Nampa. Trueblood advised Renstrom to pick a topic and become an expert. Most importantly, Trueblood told Renstrom to get good at taking photographs. Magazines were more likely to buy great pictures ac-

companied by a factual article than they were to buy a great article with mediocre illustrations.

In 1971 Renstrom had a health scare and the husband and father decided to quit his day job and become a full-time freelancer.

In 1972 he started Classics Unlimited and over the years imported and sold about 240 classic motorcycles. He spent 80 hours a week writing, uncrating his imports, servicing them, and selling them

and selling them.

By the early 1980s, after 20 years, Renstrom was burning out on freelancing. He had carefully invested his money over the years and was able to semi-retire and pick and choose what he wanted to write.

In 1985, at age 50, Renstrom told his wife he was going to take a year off from motorcycle writing and he never went back. Instead he took to the mountains and went hunting.

Renstrom spent the next 14 years in the mountains during hunting season doing a different kind of research. His final book "Understated Elegance: A Story of the Ruffed Grouse in the Central Idaho Mountains" was published in 1999

In the opening of the book he explains that "Over 8000 hours of my life has gone into this research, I have walked over 6000 miles in the mountains to collect my data, have climbed nearly 300,000 vertical feet, put 10,000 miles on my Honda trials bike over mountain roads and trails and racked up 50,000 miles on my pickup and camper." He says he didn't have the help many researchers had and instead, "All I had was a love affair with the ruffed grouse and a burning desire to do something about it."

Renstrom wanted motorcycle enthusiasts and ruffed grouse enthusiasts to be able to learn from his efforts far into the future.

If you are interested, Renstrom's articles are available in hard copy in the Boise State University Special Collections library. There you can also see newspaper clippings and letters Renstrom received from people like US Senator Frank Church.



If you are searching, know that sometimes editors gave him the pseudonyms Geoffrey Wood and Brian Carrick because they didn't want to have too many articles by the same person in their pages.

Renstrom was a unique voice and an important part of Caldwell's history. We send love and comfort to his family and friends.





Dale Peterson - A Part of Caldwell's History

I met Dale years ago when I first joined the Caldwell Rotary Club. He had that great radio voice. And then I came to learn that he had been a part of the history of Caldwell's radio station KCID (known as Twin Cities Radio), which was located on the corner of 10th and Cleveland. The building had that iconic globe that rotated and it was known as being On the corner where the world turns!"

Many of you remember that big revolving world at that radio station located in downtown Caldwell. It was there for years.

Dale began working at KCID part-time when he went to the College of Idaho beginning in 1957. He soon began working there full-time, holding several positions, learning every aspect of the business where he eventually became the General Manager.

In 1971, Dale and Duane Wolfe purchased KCID. Dale continued as General Manager, with Duane as his corporate partner. In 1986, KCİD FM 107.1 was added. Mr. Wolfe died in 1993 and Dale purchased his stock from his sons Graye and Timbre Wolfe.

Dále worked at KCID for 41 years. Both stations were sold to American General Media in 1996, and Dale worked as a consultant for two years as part of the sales agreement. He served as President of the Idaho State Broadcasters in 1975 and was presented the "Lifetime Achievement Award in Broadcasting" in 1996.

After selling Twin Cities Broadcasting Company in 1996, and completing that two-year consulting contract, he became Executive Director of Buy Idaho, Inc. and enjoyed the interaction with business and industry leaders throughout Idaho for over twelve years, retiring in 2010. Dale was a huge part of our community before moving to Utah in 2012 to be near family.

He passed away on his 87th birthday this past October 8th. He left his footprint on our community's history and on our hearts. He was a friend to many. He will be greatly missed by his family, his friends in Caldwell and the State of Idaho.

Farewell my friend and save me a place wherever you may be, because I know it will be a good one.





Ham Radio Group Expands Regional Emergency Communications



The Voice of Idaho Amateur Radio Club (VOI) has combined five of their mountain-top repeaters dramatically extending the club's auxiliary communications support for emergency use by state, regional, and local agencies. The system now covers 20,000 square miles including much of the region from McCall to Boise to Twin Falls and parts of Oregon and Nevada.

Amateur Radio systems are often the only widearea communication systems operating at the onset of an emergency that affects the power grid. This is regularly seen in the aftermath of powerful seasonal hurricanes, and other disasters such as the recent Midwest tornadoes and the Texas floods. Many times these essential volunteer communication efforts go unnoticed.

"We are pleased to be able to offer this resource to local and state agencies, and stand ready to step in and assist whenever we are needed", said Rob Oates, VOI President.

Amateur Radio operators often set up individual repeater stations, which receive a signal and re-transmit (repeat) it

from a high mountain top. This makes it possible for licensed Ham Radio operators to communicate over an extended range by using a small, walkietalkie radio that can fit in a shirt pocket. The result is the ability to communicate far beyond the limited range of the small radio.

Five years in the making, the VOI Linking Project links five of its individual high-level repeaters into a continuously-operating network. It is now possible, under grid-down conditions, for someone in Twin Falls, Idaho to talk with a person in McCall, 250 miles away, using low-power amateur radios costing less than \$100.

The Voice of Idaho Amateur Radio Club is a 501(c)(3) corporation. The club has approximately 300 members, making it one of the largest Amateur Radio clubs in the country. It is located in the Boise, Idaho area. Many talented and public service, minded people.

lic-service minded people are attracted to Amateur Radio. In the VOI, the repeater systems are designed, constructed, installed and maintained by club members who týpically have engineering backgrounds. Other club members provide operational support, and regularly practice the special communication techniques necessary in emergency situations. The club is always pleased to welcome new members who have similar interests.

need to go.





Local Dirt

It's turkey time. As I continue to reminisce on the many blessings that this time of year brings, I recall the many aromatic smells of fall and the clean air after a rain fall. Now, the yard work takes on a much different look. Fall is the best time to put all things like plants and tools to bed for the long winter's rest. If done properly, you won't be pulling your shoulder out starting your mower or string trimmer or wondering why your pruners are rusted shut.

First off, you're not done mowing until the grass height is reduced to as low as you can go and there are leaves on the ground. Our cool season grasses love this cooler weather and will grow as long as the sun shines. Once your mowing is done, give your mower a bath and sharpen the blade.

My practice of putting fuel stabilizer in with ethanol free gas, then running it for 20 minutes, then draining the oil while hot, changing the oil filter and fuel filter and then replacing the oil should then in the spring, get your mower to start right up.

Tools should be cleaned, sharpened and oiled because moist winter air will rust up those tools and affect performance and longevity. That's why I buy really good quality tools and yes, they're typically more expensive. I have these wood handled manual hedgers that are over 30 years old.

It might be a good time to repaint shovel handles. Even the fiberglass handles need some sort of protection on them or you might start seeing fibers and those can cause painful slivers in your hands.



I say buy good quality wooden handled shovels, they tend to last longer.

Now that tools are sleeping, after of course the yard work is done (this is not chronological), your vegetable garden needs a complete removal of all plant debris, either by tilling it into the soil, raking it up and burning it, or putting it in compost bins, or heaven forbid, putting it in the garbage. Almost all plant materials can be composted and reused, except some weeds like goat heads.

Leaving a clean garden will help limit the bad insects by minimizing places they can hibernate for the winter.

That brings up a very good reason why leaving all sorts of debris anywhere on your property can increase the amount of bugs you see in the spring. Please thoroughly clean up planter beds, especially up against the house. You want to make the bugs homeless and uninvited.

This is now a very good time to apply a low nitrogen fertilizer and a preemergent weed control to control early spring weeds. Do this last bit of work and you and your garden can rest well for winter.

On October 4th young kids, parents, teens and adults with bikes, scooters, roller skates and skate-boards tried out the new Pipe Dream Pump Track, designed and built by American Ramp Company, on Skyway in Caldwell. It is the largest pump track in Idaho.

But wait, what's a pump track?

A pump track is a loop made of small rolling bumps and banked turns that is designed to be ridden without pedaling or striding. A rider's speed on the downslopes and the turns takes them up the upslopes if they are pumping along just right. Riders can also incorporate tricks and other skills as they complete the pump track loop.

The new park serves local families and is expected to be a cycling destination. It is designed for casual recreation as well as competitive training and sanctioned events.

Pump tracks originated in the BMX world, were adopted by mountain bikers, and are increasingly popular with the general public. You can find other pump tracks in Meridian, Boise, Nampa, Tamarack, Hailey, and more.

Art Galviz was at the opening with his three boys aged from 4 to 8. They live nearby and are excited about the new pump track. Art previously worked in the BMX industry and says it is ideal to have the pump track located in the same place as the existing BMX course and skate park.

friend group of about 50 riders called the 208 Slow Riders and were having a good time riding the small inner loop of the pump track as well as the outer loop. (The outer loop is longer and less difficult.) They said that it is still fun to ride on a crowded day, and it isn't hard to "make room for everybody." They are glad to see little kids getting into pump track riding.

This park gives our youth another great place for a fun physical activity to keep them busy and active after school. Caldwell has stepped up to meet the needs of our youth to help keep them healthy and happy. Thanks City of Caldwell and Parks and Recreation Department for another wonderful, family friendly, recreation option for our community.
