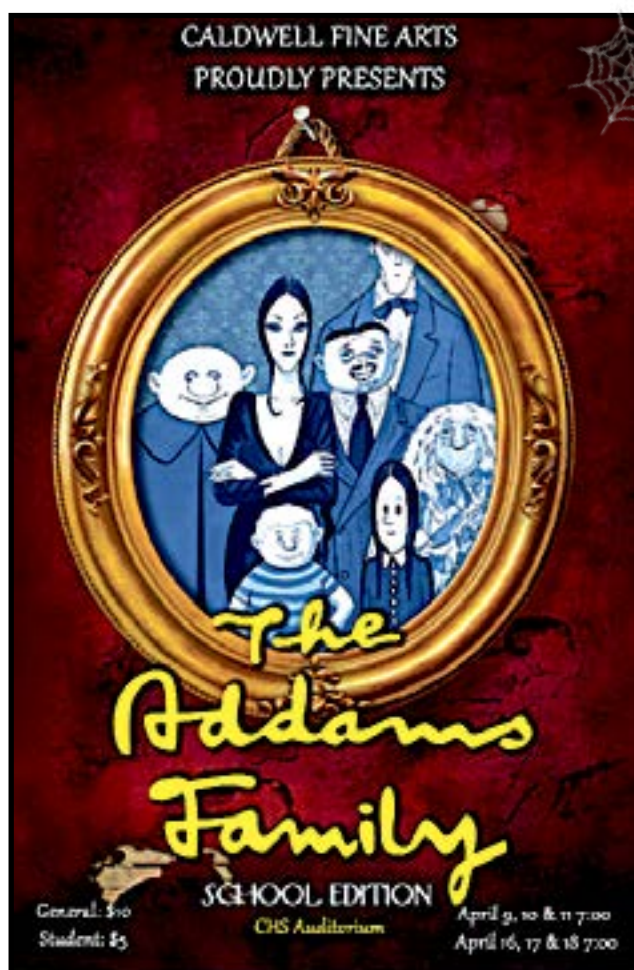

Caldwell High School's 2026 spring production is a musical version of the '60s TV show, "The Addams Family."

CHS has a long history of putting on crowd-pleasing musicals and this year looks like it will be no different.

English Teacher and Yearbook Advisor, Piper Gearheart, is at the helm of the production, supported by Theater and Speech and Debate teacher/coach, Lance Morris; Orchestra teacher,

Rebecca Chevarria; Choir teacher, Jackson Hart; and Band Director, Nathan Cockrum.

The production will show off the talents of dozens of CHS students. Ten students will be on stage as leads, 12 will be on stage as part of the "ancestor" ensemble, 20 will be in the band and orchestra, 6 will be stage hands, and 2 will be in the tech booth.

In addition to their work during the performances, students are responsible for

lighting and sound design, costume design and construction, prop design, and set design and construction.

Rehearsals have been four days a week for three hours a day since January (though not all rehearsals include every student) and Gearheart has been working on the production for about a year. For the final two weeks, rehearsals shifted to 6 hours a day as it was all hands on deck to get the sets and costumes completed and the

performances polished.

Gearheart explained that the community has played an important role in the production as well. Parents brought food to the last two weeks of rehearsals and donations from the community have made the production possible. Donations help cover the cost of the rights to the musical as well as costumes (mostly pieced together from thrift-store items), makeup kits, equipment, sets, paint, and more.

The teachers and students are hoping to see lots of members of the community in the audience for their six productions.

Shows are April 9, 10, 11, 16, 17, and 18 at 7pm at the CHS Auditorium (3401 S Indiana). Tickets are \$5 for students and \$10 for general admission. These shows are a great opportunity to support these hard-working students while also treating your family to a funny and fun musical comedy.

May 19th Pull-Out Voter's Guide Inside - Get the Info You Need



This year we will elect a Governor, a US Senator, a US Rep, three State Legislators, two County Commissioners and more. See the handy pull-out voter's guide inside (pages 7-10) for more information.

The May 19th election is a primary, so voters will vote on ballots that correspond to the political party they selected when they registered to vote.

Voters will vote for the candidate they prefer from within their party. The winners of the primary will

move on to the General Election in November when candidates from every party and independents will be on the ballot for everyone.

State Legislative District 11 (LD11) covers most of Caldwell. Candidates for LD11 State Senate and State Representative answered a four-part questionnaire about why they are running and the issues they are focused on addressing. Their responses are included in the voter's guide unedited.

Election day is May 19th and early voting runs week-

days from 8am-5pm April 27th to May 15th.

If you are not registered or have recently moved, you can register to vote online at the State's website - voteidaho.gov - or register in person when you go to vote. (Be sure to visit voteidaho.gov for information on the documents you'll need before you go.)

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Light the World Giving Machines Check Presentation Celebrates Idaho Generosity



On March 23rd, people gathered at the Idaho State Capitol and watched seven local charities and two international nonprofits be presented with significant checks from the Light the World Giving Machine campaign. These machines spent a week in Caldwell during the 2025 holiday season, where people donated directly to the nonprofit of their choice through these machines. In total, the Giving Machines, which moved throughout the holidays in Boise, Caldwell, and Meridian at The Village—raised \$1,038,851. The campaign was sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, with 100%

of donations going directly to participating charities.

Local Nonprofit Recipients Included:

\$137,115 to Boys & Girls Clubs of Ada County & Canyon County for Supporting local youth with after-school and summer programs focused on health, academics, and leadership.

\$79,100 to Camp Rainbow Gold – Providing connection, joy, and healing to Idaho children diagnosed with cancer and their families, while building a medical camp to serve nonprofits statewide.

\$109,190 to CATCH – Delivering housing-first solutions to help end homelessness in the Treasure Valley.

The P.E.O. Chapter House is Turning 75

In 1951, the P.E.O. Chapter House opened its doors, beginning 75 years as a place of gracious retirement living, friendship, and sisterhood. Envisioned and brought to life by dedicated P.E.O. women, it remains a welcoming home rooted in care, connection, and community. This project of the Idaho State Chapter has endured because of the generosity of P.E.O.s, residents and their families, and the support of sisters and chapters from across Idaho. As we celebrate 75 years, we invite you to be part of its future—your support ensures that this cherished home will

continue to serve generations of women to come.

Originally built in 1910 as the Dorman family home, the building later became the Caldwell Sanitarium, where many local families welcomed new life. Debi and Terry Jensen always have the best seats in the house, up on top of Homedale Road, for the trailing of the sheep. Every year, owner of the herd, Harry Soulen and his wife, Angie, along with a friend, their Peruvian shepherd and herding dogs, take the sheep to Letha to be sheared. The sheep will then lamb in the spring pasture in the Crane Creek area. When the lambs are old enough, in about June, they will continue their journey being lead back to the back side of Brundage Mountain. Then in the fall, they will continue on to their winter pasture, near Melba. It is about a 550 mile round trip. Harry walks up ahead of the herd the entire way, ringing a bell and they all follow. There are also about 5 or 6 sheep with bells on in the herd so the others farther back can hear and know to follow. Their herding dogs, Border Collies and Great Pyrenees, help keep them all in line. It takes quite a team to complete this journey. Harry's grandfather, Harry Soulen Sr (now deceased), had been raising sheep in Southwest Idaho since 1926. It was passed on to his son Phil Soulen (passed away in 2019), and then on to his

son, Harry Soulen Jr. Debi said, "We love this tradition in our valley! We have lived at this location for 26 years and every spring and every fall we get to enjoy a little piece of their journey, right in front of our home."

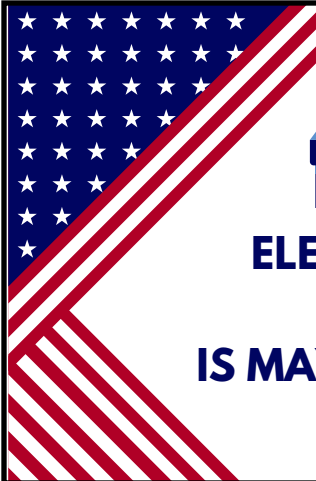

With an \$88 million revenue shortfall in 2025, and a possible revenue shortfall in 2026, Idaho legislators need to reign in the excessive spending, and keep the budget growth consistent with population growth and inflation. As a fiscal conservative, I have stood strong to vote down bloated budget bills that grow government and take federal dollars, which needlessly adds to the \$39 trillion in national debt.

What are two other issues that are important to you?

Issue: Upholding Parental Rights. I stand firm in my fight to uphold and affirm the rights of parents to choose the healthcare and education that suits their children best.

Issue: State Sovereignty - I believe in the right of the State of Idaho to remain free from the intrusion of the federal government, whether through regulations, education and healthcare mandates or land management and control. Idaho is rich in minerals and natural resources which should be mined and utilized to the benefit of Idahoans, not foreign or federal interests. Idaho should reclaim the 66% of its land that is controlled and poorly managed by the federal government, and the state legislature should form a comprehensive management plan for that land reclamation.

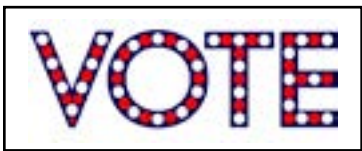

"We start around March to April. I got my wife the raised beds, and we planted strawberries a couple of years ago that never took; then last year they were everywhere! We grow Romas, and I love butternut squash. For gardening tips, I just found out that coffee grounds work well, and Starbucks gives out a free bag if you ask for it."

"I start after the last freeze is forecast. I also watch when the birds start to show up, which tells me we're getting there. The Red-winged Blackbirds have shown up in droves in the last few weeks, and I've seen more American Goldfinches this year than ever before. I'm hit and miss, but I can grow weeds like nobody's business! I'm still experimenting, but soil conditioner is my new thing."

"I start my garden whenever I can get to it. I like to garden because it makes me feel more connected to my great-grandmother, who was my best friend and loved gardening. I like growing medicinal plants, as well as berries, roses, and sunflowers, but my Bernese Mountain Dog, Randi, likes to eat a lot of them – she mowed the tops off my radishes! I don't really have any tips, I go as natural as I can."

My wife, Kari, starts seedlings in the house right about now, but we normally don't put our plants in the ground until the snow is off the mountain, the butte in Emmett. We grow a lot of vegetables, but my favorites are tomatoes and lettuce. I'd suggest you test your soil! Buy a soil-testing kit to make sure your soil has the proper pH, so you know how to supplement it.

"Everybody tells me May, but I'm not waiting! I've got my garlic in, the potatoes go in tomorrow, and the green onions have been in all year. My favorite thing to grow is corn. I've had no luck starting seeds inside, so I put them right in the ground. I've learned that either hay or straw on top of everything helps to protect it if it does freeze."

Spring Has Sprung! Gardening in Caldwell

Gardening in Caldwell is not for the faint of heart (or the perfectly manicured). Our beloved hometown, nestled in the fertile Treasure Valley, offers gardeners a unique blend of opportunity and challenges. With its rich agricultural heritage, long sunny days, and distinct four-season climate, gardening here can be incredibly rewarding – if you understand the local conditions. Typically classified as USDA Zones 7a-7b, some gardeners treat Caldwell as Zone 6b due to our occasional colder winter temperatures.

We're considered the high desert, but living here means you get a little bit of everything. Summers are hot enough to fry an egg on the sidewalk (not recommended), while winters remind you that yes, you do own a snow shovel (not last winter). And Spring? Spring is a trickster. You'll get a few warm days that tempt you to plant early, followed by a surprise frost or freeze. There are protection strategies such as covering plants with blankets, burlap, or buckets. Watering plants before frost or a freeze occurs will help, as will stringing lights over the plants to provide mild heat. But that sure sounds like a lot of extra work to me! It's probably better to know when the time is right to plant.

I've heard two opinions on this, both from experienced gardeners native to our area. One told me that the rule was to wait until the snow was off the mountain. He added that the mountain he was referring to was not Bogus. He said, "You know, that other mountain." For those of you



who don't know, that "other mountain" is Squaw Butte, a prominent 5,896-foot peak towering over Emmett and visible from North Caldwell. For all of you history fans, the name Squaw Butte was changed to Sehewoki'l Newenec'an Katete in 2022 (say that three times fast). This roughly translates to "People of the Willows Standing in a Row Butte."

The other rule of (green) thumb was given to me by another avid gardener whom I greatly admire for her gardening skills. She said, "I never plant until after Mother's Day, that way you're always safe." By the way, Mother's Day is May 10th this year.

Along with getting the timing right, gardeners in Caldwell face other challenges. Challenges such as

most precipitation falling outside the growing season make irrigation essential for a successful garden. The best practices for watering include watering early in the morning to reduce evaporation, using a drip irrigation system for efficiency, and watering deeply but less frequently to encourage strong root systems.

Another important thing to know about gardening here is that the soil tends to be alkaline (high pH) and is often sandy or low in organic matter. If you've ever tried to dig into Caldwell soil, you may have wondered if you accidentally hit a buried driveway (I can personally attest to this). Between the clay, sand, and occasional mystery rock, it's less "garden bed" and more "archaeological dig."

To improve soil health, add compost or aged manure regularly, and use mulch to retain moisture. Healthy soil is the key to growing everything from vegetables to flowers in this region, and mulch is our MVP.

Thanks to warm summers and a decent growing season, Caldwell garden-

ers can grow a wide variety of plants. Tomatoes, peppers, and squash thrive in the summer heat, while lettuce, spinach, and radishes do well in cooler spring and fall temperatures. Native and drought-tolerant plants such as yarrow, blanket flower, and gardenias are especially successful because they adapt to our local conditions and require less maintenance.

Spring has sprung, and now is the time to prepare the soil, add compost, start cool-season crops, and watch for late frosts.

Welcome to gardening in Caldwell, where the sun is plentiful, the soil has opinions, and the weeds have a personal vendetta ... happy gardening!

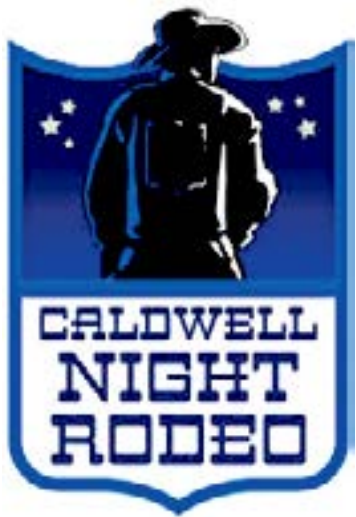
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Caldwell Night Rodeo Announces Changes Ahead of 2026 Season

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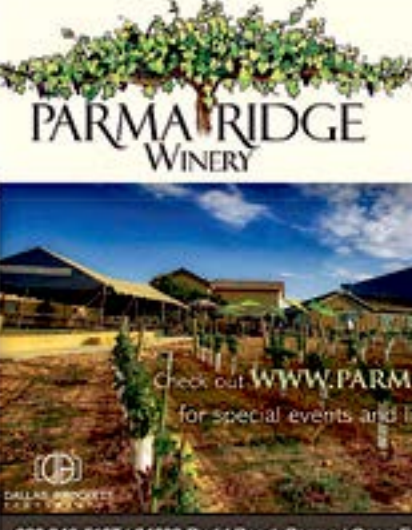
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Road to the City Budget



The City of Caldwell is beginning 2027 budget discussions. Departments are sharing information about current operations, future needs, staffing, and long-term planning. These conversations help City leadership understand the services residents use every day and the behind-the-scenes systems that keep the city running including utilities, stormwater systems, roads, and technology. Key priorities include staffing Fire Station 4 to support fast emergency response times and continuing road maintenance to keep streets safe and reli-

able. These investments help maintain the level of service our community expects and prepare for future growth. The community is invited to attend upcoming budget workshops and share your feedback. Budget workshops will be held at Caldwell City Hall June 4, 11, 17, and 23. A fee workshop will be held July 9. The Budget Book will be available online for public comments on July 6 and published on July 24. August 11th will be the Budget Hearing at City Council. City Council Considers Ordinance to Prevent Further Overcrowding in Vallivue Schools

On March 25 City Council held a Special Workshop to discuss a "School Capacity Development Ordinance" that would delay new residential construction if the project would bring the public schools in the area to over 110% of their capacity. Such developments would be delayed by three years or until the school capacity problem is resolved, whichever is soonest. The ordinance would not affect already approved projects or applications that were filed prior to the passage of the ordinance. And the ordinance would not affect commercial or industrial applications.

Vallivue School District (VSD) has been grappling with overcrowding for many years, because much of the land in Caldwell and Nampa that is available for residential growth falls there. In addition, State Law does not allow school districts to collect impact fees on new developments, so as new subdivisions are developed the affected school districts do not receive funding to help with the costs of increasing their capacity. To build new schools, school districts have to rely on bonds that must be passed by a two-thirds supermajority of voters. And currently, City Council does not include overloaded infrastructure as part of their decision-making process when approving residential projects. Landowners are allowed to build residences as long as their plans comply with the zoning in the Comprehensive Plan and comply with current City ordinances (that don't explicitly address in-

frastructure capacity). Two years ago Middleton passed a similar school capacity ordinance after five consecutive bonds failed in the Middleton School District. At the time, *Idaho Ed News* reported about the Middleton ordinance saying, "The unprecedented new law challenging residential development that harms education could ripple across the state, providing a lifeline for districts unable to pass a bond." In addition, they reported that "the Kuna School District appears ready to ask its city council to take up a similar law." The Caldwell proposal, so far, has met with quite a bit of pushback. The VSD school board sent a letter to the Caldwell City Council explaining that they were not asking for this type of ordinance and instead they "will defer to the expertise of the City of Caldwell leaders regarding" the proposed ordinance. They also explained that even if the ordinance passes, the thousands of new residences approved by Nampa and Caldwell in the past five years that haven't yet been built will still go forward and so they are expecting to have to ask voters to support a bond for new schools in the future in any case. Middleton Mayor, Tom O'Meara, attended the Council's May 16 meeting where he said he would not recommend adoption of a school capacity ordinance. He explained that slowing the growth stopped the revenues that were coming in to help with infrastructure upgrades. However, he also said that

creative solutions have gotten school capacities low enough that the Middleton City Council is no longer delaying new residential construction. Other arguments against the ordinance included that because other cities and the County feed into the Vallivue School District, even if Caldwell slowed residential growth with three-year delays, Vallivue school capacity would be likely to continue rising due to residential approvals in other municipalities. The ordinance next heads to Planning and Zoning on April 8th where they will make a recommendation regarding approval to the City Council, and then to the City Council for approval consideration on May 4th. Regardless of whether or not Council approves this ordinance, it is a positive development that they are exploring ways to factor infrastructure capacity into their decision making when it comes to residential growth. We will keep you posted.

Railroad Quiet Zone Passes in 5-1 Council Vote

Though Mayor Phillips has been openly opposed to a railroad quiet zone in Caldwell, on May 16 the Council voted to add agenda items related to the quiet zone to a future agenda. At the Special Workshop on May 25, the Council voted to approve the bid for the safety features needed for the quiet zone and then voted to establish the quiet zone. The votes were 5-1 with Councillor Register the lone vote against. The quiet zone does not require trains to sound their horns across seven intersections in Caldwell (though they can still sound their horns if they need to). The votes resolve a controversial issue in the community that had hundreds of citizens on both sides of the issue weighing in. 2026 COFFEE KLATCH

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Southwest Idaho Birders' Association

Signs of Spring – daffodils, butterflies, maybe even lizards and snakes coming out of hibernation. Birders have their favorites and recently that has included six members of the swallow family that are summer residents in this area.

Probably best known are barn swallows with their blue backs and buffy breasts, long split tails, and penchant for sitting on fences at eye level. They're easy to see and identify and it helps that they're the biggest swallow.

Violet-green swallow sounds very colorful and they also sport a lot of white on their face and breast, as do the Tree Swallows with electric blue to black backs. Cliff Swallows, Bank Swallows and Northern Rough-Winged round out the group.

When you see the por-

traits in a bird guide, it seems not too hard a task to see and identify them. Truth is, what you'll most often see is a tiny dark spot against the sky or a blur swooping low across the lake or river, catching insects on the fly. Some of the best places to see them are around culverts over the irrigation ditches as they start to flow or lined up on utility wires, sometimes hundreds together during migration.

Another sign of spring for SIBA is the first in-person meeting, at the Deer Flat NWR visitor center at 7 p.m. on April 9th. Attendees will hear about being Cuckoo for Cottonwoods: Life History, Threats, and Status of the Western Yellow-billed Cuckoo in Idaho.

The speaker will be U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service biologist Sarah Dzielski, who calls this bird "Idaho's riparian forest gem." Yellow-billed Cuckoos are secretive, medium-sized birds that are rare in the western United States.

The distinct western population segment was listed as Threatened under the Endangered Species Act in 2014. Sarah will walk through species identification, the fascinating life history and reproductive strategies of the species and talk about threats to the Yellow-billed Cuckoo and its habitat within Idaho.

Dave's Big Backyard

April 15th marks the opening for motorized boats on Lake Lowell. A bass tournament follows on the first Saturday after the opening. This year, the opening falls on Wednesday, 117 years after the lake first started filling. We take for granted the massive enterprise that was undertaken to build one of the largest offline reservoirs in the West.

Hubbard and Carlson, a construction firm located in Boise, started work on the lower embankment in February of 1906. A small community sprang up at the west end of the lower embankment, complete with a mess hall, where a meal could be had for a quarter.

The embankment was raised eight inches at a time sprinkled with water from the Ridenbaugh Canal, compacted and repeated. The compaction was so good that the method was later used for building roads in the area.

Forty-one miles to the east, work began in earnest on the main canal, Eastern investors had envisioned a canal in the 1880s, but financing and logistical problems kept the canal project from coming to fruition.

In 1902, Theodore Roosevelt enacted the reclamation act, a law that provided funds to irrigate arid and semi-arid lands in the west. With a more stable funding source, the main canal project began without further ado, 41 miles west. In September of 1906, construction began on the upper embankment.

The upper dam was built by the reclamation service. Private bids including Hub-

bard and Carlson's bid of \$232,000 was considered too high. Like the lower dam, the upper dam had houses for workers, a 120 person mess hall, and a blacksmith shop.

The main canal, now the New York Canal, opened February 22nd, 1909 and Deer Flat Reservoir began to fill. The engineers knew there would be seepage and evaporation. Deer Flat fell short of expectations.

It wasn't until Arrowrock Reservoir was completed in 1915 that Lake Lowell truly reached its full potential. Anderson Ranch followed in 1950. Lucky Peak was completed in 1955 and the Boise project became what it is today, providing water to 165,000 acres of farmland in the lower Treasure Valley.

In 1935, the Civil Conservation Corps, better known as the Triple C, made many improvements to the Deer Flat wildlife area, refacing the top of both upper and lower dams and adding riprap to dam faces to control erosion. They also widened the tops of both dams.

It was against reclamation policy to name projects after living individuals. James H. Lowell was president of the Idaho Water Users. He was instrumental in lobbying Congress for construction of the Lake, though the reservoir did not officially bear his name until 1948.

Approximately 50 years after Lake Lowell filled, my Granddad Sandy and I were sitting on the upper embankment catching perch. It was cold. There was a skim of ice near the shoreline. Our sinkers were heavy enough to drop through the ice. The small perch we caught came up through the hole. I guess you could say, this was my first attempt at ice fishing.

Lake Lowell and the Deer Flat National Wildlife Refuge have provided countless hours of enjoyment. What a gem we have so close to home.

Watering in the spring is weather-based to determine frequency, but the first couple waterings should be a good drenching to help wake things up. More on watering times and frequencies next month.

Local Dirt

You need water from a hose or sprinkler system now to water your evergreen plants, especially pines of all kinds. These dry conditions are stressing your pines and if you have not been watering them throughout winter, then they need a good drenching now. Throwing out some fertilizer for evergreen and/or fertilizer spikes would also be a good thing to do.

For you who have city water systems or have your own wells, you need to turn them on ASAP because the ground is really dry and everything is thirsty. Give everything a good drenching now and just keep an eye out on the weather.

For you who are waiting for the canals to fill, you have two to three weeks yet, so please hand water your big trees first, then water everything else. Fertilizers, pre-emergence even insecticides would be good to

apply prior to watering, because your plants are also very hungry.

Sprinkler start-ups are easy to do as long as you are prepared for what may come up. So plan on shutting it back down quickly in case there's a flood somewhere. Check to make sure you're shutting off your drain valve first, then turn on your main water supply. If you have a filter or a back flow device, there are usually ball valves on them. Have them in the off position so you can control the process of putting water in the system. Your filter should be cleaned and your back flow devices' test ports should all be closed.

Slowly open your shutoff valve to let water gradually fill the mainline leading to the valves. Once the mainline has been filled and no leaks are detected, move on to turning on individual zones. I prefer to manually open each valve so that as it

fills, I can see leaks and shut it off more quickly before it gets too muddy to work on. If no leaks, I proceed with checking and adjusting the sprinklers. I always carry sprinkler flags to mark any area that needs to be addressed. Also, if I'm planning to power rake or aerate the lawn, it's a good idea to flag every head so you don't hit them.

Question: My husband has recently started burping a lot (the burps are small but gross). What is going on?

Answer: First, consider any recent changes to his diet. Certain foods, such as eggs, red meat, cruciferous

veggies (broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower), garlic and onions, dairy (especially if he's lactose intolerant), and sugary high-carb foods that tend to ferment in the gut, are high in sulfur or hard to digest, which can cause burping.

Supplements such as Omega-3 (fish oil) are famous for causing "fishy burps"; however, a "burpless" Omega-3 is available. It might help to cut back on sulfur-heavy foods, eat smaller meals, and eat slowly. Also, be sure he drinks plenty of water and consider a probiotic (if he doesn't already take one).

Other possible causes may include digestive issues such as acid reflux, Irritable Bowel Syndrome (IBS), gastroparesis (food sitting in the stomach too long), or lactose intolerance. Certain gastrointestinal infections can also cause unpleasant burps. These situations can be very serious and require a visit to your physician. If symptoms persist, please see your doctor.

Ronee Blakley, From Caldwell High to the Silver Screen

Perhaps you watched the Oscars last month and thought to yourself, "I wonder if anyone from my beautiful little hometown of Caldwell has ever been nominated for an Oscar?"

Well, I'm here to tell you that the answer is a resounding, "Yes, Ronee Sue Blakley!" (And indeed Caldwell High School is the only high school in the state to have graduated a future Oscar nominee.)

Ronee Sue Blakley grew up here in Caldwell and graduated from Caldwell High in 1963. The yearbook said she was involved in Pep Club, Y-Teens, Drill Team, Choir, Opera, Spanish Club, Girls' State, Girls' Nation, Thespians, and much more. In 1963 she won the Miss Caldwell competition and went on to compete for Miss Idaho.

She graduated from Stanford with honors in 1967 and went on to pursue a career in film and music.

In 1975, after writing songs and touring the country singing in clubs for about six years, she landed the role of Barbara Jean in Robert Altman's movie "Nashville." The film is a collage of characters, but if anyone is the core of the film, it's Barbara Jean, a talented music star being crushed by the weight of her fame.

Blakley wrote her own songs for the film (including one called "My Idaho Home") as well as some of the songs sung by other actors. And she wrote at least one of her own speeches for

the film.

Her performance in the film was exceptional. A *New York Times* reviewer said she was "the brightest of the 24 'Nashville' stars" and a *New Yorker* reviewer said "she achieves her effects so simply I wasn't surprised when someone near me started to cry during one of her songs."

For her performance she was nominated for a Best Supporting Actress Oscar along with Brenda Vaccaro,

Lily Tomlin, Sylvia Miles, and winner Lee Grant. She was also nominated for a Golden Globe, 2 BAFTA awards, and a National Board of Review award (which she won). In addition, she shared a Grammy nomination for 'Album of Best Original Score Written for a Motion Picture or a Television Special.'

She later had a role in the 1984 horror film "Nightmare on Elm Street" as well

as a number of other smaller films and TV shows.

She put out 12 albums, the most recent one in 2020, 'Atom Bomb Baby.'
