

Recommended quarterly reading

Inquiry is the process of investigating to answer questions about the world around us. Inquiry based learning is a positive way to engage students in the topics. Consider using inquiry as a way to engage your chapter and prospective members.

A creative activity from the book: The pencil routine is designed to help students create more powerful questions that enhance their inquiry skills. This clear framework connects question stems with their purposes, making it an excellent tool for question writing.





"With the belief that all students deserve a chance to dig into their wonders and curiosities, MacKenzie proposes a scaffolded approach to student-centred learning by identifying the Types of Student Inquiry: Structured, Controlled, Guided and Free Inquiry. Each type requires students take progressively more control over their own learning. This inquiry-based learning model equips students to become lifelong learners by nurturing wonder, curiosity and agency in the classroom."

I hope this message finds all of you well as we head into the holiday season, a time for reflection, reaching out, and sharing love and hope. The role of the State-Wide and Chapter Second Vice Presidents is to focus on membership retention and recruitment. Last December, the second vice president from some of the various chapters met via Zoom with me to discuss this focus. We shared common issues in recruiting and retaining members and effective strategies to address membership retention and encourage onboarding new members.

Some common issues across chapters are the retention of current members, fluctuating and, in some cases, decreasing participation rates. Common strategies that have supported improvement in these areas include:

- Encourage members to invite potential members, such as colleagues, to participate in engaging activities, especially those that demonstrate our purposes. Knowing someone else makes it easier to consider joining and participating.
- Share with potential members how chapters can support educational efforts across the state and continue to provide opportunities for personal and professional growth.
- Join with other chapters around common topics/activities.
- Incorporate time within meetings for members to get to know one another and maintain ongoing communication with members.

We also shared new ideas for embracing a broader pool of potential members in education-related career paths who may not know their membership eligibility.

Looking forward, we will meet again during this second year of the biennium to continue discussing effective strategies for improving recruitment and retention and the next steps in soliciting further feedback and ideas from our membership.

So this holiday season, let's optimize our efforts to invite potential members to join in with your chapter's holiday celebrations to participate in engaging activities, learn about Hawai'i State Delta Kappa Gamma, and lay a foundation for potential membership in the coming year. In addition, we can attend events focused on Supporting Early Career Educators and engage with them in sharing more about our chapters and statewide efforts.

The Hawai'i State Organization of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International is pleased to announce its 2025 Selective Recruitment Grant Program which is open to any college student pursuing a career in education.

Two Lucille Hodgins Selective Recruitment Grants of \$1,000 per grant will be awarded for the 2025-2026 academic year. Applications for this grant will be available from December 16, 2024, and are due February 15, 2025.

Stipends are also available to active members for the 2025-2026 academic year:

- The Josephine E. Day Perpetual Scholarship Fund provides stipends up to \$1,000 to active members who pursue National Board Certification.
- The Eva Phillip Curry State Scholarsip Fund provides stipends up to \$500 for special cerification or professional improvement, or to fund a school, state or community project.

Applications for these grants are due March 1, 2025.
