Ulu Pono - "Grow Well - Professionally and Personally"

Our biennial Leadership Workshop is one of the ways DKG provides leadership growth opportunities for all of our members. On June 18, via Zoom, chapter leaders from each of our 14 chapters met to review, rejuvenate, and increase our knowledge of our international, state, and chapter goals for our next biennium. Leaders learned from one another to increase their knowledge of DKG and to renew our commitment as a state and chapter to achieve our selected goals. *Alpha* Chapter, led by President *Kara Ono*, planned and facilitated the workshop with help from the state Leadership Workshop Committee.

Highlights of the Leadership Development Workshop include:

- Kara warmly welcomed our chapter leaders and gave us a detailed look at the day's agenda. She thanked her Alpha sisters and the State Leadership Committee for planning the day to provide us with the tools to *ulu pono* - grow well, professionally and personally. During the panel discussion, many commented that Kara's facilitation skills rivaled Vanna White's.
- Officer training sessions were led by State Officers: President Lori Furoyama (Mu), Vice President Lisa Nagamine (Theta), Treasurer Adele Wada (Kappa), Secretary Robin Awa (Beta), and State Secretary and Webmaster Mohala Boncales (Mu). Before the workshop, facilitators shared materials through Google Docs for participants to preview. This was very useful preparation and enabled the new officers to come ready with questions and concerns.
- Chapters took time to work on their Strategic Action Plans (SAP). Guided by Lisa's overview of the overall design and function of the state SAP, chapters worked and shared ideas via a virtual Gallery Walk. In addition, everyone learned how to use Padlet, thanks to Mary Miura-Aguinaldo's (lota) tech lesson. Padlet is an efficient way to add comments and questions on other chapters' posts.
- Chapter time was a vital component of the day. Our morning session encouraged chapter leaders to identify their goals as officers and chapter goals for themselves. Throughout the day, there were opportunities for chapter members to share among chapters through virtual gallery walks.
- There was a positive, enthusiastic welcome by Lori. Through a creative and engaging PowerPoint, Lori provided an informative overview of the day's activities. She shared an inspirational book, *Be You*, which encourages us to develop our style as we work together to lead and strengthen our organization. Lori introduced *Nita Scott*, DKG Executive Director, who joined us from her home in Texas.

It was impressive to hear how much they covered in fifteen minutes!
