## HSO Finance Committee updates

At the 2022 Spring Convention, the membership voted to discuss an increase in state dues. Therefore, the Finance Committee will introduce an increase in Hawai'i State dues at the 2023 Spring Convention.

HSO dues will be incrementally increased by \$5.00 in 2024, 2025, and 2026. This will result in a total increase of \$15.00 in 2026. This rate will continue until HSO determines the need for additional funds.

HSO dues have not been increased for many years. This procedure will allow everyone to provide awareness and wise decision-making. Since the vote will be in April 2023, the suggestion is for chapters to use each chapter meeting before April to review and discuss. To begin your discussions, send any questions you have to the Finance Committee by June 1, 2022. This will enable the committee to respond by the chapter's first meeting of the new biennium year. 


## Scholarship ho'omaika'i

Tyler is pursuing a Master of Education degree in Curriculum Studies, focusing on progressive philosophy and pedagogy at UH Mānoa. His path to education was circuitous, from a business background and employment to teaching experiences with SEEQS, a public charter school in Nu'uuanu, and an international education nonprofit, the Pacific & Asian Affairs Council (PAAC). As the Study Tours & Global Engagement Director of PAAC Hawai'i, Tyler designs and delivers global issues and leadership curricula for large, multi-school Global Vision Summits and the Global Leadership Program. Completing this degree should enhance his ability to effect meaningful changes in the delivery of education in Hawai'i and beyond.



 Brittany, a mother of 5 children, is a UH Mānoa student pursuing the Master of Education degree in Educational Foundations. Through her part-time DOE employment as a Homeless Concerns Liaison, she has direct experience with the challenges children face from homeless families who attend public schools. As a result, she is very conscious of how education improves the lives of Hawai'i's youth. Enabling Brittany to complete her degree will strengthen her skills and opportunities to assist children in reaching their potential and achieving their goals.

 Carli, a Theta Chapter member since 2020, is busily completing her Doctorate of Education in Interdisciplinary Leadership from Creighton University. She is currently serving as Behavior Dean at Kapolei Middle School. Carli's dissertation focuses on the changes in teaching pedagogy faced by two veteran middle school teachers in this time of a global pandemic. Her research will enable stakeholders to better support Hawai'i educators when transitioning to a new learning modality.

Addy, an Epsilon Chapter member since 2020, is enrolled in the Master in Early Childhood Education program at Portland State University.
