Glimmer to glow: Highlights from the International Conference

The two-and-a-half-day 2021 International Conference started with a luncheon in the Portland Marriott Downtown Waterfront Hotel on Thursday, July 8. Then, international President Becky Sadowsky and Oregon Governor Kate Brown welcomed 243 sisters from all over the United States. Following that were two workshops. And, later in the evening, the talented, energetic members and friends from Oregon planned and presented the grand "Oregon Welcomes You."

Five more breakout sessions interspersed the next two days, covering a wide variety of subjects from chapter concerns as "Maximizing Talents, Developing Leaders" to professional development like "Survival Kit for Teachers" and to personal growth as "What I Did During my Covid Vacation (Introduction to Genealogy Research)." A whopping 46 sessions were offered to attendees, as well as four 15-minute Take Away sessions.

Keynote speaker, Leigh Wintz, encouraged us to make sound decisions based on solid evidence, develop communities of trust, and create nimble infrastructures to enhance flexibility and change. Finally, Dr. Gene Sharrett, Vietnam veteran, teacher, and inspirational speaker, compelled us to believe in the power of each individual, personify positivity, and make small differences in the world wherever we are and however we can.

Also featured was the U.S. Forum which addressed the fourth purpose of our Society: "To initiate, endorse, and support desirable legislation or other suitable endeavors in the interest of education and women educators." They invite all interested sisters to join their seminar in Arlington, VA, from March 6–8, 2022. You will be informed of issues and concerns impacting education on the national, state, and local levels and learn strategies to make our voices heard and respected.

Though the program schedules were packed, there were slivers of time during meals and breaks to visit the Marketplace or Art Gallery, opportunities to meet sisters, discuss ideas, and discover more about DKG. During these encounters with sisters, I was reminded of why I love our great organization: we are filled with women who exemplify care, commitment, and challenge!

Finally, Executive Director, Nita Scott, presented her eye-opening address, "Take the Reins and Let's Get Going!" She shared that in the 1980s, our membership totaled 180,000 strong. By 2010 it had dropped to 100,760, and in 2020 we totaled 62,341 members. Though it was a difficult piece of information to share, she felt it was important that all members are aware of this and concerned enough to get moving. She presented the challenge for each of us to locate and bring just one new member into our Society by examining why we joined in the first place and the value it continues to have in our lives. Spotting prospective members, sharing our appreciation of DKG from our hearts, and wrapping ourselves around them to survive and thrive in our challenging profession would be simple, natural, and critical.

At this point, a full month after our conference, I'm left with a warm glow. Despite the dire situation we face, or perhaps because of it, it is even more critical that we renew ourselves and become more visible and vocal in our support of educators and education. After all, we belong to the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International, dynamic, caring, and committed women educators who face the challenge of impacting education worldwide! - *Eileen Clarke, Iota*
