

With the Hawai'i State contingency, which included Hawai'i State President **Stephanie Conching** (Epsilon), Sharon Inamine, Jennifer Koike, and Ellen Tanoura (Mu), and Amelia Lee, Tammy Ogata, Mindy Nakashima-Inouye (Delta), apprehension was soon replaced with a sense of comfort knowing what to expect, sisterhood, and fun! We were fortunate to have Japan State sister, Hatsue Kitahara join us as well.



Opening Night was a fun way to kick off the conference with bingo and ice cream. DKG sisters from around the world gathered, and the room was filled with laughter and a sense of competitiveness! Each day began with a general meeting and voting on 94 proposed amendments, aided by using a voting device that quickly provided results. While this part of the conference was intimidating and arduous, President Debbie LeBlanc presided with grace and precision. Thus, the sisters in attendance could get through the process quickly and with little discord. Spotlight sessions offered included Maintaining, Revitalizing and Growing, Inclusive Education, Empathy Walks, how AI is changing education, Writing for Publication, Financial Stability, and Women Changing the World, to name a few. Many sessions drew standing-room-only audiences, with participants flowing out the doors.

There were two luncheons with excellent keynote speakers. One speaker was writer, researcher, and entrepreneur Margot Lee Shetterly, author of <u>Hidden Figures</u> and other best-selling books. The other was slam poet Andre Bradford. His poetry covers topics ranging from mixed-race to social justice, mental health awareness, and relationships.



The conference concluded with Officer Installation, a reception, and a banquet dinner. We recognized the service of Outgoing President Dr. Debbie LeBlanc and celebrated Incoming President Dr. Beverly Hall-Maughan's leadership. The Hawai'i State and Japan State members presented both presidents with beautiful gifts. We gladly donated fashion accessories (costume jewelry, scarves, etc.) to be collected and donated to Women Giving Back.
