Women keynote the 2024 Spring Convention

"Captivating" and "inspiring" remarked attendees of the April convention. Mehanaokala Hind spoke of growing up in Palolo, "the center of the universe," and Ku'uipo Kumukahi talked story of growing up on Big Island, both secure in the love of encouragement of their ohana. Mehana's journey led to realizing the power of wahine and becoming a trusted leader in the community, currently serving as Senior Advisor to the Council of Native Hawaiian Advancement. Kuʻuipo's journey as a songwriter and musician led to several Nā Hõkū Hanohano awards, including Female Vocalist of the Year. Her deep ancestral roots moved her to start the Hawaiian Music Perpetuation Society.

Our Hawai'i (Beta Beta) State banner

The banner of Beta Beta State is crafted in the style of Hawaiian quilts. Designed by Irene **Kubo** (**Zeta**) in May of 1991, the banner blends Hawaiian culture, flora, and society symbols. The red shield is the banner itself, surrounded by a band of gold. Hawaiian Alexandrine Laurel flanks the center applique pattern of Hawaiian hibiscus. The yellow hibiscus is Hawai'i's state flower, and the laurel has fruits like little ping pong balls with small, white, fragrant flowers. Three red silk roses symbolize the three Tudor roses found attached at the top. While the work has thousands of hidden stitches, only hundreds of tiny stitches are visible in the applique design. The design of a quilt is a very personal experience. We are incredibly grateful to our sister for sharing her gifts with us.

We aim to tie this up before the new chapter officers take the lead on July 1, 2024.

It has been a busy year. I'm happy to report that all 14 chapter 990-N filings were successfully submitted. Great job! State-wise, we have changed names from Beta Beta State to DKG Hawaii State Organization with both First Hawaiian and American Savings. We have also mailed our documents to the IRS and the Hawai'i State Tax Office. We opened a two-year CD for \$20,000 from one of them. Our accounts are at 4% APR with Hawaii USA Federal Credit Union. Our insurance policies are renewed to date. Our Finance Committee, headed by Peggy Hirata (Epsilon), has been actively meeting. We will submit some suggested changes to our State By-Laws at the 2025 Spring Convention.

We started the year with \$3969.08 in our checking account. We received a total of \$12,432. We spent a total of \$13,451.11, leaving a checking account balance of \$2,949,97 as of April 30, 2024. Our savings account total is \$74,838.36 as of April 30, 2024.
