


up the Ala Wai Canal. The highlight was tossing the Genki balls into the canal!

Gamma Chapter is exceptionally grateful for all the heartfelt words of support for Maui following the devastation due to the wildfires. The road to recovery will be long, and the rebuilding of Lahaina and the homes lost in Kula will take time. Tears were shed as we received check after check after check in the mail from so many sisters across the miles. Over \$4,000 in donations from the HSO, Epsilon Omicron, and Epsilon Lambda of California were received for our sisters impacted by the wildfires. Japan State visited O'ahu recently and also donated \$1,000 for our Maui keiki, which will be used to support a holiday toy drive for the Friends of the Children's Justice Center of Maui, who gave all their toys and books they had immediately following the fires to displaced children. Theta Chapter made over 200 stress balls and massagers, which were donated to King Kekaulike High School and Lokelani Intermediate School staff, who greatly appreciated their hard work! We see the musubi stress balls close at hand on many teacher's desks! We know that many sisters donated directly to the various organizations supporting the people of Maui and helped at the different collection and distribution drives across the islands over the past few months. 
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#### **Blooming Roses 2023**
