Title IX—Hawai'i Connections and the Rise of the Wahine


"Heartwarming video that captures the spirit of gender equity and women's rights."

Japan State Visit and Expansion

Our whirlwind, week-long trip included teaching in several schools. We started at Executive Secretary Fusa Nakagawa's Junior College, engaging and encouraging her students to practice their English. At Tosajoshi Junior High 150 middle school girls learned to make an origami flower. During our visits to four other schools and seven classes (Grades 5/6 and High School), Eileen Clarke, Mu, and members of Japan State assisted with the lessons.

The NHK news and the local television station, KUTV, and newspaper reported on our visits. Fusa said, "The more articles and TV news that come out, the more people will recognize DKG and support us."



Japan State featured presentations from Hawai'i State at their weekend Fall Workshop. Pat presented *Purposeful Living Generates Longevity and Legacy*, and in another session, together with Vivian and Donna, discussed the roles and responsibilities of officers at the different levels (chapter, state, and International). Keynote speaker, Eileen Clarke, shared the *Choose Love* program.

One of the major reasons we visited Japan State is to help with expansion. The Hawai'i sisters participated in a phone conference with a prospective member and visited Osaka to meet with two teachers who are interested in starting a chapter. We also met with State President Hatsue Kitahara, State Treasurer Kumi Shimomura, and Fusa Nakagawa. Our visit was a full and highly successful trip.
