As we move into the second quarter of the school year, I hope you have had opportunities to A'o Aku, A'o Mai—To teach and learn in your personal and professional lives. In October, over 100 DKG HSO members from all 14



chapters were able to A'o Aku, A'o Mai at the 2021 Fall Forum, E Huli A'o Ana—Learning Changes hosted by Mu Chapter. It was great seeing our sisters connect, teach, and learn virtually. We had 14 first-time attendees—five of whom were just initiated this year! Keynote speaker Duane Kurisu shared about Kahauiki Village and his lessons in leadership which have guided him to where he is today. We met in seven smaller groups during breakout sessions. As always, with so much valuable information and mana'o to share, they all seemed too short.

In addition to celebrating the high attendance at the conference, special congratulations go out to:

- Elise Hu (Ġamma) for being our Kumu Award recipient.
 This award goes to the conference attendee who has been a member the longest. She has been a DKG member for 57 years!
- Gale Ikeda (Delta) and Kathy Sakuda (Iota) were tied for the highest score in our trivia game. Gale won the tiebreaker with the closest guess of the current membership (430).
- Jacky Jaeger (Mu) was the first to respond to my hidden note in the President's message.
- the recipients of the Frances Shimote Award. This award is in honor of *Theta* Chapter's *Fran Shimote* (HSO State President 1999–2001), who encouraged everyone to attend Fall and Spring Conventions. The award is given to the chapters with attendance rates of 30% or higher. This year's Fall Forum awardees were: *Mu*–90%, *Lambda*–50%, *Kappa*–45%, *Epsilon*–35%, and *Theta*–32%.

Another example of how we continue to teach and learn from each other is at the monthly Talk Story Tuesday events. We are fortunate in HSO to have so many talented members. In October, Lisa Nagamine (Theta) shared about TRIBES and building relationships and ways to connect virtually. In November, Chapter Presidents Corinne Matsumoto (Beta) and Deanne Kanekuni (Theta) led us in exercises on self-care. Most of us were so relaxed after the calming session that we signed off early and went to sleep.
