BALD MOUNTAIN BAPTIST CHURCH

A Brief History

Bald Mountain Baptist Church of West Jefferson, North Carolina, was organized on March 5, 1910, in the old Lawrence schoolhouse, which was located near the site of the present church.

The congregation, interested in forming a new church, met for worship in the schoolhouse. After prayer by Rev. Roby Burkett, Rev. P.H. Haire preached a sermon taking as his text Matthew 16:18, "And I say also unto thee, that thou art Peter, and upon this rock, I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

A business meeting following the sermon resulted in the organization of Bald Mountain Missionary Baptist Church with twenty-four charter members joining that day. Brother Haire called for letters of all present who wished to go into an organization of said place, order and faith. A temporary moderator, clerk, and treasurer were elected.

The first church was built nearby. F.P. Trivette and Wm. E. Carlton were appointed to the Building Committee. The cost of the building site was \$15 which was donated by the members and was paid to H.A. Lawrence. The total cost of the church was \$730.

The first pastors were Rev. Roby Burkett and Rev. T.M. Hayes. The church was dedicated August 31, 1912. Preachers who participated were Rev. W.R. Bradshaw, who preached the Sabbath Sermon, and Rev. C.M. Cope, who preached the Dedication Sermon.

In 1946 an attempt was made to put a basement under the church. The church fell and the plan was abandoned. Several members were under it when it fell among which were Coy Howell, Paul Lawrence and Dean Lawrence. There were no serious injuries.

On May 4, 1946, a vote was taken to determine whether the church should be repaired or whether a new church should be built. The vote carried for a new building. Another church was built which has been in use since that time. It has been remodeled, improved, and expanded over the years.

In 1989 the need for more Sunday School rooms, additional choir space, a fellowship hall and a baptistry as well as the need to encourage additional growth resulted in the decision to build a new sanctuary with a fellowship hall in the basement. The first service in the new building, with the Rev. Jack Pugh as pastor, was held May 20, 1990. The dedication service was held August 19, 1990. The total cost of the new building was \$211,000.

Continued church growth necessitated a decision in 1998 to build a new church sanctuary to seat approximately 500 people. The construction included a new fellowship hall, choir room, nursery, classrooms, administrative offices and library. The project was completed in December 2000 at a cost in excess of \$2,000,000.


The first service in the new sanctuary was held December 24, 2000, with Rev. Lawrence Goodman serving as pastor. A dedication service was held on May 6, 2001.


In 2017 Rev. John Elledge came to serve as Senior Pastor of Bald Mountain Baptist Church having served as associate pastor since 2016.


In 2022 a barn, adjacent to the church property, was purchased from Barbara Lawrence to provide space for new ministries that have been added: Operation Christmas Child Ministry, the Food Ministry, and a Horse Ministry.

PHOENIX BAPTIST CHURCH

A Brief History

Berlin Baptist Church was organized May 9, 1908, by member taking letter form Forest Home Baptist Church at Warrensville, North Carolina. Forest Home was located near the mouth of Buffalo Creek where the Ashe County Middle School is now located. The church sat very near where the field house is located at present. Members form Berlin and Lansing areas felt somewhat isolated from the church because they had to cross the New River by boat or horseback. Sometimes the river was too full and they were unable to get to church.

The first home of Berlin Baptist Church was a small private school building in the Berlin Community. It was located near the present church site, about 50 yards from the front door and slightly right. James Eller, Sr. had donated the little school building to his three sons for the purpose of educating his grandchildren and his neighbor's children. With the coming of the larger, state supported school, the little school building was no longer needed for schooling purposes. However, it proved to be an ideal place for people to meet to worship. Following tow or three great revivals in the little school building, a Presbytery was called to organize a new church. The Presbytery was composed of Elders: Elihu Tucker, R.L. Shoaz, T.W. Carter and L.J. Day. Charter members consisted of 17 men and 18 women.

The first pastor of Berlin Baptist Church was Elder Elihu Tucker.

During World War 1, the post office name was changed for Berlin to Bina. The story told was, that the mail was sometimes sent to Germany instead of Bina as one reason for the name change. James Eller, Sr., who had given the little schoolhouse and the land it was built on, did not like the name Bina for the church. At his suggestion, the church voted to change the name to "Phoenix" for the Phoenix Mountain, which stands nearby. Back in the eons of time, God, in His infinite wisdom made a little slit in the earth and a mountain rose up known as Phoenix and a little white church had a proper name. By the time the little schoolhouse was too small for worshippers and the white clapboard church was built. The church was heated with a large coal and wood burning stove. Sunday School classes were held I the church white curtains pulled to divide the church into four sections with the "card" class being held in the bell tower. Mone to build the "new" church came for the sale of right -of-ways to the Norfolk and Western Railroad for rail service into Ashe County. The three Eller brothers sold the right-of-way

through the property to the Norfolk and Western Railroad and used the proceeds from the sale to buy supplies for the new church building. In 1914 a comfortable house of worship was completed. The little school building had served its purpose, so it was sold and moved off the property. The church continued to grow and by 1930 the membership was ninety-eight members.

Today the Bina Community seems to just be a place between Warrensville and Lansing, but at one time it was a bustling little village with three stores. It had two groceries and one department store. Clyde Mullis and Rowie McNeil operated the grocery stores and E.C. Eller operated the department store. There was also a post office with Ms. Lessie King as postmaster. Bina also had a Baptist Church, a Methodist Church and a school. The story has been told through the years that on one hill the Methodist was singing "Will There Be Any Stars In My Crown", and on the other hill the Phoenix Baptist Church was singing "No Not One".

Over the years the church has undergone major renovations. The first was the addition of three Sunday school rooms and the excavation of a small basement. Some time later the furnace was added. Later, in the early 60's, seven Sunday school rooms were added, the basement was enlarged and the clapboard siding was replaced with brick. During the pastorate of Reverend E.W. Powers, the church voted to install carpet in the sanctuary, in all the Sunday school rooms, and in the basement.

In the early 70's, Phoenix Baptist Church adopted a constitution and purchased it first van for outreach service. In July 1980, under the leadership of Reverend Jimmy Eldreth, the church moved forward by going to full time worship service and mid-week service. The church has since begun WMU for the women of the church and the Brotherhood for the men.

Charter member, Mrs. Gertrude Eller Waddell, participated in a June 1991 groundbreaking service for a new fellowship hall and education building. Her words reflect her own life and the life of the church, "Never start anything you can't finish and never finish anything you cannot give God the glory for." The fellowship hall was completed and construction is continuing in phases with a baptistery planned for the future.

In 2002, under the leadership of Elliott Osowitt, the church started a compassionate program called the "C.A.R.E. Ministry" on Thursday nights. The program consists of reaching out to others through visitation and sending cards to the sick and shut-in.

The surviving charter members were siblings: Mr. Jess Eller, who died in 1983 and Mrs. Gertrude Eller Waddell who died at the age of 99 in 1991. She was in and automobile accident on her way to church. The church van was struck by a car outside of Lansing and went off the road and rolled into Big Horse Creek killing Mr. Waddell and injuring several others.

Ashe Really Cares Annual Report 2022-2023

Thank you, Ashe Baptist Churches, for supporting your mission through another year. Many people where fee, clothed and loved on, in the name of Jesus. As people visited the ARC for help, they received food and clothing but much more came with that. We were able to pray with and hug a lot of hurting people. Your mission gives out Bibles and material with God's word so that the seed can be planted. Ashe Really Cares wants everyone from our neighbors, volunteers and our donors to feel and know God loves and uses each of us to share his love to a hurting world. You and your church make the ARC a place that can and is making a difference in the world we live in now and our home to come.

This past year we have had the privilege to serve 1,235 families that needed help to make ends meet. This touched 2,735 individuals with food, clothing and household items. We also had 61 new families to come in needing assistance. Some families only come in to get clothing, which can easily double the number of individuals that we serve.

We have given out 29,651 pounds of food from Second Harvest Food Bank. The estimated retail cost was \$54,701.95 the amount that was paid by Ashe Really Cares was \$4,999.32. We received 64,112 pounds of food from our local Food Lion Store with 40,219 pounds of that being produce. Our Souper Bowl project collected 3,690 items and \$5,826.00. Along with all of the food collected by our churches and community you can see that there is a lot of food that goes out our doors. The Baptist On Mission is still sharing "Senior Boxes" with the ARC through that we are able to give 41 extra boxes each month to our seniors.

Your mission loves on the whole person, not just the situation they find themselves in. We see so many folks that are dealing with health issues and are in need of someone to tell them that God cares and loves them. Sometimes a prayer and a hug help the hurt that people go through. Needs are being met and praise God for his work!!!

Thank all of the volunteers that give their time to help hurting families. Without you we would not be able to meet the needs that come through our doors. As we look to the future and what God is doing, continue to pray and never cease the work you have started.

Ashe Baptist Campground Report 2023-24

Nestled in the heart of the Appalachian Mountains, there is a beautiful nine-acre campground known as the Ashe Baptist Campground. The land was donated by a local family and the community had come together to build a place where people could gather to enjoy nature and strengthen their faith. The centerpiece of the campground was the Mattie Parsons Memorial Building, a large wooden structure that could accommodate up to 300 people for worship services, conferences, and retreats. It has a kitchen, showers, sleeping quarters and a media center with internet. It was named after a beloved member of the community who had dedicated her life to serving others and spreading the gospel. On the grounds include a serene Prayer Garden with benches and pathways winding through vibrant flowers and shrubs. It is a peaceful place for meditation and reflection. Just you and God in a special place. On the other side of the campus is an amphitheater, where concerts, outdoor movies and plays can be held on summer evenings. Nearby is a softball field, where boys and girls and community groups could compete against each other in friendly games. For those who prefer basketball, there is a court where pick-up games could be played. And for those who enjoy a slower pace, there is horseshoe pits where people could toss horseshoes and chat with friends. Throughout the campground are picnic tables where families could enjoy a meal together in the shade of the trees. There's also walking trails that wind through the woods, offering glimpses of wildlife and breathtaking view of the mountains in the distance. I hope this year will be the year that the church you attend will go to the camp for a different type of worship service or training session for folks. Church wide picnics are a must. Boys and girls can camp out or stay in the Ray Minton Cabin, in tents or the Mattie Parson Building for overnight experience. Showers are available. A nice kitchen is there for your use, the internet is available in the media center down stairs. Wide screen TV, computer and DVD Player is there for you to use as well. Churches of Ashe Baptist Association mow and keep the camp open April through October each year. Individuals do lot of odd jobs to keep it in great shape and we appreciate it. We are on mission together! Church and individual financial support is needed to pay electric bills and for upkeep of different types. One of the larger expenses is Insurance. Everyone is responsible for leaving the building clean like it was when you arrived. If you move anything from where you found it please put it back in its place. There are pictures posted that show you where things belong. All electronics must be used with care and not moved or disconnected. Please remember cleaning commodes, vacuuming and moping is necessary before you leave. We want the campground to always honor God. Call the office and book a time now. Let's keep the camp beautiful for the next generation. See you at the campground!

Ashe Baptist Women

Women on Missions is certainly not a new term but is so meaningful to Ashe County churches. Many churches still look to Women Missionary Unions (WMU) to educate and inform the congregation of mission work at home, the community and throughout the world. Many churches currently hold a monthly meeting to plan, organize, and pray for events to share the importance of mission work. Women promote special offerings including Anne Armstrong at Easter and Lottie Moon at Christmas. Various churches call the women's organization differing names such as Embrace, Ladies Circle or Women on Mission, but each of these groups has the same mission, to serve the Lord while serving others.

Currently, a group of ladies called SEEKERS (Scriptures are Excellent Examples Keeping Everyone Reaching and Searching). These ladies met beginning in 2022 realizing women needed to be in God's word. Ladies committed to be a "coach" and meet with a small group of ladies (2 to 3) in their church or community to study and share the scriptures. Each participant was challenged to read short scripture passages daily and come back periodically with their Coach to share what God had spoken to her. In II Timothy 2:15 it says, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." SEEKERS Coaches and their participants met back for lunch on February 28, 2023 to share their progress. What a blessing to hear women tell how much they enjoyed reading the same scriptures/passages as their coach. God was revealing the word to them, and many felt encouraged to move forward and be a "coach" themselves. They now have formed a small group of their own, and hopefully this process will continue so more women will find support while reading scriptures and applying it to their lives.

LOOMS (Ladies with Open Hearts and Open Minds), meet Thursdays for Bible study. Elijah: Faith and Fire by Priscilla Shirer is our current study with twenty-five ladies attending. With this number of participants, we outgrew Ashe Baptist Associational conference room, and Midway Baptist Church has graciously offered us a room at their church. All ladies who are available from 11:30 - 12:30 are invited, and our hopes are that we outgrow the space we are currently using and will need to have even more space as we gain more participants. We have such a great time going deeper in God's word.

Women have been busy, but it's not over yet. We are just beginning. As a celebration, SEEKERS and LOOMS will host Priscilla Shirer's simulcast August 26, 2023, from 9:30 am to 4:45 pm. Lunch will be provided, and we want to invite all ladies to register to attend this great event. More information will be sent to each church. Ladies! We hope to see you there, and it would be even better if you brought a friend to enjoy the day cultivating a deep desire for God. Be in prayer for the ladies in our churches who are committed to knowing more about God and his purpose in their lives.

Faith-Health Ashe Connector Report

The Faith-Health model recognizes that we are now in a new era of health care and a new way of caring for people in need. Providers must also focus outside hospitals and practices into the local community. Part of my job description is to identify social and faith networks that provide physical, mental, social, or spiritual health resources and connect them with patients within the relevant community who are in need of such Care Resources. In the past few months as the new Connector for Ashe County, I have assisted residents with various needs. The following is a sampling of my recent work:

- 1. Met with gentleman to visit wife in total care unit of nursing facility. Prayer and discussions with husband on final arrangements. Assisted him in seeking resources and finalizing arrangements.
- 2. Gave presentations on Faith-Health to two groups of Pastors and local radio station.
- 3. Assisted resident who was previously treated for brain cancer. He had started having serious head pain and I was able to get him scheduled with oncologist the following day.
- 4. Worked with resident whose husband was released from rehab and in need of a liver transplant. Assisted her in getting orders for home health to help her during this time of transition.
- 5. Went to ER to be with patient having an anaphylactic reaction to medication. Stayed with wife at ER until patient stabilized. Went next day to assist him in getting settled at home. Reviewed medications with he and wife.
- 6. Met with a number of residents in need of encouragement for pressing needs. Counsel and prayer with them and offered Faith-Health connections.
- 7. Attended a number of meetings on Faith-Health including a daylong meeting at the Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem.
- 8. Followed up with a number of residents who were post-op or DC'ed from rehab. Prayer and offered assistance with Faith-Health resources.
- 9. Assisted resident with transportation needs to medical appointments.
- 10. Assisted disabled resident in need of funds to have car repaired. Found resources and had mechanic agree to a lower price for repairs.
- 11. Finally, just like all pastors, I am on call 7 days a week if needed.
 As you can see, the needs in Ashe County are many and multi-faceted. Please call me at the Association Office if I can assist you, a Church member, neighbor, or friend who is in need.

BAPTISTS ON MISSION AREAS OF WORK

At Baptists on Mission, our Purpose is to Glorify God by involving churches and Christians in meeting human needs in Jesus' name. We do that by offering a wide variety of opportunities for volunteers to be the hands and feet of Jesus. Everything from aviation missions where we fly patients to much-needed medical care, partnership missions, prayer ministries, medical, dental, construction, disaster relief, disaster recovery, etc.

Baptists on Mission volunteers serve in 19 ministries that include the following:

STATE/NATIONAL/INTERNATIONAL MISSION PROJECTS

God is changing lives through mission trips sponsored by Baptists on Mission in North Carolina (mission camps, Impact NC, Disaster Rebuilds, etc.) and to places such as Pennsylvania, Hawaii, New England, Rocky Mountain Region, Appalachian Coalfields, Alaska, Guatemala, Kenya, Armenia, Romania, Hungary, Moldova, Cuba, South Africa and other places. Many hundreds of volunteers serve in these partnerships every year. As a result of the war in Ukraine, we have sent and are sending teams and funds to assist refugees in Poland, Hungary. Moldova and inside of Ukraine to assist displaced people. Because of your generosity, our goal we fed more than 1,000,000 Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) whose lives have been upended by the war in Ukraine. Additionally, this past Winter we were able to send more than 1000 stoves to Ukraine to assist those affected by the war.

Lives are being changed... The British missionary William Carey said, "Expect great things from God; attempt great things for God." Here are some of the things that we as NC Baptists have been doing to minister to people and to glorify God:

DISASTER RELIEF

God has blessed us with excellent disaster relief equipment and volunteers. North Carolina Baptists have five large disaster feeding units. The two largest units are capable of preparing and serving 30,000+ meals per day. We now have more than 250 disaster recovery trailers (owned by local churches and associations) used to clean up and repair work after a disaster. We also have six large shower units, three laundry units, a childcare unit, several large recovery units, large generator units, and lots of other disaster relief equipment that the Lord has provided. This past year NC Baptist Disaster Relief responded to the Kentucky Tornadoes, Rockingham County tornadoes, Hurricane Fiona in Puerto Rico, flooding in Kentucky and Virginia, Hurricane Ian in Florida, and other disasters.

DIASASTER REBUILD

In September, 2018, Hurricanes Florence slammed our state and affected thousands of families. Three years later in August 2021, Tropical Storm Fred devastated Haywood and other counties in WNC. God has blessed us with rebuild centers where we can house, feed, and coordinate the work of thousands of rebuild volunteers. So far, we have helped more than 2000 families get back in their homes. There are more families still waiting for assistance in rebuilding their lives years after the storms. People in great need are hearing and seeing the love of Christ, and many people are coming to commit or to recommit their lives to Jesus.

MEDICAL/DENTAL MISSIONS

Baptists on Mission offers the use of the mobile medical/dental units to Baptist and non-Baptist churches and service organizations within North Carolina who wish to reach out to people in need. More than 100 clinics are

held each year on the two mobile units. Patients targeted through this ministry may include the impoverished, Hispanic, and other ethnic groups, farm workers, fair workers, the homeless, the elderly, and more.

HEALTH SCREENING MINISTRY

Health disparities are prevalent in more impoverished neighborhoods. Our goal is to take healthcare to the most disadvantaged populations, thus improving community health navigation as we align local community health centers with patients seen at the mobile clinics. The unit's health screening tests include Hemoglobin A1C for diabetes screening, finger stick glucose, Cholestech LDX for total cholesterol and HDL results, body mass index calculation, depression screening, basic eye exams, and vital signs assessment. This ministry provides not only basic health screening clinics but spiritual assessments and counseling as well. Our hope is that by meeting a physical need, a spiritual door will be opened, and the love of Jesus can be shared.

STUDENT MISSIONS

Deep Impact helps North Carolina Baptist churches develop a comprehensive, coed youth missions strategy to produce committed followers of Christ. This strategy includes pre-packaged mission weeks, free online mission studies, weekend mission retreats, hands-on mission training, and much more.

DI KIDS

One of our newest efforts is DI Kids (Deep Impact Kids), a missions weekend/week for children and their leaders. DI Kids Missions Weeks, Mini-weeks, and Weekends are pre-packaged mission experiences sponsored by Baptists on Mission. They provide elementary-age students and their leaders/parents with the opportunity to share the love of God with people in NC. The children enjoy a great camp experience with a mission focus. Involving children in missions is an excellent beginning to develop disciple-making students and adults with love for missions.

OTHER MINISTRIES

In addition to the ministries described above, other ministries of Baptists on Mission designed to equip, motivate and mobilize volunteers to be involved in missions are Agriculture Missions, Aviation Ministry, Baptist Builders, Baptist Educators, Family Foundations, College Missions, Compassion Ministry, Church Renewal, Prayer Support, Sports and Recreation, Men's Ministry, Student Missions and Children's Missions.

MISSIONS CONFERENCE

The annual missions conference, sponsored by Baptists on Mission, includes music, testimonies, speakers, breakout sessions, mission fair exhibits, volunteer suppers, and much more. The desired end result is for participants to be spiritually renewed and inspired to become involved in missions locally and worldwide. Over 1,600 people attend this conference every year.

REGIONAL MISSIONS RALLIES

Each spring and fall, Baptists on Mission sponsors regional rallies in all 10 regions of our state. These meetings are designed to challenge North Carolina Baptists across the state to greater mission involvement and promote the September North Carolina Missions Offering. The rallies are open for all men, women, and youth interested in missions.

BAPTISTS ON MISSION MAGAZINE

This publication is mailed twice each year to all church mission leaders on each level, mission volunteers, BOM ministry groups, youth directors, ministers of education, and pastors. Information is provided through this magazine to promote upcoming mission projects/events and to report on recently completed projects.

MISSION CAMPS

Every year an average of 5,000 volunteers respond to needs through the Mission Camps in Red Springs, Shelby, and Rose Hill (Charity). These Mission Camps are a great way to get your church involved in life-changing mission projects at a very affordable price.

STAFF

The Baptists on Mission Staff is committed to helping North Carolina Baptist churches involve their members in missions. Evangelism

What is evangelism? A good definition is the presenting of the gospel of Jesus Christ and His saving Power to a lost and dying world, with the intentions of putting men, women, and children in touch with the living God, who came into the world through Jesus Christ to seek and to save that which is lost. The Gospel of John says, "In Him (Jesus) was life, and the life was the light of men. (John 1:4) And John says that he wrote the gospel "that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing ye might have eternal life through His name." (John 20:31) Jesus Himself said, "I am come that they might have life and that they might have it more abundantly." (John 10:10)

There are many ways to accomplish this goal. Personal contacts are now, and have been since the beginning of the Church in Jerusalem, the most effective means of spreading the good news (gospel) of Jesus Christ. As the Church has progressed, other really good methods have been developed. Many churches have one or two revivals every year, which is supposed to revive and renew the members, but is an excellent evangelism tool as well.

Now that the concern about Covid has diminished, many churches have resumed having a Vacation Bible School during the summer. This is an excellent method of reaching the young people in our communities, with a good number professing Christ each year.

Disciple making, which is really aimed to teach those that have already accepted Christ about His words and concepts, has also proven to be an effective evangelism method, with people being saved during discipleship classes.

More and more churches are using electronic equipment and social media to get their services into homes that might not otherwise have access to local services, or a desire to attend an organized church. This is one good result of the Covid pandemic, although nothing can replace the fellowship of the local church.

Our own Good Soil Ministry, in which most churches in the Association participates, recycles the printed Word in the form of Bibles, Sunday school literature, Christian books and magazines, etc., to foreign countries to be reused and become excellent evangelism tools for people who might not otherwise have any such tools. All of these methods and more (Is there really a wrong one?) have one goal in mind, the salvation of lost souls!!!

Historian Report 2023

This year's Historian report is taken from the Ninety-Fifth Annual Session. The theme was: "Every Baptist involved Until Every Person Reached." The year was 1981 and both sessions were held at the Associational Camp and the first session was held on August 7, hosted by the Laurel Knob Baptist Church. The second session was held August 8 hosted jointly by Mission Home and Old Fields Baptist Churches. Rev. Bill Ballou served as the Director of Mission; Rev. Richard Baird served as Moderator, Mr. Joe Brown as Vice- Moderator and Mrs. Jeannie McNeill as Clerk-Treasurer. Speakers for the ninety-fifth session were Rev's Joe Riley Blevins, Wayne Jones, Steve Pegram and Jimmy Eldreth. The Association was made up of 56 churches.

History of the Ashe Baptist Camp was printed as follows:

On the 23rd day of September, 1968, Mr. & Mrs. Bernard Hodgson deeded a 10 acre tract of land to the Ashe Baptist Association or denominational and associational proposes.

The Camp has been in constant stages of development since that time. A shortage of funds has caused development to proceed very slowly.

A \$12,000 Ioan was secured from Northwestern Bank making possible construction of the building. The balance on the loan at this time is \$9000.

On Sunday, June 22, 1980, special dedication services were held here at the camp.

Prior to her death, Mrs. Mattie Parsons had a dream of a building being erected here for Christian activities for people of the churches in our association. Through a generous gift on her part and contributions given in her memory, construction began. The building and grounds have been dedicated to God and the structure has been named, The Mattie Parsons Building. It is here for your pleasure and enjoyment. Miss Mattie would have wanted it that way. Her photograph hangs here in the building. It is our hope that your church will place the camp in the budget or at least periodically receive a special offering. Possibilities are unlimited as to the Christian influence our camp can have in the lives of young people and adults of our association.

As we look to the past 12 months I am pleased to report that the Ashe Pregnancy Care Center has been effectively working in our community serving moms, dads and babies.

We provide a loving environment and all services are FREE & confidential to our clients. We offer over 200 FREE educational classes through Bright Course. These are high quality educational videos on parenting - pregnancy - life skills and abstinence, all with a Christian foundation. Classes are offered in office and via text to the clients phone for ease of accessibility.

Our services include in fant supplies & equipment, formula, baby food, diapers & wipes, maternity clothing, peer support & mentoring, adoption in formation & referral, pregnancy testing, fatherhood mentoring & classes, and local resource referrals. Many moms would tell you that one of their favorite reasons for coming to the APCC is that we truly care for them, encouraging and inspiring them to take the next steps in their lives. We also offer an after abortion recovery and emotional healing study scheduled individually and confidentially. We lead a new believers and discipleship Bible Study with our clients.

In the last 12 months:

- 752 individual parenting classes
- 370 client office visits
- 1392 volunteer hours
- 18 Clients delivered healthy babies
- Many diapers, wipes and baby supplies given out
- Many donations received

In the pro abortion environment we live in, we give thanks to God for the new NC law which took effect July 2023 which limits surgical abortions to 12 weeks (an improvement from the previous 20 weeks). We have increased our efforts and budget to reach her, the abortion vulnerable woman. We provide the true facts and information about all options, as well as all the support available through our center, local churches and community services.

Our dedicated staff, volunteers and board members are continually seeking the Lord's guidance as we reach more young moms with help and hope.

Ashe Baptist Association Mission Report, 2023 Annual Meeting

Jesus said this: Acts 1: 8 "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come on you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth" (CSB).

Friendship Baptist Church takes this command seriously as well as other Ashe Baptist Association Churches who have mission work going on right here in our Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and to the end of the earth.

We take seriously that our mission is obedience to the Great Commandment of loving God and others and to the Great Commission through evangelism and discipleship.

In the past year we have been actively engaged in our **Jerusalem** by working with Ashe Really Cares, Ashe Crisis Pregnancy Center, Good News Bible Clubs, Back to School Bash, Jesus Video Distribution, Ashe VBS Camp, Pre-teen Bible Camp, Sunday School, Discipleship Training, celebration worship services, special events and other activities to reach Ashe County with the good news of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

We are attempting to establish a partnership with the town of Pocahontas, Virginia. This is our **Judea**. Pocahontas is a small village just outside of Bluefield, West Virginia. The town has a Baptist church as well as a few others but attendance is low, needs there are great. We have been working to refurbish a mission house and to establish a relationship with the local church to make possible short term mission trips for both youth and adults to share with that town of 268 plus those that live in the surrounding hollers.

Samaira is a little distant but not too far for a great foreign mission experience on a budget. A partnership has been established with the Baptist Church in Pueblo Viejo, Toledo District in the country of Belize. Since that partnership has been established a church construction project has been completed and services are being held there on a regular basis with a pastor in place. Several trips to Belize have been made in the past year to work on the building, install a reliable solar power system, and begin to plant an additional church in the village of Jalacta. This village is about a fifteen minute drive over some horrible roads from Pueblo Viejo and is very near the Guatemala border. English is the official language of Belize but several other languages are spoken in these villages.

The end of the earth for us currently is Peru. In 2009, the International Mission Board invited me to travel to Lima, Peru, to attend a seminar on reaching unreached people groups in that country. We spent a few days learning of the history, culture, world views, and religion of the country. An IMB missionary took me to an area in the Ancash District high up in the Andes Mountains to the city of Caraz. This city of about 50,000 is the center of commerce for approximately 250,000 or so residents in an area between the Black and White Mountains. We identified a "Person of Peace" and began a ministry there that we continue to work to this day. Teams have been there frequently except for two years during Covid. During the past year two teams have traveled there, one to do evangelism and eye clinics, the other to do discipleship in the four churches/preaching points that have been established. Dear Pastor and Church Leaders,

I am asking for your and your congregation's support in helping our local Detention Center. There are several ways a church can be involved in helping those incarcerated: Second Mile Ministry, Bible Blitz, Holiday Helps, CCC Ministry, IPM, and Tender Teddy.

*Second Mile Ministry (Matt. 5:41): We have partnered with ACTA so that a church or individual can give directly to ACTA to provide transportation to inmates that do not have a ride to make it safely home. This is mainly for inmates that are SMCP, which means they come from another county, and the jail is not responsible to provide them a return trip home. This also helps decrease homelessness in the county.

*Bible Blitz (Mark 4:14): There are several ways to help with this. Inmates are always asking for large print Bibles. Churches can give Bibles, Bible studies, or books (no hardbacks or staples). Also, Badges of Ashe will take any donations earmarked to Chaplain's Ministries to be applied to this cause. Churches can give plastic (not metal) reading glasses as well. We would also like to say a special thank you to the Gideons for the Bibles they currently provide to the detention center.

*Holiday Helps (1 Corinthians 12:28): Churches can give gift bags to inmates during Christmas or other holidays. Acceptable items include candy, word searches, hygiene items, playing cards, tracks, and devotions. Prohibited items: no items with metal or staples; no long pencils, long pens, or long toothbrushes; and no handmade food. Call 336-846-5610 for any questions on item eligibility. All items are subject to dismissal by the jail staff.

*Tender Teddy (Mark 10:14): This is a stuffed animal drive, so our officers and deputies have teddy bears and blankets to comfort kids in dire circumstances.

ASHE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION 2023 Gideon Report Ashe Baptist Associational Meeting

The Gideons International is an association of Christian business and professional men and their wives who are dedicated to seeing lost people come to Christ. They do this through associating together for service, prayer, personal testimony and work and placing and distributing God's Holy Word in specific venues.

The Gideons association was formed in 1899 when two traveling salesmen shared devotions in a hotel while traveling and began wondering how they could put a Bible in hotel rooms for other travelers to do the same. In 1908 a church gave a love offering for these men to place the first 25 Bibles in rooms of a Wisconsin hotel. Many men at that time were traveling salesmen and away from home and family quite often. As they associated together as Christian businessmen, they held one another accountable to the Lord and Biblical principles. Their wives, known as the Auxiliary, became the prayer power behind this work and they still are today!

Gideons are members in good standing of evangelical churches and are recommended by their pastors for membership. Many churches have provided Scriptures in Ashe County and around the world. Currently, there are over 150,000 Gideons and over 93,000 Auxiliary in 199 countries around the world. COVID-19 and its lingering after-effects continued to restrict our normal activities somewhat this past year, however we were blessed to be able to distribute almost 54 million Scriptures worldwide during our last fiscal year which ended June 30%, 2023.

The Ashe County Camp, currently totaling 43 Gideons and 33 Auxiliary members, was able to give 86 presentations in Ashe County churches this past year. This was over a sevenfold increase from the 12 presentations last fiscal year. Praise the Lord III These 86 presentations raised a total of \$38,478 from our generous congregations. We were also able to raise an additional \$48,929 through Gideon and Auxiliary offerings, Gideon Card receipts, and other contributions by churches and individuals. That total of \$87,407 will purchase 56,030 Testaments or 17,481 Bibles for lost and hurting people. We are glad to report that, as always, 100% of these offerings were used to purchase and place Scriptures.

In Ashe County, Gideons personally place Bibles in nightstands of local motels and hotels and check the condition of these Scriptures every year. They offer Testaments to 5th graders in Ashe County's three elementary schools as well as to graduating Seniors at Ashe County High School, college Testaments to students on Ashe campus of Wilkes Community College, to inmates in the Ashe County jail, and employees of emergency and rescue facilities. Gideons and Auxiliary place large print Testaments in rooms of Ashe County nursing homes. We thank God for these opportunities and ask for your prayers for continued open doors and receptive hands in future.

Ashe County Gideons also have a booth during the "Christmas in July Festival" offering Testaments to youth who may not have received one in the fifth grade, as well as to others who show an interest. This past year we were blessed to distribute 400 Testaments.

The Auxiliary places Bibles in waiting rooms of doctor, dentist and Veterinary offices and offers Medical Testaments to the staff of these offices, as well as to medical staff at nursing homes. They also offer Testaments to chaplains of Domestic Violence Shelters to pass along to the

residences and leave Testaments with the director or chaplain of Crisis Pregnancy Center for those clients. Gideon and Auxiliary couples go together to place large print Testaments in rooms of Ashe County nursing homes and make them available to patients at Ashe Memorial Hospital when they ask for a Bible.

The Gideons International now have a Friends of Gideons Program where individuals can become a financial partner when they may not have time to join as actual members of The Gideons International. Pastors may now sign up as Friends of Gideons on behalf of the church and purchase Testaments for church mission work.

Another important source of funds for the Gideon ministry comes from our Gideon card program. Many of you may be familiar with our cards but in case you are not, we provide <u>free</u> spiritually based greeting cards for a variety of occasions; to honor or remember someone or to simply tell them that you're thinking and praying for them by donating Bibles in their honor. The person sending the card simply chooses the number of Bibles they wish to donate and mails payment of \$5 per Bible by check, cash or credit card in the self-addressed envelope provided. If your church does not have a Gideon card display rack and would like one please contact us and we'll be happy to provide it along with cards at no cost.

Pastors and church representatives, thank you for recommending Christian business and professional men and their Christian wives for membership in this association. Your support for The Gideons International through prayer and funds for Scriptures are living proof of Isaiah 55:11. "So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: it shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it."

We never know how many lives will be impacted by that one little Testament.

2023 Annual Report to Baptist Associations Atrium Health Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center

North Carolina Baptīst Hospital (Hospital), now known as Atrium Health Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center, enters its 100 th year of service with new relationships and new opportunities. I am glad to share highlights of each with you during this report.

Centennial Celebrations

The first patients were admitted to NC Baptist Hospital on May 28th, 1923. The first child born at the hospital arrived on that day, as well as additional patients requiring surgeries and other forms of care. To kick off the season of celebrations, the FaithHealth Division called attention to a century of spiritual care during National Spiritual Care Week in October 2022. We then celebrated with NC Baptists with a banquet on Monday evening during the annual meeting of the Baptist State Convention of NC (Convention), on November 7th, 2022. During the banquet, we recognized two of our original partners in ministry: Woman's Missionary Union of NC and the NC Baptist Foundation. Without the support of these two partners, the Hospital literally would not have been able to open its doors in 1923. During the Tuesday morning session of the annual meeting, we called attention to the 100th anniversary of the Convention's approval of the Charter for the Hospital and presented a plaque to BSCNC Executive Director-Treasurer, Toold Unzicker, in recognition and appreciation of 100 years of partnership with the

New Relationships

The annual meeting in November 2022 provided the messengers the opportunity to provide the final approval to a new relationship between the Convention and the Hospital. The new relationship is now in place and is expressed In the following ways: 1.

- The Convention no longer elects trustees for service on the board of trustees for the Hospital 2.
- The Convention no longer provides undesignated Cooperative Program funds to the Hospital
- The Convention engages in a variety of shared ministries with the Hospital when these ministries align with the Convention's strategies and ministry priorities.
- The Hospital co intinues to provide access to active and retired ministers, Associational Missionaries, and missionaries that have retired from service with NAMB and IMB who now reside in North Carolina to the Baptist Minister's Subsidy (BMS). The BMS is not a discount, but a payment toward the remaining o ut-of-pocket expense of a qualifying minister that receives their medical care at one of the five Wake Forest Baptist Health System hospitals.

It was noted during the November 2022 annual meeting of the Convention, that the BSCNC staff will evaluate the continued endorsement of the annual Mother's Day Offering – benefitting patients who cannot pay their medica I bills – and report their recommendations to the BSCNC Board of Directors no

Mother's Day Offering

The Annual Mother's Day Offering (MDO) is being received by churches across the Convention as this report is being written so we do not have final totals for these gifts. Our goal is \$650,000 and we thank

North Caro lina Baptists for their continued support of this offering. The MDO was established by the Hospital in 1924, and endorsed by the Convention during its annual meeting that same year. The purpose of the offering is to assist patients that often fall through the cracks: they make too much for other supports but struggle to pay their bills. Healthy Farmer Initiative - CareNet

CareNet Counseling has received a grant from the NC Agromedicine Institute that provides funds to pay for counseling for farmers, farm families, and farm workers in five (5) locations across North Carolina. From West to East, those locations are Wilkes County, Anson County, Robeson County, Duplin County, and Pitt County. To qualify, we have a very low threshold for income/expenses from agricultural work: individuals must only earn/lose \$1,000 per year in an agricultural pursuit to qualify for this funding. This income and expense threshold is intentionally very low I as the goal is to assist as many farmers, farm family mem bers, and farm workers as possible. In addition, we have developed a specialized Community Health Worker known as the Farm Health Connector that assists farmers, farm families, and farm workers as well. The Healthy Farmer Initiative is proving to be not only an effective partnership with the Agromedicine Institute but is being hailed as an innovative approach to addressing the mental health crisis taking place across rural North Carolina. As a result, I was invited to present a paper on our work to the International Society for Agricultural Safety and Health (ISASH) during the society's meeting in June in Tampa, Florida.

Ministers Assistance Plan - CareNet

Ministers serving churches affiliated with the Convention may qualify for financial assistance when they seek counseling through CareNet. The Minister's Assistance Plan will pay for counseling when a minister is uninsured, or underinsured. This assistance is also available to immediate family members (defined as the minister's spouse and dependent children under 18 still living within the home). The MAP applies to both in-person and telehealth services. For more information, please contact me at briadavi@wa kehealth.edu or by calling 336-413-9297.

New Opportunities

At the conclusion of 2022, the Federal Trade Commission gave final approval to the merger of Atrium Health with Advocate-Aurora Health; the combined healthcare system will now be known as Advocate Health. Advocate-Aurora Health is a health system with hospitals located across Illinois and Wisconsin. The new corporate offices of Advocate Health will be in Charlotte, with the executive leadership of the new health system hailing primarily from Atrium Health leadership. Advocate Health employs more than 150,000 teammates, making us the fifth largest non-profit healthcare system in the United States. The system includes 67 hospitals located in North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Wisconsin, and Illinois. Advocate Health's 21,000 doctors are joined by 42,000 nurses as we serve more than 6 million patients annually. With the expansion of the Wake Forest University School of Medicine to its second campus in downtown Charlotte, we now have one of the largest medical schools in the nation. Coupling clinical care, medical education, and research – led by the Innovation Quarter in Winston-Salem and soon to be joined by the Pearl Innovation District in Charlotte, Advocate Health is creating an

innovation corridor between Winston-Salem and Charlotte with the potential to bring new medical breakthroughs to market faster, impacting more lives quicker, and improving health more thoroughly than our founders could have ever dreamed 100 years ago.

Thank you for your continued partnership but most of all for your prayers. May the foundation, so expertly established by the Convention 100 years ago, continue to hold firm as Atrium Health Wake Forest Baptist enters its next century of service. We are many ministries beating with one heart — the heartbeat of Jesus.

Did you know: God has grown BCH from its roots as an orphanage to a sprawling non-profit organization that ministers to others from the first heartbeat to the last.

- BCH has locations in more than 35 communities in NC, SC and in Guatemala.
- BCH impacted 167,619 lives in 2022 through the support of NC Baptists.
- 80% of those we serve come to BCH unchurched and unreached for Jesus.
- There have been 661 professions of faith throughout the past five years.
- Through the EVERY CHILD Foster & Adopt Initiative, a partnership between BCH and NC Baptists, we train and license Christian couples to be foster families. We help churches to begin their own foster care ministries. There are more than 10,000 (Data from morethanenough.cafo.org) NC children in the state's foster care system who were removed from their homes for their protection. - BCH oversees an orphanage and cottage homes at Good Shepherd Ministries in Xela, Guatemala providing care to indigenous boys and girls who are abused and neglected.
- The ministry provides homes for intellectually/developmentally disabled adults.
- BCH operates the North Carolina Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM) serving senior adults. Visit recham.org
- It offers 24/7 residential wilderness camp ministries that are accredited, non-public schools. *Visit cameronboyscamp.org and campduncannc.org*
- BCH provides a supportive home for teen mothers and their babies.
- Family Care offers a residential program for single mothers needing support.
- Greater Vision Outreach aids immediate needs of community families in crisis and connects them with resources to achieve long term stability.
- HOMEBASE offers resources to college students with little to no family support.

Highlights and Future Efforts:

- Tirrell Discovers Family & Freedom, Accepts Christ: From isolation to salvation, Tirrell is experiencing family and freedom for the very first time. For years, he was confined in his childhood home never attending school and only being fed rice. His extreme situation was not discovered until he was almost a teen. Now, he has found his family through John and Erin Stuebe who were trained and licensed as foster parents through the EVERY CHILD Initiative, a partnership between BCH and NC Baptists. Through the couple's discipleship and church involvement, Tirrell accepted Christ on June 16. Tirrell's story is the focus of the Annual Offering. The Week of Prayer is November 5-12. The new video and offering resources are at bchoffering.org
- Emmanuel Home Welcomes First Resident: The new residential ministry for mothers who have chosen adoption for their babies, has its first resident. This birth mother comes from Eastern NC and has no family support. She found a job almost immediately.
- NC Baptists throughout the state collected more than \$500,000 in food, supplies and gift cards through the annual "Food Roundup."
- Bikers participating in "Ride to Clyde," the statewide motorcycle ride organized in partnership with NC Baptists, raised a record \$178,002.00.
- Efforts are in place for a new collaboration between BCH's Intellectual & Developmental Disabilities Ministry and NC Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM). This will bolster each ministry and continue to grow our services to the local community including the aging population as well as families with special-needs members.
- Two new Innovations in Special Needs Ministry: The first new effort is known as "Special Homes for Special Adults," known in the Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD) field as Alternative Family Living. This is where families or individuals open up their homes for a special needs adult to live. A family in Greensboro will be the first within this new model of care. The second new effort are Inclusion Classes at the Weekday Education center in Thomasville, one of the few places serving special needs children. Inclusion Classes are designed to mix special needs children with typically developing boys and girls so they help each other learn and grow.
- NC Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM) opened the first of its new "Care Villages" at BCH's Kennedy Home in Kinston with help from the Neuse Baptist Association and area churches. Plans are in place for a Care Village at the Baptist Convention building in Cary. NCBAM works with churches, aging-service providers, and others to bring services to Care Village members living in their own homes. This allows them to age "in community." Learn more at ncbam.org.

The Associational Partnerships Catalysts serve in a part-time permanent role to partner with the Associational Missions Conference Leadership Team, Associational Mission Strategists and Associations to develop and offer leadership, strategic and operational training across North Carolina. Serving in the three respective areas of the state, each catalyst works with each individual AMS as well as Associational Search, Vision and Strategy Teams. Regional AMS Roundtables meeting frequently offer another layer of connection for resources and relationships. Another important and powerful component introduced this year continues to be training of the Leadership Library and Pipeline with the help of Marcus Redding. The next phase of the Pipeline is to equip AMSs to share this tool with their pastors.

We are grateful to and for our Executive Director-Treasurer, Dr. Todd Unzicker, who engages our AMSs across the state frequently through the use of Zoom calls in order to keep a personal connection and offer updates and resources.

The 2 023 North Carolina Associational Missions Conference was held at Caraway Conference Center April 17-19, 2023. During the training for Potential and New AMSs offered on Monday morning, information was shared regarding support organizations who offer additional training and resources, a panel discussion with three veteran and three new AMSs addressing "Best Practices and Wisdom for Getting Started Well," and overview of the role of Associational Missions.

The following early bird sessions open to potential and current AMSs were offered: Roy Smith focused on "Pastor Search Team Tools" while Marcus Redding facilitated training regarding the "Multiplication Pipeline."

Baptist Retirement Homes Foundation would value the opportunity to share with your congregation, Senior Group or Mission Group about this vital ministry and areas of need among our senior adults. We have speakers across the state that would embrace the opportunity to engage with your church family, and we always welcome groups from your church to visit one of our communities and possibly provide ministry with our residents. Our "Medicine from the Heart" program also provides a great opportunity around engaging mission

groups, VBS participants, Sunday School Classes, etc. This initiative seeks to help older adults with limited financial resources purchase the medications they need. We will provide you with everything you need-medicine vials, collateral materials, and a speaker connected to the program if requested. Simply have your groups fill the vials with spare change, checks, or cash, then submit a gift for that total amount. This program touches lives in a direct and significant way. 

NCBAM was a warded another grant for long life smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms for adults 65+. The smoke alarms are intended to be installed in senior adult homes where there are no working smoke alarms or where the alarms are over 10 years of age. North Carolina Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM) BOOK OF REPORTS, 2023

The NCBAM Triangle Area Care Village (based at the Baptist State Convention building in Cary) celebrated its new space there by hosting a brunch for senior adult ministers in the area. This newest Care Village will be a resource for seniors in the area who wish to live independently while being part of a caring community of support. NCBAM is currently planning additional Care Villages in Thomasville and Shelby.

The third annual Camp BAM was held in July on the Mills Home campus in Thomasville. Forty-one volunteer campers completed six wheelchair ramps and provided other services to area seniors. Ramp materials were purchased with a grant NCBAM received from the American Rescue Plan Act.

Aging Well Conferences were held in Cary, Lewisville, and Asheville in the spring of 2023. These conferences address aging well spiritually, emotionally, and physically and are held across the state each spring.

NCBAM's State Leadership Conference was held in May in Winston-Salem. The conference kicked off a year-long exploration of strengthening intergenerational ministries within churches.



he longer I live, the more I am resolved that what matters most in life is that you please King Jesus. Nothing else is more important or more precious. When I consider what the Bible says about what is on Jesus's heart — what he is most pleased to see in us — my mind immediately goes to his Great Commission (Matt. 28:18-20) and to his High Priestly Prayer (John 17).

The Bible tells us in all four Gospels and in the book of Acts that what was on our resurrected Savior's heart was his Great Commission for his Church. Fill the Tank Campaign




New Online Giving Form

• In partnership with the Operations group, the group released a new online giving form, making it easier and more efficient for churches to give to missions and keep track of their contributions.

Children's Ministry

- Churches continue to become aware of the need for safety and security procedures in their children's and youth ministries. In response to this need Childhood Ministries and BOM Children's partnered to offer safety and security training across the state at four locations.
- There was a significant increase in the number of Individual churches and organizations requesting training for safety and security.
- As churches continue to struggle to restart discipleship training after COVID, requests for consultations for facility evaluations and leadership training are increasing.
- Bible Drill saw a 50% growth this past year.
- Regional drills/speakers tournaments were held at: Flint Hill Baptist, Shelby; Elizabeth Missionary, Roseboro; Lilesville Baptist, Lilesville. State Finals were held at Burkemont Baptist, Morganton. Nationals were held at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary Fort Worth, Texas. Our State Winners who attended Nationals represented North Carolina very well.
 - o Youth state winner: Peyton Woodell, Mt. Airy Baptist, Pembroke: Came in 1st place at Nationals and had a perfect score.
 - o High state winner: Annabelle Hamrick, Mt. Sinai, Shelby: Came in 2nd place at Nationals and had a perfect score.
 - o Speakers state winner: Liliana Locklear, Reedy Branch, Fairmont: Came in 2nd place at Nationals

College Ministry

- N.C. Baptists hosted The Call Conference March 24-26, 2023, in Black Mountain. We saw approximately 200 students and church staff in attendance.
- Pastor Ricky Harris Jr. from Hope Church, Las Vegas, Nev., challenged students to see the grace of God in their lives and count the cost of following Jesus. In breakout sessions, students were presented with opportunities to learn about discernment, stewardship, unmet expectations, mental health, the character of God, discipleship tools, international missions from IMB missionaries, SendNC church planting, and ministry residencies.
 - Faith Baptist Church in Youngsville reported, "One of our students took away from the conference that he is called to do hard things for Jesus. He literally changed his college decision to go to a place with more lostness that will push him to be a light for Jesus in a dark place." Brackston Rhyne of Hope Community Church (Gardner-Webb University '23) committed to a ministry residency after her time at The Call Conference. MaKinley Neill of Hope Community Church (Gardner-Webb University '23), committed to follow Jesus through baptism after her time attending The Call Conference.
 - o "Attending the Çall Conference was very timely for me, as I attended about two months before I graduated college. This time was vital to refreshing my faith and shifting my career focus from myself, to how I can honor God in the vocational world. I am now applying the many lessons I learned by knowing how to keep the gospel at the center as I navigate a career in Finance." Jordan Barnett, Wingate University '23
- We hosted a Leaders' Cohort gathering Jan. 9-10, 2023, in Burlington and another June 19-20, 2023, in Boone. The purpose of the cohorts is to facilitate community among those in similar ministry positions and contexts, provide opportunity to problem solve and improve ministries, and allow us to hear the challenges churches are facing on college campuses. The outcome of each event has been an increase in year-round collaboration and cooperation, sharing of resources like curriculum and events, and opportunity to invite more leaders into our network.

Church Health and Revitalization


Pastoral Wellness:

- We hosted two Replenish Retreats in September 2022 and May 2023 at Fort Caswell. Between the two retreats, over 50 couples attended and spent a few days focusing on replenishing their marriage, ministry and mission through times of worship, main sessions on various topics, small groups and a designated date night.
- This year, six Pastoral Wellness cohorts were established across the state with the purpose of connecting pastors and working through a personal Pastoral Vision frame.
- This year we partnered with five churches to provide sabbaticals for their pastors.
- We worked with two associations to provide events to encourage their pastors: one weekend retreat and a one-day Refresh Conference.
- Allan Blume hosted eight Transitional Interim Trainings across the state, training around 117 pastors.

Church Revitalization:

- Our N.C. Baptist partners have conducted 600 church health assessments over the last year. We have driven many of these assessments online for a shared database.
- We currently have over 210 churches in our revitalization process with 29 completing the process this year. Of those 29, over 80% are showing significant growth on our Missional Health Assessment.

• This year, we equipped 71 in our revitalization tools and processes. This effort has led to 21 church revitalization cohorts in 9 of 10 regions across the state, with 13 being new. These cohorts engage pastors to develop and deliver our Revitalization Process to their church.

Foster-Replant:

- We have directly coordinated over 20 Fosters, Replant, Mergers and Adoptions. Additionally, we have played a supporting role to numerous others.
- We have launched 11 Foster/Replant Teams over 7 regions across the state.
- We launched the Reconstruct Conference in January 2023 with 208 registered from numerous healthy and struggling churches across the state.

SendNC

- On Sept. 27 Todd Unzicker announced to our Board of Directors that N.C. Baptists had entered a new church planting partnership with the North American Mission Board. This co-branded partnership was named SendNC and would combine the work of the state conventions church planting team with the systems, structures and planter benefits that NAMB's Send Network provides.
- The SendNC worked in conjunction with the Send Network Assessment team to implement Send Network Assessment in North Carolina. Candidates, their spouses and their Sending Churches gather for the two-day assessment where our assessors observe, interview and determine the couples' readiness to plant. During this calendar year our assessment teams have assessed 19 candidates with 81% of candidates receiving a "Ready" recommendation.
- From July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023, we saw 48 new churches partner with SendNC and N.C. Baptists as a new church plant. All of these planters have an official N.C. Baptist Sending Church.
- The Lord continues to bring the nation as well as the nations to North Carolina, giving rise to the need for new "On Mission Together" churches across the state. Throughout the year, SendNC's multiple training pathways have trained 79 planters including English language (29), International (26), Korean (7), and Spanish speaking planters (17).

• The SendNC Team hosted 4 Sending Church Labs across the state (Winston Salem, Rocky Mount, New Bern, and Greensboro) serving and onboarding 106 churches as potential sending churches. The purpose of the Sending Church Labs is to help engaged N.C. Baptists understand what it means to be a sending church and how they might become a church that plants and sends.

Student Ministry


- The Momentum Tours began with the goal of assisting churches in equipping and training students to reach their generation with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We had stops in Morganton, Mars Hill, Brunswick, Rutherfordton, Murphy and Whiteville.
- Local churches and associations are continuing to see the need for revival in their student ministries. There was a significant increase in churches reaching out and wanting the Momentum Tour and more consultations for youth pastor training.
- Fall retreats were held in Black Mountain and Fort Caswell where 70 churches attended with 1336 in attendance. There were 65 first-time decisions, 84 rededications, and 30 called to ministry. The students learned what it meant to be a disciple maker and how to "act justly, to love faithfulness, and to walk humbly with your God."
- During 2022, students at Summer Youth Weeks studied "I consider my life worth nothing to me; my only aim is to finish the race and complete the task the Lord Jesus has given me the task of testifying to the good news of God's grace." We looked at Is Jesus worth it? Am I worth it? Is living the Christian life worth it? Is the church worth it? There were 5570 in attendance, with 228 churches represented. There were 412 first-time decisions, 1548 recommitments and 585 calls to ministry.

Worship Ministry

- The RenewingWorshipNC.org blog continues to get weekly updates with relevant resources to help our churches in all areas of worship.
- A continuing partnership with Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary and Fruitland Baptist Bible College offers training for worship leaders across our state, including options for undergraduate and graduate certification.
- A worship choir and orchestra of 135 members, made up of musicians from across our state, sings for the annual meeting and worship concerts in churches throughout North Carolina –The NC Baptist Singers & Orchestra.

- A new resource was created to help worship leaders transform the worship of their churches *The Worship Ministry Guidebook: Engaging Your Congregation in Transformational Worship.* The 282-page book is based on the curriculum of the worship leader training program mentioned above.
- Plans were made for the return of the Renewing Worship EXPO to be held in September 2023 to provide encouragement, resourcing and fellowship opportunities for all serving in the worship ministry in their churches.

Vacation Bible School

Vacation Bible School continues to be many churches' largest evangelistic ministry event each year. VBS offers opportunities to minister to children/families while discipleship and growth occur in their church as well as create outreach and open doors to share the gospel to children/families in surrounding communities.

- Our N.C. VBS Consultant & Training Team (total of 8 individuals) attended Lifeway's VBS Preview event in January 2023 where they were trained in sharing effective & exciting ways to lead Twists & Turns, a Lifeway curriculum that focused on "Following Jesus Changes the Game."
- Our VBS Consultant & Training Team wrote & recorded 11 Make it Matter VBS 2023 Training Videos to provide curriculum training options to churches/VBS Volunteers. These are located on the N.C. Baptist Children's Ministry Vimeo Channel and will be archived there so churches can reference them should they use past year's curriculum in the future.
- We offered **five VBS Lunch Bunch Zoom Training opportunities** where leaders/volunteers could gain insight and direction. Attendees experienced round table discussion on topics that included leading a child to Christ, Volunteer recruitment and appreciation, Budget VBS Decorating, VBS Curriculum Selection and VBS Follow-Up and Discipleship. These were taped & offered to individuals on a request basis should they be unable to attend.
- The **Go & Tell Mission Trip VBS** (transportable VBS) was trained & shared with several mission trip teams, so they were prepared to share the good news with kids/families.
- The NCVBS Facebook Community Page continues to thrive and has grown substantially to over 450 members this year. The goal and purpose of this Facebook group is to provide the best possible Vacation Bible School communication, connection and support to the large base of North Carolina VBS volunteers, leaders, church staff and N.C. associations. It stands as our strongest communication format.

• We were thrilled to offer five Associational VBS Training Clinics, with a variety of churches attending across the state, providing resources and training to VBS leaders, teachers and volunteers to aid them with the implementation of Vacation Bible School. In addition, for the first time we were able to offer a standalone Spanish/Bilingual inclusive VBS Training Clinic.

Compensation and Benefits Services (CABS)

The Compensation and Benefits Services (CABS) office exists to assist churches with financial and tax issues. We provide workshops and one-on-one meetings to help answer general questions regarding accounting, tax, compensation, retirement and insurance matters that impact our churches. Our goal is to keep our N.C. Baptist association offices and churches up-to-date on financial and tax changes that impact them. The following information is a summary of those efforts:

Retirement

- Educate and encourage church staff to understand the importance of being prepared for retirement. This process includes urging lay leaders to be responsible employers by providing retirement contributions for their staff members in a Christ-honoring manner.
- Present specific workshops to educate attendees how to prepare for retirement including financial and tax related timelines and options to maximize their resources in the future, and to protect their estates through planning.

Convention Protection Benefits

- Continue to offer disability survivor protection benefits to all eligible staff members of N.C. Baptist churches participating in the Church Retirement Plan through GuideStone.
- North Carolina continues to lead all state conventions in the number of participants, but we still fall far short of the goal of having every church providing protection benefits for their staff members through participating in a GuideStone Retirement Plan.

Tax and Health Insurance Laws

• GuideStone remains a leader in providing detailed information regarding the impact that new tax and health care laws have on our churches and their staff. Timely and thorough updates of changes in the tax law are available on the GuideStone website.

Church Staff Compensation

NC BAPTISTS

- We work with churches to present a flexible and robust compensation and benefits package to existing and prospective staff. CABS helps churches to see the disadvantages of providing their ministerial staff with the typical "lump sum pay packages." Such pay packages can cause a minister to be assessed more in taxes than originally intended.
- 2022 Southern Baptist Compensation Study results are available online by visiting the Lifeway website (www.compstudy.lifeway.com).

Mission:Dignity

- GuideStone Financial Resources continues to provide financial assistance to elderly ministers, church workers and their widows/widowers who live under financial duress and need ongoing and/or one-time assistance through Mission:Dignity.
- In 2023, the convention made an extra gift to Mission:Dignity so the 160+ N.C. recipients would receive a 13th check. The extra check was distributed in the spring of 2023.



State/National/International Mission Projects

Mission trips sponsored by Baptists on Mission are getting churches involved in serving those in our state, across our nation and around the world.

o **State:** At our Rebuild Centers and Mission Camps, lives are being changed as volunteers are serving those in need. Across North Carolina, homes are being rebuilt after a disaster, ramps are being built to provide accessibility, and volunteers are sharing the love of Christ.

NC BAPTISTS

- National: Many opportunities are available for churches to serve across our nation. Pennsylvania, Hawaii, New England, Rocky Mountain Region, Appaiachian Coalfields and Alaska are all places teams are being sent.
- o International: In Guatemala, Kenya, Armenia, Romania, Hungary, Ukraine, Cuba, Moldova, South Africa and other places, God is on the move. Teams are still serving in Ukraine and Moldova to bring relief and hope to refugees of the war.

Dental/Health Screening Ministries

Both the medical and dental units are used by churches and service organizations within North Carolina to serve those in need of health and dental care. The hope of these units is to meet physical needs which can open the door to share the love and message of Jesus.

- Approximately 4,000 people are seen on the two units each year.
- o Patients treated through these ministries include those who are facing poverty, people from various ethnic groups, farm workers, fair workers, the homeless, the elderly and more.

Children/Student Mobilization

- O Deep Impact Kids Missions Weeks, Mini-weeks, Weekends, One Day events are pre-packaged mission experiences. They provide elementaryage students and their leaders/parents with the opportunity to share the love of God with people in N.C.
- Deep Impact helps N.C. Baptist churches develop a comprehensive,
 co-ed youth missions strategy to produce committed followers of Christ.
 This strategy includes pre-packaged mission weeks, free online mission studies, weekend mission retreats, hands-on mission training and much more.
- Each of these ministries allow students/children to enjoy a great camp experience with a mission focus. The goal is to have participants develop a love for missions.

Disaster Relief and Recovery

This past year, N.C. Baptist Disaster Relief responded to nine events, five of which impacted North Carolina. Volunteers responded to Hurricane Fiona in Puerto Rico, Hurricane Ian in Florida, flooding in Kentucky and Vermont, tornadoes in Cherryville and Rocky Mount, N.C., power outages in Moore county, search and rescue efforts in Scotland county, and storms in Thomasville.

- o N.C. Baptists have six large disaster feeding units. The two largest units are capable of preparing and serving 30,000+ meals per day.
- O Disaster Relief now has more than 250 disaster recovery trailers (owned by local churches and associations) across the state. These are used for clean up and repair work after a disaster.
- God has provided six large shower units, three laundry units, a childcare unit, several large recovery units, large generator units and lots of other disaster relief equipment.

Baptists on Mission Events

- The annual Missions Conference, sponsored by Baptists on Mission, includes music, testimonies, speakers, breakout sessions, mission fair exhibits, a volunteer supper and much more. We desire for participants to be spiritually renewed and inspired to become involved in missions locally and worldwide. We want to encourage and equip every Christian to live as a missionary.
- o Regional Rallies take place in all 10 regions of our state. They are offered annually in February and August. These rallies are open for all men, women and youth interested in missions locally, nationally and internationally. Regional Rallies are designed to celebrate and challenge N.C. Baptists across the state to greater mission involvement and promote the North Carolina Missions Offering.

We are with the help of Paul Langston with the Baptist on Mission and the USDA currently providing 41 of our seniors with an extra box of food each month, we are on a 3-year program with this and it allows up to help our seniors with extra food. We have no FEMA money coming in currently. We are in hopes it comes in soon so we can help with electric bill and heat. We have had a few folks donate funds for fuel assistance. If you are sending monies for fuel assistance, please write fuel assistance in the memo line. We appreciate any and all assistance. We are having our first Volunteer Dinner for the first time in a couple of years! This will take place on October 11, 6:30pm at Friendly Grove Baptist Church. Everyone bring a covered dish and enjoy the meal and fellowship. God has blessed us with wonderful volunteers and we appreciate each of them. Rev. Russell Hart spoke about the Debt Reduction Offering coming on Sunday, October 16th. This offering will go towards paying the mortgage debt for the Ashe Baptist Complex. Last year, the total offering was \$23,678, we exceeded our goal of \$20,000. Hopefully we can come close to the same amount this year, and possibly eliminate the debt in the next couple of years. The ARC could not operate without them. The ARC thanks churches, and individuals for donating clothing and household items, food and monetary donations also your assistance also helps up help others. Lots of churches gave food items for Thanksgiving and Christmas as well as Food Lion donated turkeys. This helped several neighbors have nice holiday meals. ARC was blessed with \$50 gift cards to Food Lion for extra food during the holiday season. Project Star also provided more food and needs to several of our neighbors were blessed with during the giving season. Some receive monetary aid for electric bills. Donations were very good for

Again this year the ARC received \$4335 from AEV, these funds are contributed by employees of AEV and matched by the company. ARC is one of the top five recipients of this funds. Powers read scripture from Luke 23:6 ... Rev. Powers reminds us that the Lord went through a for us, because of love. Jesus covered our sins on the cross at Calvary. Rev. Powers closed with prayer.

Debbie Miller, presented the Roll Call with 14 churches being represented. Mrs. Miller then presented the minutes from the January- March 2023 Executive Meeting. Debbie asked everyone to read over the minutes as we would be voting to approve them in the Business Section of this meeting. Ms. Miller, also presented the 3rd Quarter- January - March Treasurer's Report. Income from churches for the 3rd quarter totaled \$17,114.07. We do appreciate all churches who financial support the association, thank you. The Ending Balance was \$16,366.66 on March 31,2023. Current Debt Reduction total is \$15,803.00 and mortgage balance on March 31,2023 was \$48,207.71. The budget is looking good with the 4th quarter coming up our Budget Balance is \$28,916.21. Our average expenses per quarter is @ \$28,916.21. This Report will also be voted on for approval in the Business Section of the meeting.

Rev. Allen Huffman, Moderator asked Pat Miller for the Ashe Really Cares Report.

Mrs. Pat Miller, presented the Ashe Really Cares report. In the 3rd quarter Ashe Really Cares served 373 families, 826 individuals, 19 new neighbors with food. 578 families were served with clothing. Souper Bowl Donations collected were 5,826 food items, and \$3,690 in monetary donations. Pat would like to thank all the churches and individuals that gave in the Souper Bowl Drive. Appalachian State University Group is doing a food drive to be delivered to the ARC, our Local Boy Scout Troop 221 collected 223 pounds of food for the ARC also. We appreciate all our donations they help us help those in need. We are still giving out 41 Senior Boxes through Baptist On Missions to some of our seniors each month. Our neighbors love fresh vegetables, so as you plant your gardens, please plant a row for the ARC. Our neighbors would greatly appreciate good fresh vegetables as they are no longer able to tend a garden. We are thankful for our winter assistance. Donations were made for fuel assistance and we were able to help 25 families. FEMA assistance (Phase 39) assisted 49 families this winter to be able to keep their electric on. Phase 40 will be coming soon; this will also allow us to assist more families. David applies for the NC Hunger Fund each year, we were approved and will receive \$750.00 for each quarter of the year. We not only aid neighbors with food and clothing, but also with household items and furniture. Volunteers are a necessity for the ARC, and we appreciate each one of them, ladies that sort clothes and hang them, the ladies that work in the food room, the fellows who pick up food each day, we could not make it without our volunteers, so thank you Volunteers very much! Butch spoke on How we need to stand on God's Word in the day we are living and then led us to the Lord in prayer.

Debbie Miller, presented the Roll Call with 12 churches being represented. Mrs. Miller then presented the minutes from the April-June 2023 (4th Quarter). Debbie asked everyone to read over the minutes as we would be voting to approve them in the Business Section of this meeting. Ms. Miller, also presented the 4th Quarter- April - June Treasurer's Report. Income from churches for the 4th quarter totaled \$18,514.89. We do appreciate all churches who financial support the association, thank you. The Ending Balance was \$19,424.46 on June 30, 2023. Current Debt Reduction total is \$15,803.00 and mortgage balance on June 30, 2023 was \$45,046.49. We did go over our 2022-2023 budget by a small amount. Our average expenses per quarter is @ \$28,859.05. This Report will also be voted on for approval in the Business Section of the meeting.

Rev. Allen Huffman, Moderator called Rev. Curtis Presnell for a report on his attendance at the Southern Baptist Convention. In his absence, Rev. David Blackburn, DOM mentioned he had spoken with Rev. Presnell and he was glad he was able to attend the Convention, he thought he was great. Rev. Presnell is the pastor at Riverview Baptist Church and also does the "Hope After Dope Ministry."

Rev. Allen Huffman, Moderator asked Pat Miller for the Ashe Really Cares Report.

Mrs. Pat Miller, presented the Ashe Really Cares report. Thank you to each church and individual that donates to the ARC, pray for our neighbors as we have a lot of hurting folks that need God. Pray the feel and see the love of God through us. Midway Baptist VBS visited the ARC in July, some had visited before, others had not, they enjoyed the tour. In the 4th quarter the ARC served 376 families, 858 individuals and 22 new families. For the 2022-2023 year the ARC served 1035 families, 2035 individuals, 61 new families with not only food but clothing also. The ARC through NC Baptist on Mission is still providing Senior Boxes that help 41 senior neighbors with an extra box of food. We received the NC Hunger Fund Grant of \$750 that David applies for, this helps us buy extra food needed. FEMA Funds Phase 39 and 40 have been received and monies will be used for electric and heat in the colder months coming. We do receive clothing donations monetary donations, food and produce from individuals and our local churches, we appreciate and thank all you help keep the ARC stocked. We also received some funds to purchase food with from Second Harvest, they also provide food, along with Food Lion and our Souper Bowl Drive this year, that drive provided 3690 cans of food and \$5,826. We are making some improvements at the ARC, the gravel part of the parking lot will be paved in late August, also we have had some pressure washing done and some painting that will be done. The ARC fan is going to be repainted. It still serves us well and we want to take care of it to keep it in good working order. As always, we appreciate our volunteers, we are looking for a couple of men, or a just a couple of folks to help us with food pick-up, just call the office for details. We appreciate Nathan, with his duties he is also picking up food now since we are short a few food pick-up volunteers. Thank you.

Rev. David Blackburn, DOM presented his Missions Strategist Report for the 4th quarter. Rev. Blackburn thanks everyone for supporting the Ashe Baptist Association, NC Baptists and missions around the world. Thanks to our churches and individuals for your support, we could not do it with out you. Thanks to Debbie and Pat at the ARC for their work.

Moderator, Rev. Allen Huffman welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order by asking Mr. Butch Miller and Rev. Alan Ambrose to lead the congregation in "To God Be The Glory."

Rev. John Elledge, Pastor of Bald Mountain Church welcomed everyone to the Annual Meeting held at Bald Mountain Baptist Church. Rev. Elledge use the theme verse from Psalm 122:1 for the devotion. "I was glad when they said unto me, Let us go into the house of the Lord". Are you glad to be in the House of God. It should be a delight to us, not a duty to be in House of God. We should be like David, rejoicing, excited to be in the presence of the Lord. Let us make it a practice to say, I was glad when they said unto me. Let us go into the house of the Lord. Walk in, rejoicing and praising the Lord. The congregation repeated Psalm 122:1 and Rev. Elledge led the congregation in prayer.

The moderator continued by calling for the seating of the messengers, adopting the order of business, which comes from the committee. The vote was taken and the adoption of the order of business was approved. The moderator then recognized all visitors and speakers for the meeting, and new Pastors since last year; Rev. Matthew Tilley, Pastor at North Beaver Baptist Church was recognized as new pastor. Moderator mentioned that Committee Appointments are on Page 14. These were brought by a committee, all were approved. Association Clerk, Debbie Miller called the roll of churches with 57 messengers present representing 23 churches.

Mrs. Diane Roark, Member at Bald Mountain Baptist presented the history of the church. After another hymn led by Butch Miller and Rev. Ambrose, Rev. Ambrose ask if to think of all the things God has and is doing for us. We then sang," O Praise The Name". The afternoon message was presented by Rev. Homer Murdock, pastor of God's Will Missionary Baptist Church. Rev. Murdock read Matthew 14: 22-23 and Luke 18: 31-34. Message is to encourage young preachers. God's Purpose is never Man's Purpose! Do you ever feel like quitting? God knows and sees your struggle. When God does a miraculous work, don't let your focus get off on who did the work. Avoid the great failure trying to do it on your own, follow God's will. The Great Rescue, even when you fail Jesus has already written the story of you restoration. When storms come your way, remember you are not done, don't quit! Don't let Satan use your failures to keep you from doing God's work now.

After the sermon and the hymn, All Hail The Power, the moderator presented the Administrative Committees for 2023-2024 from pages 11-13 in the book of reports. No discussion on the committees, all were approved by vote. The Proposed Budget and Treasurer's report on pages 55-56 was presented by Debbie Miller who also asked for anyone with questions to check with DOM, Rev. Blackburn, Rev. Russell Hart, Chairman of the Finance Committee or herself.

Debbie thanks churches for their faithful financial support to the association. The proposed budget will be voted on during the business session on Saturday. The Debt Reduction Offering last year was \$15,803, which along with the monthly mortgage payments has brought the mortgage balance down to \$45,046.49. Rev. Russell Hart, Chairman of the Finance Committee announces it is his last year on the Finance Committee. He explains the increase in budget on page 55 is due to these changes: VBS has been reduced due to Covid changing the way folks do VBS. Printing and supplies increased, Under DOM Salaries and Allowances, DOM utilities increased. Office Assistant increased due to Debbie's salary increase. She took only \$18,900 her first year (2020-2021) and the remainder of the salary went to the mortgage. 2021-2022 was \$19,650.00 She can now make what she could not, due to SS limits, so we hope to give her back what she could not take. This increase will be \$12.94 per hour and a 40 hour work week. Proposing the increase in the budget from \$114,708.00 to \$121,471.00. (Special Offering for Debt Reduction) Last year's offering was \$15, 803.00, the year before was \$23,678. The Association Debt Offering began two years ago, when Russell started on the Finance Committee the mortgage debt was \$101,000 and so many dollars, today it is a little less than \$45,000. We will have one more (special offering) debt reduction offering this year, it will be on Sunday, October 15th, this short amount of time we have cut the debt in half, the goal is by next year to be debt free, it can be done, the answer lies in your pocketbooks. Association has no way to increase their budget. The only way the association can get money is to ask for it, it is hard to ask for money, so Russell states he is asking for it for the association. If all churches take up \$20,000 this October 15 or your choice of dates. Russell believes by spring of 2024 the debt can be eliminated. Churches can survive without the association, but the association can't survive without the churches, it is totally dependent on the what churches give, association is totally dependent on what churches give. There are no set rules, churches do what they do, it is not unbiblical to tithe e to the association as a church. The association is there as right arm to reach men, women, boy and girls with the gospel of Jesus Christ, first and foremost. Association is there to help churches with spreading the gospel. If we lose the association let's shut down. If we lose the business of preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ, we just shut it down. On behalf of the association, thank you. (Proposed Budget and Treasurer's Report are attached to these minutes). Moderator, Rev. Allen Huffman asks if there is any discussion as these items will be voted on tomorrow, Saturday's Session. With no discussion, we move on to reports.

Nine Representatives from the NC Baptist in Cary, NC came and gave their reports of which all are in the Book of Reports. Each representative brought greetings from Cary and gave appreciation and thank you's for our Ashe Baptist Associational Churches giving and supporting the Co-Operative Program, from where their programs do receive a portion of the monies given to the Co-Operative Program. A couple of the programs supported by the Co-operative Program such as the NC Baptist on Missions are allowed to have an annual offering this one is in September called NC Missions Offering which helps the Baptist on Missions, enabling them to help many others in various situations and locations: and sharing the gospel, also the Baptist Children's Home does an annual offering along with the Food Drive which is stocks 80% of their shelves annually.

Those representatives attending were: Great Commission Catalyst Regions 9 &10, Rev. Steve Harris (report page 25), Rev. Paul Langston with NC Baptist On Mission (report pages 26-28), Rev. Chris Allen representing Southeast Seminary (report page 54), Rev. Jody Yopp with NC Baptist Children's Homes (report pages 45-46), Rev. Dr. Brian Davis representing, NC Baptist Hospital-Atrium Health/FaithHealth (report pages 40-42), Ms. Angie Gregg with NC Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM) (report pages 51-52), Mr. Wesley Berry representing NC Baptist Retirement Homes (report pages 47-48, Rev. Allen Schulyer representing NC Baptist Foundation (report page 53), and Dr. Rev. Lester Evans, Western Catalyst and giving the Report for the Associational Partnerships Catalysts for 2023 (report pages 47-48).

Rev. Tilley encourage us live in liberty as verse 13 says, to stand firm and don't go down the wrong path. Our churches are called to liberty, we cannot use the law as an excuse to sin. Christ secured our freedom on the cross may we never forget. Christ showed us what selfless love look like. We shall love our neighbor, serve each other, let the Holy Spirit lead us truly standing with Christ who has made us free, resisting the shackles Jes us has freed us from.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

- 1. We believe in one true and living God, and that there are three Persons in the God-head; the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.
- 2. We believe that the Bible, the Old and New Testament, is the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the impotency of man and the sovereignty of God.

4. We believe that Salvation is by Grace through Faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances instituted by Jesus to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator, and that those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and doctrine should take the Lord's Supper.

7. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints in Grace and Glory.

- 8. We believe in a separate resurrection and judgment, both for the righteous, and unrighteous dead.
- 9. We believe that the existence of the righteous and the wicked will both be of eternal duration, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

CHURCH COVENANT

Having been led as we believe, by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now, in the presence of God, angels and the assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into this covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.

We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this church, in knowledge, holiness and comfort to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain worship, ordinances, discipleship and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the church and the relief of the poor; and the spread of the Gospel through all nations.

We also engage to maintain family and secret devotions; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealing, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting, and excessive anger, to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense but always ready for reconciliation; and mindful of the rule of our Saviour to secure it without delay.

We moreover engage that when we remove from this place we will, as soon as possible, unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this covenant and the principles of God's Word

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS PREAMBLE

For the purpose of preserving, propagating, and making articulate the principles of our faith and to the end that this body of cooperating churches may be governed in an orderly manner, consistent with the accepted tenets of associations of Missionary Baptist Churches, for the purpose of preserving the liberties inherent in each individual church, and in order to set forth the relationship of this body to other Baptist bodies, we do adopt and establish this Constitution.

Article I - Name and Membership

Section 1. This body shall be called the Ashe Missionary Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall consist of all Missionary Baptist Churches in Ashe County, and communities closely adjacent thereto, of like faith and practice, who wish to affiliate with this Association and are loyal to the faith and practice of the Missionary Baptist Denomination.

Section 3. The membership of this body shall be the pastor and three (3) messengers from each church. A letter certifying their appointment and giving the statistics of the membership and work of the church shall be sent to the Associational office at least twenty (20) days before the opening session of the annual meeting.

Section 4.Any church reported to be irregular in faith or practice may be investigated by order of the Association and such action taken, as may be decided by the Association.

Section 5. The Association shall be sole judge of its membership and may receive churches according to the Association's Constitution and By-Laws. Any church in the Association, which fails to cooperate with the Association for two consecutive years, shall be contacted by the Executive Committee to ascertain the wishes and desires of the church relative to its continuance in the Association. A Cooperating church should be defined as one which sends a report (church letter) to the annual session, is represented (by messengers) at the annual session, represented (by Executive Committee members) at the regularly scheduled Executive Committee meetings, contributes to the financial program of the Association, and is in general sympathy with the purposes of the Association. The Association recognizes that any affiliated church has the right to withdraw its fellowship from the Association.

Article II - Purpose

Section 1. The purpose of this Association shall be an organized effort to unite the churches of the Association in devising and promoting measures and programs for the spread of the gospel in our bounds and in all the world, in compliance with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article III - Annual Church Letters (Annual Church Profile)

Section 1. The churches shall report annually statistical and general information upon a printed form furnished by the Associational office. The printed form shall be furnished to the church at least six weeks before the convening of an annual session of the Association and returned to the Associational office at least twenty (20) days before the opening session of the annual meeting.

Article IV - Officers and their Duties

Section 1.The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Missionary, and the heads of such organizations as are set up and approved by the Association. The offices of Clerk and Treasurer may be the same person, at the discretion of the body.

Section 2.It shall be the duty of the Moderator of the Association (Vice-Moderator in his absence or disability) to preside over the annual sessions and all special sessions, including the meetings of the Executive Committee. As the presiding officer, he shall open the meetings punctually at the appointed time, enforce the rules, preserve the order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall name the committees and representatives of Institutions and agencies described in Sections 5, 6, and 8 of Article V of the Constitution at the opening of the annual session. He shall be elected for a one-year term, and he cannot succeed himself after the second consecutive term.

Section 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of all proceedings of the Executive committee meetings, annual meetings, and make such available to the body and the Associational Missionary for printing and distribution.

Section 4. The treasurer shall have charge of all Associational funds as the Association may direct and make a report of receipts and disbursements at each annual meeting.

- Section 5. (1) The Associational Missionary shall be elected upon a recommendation of the Committee on Missions, and by a vote of the Association at a regular scheduled meeting. The relationship between the Association and its Associational Missionary may be terminated following a reasonable notice of not less than 30 days.
- (2) The Associational Missionary shall promote the work and witness of the Association and denomination, cooperating with the churches, their pastors and officers and Associational committees and organizations.
 - A. He shall be responsible for planning, promoting and executing the ministry of the Association in cooperation with the Committee on Missions.
 - B. He shall make an annual report to the Association at the August meeting

Article IV - Officers and their Duties (continued)

He shall be ex-officio member of all committees of the Association, serving in an advisory and/or resource capacity.

D. He shall seek to visit each church in the Association in order to:

Encourage and strengthen the ministry of the churches. (2)

- Enhance the cooperative relationship between the churches and (3)the Association
- E. He shall, when necessary, conduct surveys or inquiries, in order to determine specific needs for ministry with the area of the Association.
- He shall, upon request, provide a list of qualified persons who may be considered by churches seeking pastors.
- He shall have full administrative responsibility for all personnel employed by the Association.

Strengthen Program Organizations

Promote evangelism and church growth through total church (1)organizations. Provide needed helps to enable churches to become better equipped in areas of church ministry.

Promote Missions

- Encourage and lead in mission commitment of member churches (1)utilizing Bold Mission Thrust Plans, by creating awareness to mission opportunities, new work, and by assisting in the development of church mission development programs, church extension, language missions, Christian social ministries, chaplaincy ministries, interfaith witness and special mission ministries.
- Give high priority to reaching the many unreached Hispanics (2)through existing churches and in new work.

J. Develop Leadership

Encourage and provide support for development and improvement (1) in areas of church, ministry, dealing with crisis times, leadership, and supervision skills, etc. Approaches will include family ministry, seminary extensions, workshops and conferences for church secretaries, church clerks (Uniform Church Letter), non-salaried and salaried leaders, music workshops, pastors' retreats, and ethnic leadership development.

K. Nurture Fellowship:

- Nurture fellowship among member churches. (1)
- The Associational Missionary is entitled to two weeks vacation (2)annually. Upon completion of five years service, the Associational Missionary shall be entitled to three weeks annual vacation, and after ten years, four weeks annual vacation. Vacation is to be taken within the calendar year, and it is not accumulative.

Should there occur at any time a grievance on the part of the (3)Association of the Associational Missionary, either party may consult with the Moderator and Chairman of the Missions

Committee.

Article IV - Officers and their Duties (continued)

Section 6. The officers of the other organizations within the Association shall be nominated by their respective organizations and their names furnished, and presented to the Association for action at each annual session.

Section 7. The officers designated in Section 1, the Associational Missionary excepted, shall be elected at the morning session of the first day of the annual meeting and shall assume their duties at the close of the annual meeting, at which they are elected, and serve until the close of the next session.

Article V - Committees and Their Duties

Section 1.The committees of the Association shall be: Executive Committee, Committee on New Churches, Program Committee,
Committee on Place and Preacher, Resolutions Committee, Missions Committee,
Nominating Committee, and such other committees as the Association may designate and name at any annual session. All committee members will serve for a period of three (3) years. Initially each committee will, with the consent of each member, designate which committee member will serve the three- (3) year, two (2) year, and one (1) year term. After the completion of a term, no member shall be eligible for re-election to the committee until after the lapse of one year.

Section 2. The Associational Executive Committee shall be composed of one lay member of all churches, the pastors of such churches, and the officers of the Association, as listed under Section 1 of Article IV. Twelve members of this committee shall constitute a quorum to transact business, after notice of such meeting has been mailed, or otherwise given to all members of the committee at least three days prior to the proposed meeting. Members of this committee shall be elected by the churches annually.

Section 3. The Committee on Organized Churches shall consist of the Moderator, ex officio, three pastors, and three lay-persons. This committee shall be responsible for receiving letters of application for membership into the Association by organized Missionary Baptist Churches. This committee's responsibility shall be to communicate to applying churches the requirements of a cooperating church, as herein defined in Article I, section 5, paragraph 2 of the Ashe Baptist Association Constitution. Applying churches, upon recommendation of this committee, shall, with approval of the messengers at the annual session, serve one year under watch care of the Association. This committee shall work with this church during this period and then make final recommendations at the next annual meeting.

Section 4. The Program Committee shall consist of five members who shall prepare an order of business for the annual meeting, including the designating of persons to make reports as to the various objects supported by the Churches of the Association. The Associational office shall prepare copies of the same for distribution to those attending the annual sessions of the Association.

Article V - Committees and Their Duties (continued)

Section 5. The Committee on Place and Preacher shall consist of three members, who may be appointed by the Moderator, with consent of the Association. At each annual session, this Committee shall recommend to the Association a place, or places, for the holding of the annual meeting of the Association, and shall designate a minister to deliver the Associational sermon and an alternate.

Section 6. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of three members to be appointed by the Moderator. This Committee shall prepare and submit to the Association such resolutions, as it may consider pertinent and proper for the good of the body.

Section 7. The Nominating Committee shall name a Nominating Committee of five (5) members who shall bring to the second Executive Committee of the calendar year, (which is normally in April), for election of the following nominations: Clerk, Youth Director, Brotherhood Director, Discipleship Training Director, Evangelism Chairperson, Moderator, Music Director, Seminary Extension Director, Sunday School Director, and others who are invited to receive training at the Key Leadership Conference by the Baptist State Convention, (which is normally in May).

This Committee shall also present at the annual meeting for election all of the other committee members which are covered herein. Organizational heads will be named by their respective organizations and presented to the Nominating Committee at least two weeks before their nominations are presented to the Executive Committee at their

second meeting, (which is normally in April).

If the organizations do not present their respective organizational heads two weeks prior to the April Executive Committee, then the Nominating Committee will select those needed and present their names to the second Executive Committee meeting (normally in April). The chairman of the Nominating Committee will contact these organizational heads before making these selections to be sure they have not already selected someone.

All other nominations shall be presented and elected on the first day of the annual meeting of the Association. All nominations at the Executive Committee meeting and the annual meeting are subject to additional nominations from the floor, and the expressed will of the Association.

Section 8. The Moderator is authorized and directed to appoint suitable persons at each session to prepare and present to the next session reports on the various subjects and causes customary to be presented and to notify such persons in due time before the meeting of the Association. (Refer to Article IV, Section 2.)

Section 9.The Board of Directors of the Ashe Baptist Summer Camp shall consist of nine members who shall initially be chosen three (3) for one year, three (3) for two years, and three (3) for three years.

Of the said members, three shall be active pastors in the Association. After the completion of one term, no member shall be eligible for re-election to this board until after the lapse of one year. No more than one member of this board shall be chosen from any one church of the Association. The treasurer of the Ashe Baptist Summer Camp, (who shall serve in addition to the nine member Board of Directors), shall be elected by the Board of Directors on an indefinite basis. Helshe shall have voting privileges, as do other members.

Article V - Committees and Their Duties (continued)

It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to cooperate with the officials, pastors, and Executive Committee of the Association in promoting and advancing the development and operation of the camp; to supervise and direct the work of the camp; and to make a report to the Association at each annual meeting. Vacancies occurring in this organization shall be filled in accordance with the provision of Section 7 thereof.

Section 10. The Mission Committee shall consist of seven (7) members, five (5) of which shall be heads of the following organizations: Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Brotherhood, WMU and Church Music. The names of these five (5) shall be submitted to the Associational Nominating Committee by their respective organizations and voted on by the full body on the first day of the annual meeting. The other two (2) members shall be active pastors in the Association and they shall be named by the Associational Nominating Committee. They too shall be elected along with the organizational heads. Should any of the before mentioned organizations fail to submit the name of a person nominated by themselves to serve as head of that organization, then the Associational Nominating Committee shall be responsible for nominating that person.

These seven (7) people shall constitute the Associational Missionary Search Committee, when such a need arises. This Committee shall work with the Associational Missionary in promoting the work of the Association and lead and assist in determining need for beginning new missions stations and organizing new churches. The Moderator and Associational Missionary shall be ex officio members of this committee.

Section 11. The Ordination Committee shall consist of five (5) members, all of whom must be ordained ministers, meeting the qualifications as stated in I Timothy 3:1-7, and who are members of cooperating churches of the Ashe Baptist Association. The Chairman, at his discretion, may invite the pastor of a candidate to sit with the committee. Churches of the Association desiring to ordain a preacher to the Gospel ministry, and desiring to use the services of the Ordination Committee of the Ashe Baptist Association, shall use the following procedure.

- 1. The Church in conference shall vote to ask the Ordination Committee to examine the candidate and so notify the chairman.
- 2. The candidate shall meet the following conditions before ordination:
 - (a) Hold membership in a cooperating Missionary Baptist church.
 - (b) Shall have held a license to preach, issued by a cooperating Missionary Baptist Church for not less than six months.
- 3. The chairman shall set a suitable time and place, notifying the members, for the examination.
- 4. The candidate shall be examined as to his conversion, call to the ministry, doctrinal beliefs, and attitude toward our denomination and its programs.
- 5. The Committee Chairman shall notify the church of its recommendations and they may proceed with the ordination.

Section 12. The Evangelism Committee, composed of 5 members, shall promote the work of Evangelism in the churches and the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs are to be subject to the approval of the Association, or its Executive Committee.

Article V - Committees and Their Duties (continued)

- Section 13. The Nominating Committee shall nominate a Committee on Constitution and By-Laws consisting of five members, of which the first named shall serve as chairman. It shall be the duty of this committee to receive, examine and make recommendations to the Association on all proposed amendments to the Constitution or the By-Laws.
- Section 14. The Nominating Committee shall nominate a Properties Committee, which shall consist of three members, and shall have the responsibility of recommending the purchase of necessary property, and the construction of necessary buildings. This Committee shall recommend any repairs and improvements needed on Associational property beyond normal repair. All recommendations are subject to approval by the Executive Committee between sessions or the full-body session.
- Section 15. The Committee on Finance, composed of five (5) members and the treasurer; shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise and develop plans for securing the cooperation of churches in providing funds to meet the budget. The treasurer will submit a complete financial report at the annual meeting in August.
- Section 16. The Committee on Youth shall be composed of at least nine (9) members, three (3) of whom shall be ministers. The Chairman, also called "Youth Director," shall be selected from within their own ranks. The Committee shall be concerned with ways of relating youth to the churches of the Association and shall lead the Churches and Association to plan programs and activities that will meet their needs.
- Section 17. The Seminary Extension Committee, composed of five (5) members, shall work with the chairman of the Committee to plan, promote and implement the offering of such courses of study as will meet the needs of pastors and lay-persons in the areas of Biblical studies, historical theology, Baptist life, church administration, Christian education, and pastoral training.
- Section 18: There shall be five (5) trustees of the Association. They shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the said Association. Trustees shall be elected for an indefinite term and shall serve at the pleasure of the Association.
- Section 19. The Associational Historian, in his/her sole discretion, shall collect facts of interest to the Association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual session of the Association. In addition, he/she shall contact hosting churches of the annual meeting and request a brief history of each church for publication in the Book of Reports and the Associational Annual.

Article VI Meetings and Reports

Section 1. The Association shall hold an annual meeting convening in the month of August of each year, at such time and place as may be designated or authorized by the previous session.

Section 2. Each organization within the Association shall make a written report to the Association at each annual meeting.

Section 3. A special session of the Association may be called by the Moderator with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The Associational Executive Committee shall meet quarterly.

Article VII Order of Religious Exercises

Section 1. At the annual meeting the Associational Sermon shall be delivered as herein before provided.

Section 2. In addition to the Associational Sermon, the Program Committee shall designate a minister to deliver at least one other sermon each day the Association is in session and all business shall be suspended while such sermons are being delivered. No sermon shall be scheduled so as to conflict or interfere with the business sessions of the Association or the presentation of reports to the Association.

Article VIII Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present, and voting on the second day, provided that such amendment is presented in writing on the first day, or that notice of such amendment shall have been given during the previous annual session.

I. The Scriptures

The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. Therefore, all Scripture is totally true and trustworthy. It reveals the principles by which God judges us, and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. All Scripture is a testimony to Christ, who is Himself the focus of divine revelation.

II. God

There is one and only one living and true God. He is an intelligent, spiritual, and personal Being, the Creator, Redeemer, Preserver, and Ruler of the universe. God is all powerful and all knowing; and His perfect knowledge extends to all things, past, present, and future, including the future decisions of His free creatures. To Him we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. The eternal triune God reveals Himself to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

1. God the Father

God as Father reigns with providential care over His universe, His creatures, and the flow of the stream of human history according to the purposes of His grace. He is all powerful, all knowing, all loving, and all wise. God is Father in truth to those who become children of God through faith in Jesus Christ. He is fatherly in His attitude toward all men.

2. God the Son

He was raised from the dead with a glorified body and appeared to His disciples as the person who was with them before His crucifixion. He ascended into heaven and is now exalted at the right hand of God where He is the One Mediator, fully God, fully man, in whose Person is effected the reconciliation between God and man. He will return in power and glory to judge the world and to consummate His redemptive mission. He now dwells in all believers as the living and ever present Lord.

3. God the Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of God, fully divine. He inspired holy men of old to write the Scriptures. Through illumination He enables men to understand truth. He exalts Christ. He convicts men of sin, of righteousness, and of judgment. He calls men to the Saviour, and effects regeneration. At the moment of regeneration He baptizes every believer into the Body of Christ. He cultivates Christian character, comforts believers, and bestows the spiritual gifts by which they serve God through His church. He seals the believer unto the day of final redemption. His presence in the Christian is the guarantee that God will bring the believer into the fullness of the stature of Christ. He enlightens and empowers the believer and the church in worship, evangelism, and service.

III. Man

Man is the special creation of God, made in His own image. He created them male and female as the crowning work of His creation. The gift of gender is thus part of the goodness of God's creation. In the beginning man was innocent of sin and was endowed by his Creator with freedom of choice. By his free choice man sinned against God and brought sin into the human race. Through the temptation of Satan man transgressed the command of God, and fell from his original innocence whereby his posterity inherit a nature and an environment inclined toward sin. Therefore, as soon as they are capable of moral action, they become transgressors and are under condemnation. Only the grace of God can bring man into His holy fellowship and enable man to fulfill the creative purpose of God. The sacredness of human personality is evident in that God created man in His own image, and in that Christ died for man; therefore, every person of every race possesses full dignity and is worthy of respect and Christian love.

IV. Salvation

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by His own blood obtained eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation includes regeneration, justification, sanctification, and glorification. There is no salvation apart from personal faith in Jesus Christ as Lord.

1. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of God's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit through conviction of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace.

Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God. Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as Lord and Saviour.

- Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of His
 righteousness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings
 the believer un to a relationship of peace and favor with God.
- 2. Sanctification is the experience, beginning in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to God's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual maturity through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue P.131 sughout the regenerate person's life.

3. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.

V. God's Purpose of Grace

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, justifies, sanctifies, and glorifies sinners. It is consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is the glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility.

All true believers endure to the end. Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sanctified by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end. Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirit, impair their graces and comforts, and bring reproach on the cause of Christ and temporal judgments on themselves; yet they shall be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

VI. The Church

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is an autonomous local congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the two ordinances of Christ, governed by His laws, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Each congregation operates under the Lordship of Christ through democratic processes. In such a congregation each member is responsible and accountable to Christ as Lord. Its two scriptural offices are that of pastor/elder/overseer P.132

and deacon. While both men and women are gifted for service in the church, the office of pastor/elder/overseer is limited to men as qualified by Scripture.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the Body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages, believers from every tribe, and tongue, and people, and nation.

VII. Baptism and the Lord's Supper

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

VIII. The Lord's Day

The first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should include exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private. Activities on the Lord's Day should be commensurate with the Christian's conscience under the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

IX. The Kingdom

The Kingdom of God includes both His general sovereignty over the universe and His particular kingship over men who willfully acknowledge Him as King. Particularly the Kingdom is the realm of salvation into whi P.133 n enter by trustful, childlike

commitment to Jesus Christ. Christians ought to pray and to labor that the Kingdom may come and God's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return of Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

X. Last Things

God, in His own time and in His own way, will bring the world to its appropriate end. According to His promise, Jesus Christ will return personally and visibly in glory to the earth; the dead will be raised; and Christ will judge all men in righteousness. The unrighteous will be consigned to Hell, the place of everlasting punishment. The righteous in their resurrected and glorified bodies will receive their reward and will dwell forever in Heaven with the Lord.

XI. Evangelism and Missions

It is the duty and privilege of every follower of Christ and of every church of the Lord Jesus Christ to endeavor to make disciples of all nations. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary effort on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life, and is expressly and repeatedly commanded in the teachings of Christ. The Lord Jesus Christ has commanded the preaching of the gospel to all nations. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by verbal witness undergirded by a Christian lifestyle, and by other methods in harmony with the gospel of Christ.

XII. Education

Christianity is the faith of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ abide all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is, therefore, a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. Moreover, the cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian education is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

XIII. Stewardship

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Him. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for helping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XIV. Cooperation

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying fo P.135 the missionary, educational, and

benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such cooperation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XV. The Christian and the Social Order

All Christians are under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ supreme in our own lives and in human society. Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Jesus Christ. In the spirit of Christ, Christians should oppose racism, every form of greed, selfishness, and vice, and all forms of sexual immorality, including adultery, homosexuality, and pornography. We should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the abused, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. We should speak on behalf of the unborn and contend for the sanctity of all human life from conception to natural death. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

XVI. Peace and War

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love. Christian people throughout the world should pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace.

XVII. Religious Liberty

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XVIII. The Family

God has or dained the family as the foundational institution of human society. It is composed of persons related to one another by marriage, blood, or adoption.

Marriage is the uniting of one man and one woman in covenant commitment for a lifetime. It is God's unique gift to reveal the union between Christ and His church and to provide for the man and the woman in marriage the framework for intimate companionship, the channel of sexual expression according to biblical standards, and the means for procreation of the human race.

The husband and wife are of equal worth before God, since both are created in God's image. The marriage relationship models the way God relates to His people. A husband is to love his wife as Christ loved the church. He has the God-given responsibility to provide for, to protect, and to lead his family. A wife is to submit herself graciously to the servant leadership of her husband even as the church willingly submits to the headship of Christ. She, being in the image of God as is her husband and thus equal to him, has the God-given responsibility to respect her husband and to serve as his helper in managing the household and nurturing the next generation.

Children, from the moment of conception, are a blessing and heritage from the Lord. Parents are to demonstrate to their children God's pattern for marriage. Parents are to teach their children spiritual and moral values and to lead them, through consistent lifestyle example and loving discipline, to make choices based on biblical truth. Children are to honor and obey their parents.
