

If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ. 1 Corinthians 15:19-26

Imagine for just a moment that there was no Easter. Imagine that Jesus didn't rise from the dead. Imagine that Good Friday was the end of it all -

- that death had the final word. There would be no hope for Easter.

In the Corinthian church the resurrection came into question as some were saying there was no resurrection of the dead. Paul told the Corinthians how necessary the resurrection was to the Christian faith. It was everything. Without it, faith was empty. Christianity would be like every other religion in the world. In fact, it would be worse because it would be making a false claim.

Lee Strobel, best-selling author of many books including God's Outrageous Claims, The Case for Christ, The Case for Faith, and The Case for Easter, once felt that Christianity was doing just that -- making a false claim. As a journalist, he was an avowed atheist. Yet, after viewing the evidence, the award-winning atheistic journalist believed in Christ -- resurrection and all.

The apostle Paul made his case for Easter and the resurrection to the Corinthians in the passage above. He asserted the main claim of Easter and of Christianity: "Christ has been raised from the dead." And, Christ's resurrection has a purpose: so that "all will be made alive in Christ." Death has no hold on us any longer, as "the last enemy to be destroyed is death."

Yet how often do we ignore our basic belief and fear death? We live as if Easter was dead -- as if Christ stayed in the grave. We fear death.

Easter shouts to all who will listen: The enemy of death has been destroyed! Adam's disobedience leading to death has been reversed by the obedience of Christ. The resurrection is real.

\* Jesus is no longer on the cross. The cross is empty.

\* Jesus is no longer wrapped in grave clothes. They are empty.

\* Jesus is no longer in the tomb. The tomb is empty.

The message of Easter is so clear: We have reason to be thankful -- Christ has given us a tomorrow. There is no need to fear death -- Christ has destroyed that enemy. Death loses some of its power and sting. Thanks be to God who gives us the victory in our Lord, Christ Jesus!

Because of Easter, we can and will experience everlasting life. Let us experience God's love as the last word over death. Alleluia! Christ is risen! May we live as Easter people every single day! Have a blessed Easter!

Starting Easter Sunday, April 1st, through Sunday, April 29th, we will be collecting food (1,000 each of oatmeal packets, granola bars, individual fruit cups or applesauce, single serving microwave meals like Mac and cheese, soup, or Chef Boyardee, and 125 of 16 oz jars peanut butter) and money for Buddy Bags. The collection is for specific food items that can be sent home with and be prepared by school age children for the weekend. We and Smoky Row Brethren Church are partnering with the Family Mentor foundation to provide food to these students. Everything we collect whether food or money will be given to the Family Mentor foundation for this purpose. We have lists available for food items required to fill a Buddy Bag. Money given should be by check and made payable to, Fellowship Lutheran Church, and have "Buddy Bag" written in the memo line and will be used to purchase milks and vegetables that Family Mentor Foundation can obtain at a lower cost.

Saturday, May 5th we will prepare to pack buddy Bags. Sunday, May 6th we will fill the Buddy Bags at Smoky Row Brethren Church at 12:30 p.m. Our goal is to pack 1000 buddy bags. #### **Board of Administration**

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you." Matthew 28:19,20

During our January meeting, we discussed the budget, a significant deficit between our budgeted expenses and our income, and how to close that gap. Most of our large expenses we have little control over. However, one that we might be able to adjust is our mortgage payment. PPC brought forth the proposal to refinance the mortgage at the January meeting. The congregation approved moving forward with getting mortgage proposals. And, at the meeting, we advised the congregation that a special congregational meeting to vote on a refinance proposal would be forthcoming. We have called a meeting for April 8 after the worship service to complete this process.

This turned out to be more difficult than we thought. Chase led us to believe that we would qualify, and when they declined our application, we were surprised as was the Chase branch manager. We then looked into other potential lenders. We contacted 7 other lenders and made applications to 3. We dismissed one lender due to their rates. 2 only do residential loans. We received positive responses from 2, one of which was a broker who would have charged a significant amount in brokerage fees.

We have settled on First Commonwealth. They are the bank that acquired Delaware County Bank. We met with their business loans representative and went over all the terms and questions that we had. The basic terms were as follows:

- Financed amount of \$300,000 with a 20 year amortization schedule, fixed for 5 years with adjustments each 5 years after
- \$2,043.38 monthly payment at current 5.38% interest rate
- \$2043.38 monthly payment
- Closing fees of \$1,300
- Annual cash flow savings for our operating budget of \$11,959 that will help us maintain and improve our mission
- Cash takeout available for capital improvements such as repaving driveway, security system, repair of east wall, etc. approximately \$42,000

The interest rates have gone up some since we started investigating this with Chase in December.

This would be a significant improvement in our cash flow. With the refinance and our current balances, we would finish the year about a -\$1,200 balance at year end. We have also worked on some other cash flow improvements including changing our electric contract, and we are hopeful that our recent visitors are a good sign for bringing in new members.

Please make every effort to attend the meeting on April 8. We will discuss the details of the proposal at that meeting. Thank you.

#### **Mission Interpreter**

#### **ELCA World Hunger Global Farm**

As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease." Genesis 8:22 (NSRV)





Not so long ago, most of the people in the United States lived on farms, like the Engen Farm of ND pictured here, and were basically subsistence farmers. Their existence depended on weather, health, and enough labor to work the fields. One severe drought or severe winter could bankrupt or even kill them. As late as the 1930s, there was widespread famine due to drought and economic conditions in farming country here in the United States.

Much of the undeveloped world is still in that situation. Today, 80% of the world's food is produced on small farms that depend on family labor, just like the prairie homesteaders did here in the United States a hundred or more years ago. Half of the world's undernourished people live on these farms. And, adding to the usual weather challenges that farmers face, climate change is changing the rules right under people's feet.

Family farming is a way of life in the United States and the world. We city-folk have grown away from our farming legacy, but there are still a huge number of family farms here at home. Most are much bigger now than they were even 30 years ago. Where my ancestors worked a 160 acre homestead, today's family farm in the United States probably works thousands of acres.

ELCA World Hunger has started the ELCA World Hunger Global Farm campaign to help family farmers the world over gain access to livestock, seeds, tools and training. Much like I witnessed in Haiti with the Haitian Timoun Foundation, access to this kind of support can make a huge difference in the viability of family farms. Fellowship actually participated in the beginnings of this at Christmas when we had the opportunity to buy pigs, honeybees, and other farm animals and tools via those ornaments on the tree in the narthex.

The ELCA Youth Gathering is making this a focus and many groups will bring their offerings to this campaign to the gathering this summer. For more information on how you can contribute, see:
