When we make Christ's suffering personal, the journey to the empty tomb becomes personal. Insurrection leads to resurrection. Like two sides of a divine coin, we can't have one without the other." (Rev. Timothy E. Schenk)

What does resurrection look like in 2018?

What first comes to mind for me are the blossoms that begin to appear on trees around in the spring, boldly proclaiming with their beautiful and delicate petals that winter is drawing to a close and spring is coming.

I think of a loved one sitting in an Easter Sunday service so many years ago in my home congregation, just three days after she and her spouse decided divorce was the right choice for them. I think of the tears that rolled down her face as she acknowledged the death of her marriage, of the life she had known and held onto the hope of resurrection, of new life budding out of death.

The truth is that we do not have the eyes to see resurrection if we are not willing to acknowledge death. We long to skip past Friday and Saturday into Easter Sunday, to ignore the stories of the cross and the lifeless body placed in the tomb.

But the sight of Easter's empty tomb is meaningless to us if we do not acknowledge that it was once full. That is the work of Lent, to acknowledge what parts of ourselves, our lives, and our word are like dry bones crying out for new life.

What does resurrection look like to you? Where do you notice the yearning for new life? These are questions for us to ponder as we continue our Lenten journey to the cross and the empty tomb.

I encourage you to embrace the whole Lenten and Holy Week experience. Come to worship on Sundays as we look at the covenants God has made with God's people in the Old Testament. Come on Wednesday evenings and enjoy a light supper with



friends followed by a short midweek Lenten service where we are learning about the different places Jesus meets us.

And don't forget Holy Week which starts on Palm/Passion Sunday with the procession into the sanctuary with the palms and the reading of the Passion. If you have never gone to a Maundy Thursday meal and service at Fellowship or gathered for a community Good Friday service (this year at the Moravian church on Sawmill) with the last words of Christ and the community choir, you've missed out on so much! Give these services a try this year. You won't be disappointed!



Board of Administration

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes: first to the Jew, then to the Gentile." Romans 1:16 (NIV)



The Board of Administration and PPC have been working on inviting lately. We have been looking at various resources. Thom Rainer says that 60% to 80% of people who get an invitation from someone they know will go at least once. ELCA pastor John Krahn in his book, From Surviving to Thriving, talked about inviting in casual conversation. The basic technique was to simply ask someone if they had a church they went to. If they said, "yes," simply say, "that's great! If they say, "no," then the inviter might say, "Well, if you'd be interested, I'd like to invite you to meet me at my church on Sunday." PPC would like each of us in the congregation to be able to invite someone to church. Pastor gave us some exercises last summer to help. This month, PPC has done some work to make it a little easier. Each of us created an elevator pitch about Fellowship that you could use as an example in telling someone about Fellowship. Karen Espe is compiling all of the examples that PPC created in her article in this month's newsletter.

A person could use these little elevator pitches to make that conversation snippet a little more enticing. Suppose you start that conversation off as above, but if the person says no, perhaps you could use an elevator pitch to give a little more information. For example, one of the elevator pitches I created could be used like this:

Me after a little small talk, "say, do you have a church you go to?"

Friend, "No, I haven't kept up with church since I was a kid."

Me, "You know, My church is Fellowship Lutheran Church. We make amazing things happen by sharing God's love and Grace through our words and actions. We are small, but mighty. Being small makes us very friendly. But, we can still do big things – like serving meals at First English on the near-east side, hosting a free summer day camp, and having a really good musical worship service.

Would you like to meet me at Fellowship on Sunday to see for yourself? "

That doesn't sound too hard, does it? I encourage you to look through the examples that Karen has assembled, pick one or make one up yourself, and try it out.

Your servant in Christ, Todd Engen *Jesus said, "Watch out. Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions."* Luke 12:15

Jesus states this before he tells the parable of the rich fool in Luke 12:16-21. One of our major problems of today's society can be described by one word. That word is **greed**.

Greed is defined in the World Book Dictionary as "The quality of wanting more than one's share or extreme or excessive desire." Doesn't that describe many people in our society today? Everyone wants for themselves and not for our neighbors. This country will have to change our focus on greed to one of helping the poor and destitute in our world or we will cease to exist. Please pray for our leaders.

On Thursday, April 5, 2018, will be our final trip to the Frebis Food Pantry. They will close on April 6, 2018. However, we can continue helping for they will have a mobile pantry which will move on a daily basis. The mobile pantry will still need volunteers to help dispense the groceries and produce. I will keep you informed on the change.

The adult Sunday School class will begin very soon reading the entire Bible. After each book, there will be a discussion and lecture. We are looking forward to this. Please join us from 8:45 to 9:45 a.m. in the narthex on Sundays. Steve Espe and Bruce Johnson will lead us.

Our next men's breakfast will on Saturday, March 10, 2018, at 8:30 a.m. I will be out of town, so the men will eat out that day. I will cook again on April 14, 2018, at 8:30 a.m.

This past year, we have had many exercises on Evangelism. From the session of "Fishing for People", we have gained the knowledge how we can be more comfortable to extend an invitation to visit Fellowship Lutheran Church. Along with these exercises, I have been reading an excellent book, <u>From surviving to Thriving - A practical guide to revitalize your church</u> by Rev. John H. Krahn. One of the ideas is to write a 30 second invitation on an index card, and keep it in your pocket for ideas on what to say to invite people to our church. Here are some examples:

"Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms." – 1Peter 4:10 NIV

This bible verse speaks to us to be "faithful stewards" and "to serve others". That's pretty much what our board is all about. We usually talk about the stewardship side of things; budgets, giving, tithing, etc. You know, things that hit us in the wallet. This month I'd like to concentrate on the call to service that falls under our board's umbrella as well.

You may think that you aren't "cut out" to be a servant of the Lord, but as the verse states, "... use whatever gift you have received to serve others,...". We all can make time to lend a hand in the church, and in the community. We all have many talents that we can share. Here are some ways that you can share your time and talents:

Worship involves many people on a weekly basis. It is probably the greatest opportunity for service, with a minimum time commitment. Just think of all the people involved on a Sunday: Assisting Minister, Acolyte, organist, choir members, other musicians, ushers, readers, communion assistants, Sunday school teachers, nursery attendants, and coffee hour hosts. Now granted, some of these tasks take more time and talents than others, but all are important.

There are other ways that we can serve our congregation. Helping out in the kitchen for one of the many dining opportunities is something many of us can do. Come make pancakes for the Men's Breakfast on 2nd Saturdays, or bring a dish to share to one of our potlucks. Bring in soup and salad for our Lenten meals. Lend a hand grilling hotdogs and hamburgers on Sunday evenings for our Burgers and Basketball ministry. Take a meal to one of our shutins.

Fellowship will again be hosting the Amazing Grace Day Camp in July. They need all sorts of helpers during the week to work with the kids. You can host one of the camp counselors in your home for a week, or maybe just help provide some snacks or craft materials.

No matter if you have your days free, or can only help in the evenings, there are ways to serve our community. We have a group that helps out at the Frebis Food Pantry. The next date is April 5th, and usually takes a few hours in the morning and early afternoon. Another group helps prepare and serve a hot meal at First English Lutheran Church on the near east side. The next meal is March 8th; we serve every other month on the 2nd Thursday. Helpers are needed in the afternoon to prepare, and the evening to serve and clean up.

Finally, in October, is the Pumpkin Patch, a project that has come to define Fellowship as the "Church with the pumpkins on Sawmill". We need folks to man the patch daily for 32 days!

Not all of the above service opportunities fall directly under our board, but we wanted to remind you of the many ways we can share God's Grace.

What other ways can you think of to serve our church and community?

"Even now," declares the Lord, "return to me with all your heart, with fasting and weeping and mourning." Rend your heart and not your garments. Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love, and he relents from sending calamity. Joel 2:12-13

In many cultures, loud weeping, wailing, and the tearing of clothing are accepted ways of lamenting personal sorrow or a great national calamity. For the people of the old Testament Israel, similar outward actions expressed deep mourning and repentance for turning away from the Lord. Joel reminds us that while outward demonstrations of repentance can be powerful, what God wants from us is a sincere, heartfelt response to the love he shows us every single day.

During this Lenten season let's pause from our busy lives, and take time to return our hearts to God

Depression in Older Adults

For the enemy has pursued me, crushing my life to the ground, making me sit in darkness like those long dead. Therefore my spirit faints within me; my heart within me is appalled. Psalm 143:3-4 (NSRV)



A couple threads came together for me this month. The latest issue of Living Lutheran has an article, "When Shepherds Grieve," about grief and depression, <u>https://tinyurl.com/y7lyawnp</u>. In this article, the author discusses two of his brothers' suicides brought on by depression. A few weeks ago, one of our members handed me an article from the National Institute on Aging about recognizing depression in older adults. And, of course, my wife is a Psychiatrist, and many of the patients she sees suffer from depression.

If you are not familiar with depression, it is more than just feeling sad. It is a medical condition caused by an imbalance of neurotransmitters in the brain, especially of serotonin. Serotonin moderates mood and also affects production of melatonin, which helps regulate sleep. There are medical and psychological therapies to treat depression.

Because older adults often have a number of medical issues, it can be difficult to tell that someone may be suffering from depression. Some of the symptoms of depression are: losing interest in activities; feeling hopeless or pessimistic; feeling guilty or helpless; low energy; eating issues (too much or too little) and weight change; trouble focusing; difficulty sleeping; restlessness; irritability: even body aches and pains that never seem to get better. The symptoms of depression in younger people are very similar, but are noticed more often since younger people have fewer complicating issues.

While depression can be common in older adults, many people think depression is a normal part of aging. It isn't. Many of us are getting older or have aging parents. The point of the article was to watch out for signs of depression in the older adults in our lives. If someone has several of these symptoms for more than 2 weeks, and these symptoms interfere with normal everyday activity, they may have depression. If you notice signs of depression, have them visit their doctor. However, a word of warning, some doctors may think such symptoms are normal for an older adult, so you may have to insist a bit or see a Psychiatrist or Psychologist.
