I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all.

Ephesians 4:1-6 (NRSV)

Many of our second readings in the lectionary the last two months have come from Paul's letter to the Ephesians. Paul wrote to the churches around Ephesus about God's plan for all of humanity, for the Jewish and the Gentiles. God's grace is extended to all, and this has implications for churches, individuals, and for families.

Paul would not have had to make this appeal if there was not the threat of schism within the early church. Yet because his appeal is included in our scripture, it stands as a challenge to much of our behavior within the church today. On the one hand, it is comforting to realize that God has faced this type of behavior in the church before and triumphed over it. On the other hand, it should make most of us pause and examine our true loyalties within the church. Paul was appealing to the Christians in Ephesus to lead lives worthy of their callings. Paul repeatedly lifted up what, in other contexts, he called the "fruits of the Spirit" as a measure of faithfulness to Christ's call in the church.

For Paul the fruits of the Spirit became one of the true marks of the church. When we raise our voices within the church, either locally or on a denominational level, are we doing so "with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace"? While we may feel very passionately about a particular issue, do we demonstrate, even as we give voice to our opinions, that we believe that "there is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all"? It is so difficult to maintain this spirit when we see people advocating things with which we passionately disagree. Yet Paul was quite adamant that our task is equipping each other for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all come to the unity of the faith.

Doctrine and right belief are very important, and Paul certainly was not shy about challenging what he believed to be errors in the faith. But it is Christ, not our beliefs, that is the head of the church. It is only as we recognize that our loyalty to Christ is above all else that we will have the courage to live together in unity in a way that causes the world to notice that there is something different about our faith. All the world knows how to fight and to divide, but Christ provides us with a different way of living that the world desperately needs to see.

This past month we have seen some differences of opinion expressed by members of our congregation on issues. Like Lutherans all throughout time, we do not always agree with one another but my hope and prayer is that these issues do not divide us and we remember that the one thing we share is our unity in Christ.

"But when Cephas came to Antioch, I opposed him to his face, because he stood self-condemned; for until certain people came from James, he used to eat with the Gentiles. But after they came, he drew back and kept himself separate for fear of the circumcision faction. And the other Jews joined him in this hypocrisy, so that even Barnabas was led astray by their hypocrisy. But when I saw that they were not acting consistently with the truth of the gospel, I said to Cephas before them all, "If you, though a Jew, live like a Gentile and not like a Jew, how can you compel the Gentiles to live like Jews?" We ourselves are Jews by birth and not Gentile sinners; yet we know that a person is justified not by the works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ. And we have come to believe in Christ Jesus, so that we might be justified by faith in Christ, and not by doing the works of the law, because no one will be justified by the works of the law. **Galatians 2:11-16** (NSRV)

We have our normal congregational meeting scheduled for Sunday, September 16 following the worship service. I encourage you to attend. There are 3 main topics on the agenda: Proposed 2019 Budget, Stewardship Campaign Kickoff, Discuss Fellowship's Relationship with the ELCA.

This year, we are changing the way we do the budget and stewardship. In the past, we have conducted the Stewardship campaign in October, and then developed a budget with an eye on the estimated income for the next year based on the results of the campaign. That implies a dependence on the stewardship campaign and the budget. This year, we are going to submit a budget based on our anticipated needs and our desired mission spending. The stewardship campaign will operate independently with a focus on our mission. Details of the budget will be sent out around Sept. 1 so that everyone can review it before the meeting. We are anticipating a total operating budget of about \$193,000 to \$197,000. This is significantly lower than recent years due to savings on mortgage payments, copier lease, and Pastor's health coverage.

There have been a number of emails and discussions in leadership about the ELCA, Youth Gathering speakers, and other issues lately. We plan to have a discussion of this topic at the meeting. We ask everyone to listen to each other to consider everyone's thoughts. An important question to ask yourself and to consider, is, what does the ELCA, or some other organization mean to Fellowship? For me, and for leadership, our view is that Fellowship is a member of the ELCA. The ELCA believes in the basic Lutheran theology as described in the Augsburg Confession and other writings of the Lutheran founders, specifically: we are saved by faith in God's grace alone, we are guided by the bible, and recognize that there will always be some disagreement on details. The ECLA tolerates those disagreements so long as the disagreement does not violate the basic principles. The ELCA delegates to each congregation a lot of the particulars of what they do. A congregation in San Francisco is not the same as a congregation in Northwood, ND, and each will have its own perspectives, but we all have the same view that God's Grace is with us and frees us to do God's work. The verse above shows that disagreement has been with the church since the beginning.

Your servant in Christ, Todd Engen This month we will be kicking off the stewardship initiative for 2019 in support of our mission here at Fellowship. The theme this year is "We are Stewards, not Owners". Over the next several months, we will be examining just what being stewards means to us.

Stewardship is the most basic of all biblical concepts about material things. So what is a steward? Very simply, stewards manage the property of others. In Genesis 39 we read how Joseph gives us a model of what it means financially to be a steward of God's things materially. We manage what belongs to others. Stewards are much like bank tellers or portfolio managers. They handle or control a lot of money, but they better not start thinking of it as their own.

The steward's real job is faithfulness. God has clear instructions for stewards. "Now it is required that those who have been given a trust (literally, stewards) must prove faithful" (1 Corinthians 4:2). The Greek term "steward" here includes a form of the word, house. It describes a household manager in the ancient Greek world who handled the finances for the owner. Managers are accountable to owners for how they use their finances or material possessions. Owners will hold managers accountable! And God will hold us accountable for anything He has entrusted to us.

We know that Joseph was falsely accused and was thrown into jail unfairly. That doesn't sound fair for someone who was a faithful steward does it? However, at the end of the story, where is Joseph? He is a steward again – in a big way! Joseph became the prime minister of Egypt, in charge of the palace, in charge of everything and everyone except Pharaoh himself. (Genesis 41:40-42) Why did this happen? God made it happen because Joseph was a faithful steward. So we learn two principles from Joseph about the way God views stewardship. 1) Stewards manage the property of others. 2) Stewards who are faithful receive greater privileges.

Managing a little leads to managing a lot. Look at what Jesus said: "Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much." (Luke 16:10) What is Jesus talking about? Was He promising to make us richer financially if we are faithful stewards of our money, as some in the prosperity movement teach? No He isn't. So if the promise of financial wealth is not what Jesus is teaching, what is He teaching? He is teaching the surprising truth that God uses our stewardship financially to determine how much He can trust us with spiritually.

Jesus never promised us worldly wealth here on earth, but He does say that the way we manage whatever amount of money or worldly possessions we have is really a spiritual test. And God is grading that test. How much we have is not an indication of our spirituality; how we manage what we have is an indication of our spirituality.

Our management of money continues through our working life and retirement. God is looking for people he can trust with real eternal things – and He uses our management of entrusted money and possessions in that evaluation. So every financial decision is a spiritual decision. Stewardship means a whole different way of thinking. What matters is that it's all God's money and we must decide how He wants me to use it.

The point is that **stewards think different than owners**. In the weeks ahead we will explore four specific areas about which stewards think differently than those who think they own possessions.

Two members of our congregation, Laura Powell and Jillian Mott, joined 31,240 other ELCA youth at the ELCA Youth Gathering this summer. Most of Jillian's and Laura's expenses were paid through the proceeds from previous Pumpkin Patch proceeds. Thanks to all of you here at Fellowship and to our customers for making this happen.

The event covered 5 days, June 27 to July 1. Each day's programming followed a specific theme that reflected how "that changes everything":

June 27 - God's Call Changes Everything


June 28 – God's Love Changes Everything

June 29 - God's Grace Changes Everything

June 30 – God's Hope Changes Everything

July 1 – Jesus Changes Everything

Sunday morning included a closing worship in the DRG.



Attendees came together at the NRG stadium each night for the Mass Gathering, for a time of inspiring speakers, uplifting music and more. The speakers shared how God's call, God's love, God's grace and God's hope changed everything in their lives. There were 16 speakers, including students, pastors, and other inspirational ELCA members, plus Bishop Eaton. There were 7 musical artists plus the house band. The house band had a play list of 25 songs alone, some familiar to us -- like Amazing Grace and How Great Thou Art, and some not so familiar, at least to me – like Relentless and What a Beautiful Name.

Jillian and Laura contributed to the results of the Gathering where the youth contributed:

Raised more than \$260,000 for ELCA Global Farm, part of Lutheran World Relief Contributed \$261,226 of offerings at the Sunday Mass Worship – split between the Texas-Louisiana Gulf Coast Synod, Prison Congregations of America, and ELCA related Global Ministries

Donated over 40,000 books Donated 1,248 units of blood
