

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"The days are surely coming," says the Lord, "when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and the house of Judah". In those days and at that time I will cause a righteous Branch to spring up for David; and he shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. **Jeremiah 33:14-15**

In a few days we will begin a new church year and the season of Advent while the world is busy finishing the calendar year. Advent begins not only with promise but also with the very real question, made even more urgent with the passing of time, as to whether God will be faithful to the promises of scripture. Jeremiah stood at the point of destruction of his nation of Judah, long after the destruction of Israel in the north, and was bold enough to proclaim that God was faithful and would fulfill God's promises. What type of faith do you think it takes to "see beyond touch and sight some sign of the kingdom"? This was not some vague promise that God made beyond the reaches of time but a concrete promise that would be fulfilled here on earth. "In those days and at that time I will cause a righteous Branch to spring up for David; and he shall execute justice and righteousness in the land." As Christians we have focused on the "Branch" and applied it to Jesus, but we still await the execution of justice and righteousness in the land. A quick look at the newspaper or the evening news confirms the need for this.

Jeremiah was quite definite in what he believed the promises of God to be. It would be hard in our own time to say, "In those days Judah will be saved and Jerusalem will live in safety. And this is the name by which it will be called: 'The Lord is our righteousness.'" Our hope rests with our expectation of Christ coming again to complete the reign of God. Therefore, in Advent, we are not just looking back and remembering the birth of a baby 2,000 years ago. Rather, we are looking forward, and, in the face of all the evidence to the contrary, like Jeremiah, we are proclaiming hope for the world. Advent confronts us with the weakness of our trust in God to fulfill the promises of scripture. Far too often it seems that we slip into cynicism and do not really expect anything new to happen. It takes courage to fully celebrate Advent and to look forward and say, "The days are surely coming...."

In the upcoming weeks, I encourage you to slow down and wait for the Lord. In the busyness of the season with all of the shopping to do, gifts to wrap, parties and Christmas pageants to attend, take time to pause and breathe in the light and hope we have in the Christ child. Listen to the Christmas story again at our Sermon-in-Song services at 5:00 p.m. on December 9th and at 10:00 a.m. on December 16th. Want a more meditative type service? Try out our Blue Christmas service at 5:00 p.m. on December 16th. And don't forget our beautiful candlelight service on Christmas Eve at 7:00 p.m.



Administration

Thank you to all who attended the November Congregational meeting. There were several key issues that we discussed in that meeting. First, we elected the 2019-2020 leadership team: Todd Engen – President, Mike Rankin – Vice President, Ruth Albert – Council Secretary, Carol Jaeger – Director of Outreach, Sonya Thelin – Director of Worship, Bill Lude – Director of Education and Youth, John Votino – Director of Stewardship & Support, and Chad Laucher – Director of Congregational Life.

Next we reviewed the general results of the Congregational Focus Groups that we held between the September and November congregational meetings. There were 3 total meetings. About 30 different people attended across the 3 meetings. There were a number of good conversations in those meetings. A major theme was that our membership cares deeply about the congregation and the members of the congregation. We feel a strong sense of community. We had some action items to take from the meetings, including:

- Need to grow
- Focus on relationships
- Be more inviting

Look for some initiatives in the coming year to focus on those key takeaways.

A third topic was a financial update. As we enter November, our Operating Fund has a balance of \$3,501. November and December are usually strong months, so hopefully that will grow. Unfortunately, some members have decided to leave over the concerns that led to the focus groups. Their departure will probably reduce our income in 2019 by about \$35,000. We are taking actions to address the shortfall. Among those are:

- Reducing salary expenses Pastor Robin has volunteered to go to ¾ time
- Reducing any non-essential expenses from the budget
- Asking everyone to consider increasing their giving

We have roughly 60 giving units in the congregation now. If everyone would increase their giving by \$10 a week, that would cover \$31,200 of our projected shortfall. Please consider increasing your giving to help us weather this storm while we continue to work on our revitalization and grow our congregation. Our giving supports our ministries and our mission. Yes, we have bills to pay, but the reason we are here is to share God's Love and Grace through our words and actions. Your gifts support those efforts. There are many wonderful things that we do: Amazing Grace Day Camp, First English, Burgers and Basketball, Pumpkin Patch, and many others. Please consider increasing your giving to the congregation.

While much of this article is administrative, I assure you that your leadership team has a strong faith that we can not only grow, but thrive by bringing people to God as we are called to do.

Stewardship & Service

Too often stewardship is tied to the congregation's need to "pay the bills." In this article, originally published in <u>The Living Pulpit</u> magazine, Rev. Charles Lane prescribes what can be done to rectify this corruption of a biblical understanding of stewardship.

A Daring Rescue -- Reclaiming Stewardship from "Paying The Bills"

The cold winds of January were blowing. In the warmth of the church basement, Pastor Johnson eagerly reported to his colleagues, "Stewardship was very good at First Church last year. We not only paid all the bills, we even had a little extra money that we have carried over into the new year."

Unwittingly, Pastor Johnson had just become an accomplice in one of the most dastardly kidnappings ever known to Christendom. Without intending to do so, the good cleric had just kidnapped stewardship and replaced it with "paying the bills." Unfortunately, Pastor Johnson has countless partners in crime across our land.

When talk about money in the congregation focuses on the need for the congregation to receive members' money rather than the need for the members to give generously as a part of their relationship with their Lord, the kidnapping has occurred.

When your congregation presents a budget to members during the "stewardship program" and some well-intentioned finance committee member stands up and says, "Costs for everything are going up, and the church is no different. We need everyone to increase their giving for next year to help cover the increases," the kidnapping has occurred.

Contrast these statements of the congregation's needs with the way Jesus talks about money in the Gospels. Jesus talks about money a lot, and when he does the focus is always on the place of money in the individual's relationship with God. Generally, Jesus' talk about money falls into one of two categories. Sometimes he talks about money as a threat -- generally as a threat to a person's relationship with him. "No one can serve two masters" summarizes Jesus' words in this regard. On other occasions, Jesus talks about the duty that accompanies having money. Those who have money are obliged to use it in the care of those who don't have enough. The story of the rich man and Lazarus is but one example of this.

Although Jesus talks about money a lot, he never talks about the need of the church to receive. Jesus always talks about the need of the giver to give. This is the Bible's stewardship message. We who gather in Jesus' name would do well to follow our Lord's lead.

Pastor Johnson and others have kidnapped stewardship. I am convinced that we can rescue stewardship, return it to its rightful place in congregational life, and send "paying the bills" to its proper place in the treasurer's job description. I am also convinced that our preaching is a great place to start this rescue. Let me offer three suggestions.

First, we can commit ourselves to honest talk about money. Too many pastors I know are afraid to talk about money. I understand this. Each of us has probably heard someone complain about coming to church and always hearing about money. Many pastors react to this complaint by never talking about money.

Most often this complaint is unfounded. Most churches talk about money considerably less than Jesus did. Further, when we talk honestly and plainly about money as a spiritual issue, not as something the church needs, the complaints will usually disappear. We live in a society with all sorts of anxiety about money. If we can help people address these anxieties in a grace-centered way, there will be no complaints.

Stewardship & Service

When we talk about money as an all-year spiritual issue, not a one-Sunday-a-year plea, God's people will appreciate the honest conversation and the help for their day-to-day lives. I would suggest that honest talk about money should include the pastor's indicating his or her giving level to the congregation. Since the pastor is called to provide spiritual leadership to the congregation, and since money is a spiritual matter, not talking about money is no more tolerable than not talking about prayer.

Second, as preachers we are presented with an excellent opportunity to talk about money. The opportunity is presented by our Lord in the Gospels. Since Jesus talked so much about money, texts about money will regularly present themselves. If you preach from the lectionary, seize the opportunities when they appear in the lectionary readings to preach on financial matters. If you don't use a lectionary, be sure to regularly select texts in which Jesus deals with money. In doing so, you will be faithful to the Scriptures. I know a few pastors who, when the assigned Gospel for a Sunday deals with money and possessions, regularly preach from the Epistle or the Old Testament that week. Don't join their ranks.

My third suggestion is that when you talk about money, you follow Jesus' themes of money as a threat and money as a duty. Be honest with people about how money functions in these ways in your own life. Ask people to think about how money functions in these ways in their lives. Naming these two themes and examining them honestly can be very freeing for God's people. They discover that they are not alone in their struggles, and they find hope as they face the financial anxieties of life.

A recent article in USA Today was entitled, "Many marriages today are 'til debt do us part." If Jesus' focus on money isn't enough motivation for us to preach about money openly and honestly, then this headline ought to convince us that God's people in the 21st century need us to preach about money openly and honestly.

Many people have described the sermon as the intersection of God's word and the newspaper. Honest preaching about money is certainly at this intersection. And besides, who doesn't want to pull off the daring rescue of a kidnap victim?

ELCA World Hunger Supports Healthy Food In Rural Mexico

" ... does not wrong anyone, exacts no pledge, commits no robbery, but gives his bread to the hungry and covers the naked with a garment," Ezekiel 18:16 (NSRV)

In the news, we are hearing about migrants coming from Central America to escape violence and poverty. ELCA World Hunger is working to get at the roots of these problems. They are working with local organizations, like Amextra, to help reduce the poverty by giving peasants opportunities to raise enough food and raise their incomes. This effort is very similar to some of the organizations I saw when I went to Haiti with the Haitian Timoun Foundation (HTF).

There is an old saying, "give a man a fish and he eats for a day. Teach a man to fish and he eats for a lifetime." That is what organizations like HTF and Amextra are trying to do. Amextra works with extremely poor communities that often lack access to basic services, healthy nutrition, and safe water. They provide training, resources, and startup provisions and supplies.



These photos come from a project in the remote, mountainous community of Illano de las Pierdas, Cochoapa el Grande in Guerrero, Mexico. With help from ELCA World Hunger, Amextra provided such simple things as seeds, fencing and a watering hose so that Ignacio, left, could build a garden. He grows radishes, potatoes, beets, cilantro and cabbages. He can sell some of his produce as well as feed his family. Amextra also taught him how to keep his garden healthy without using chemical fertilizers.

Esmerelda, right, is holding one of the six chickens that Amextra provided to her mother and her family. Eggs are a primary protein source in the mountains. Prior to getting assistance from Amextra, Esmerelda and her family could only afford to eat eggs 3 times a week. Now, they produce their own eggs and they can sell the extra for extra income that they can use for other foodstuffs and essentials. Also, eggs can be allowed to hatch and become chickens, and increase their flock and even provide meat. Amextra provided the chickens, materials for a chicken coop and training for the care of the chickens to Esmerelda's mother, Marcelina.
