

When I came to you, brothers and sisters, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. And I came to you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling. My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God." 1 Corinthians 2:1-5

I've been intrigued by Paul's advice to the people of Corinth in our second lessons the last couple of weeks. One aspect of scripture that never ceases to amaze me is its relevance and truth across time. Paul offered some very unsettling advice for all of us who read all the books on programs for making our churches successful. He refused to depend on the pragmatic and rational wisdom that the world admires. "My speech and my proclamations were not with plausible words of wisdom...." If one reads this in isolation from the exceedingly practical advice that Paul offered on many church issues, one could slip into a spiritual self-righteousness. Yet all practical wisdom must be filtered through an understanding of the guidance of the Spirit. Paul began with a core belief. "For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified." Our dependence on practical wisdom for success and survival was nailed to the cross. No matter how successful we are in church building, it is empty unless we are guided by God's Spirit. So how are we to pierce the cultural wisdom that surrounds us and listen to God's Spirit? If our decisions are patterned after the mind of Christ, I believe we will discern the spiritual wisdom to guide us. Trusting in guidance from the Holy Spirit and not on our own beliefs is essential when we make important decisions related to our congregation. I have felt the Spirit's presence at Fellowship on many occasions and I trust that the Spirit will continue to lead our congregation and our new PPC as we make plans for the future of our church.

There might be times in our personal lives when we are confused and unsure about what direction to go next. We live in the information age with readily available knowledge literally at our finger tips. There has been more information generated in the last thirty years than during the past 5,000. Having an abundance of information available does not always solve our problems. We are told that to improve our health we should try different foods, new drugs, or vitamin supplements, only to discover a couple of years later that we should avoid that particular product. Instead of being beneficial a new study reveals the product might actually cause harm. All this wealth of information leaves us confused.

The apostle Paul's words are helpful whenever we are confused and mistakenly think that church is about us and meeting our immediate needs. Paul reminds us that not everything is about us. Paul draws our attention instead to the foundation of our faith. These words were written thousands of years ago by the apostle Paul in which he spoke to a fractured people who had been swayed by allegiances to a variety of charismatic leaders. Paul calls them to unity in the one who is the ground and source of their faith and salvation. Paul reminds Christ-followers in Corinth that their unity is in the proclamation of the gospel of Christ. May that be our unity and foundation also.

But now the Lord my God has given me rest on every side; there is neither adversary nor misfortune. So I intend to build a house for the name of the Lord my God, as the Lord said to my father David, 'Your son, whom I will set on your throne in your place, shall build the house for my name.' 1 Kings 5: 4-5

We have just kicked off our year with our January Congregational meeting. Our finances seem to be improving over last year. We start the year with a balance in our operating funds of over \$7,000. Last year at this time we had a balance over \$1,000 and we got above zero by one of our parishioners contributing their entire 2016 commitment in December of 2015. We are clearly in a better position financially than we were last year.

Of greater note was a discussion about an offer that we have recently received for the church property. A commercial real estate broker approached us with an unsolicited purchase offer. The board of administration has been doing due diligence to determine how attractive the offer really is and if it would be enough to enable us to rebuild a comparable building.

There was much discussion on the topic in the congregational meeting. Some was logistical, such as: how long would it take? Where would we get property to build on? Some was mission oriented such as: How does this affect the mission that Fellowship has in our area? What does it mean to the reach of our congregation? And some was existential, such as: what would be the effect of even more change? With our recent membership statistics, how long can we sustain a viable congregation where we are, given that membership has been dropping for several years and many of us are aging?

As I see it, this offer could be a tremendous opportunity to upgrade to a new building and move out of a stagnant neighborhood and currently ill-sited location for a church and move to a growing area with new housing and new families. Where we are, we grew along with the development of the area, but now that nearby growth has nearly completed and our membership has peaked. It may be the last chance that we could pull that off economically without moving well into Delaware county. It would offer us an opportunity to move into the growing areas of southern Delaware County that would enable us to grow. They say God will provide. Is this opportunity an example of God putting an opportunity in our laps?

On the other hand, we have a number of members who travel quite a ways from Hilliard, Westerville, and Reynoldsburg via I-270 to get here. How many would be willing to add another 3 or 4 miles to that commute? Also, would we just moving to make it easy on ourselves since our mission has not really connected with the immediately surrounding area of our church? If we stay, how do we effect growth? How do we connect with the area that we are serving?

It seems that no matter what course we choose, we will need to change and we will need to step up our game.

All these are valid considerations and not any of us alone is able to fully answer them. I would welcome any comments as we investigate this situation. Feel free to button-hole me at church or send me an email with your thoughts at tcengen@att.net

### Stewardship & Service

Read Matthew 20:1-16. This is the parable of the workers in the vineyard.

In today's parable the vineyard owner asks the grumbling laborers, "are you envious of me because I am generous?"

What a question! Do we envy's God's generosity? I suspect not. Most disciples that I encounter can point to the ways that God has generously blessed their life. If given a chance most disciples can identify the ways that God's hands have opened wide to them to satisfy their needs. No. Most folks I know live as the grateful recipients of God's generosity.

Yet this parable stings for many of us. It seems unfair when all the laborers receive the same wage. We see ourselves among the laborers who've been at it all day. Maybe it stings because it points out how calculating we are, or maybe because it shows how much we attach worth to wealth.

We may not envy God's generosity, but perhaps this parable bites for many of us because it reminds us of how we often fail to live in the image of our generous creator.

The Psalmist says, "You open your hand, satisfying the desire of living thing." God's generosity towards creation is lavish. Yet often we, who have been created in the image of a generous God, become focused on calculating what's right rather than on lavishing the abundance of what we have received on a hungry and hurting world.

What would happen if we spent time in the coming days and weeks identifying, practicing and focusing on the ways that God's character of generosity is alive in us? Such a practice might be one way to live our life in manner worthy of the gospel of Christ. --- This devotion was prepared by Rev. Amy Walter-Pederson, Upstate New York Synod, ELCA

The season of Epiphany - this is what *Sundays and Seasons*, our worship resource, calls "bread and butter Christianity." Here we find the dational stuff of Christian life. Between the high dramas of Christ - Lent, the time after Epiphany returns to the basics. Basic does mportant, though. On the contrary, many foundational and ture readings are packed into these eight weeks: "To do we kindness and to walk humbly with your God"; the

Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified"; and many more phrases that we may find ourselves reciting as much as reading. Through all eight weeks, the readings point again and again to the centrality of Christ, his life and teaching. He is the servant, the lamb, the light, the foundation, and the beloved Son. For us, his disciples, the attention turns to our baptismal identity and activity. We find passages that fill out the image of discipleship in commandments, justice, testimony, and praise, all rooted in the joy and confidence of our baptism into Christ.

This time in the church year is often experienced as a lull, but with that comes the opportunity to scale back and focus intentionally on central things. Let the primary themes of the readings — Christ, baptism, discipleship, and light —set the tone for your personal worship. Let the light and joy of the Christmas cycle blend with the simplicity and intentionality of Lent and allow that to serve as a bridge between the seasons. In one sense these eight weeks of Epiphany are very simple: they focus on Christ and how he has transformed our lives. In another sense that means that all the joy, struggle, and complexity of Christian life can be found here in this little green season. #### **Small But Mighty**

John 21:17: He said to him the third time, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" And he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep."

Living Lutheran is the new name for the former Lutheran magazine. It is published by Augsburg Fortress and the ELCA. Jessica McClard, a woman from Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Fayetteville, Arkansas, started the first Little Free Pantry to help people who are food insecure in her town. Like me, she had noticed some Little Free Libraries popping up around her area. She used a \$250 Thrivent Action Team grant to get started.

The idea of these little pantries and little libraries is to provide sustenance in the form of food or reading adventures to people in areas that struggle to afford them and have access to them. The pantries and libraries are community oriented both in the benefit and the stocking of them. Anyone can add to what is in the pantry or library, or anyone in need can take from it.

She found that, almost immediately the word spread for her little pantry. Within two days the Facebook page had more than 900 "likes" and the project was covered by the local news. An outpouring of people began contributing to the Little Free Pantry, and McClard was soon able to estimate that certain items were being turned over (placed and then taken) in as little as 30 to 45 minutes. Since she started, the pantry's facebook page has over 17,000 likes. Clint Schnekloth, pastor of Good Shepherd, agrees, saying the pantry has widened the church's circle. "It's become part of our identity that we are a church that



has a free pantry," he said. "I don't think we think of the pantry as an evangelism tool in the popular sense of that term, but it's certainly a public sign of the theological sense of the word evangelism—to 'good news-ify.' Everyone who drives by it sees it as good news."

I know Dave Anderson has been looking for ways to take advantage of Thrivent's Action Team grants. Here is a great idea of a way to use one or two.

Who will join me to start a team to get a Little Free Pantry and a Little Free Library going at Fellowship? What a great way to get people to see how we put God's love for us into action. Also, what a way to get information about our church out to invite people in.
