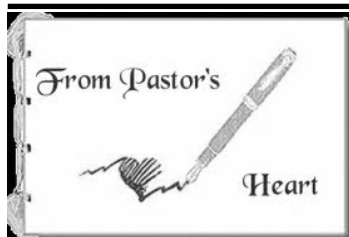

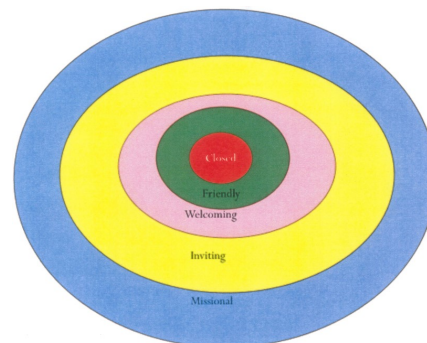
"The church that once lived at the center of culture and thrived as a result is now being moved more and more to the edges, maybe even the margins of society."
(Dave Daubert, *Living Lutheran: Renewing your Congregation*)

Last month, I shared with you some of the information from Pastor Katie Kerrigan's workshop in May at Fellowship called, "Fishing for People." This month, we'll continue along this line.

At the workshop, Pastor Katie presented Rich Jorgensen's chart of churches which organizes churches according to their openness to the community. Churches can be classified as closed, friendly, welcoming, inviting, and missional. At Fellowship, we are aiming to become more inviting and missional.

At the center, you can see the "closed" churches: Closed churches often say they are friendly. When a visitor walks into the church, the only person who approaches them is the pastor. After they leave, members will approach the pastor to see who the visitor was, and then they go back to doing what they were doing.

The "friendly" church will do a little better—they may actually greet a visitor themselves, just as they would greet anyone who comes to visit them in their homes. They will encourage them to stay for coffee and to come again. But they aren't interested in accommodating to visitors. The friendly church believes that visitors should accommodate to them, should learn how things are done. It's a sort of "our house, our rules" approach.



The "welcoming" church is a congregation that has decided to take hospitality seriously. They really want people to come, and they have put serious effort into making people feel welcome when they come. They look at their buildings from the viewpoint of a stranger, and try to make their way easier to find with good signage. They keep their building clean and inviting. They provide all-inclusive bulletins so that visitors won't have to juggle too many things, and may even make the move to projectors and screens to make the worship experience even easier. They even recognize that newcomers will necessarily bring change, and they have made their peace with that—they are ready and willing to be changed themselves. The welcoming church is willing to accommodate to their visitors. These congregations are seriously interested in welcoming visitors and very much want them to come back.

The inviting church actually invites people...and then welcomes them once they come. So, it does all the things the welcoming church does, but takes it a step further: The inviting church equips people to invite others to church. Becoming missional is the last step in the process.

Last month, we practiced (hopefully) using the phrase "my church" in a conversation with one person, using Pastor Rob Moss' "small bite" five month strategy for a congregation to become more inviting. So Fellowship members, here's your challenge assignment for July - consider a phrase that describes our church well, and then use it in a sentence: "My church is..." in a conversation with one person each week during the month: "My church is struggling with that very issue." "I've found my church is very supportive during hard times." "My church is really committed to serving the community." "My church is offering an Amazing Grace Day Camp this month."

We are continuing our focus on renewing and revitalizing our mission. We did the Fishing For People workshop in May. Following that, Pastor Katie Kerrigan provided us some homework. The first part was some exercises to practice to help us become more comfortable inviting people to church. The second was a 3 part bible-study in discerning our mission.

The exercises that Pastor Katie gave us were a series of things to do at least once a week, for a month with a person not from our church. In last month's newsletter, Pastor Robin gave us our first practice assignment to help us become more comfortable inviting. The assignment was to use the words, "my church" at least once a week in conversation with someone that does not attend our church. Some of us probably do that already just because we have things that we do at church and it comes up in conversation. It is a good, easy way to start talking about our church. I expect that in this newsletter, Pastor Robin will give us the assignment for the next month, so, I won't steal her thunder.

Pastor Katie also shared her 3 part bible-study focused on understanding where we are in mission, what we do, and what we could do in our mission. We have been doing this during the time that a summer adult Sunday School would be happening, from 8:45 to 9:45 on the last 3 Sundays of June. We have had 12 to 15 people participate each week, including one of our high school youth. We had a lot of good conversation in those first three weeks about where we are and some good ideas. However, we only finished 2 of the bible studies. We will be doing the final one on a Sunday in the near future. Watch for an announcement on email, the newsletter, and/or Facebook for an update.

I think one of the most important aspects of the out-of-the-blue offer to purchase our property has been that it has stimulated a lot of discussion and soul-searching about where we are as a congregation, and what can we do to improve our focus on our mission, and what really matters here at Fellowship. That process will lead us to be able to reinvigorate our congregation and make it more of a place people want to be to experience and spread God's Word, and help us explain to our world why Fellowship is here and it's relevance to us and to them.

I feel blessed to be serving Fellowship and God at this moment in time. Thank you for your trust in me in calling me to be President and for your prayers.

Luke 8:5-8

"The sower went out to sow his seed; and as he sowed, some fell beside the road, and it was trampled under foot and the birds of the air ate it up. "Other seed fell on rocky soil, and as soon as it grew up, it withered away, because it had no moisture. "Other seed fell among the thorns; and the thorns grew up with it and choked it out. "Other seed fell into the good soil, and grew up, and produced a crop a hundred times as great." As He said these things, He would call out, "He who has ears to hear, let him hear."

Yesterday as I was weeding my yard, I was thinking about what to write this month for the newsletter. As I was pulling out a 5 foot high thistle weed, I remembered the story in the Bible about seeds that were thrown among the thorns or weeds. As a congregation, Fellowship needs to pull out our "weeds" to let our ministry flourish. Over the last few weeks, we have had the opportunity to examine our ministry and our mission as a church.

Focusing on these discussions examining our mission, I discovered the article below in the Summer 2017 issue of "Seeds for the Parish" newsletter.

With some experts predicting that as many as 1/3 of congregations will close in the next 10 years, work at renewing and revitalizing congregations cannot be timelier. In his latest book, "From Surviving to Thriving," the Rev. Dr. John H. Krahn shares his experience of nearly 50 years in helping congregations turn around and grow again.

Krahn emphasizes that congregations need not fail. He states, "Stop making excuses and start doing something." He feels that the God behind the church is stronger than the problems before it, encourages congregations to actively witness to those who are not experiencing the saving love of Christ, and urges congregations to remember that Christ did not just invite his disciples but all Christians to join him in fishing for others.

"From Surviving to Thriving" provides practical suggestions from both cutting expenses and increasing giving. It discusses how to increase attendance by reaching out to inactive members as well as to unchurched people in the community and how to recognize and remove roadblocks to growth. Ways of invigorating a congregation's worship life are shared as well as examples of a God of miracles still at work in the church. And each chapter is followed up with suggested action items for renewal work in the reader's congregation.

So as our congregation moves forward in determining our mission, let us remove our roadblocks to growth, our "weeds".

At Fellowship we have new First English Schedule coordinator. Pete Cardimen will be taking on the role and the Board of Stewardship and Service would like to thank George Biemel for his dedication in getting this ministry started and working to keep us informed.

At First English there are changes as well. They have adopted a new serving style to encourage food sharing and to model some communal table manners for the guests. These changes include serving food from the tables versus a cafeteria style line, and asking that those serving sit and eat with the guests. These modifications to their processes are purposeful and are a new attempt based soundly on Biblical principles. Pastor Sally (head Pastor at First English) calls the new method a family style approach, she explains that having the guest's experience this new method will help to teach them how to share the food, something she says they may well not have learned at home. This is real mission adaptation that could lead to a real change in attitudes and actions. Real change is not easy. Fostering an environment where change can occur, like learning to sit quietly when someone, especially a Pastor is speaking, (some guests talked over Pastor Sally in May), or learning table manners are higher level ministry goals, more significant than the meal all by itself.

Pastor Sally is patient enough to be willing to work in her environment to be an agent for change and the new serving style is her method to accomplish that. If she is willing to try it, our board decided we were willing to continue to support the outreach. Like all new methods or ideas there are lessons to be learned as it is maturing. Dave Bear already has plans in place for a more organized serving method, other concerns are easily remedied. We believe that there are quite a few at FELC who are doing great work and are in great need of the outreach opportunity for others. FLC is happy to provide the dinner & work side by side with other FLC members serving the community. This is an opportunity when you truly serve others in need, and the benefits of the new method as outlined by Pastor Sally certainly warrant our patience and continued support as the new process is matured. No new idea on try one is smooth, we would be wise to remember this as we examine our own mission.

Financial support for this outreach is accomplished by one of three methods; a Thrivent Member Grant, directed benevolence from the board of Stewardship and Service or a direct contribution to the FLC² fund. This fund was established at the onset of our First English Mission, and stands for Fellowship Lutheran x First English Lutheran FLC raised to the power of 2. (FLC²) The fund balance currently is just under \$850, almost enough to cover the three remaining dates for 2017. They are July 13th, September 14th and November 19th.

If you want to contribute directly financially put FLC² on an envelope and drop in in the plate. If you're willing to serve and sit with guests then sign up and come ready to try out a new method and maybe help change someone's life for the better. Worst case scenario you get a meal provided by Dave Bear.

Shout Hosanna! Amazing Grace Day Camp, AGDC for short, is coming to Fellowship. You can tell your neighbors, too, in a softer voice. As you are almost surely aware, the camp is coming to Fellowship on July 17. We are praying and planning for a successful camp. This is a tremendous opportunity for us at Fellowship to serve our neighbors and to proclaim God's word. Registration is now open.

Amazing Grace Day Camp is funded by Lutheran Outdoor Ministries of Ohio (LOMO) and the Southern Ohio Synod. It is staffed by LOMO counselors. Each congregation that hosts a day camp provides volunteers to house the counselors and to do the administrative work of the camp. We have had a few volunteers sign up, but we can use many more. Volunteers will be needed each day to help with check-in, check-out, registration, meals, snacks, crafts. You can sign up for the whole week, for a day, or even just an hour, or just a specific role. Please help us out to make sure we have lots of representation from our congregation.

The AGDC team has used a number of methods to publicize the event. They have put a sign out up front, they have put up flyers at the library and in our Little Free Library out front. We have also used Facebook ads to push ads to people within 5 miles from the church.

You can also help by shouting out the news with technology by sharing the Amazing Grace posts from Fellowship's Facebook page. However, I would recommend not using web speak for shouting if you repost. In case you're not familiar with web and cellphone shouting, that is when you post in ALL CAPITAL LETTERS. Don't do that. On the internet, that is almost like declaring war – like Joshua's trumpets. Just normal text would be perfectly fine for shouting out God's word.

Let's make this a great success! AGDC promises to be a terrific experience for anyone who attends or volunteers. Tell your friends and neighbors. Share the Fellowship church Facebook posts with your friends. Use it as one of the ways to mention "my church" in casual conversations as Pastor Robin wrote about in her newsletter article last month.
