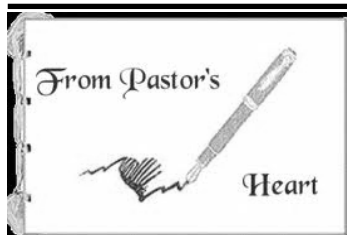

Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you."
John 20:21

"But in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect..." **1 Peter 3:15**

Pastor Katie Kerrigan, Director of Evangelical Mission for the Southern Ohio Synod, led a workshop on May 13th at Fellowship called, "Fishing for People." For the 26 attendees, representing 10 congregations of the Southern Ohio Synod, Pastor Katie provided much helpful information about telling others about Jesus and sharing our faith. I will be sharing her information with you the next couple of months.

We learned that there are many reasons for our fear of the "E word", i.e., evangelism.

- We don't want to seem fanatical or pushy or weird
- We think faith is a private matter and don't want to invade personal space
- We hate knocking on doors
- We don't feel equipped to engage in conversation about religion or faith
- We aren't in touch with our own faith stories...and so think that we don't have anything to share
- We think evangelism is about getting people in the pews
- We don't know how to invite—and so we do it badly
- We assume that people don't want to come and give up (especially when they fail to respond to our unconvincing or half-hearted invitations)
- We think it is the pastor's job to do evangelism (or the Board of Evangelism's job)
- We misunderstand the purpose of church—we SAY we believe the church was founded by Jesus to share the good news of God's love for all people, but in language and actions we proclaim that we believe the church belongs to us:
 - We call it our church home—and we treat it just as we do our own homes, as if it belongs to us.
 - We talk about our church as "family" without thinking about what that means to most people: that just as we wouldn't bring just anyone home to dinner with our family, the use of the word "family" sends the very opposite message of what we probably intend.

Pastor Katie then shared Rich Jorgensen's chart of churches which organizes churches according to their openness to the community. Churches can be classified as closed, friendly, welcoming, inviting, and missional. How would you rate Fellowship on this scale? Our goal of course is to become inviting and missional but in general most Lutheran churches have not reached that goal yet. I'll describe the different kinds of churches in next month's article.

We learned several ways to move from a welcoming church to an inviting church using the suggestions of Pastor Rob Moss. He proposes a "small bite" five month strategy for a congregation to become more inviting. So Fellowship members, here's your challenge assignment for June - find an opportunity to use the phrase "my church" in a conversation with one person each week. Try to make it natural, "I can't do such and such, I've already made plans to be at my church," or "You know the place, it's just two blocks past my church." Practice with other people and see what happens!

“I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind— just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you— so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ.” 1 Corinthians 4-7

On Sunday, May 21, we held our May congregational meeting. There were no resolutions that required votes, but there were several key topics that we covered: financial update, Amazing Grace Day Camp, property sale status, mission planning efforts, plus introducing new members Sam and Maxine Brunner, and starting to update our constitution.

Our financial status is stable. We started the year with a balance of about \$7,500 in our operating fund. As of the end of April, we are still at about \$7,500. We have exceeded our special stewardship campaign goal of \$4,800 by about \$300. We have also done some adjustments of what bank accounts we keep our funds in. We have closed the account at Delaware County Bank and consolidated to our checking and savings accounts at Chase. We have also rebalanced those funds so that about 1 month's operating expenses are in our checking account and the remainder is in the savings account to garner a little bit of interest. We are planning on developing an Investment Policy which was one of the recommendations from the audit last year.

Mary McDaniel, Missy Hensley, and Dianna Roll are coordinating our Amazing Grace Day Camp. We have had training sessions and they have identified 2 families to host 2 of the 3 LOMO counselors who will be staying with us. They need 1 more family to host a counselor. Please see Mary, Missy or Dianna if you can pitch in for that or for other functions they need.

We continue doing due diligence on the potential property sale. We continue working with the Synod on their requirements if a congregation wishes to relocate. We solicited and received an appraisal on our property. The estimated market value is \$1.5M. We have also done some investigation of where we might go if we relocated, including visiting the Moravian church up Sawmill, as well as a driving tour of areas and properties. We were given a listing for a 9.4 acre property at the intersection of Home Rd. and Steitz Rd. at \$249,000. For reference, that would be about 6.5 miles from our current location.

A key part of the relocation is to focus on our mission and that is also necessary for our vitality if we choose to stay. PPC has engaged Pastor Katie Kerrigan, Director of Evangelical Mission (DEM) to evaluate where we are and what we can do to improve our mission efforts and our appeal to members. We have had Pastor Katie in twice to work with PPC and we also hosted her Fishing for People workshop. Our Adult Sunday School class will probably be using some of the materials that she suggested, 13 Lutheran Trump Cards, to reinforce our catechism training. We may also hold an internal Fishing for People workshop for the congregation.

Megan Cardimen works to make us successful by her teaching, coordinating and expertise in working with children. Major Crispin helps our board by his contributions and wisdom in evaluating and interpreting different situations before the board makes decisions. And, Carol Scantland is instrumental in working with the board by her sewing, baking, teaching and in many other areas. Thank you all; we'd not be successful with all three of you.

One of the best known and beloved psalms is Psalm 23, the Shepherd Psalm. There we learn that the Lord is our shepherd. And since He is our shepherd, we will not want. We will not suffer want because the Lord, our shepherd, will lead us to green pastures and beside still waters. In other words, the Lord, our shepherd, will provide for all that we need in both body and soul.

Yet, we live as though this is not the case. We live as though we actually suffer from want, that the Lord, our shepherd, will not provide for all that we need. And thus, we live as though the Lord is not our shepherd. And that means that we live as though we are not the Lord's sheep.

How do we do this? We do it when we put anything else before Him and His provision for us. When we think that going to work is more important than receiving the gifts that He won for us on the cross, a violation of the First and Third Commandments. We do it when we fail to give generously of the first fruits of what the Lord has provided for us because we think we don't know what the future will bring, even though He has promised that He will lead us to green pastures and still waters. We do it when we think that the Lord is only in the business of helping those who will help themselves, we do this because we have a mind set on earthly, temporal things and not on heavenly, eternal things. We do this because we have stopped hearing the call of our shepherd, which comes through His Word.

The Word of God is how our shepherd calls us to himself. Through that Word, the Holy Spirit gathers and enlightens us with His gifts. Through that Word, we are kept holy and nourished in the one true faith, the faith that follows our Shepherd wherever He leads us. He promises to lead you to your true home, to the land flowing with milk and honey, to a better country, not of this world, but a heavenly one.

And so, here's the good news: The Lord is your shepherd still, even, and especially, for wayward sheep. For Jesus seeks and saves those who are lost. He finds the lost sheep and carries them back to the fold. He is the shepherd that lays down his life for His sheep. The Lord is your shepherd. Let us live then as His sheep.

ELCA? What's In It For US?

Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." Matthew 14:16-18

Over the last two and a half years as Mission Interpreter, I've written about all kinds of topics related to the missions that the ELCA supports: from Lutheran World Relief, to Young Adults in Global Mission, to Lutheran Disaster Relief and Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services and even some things closer to home like the Lutheran Seminaries and Colleges. There is lots of interesting stuff there, but it seems like a lot of that is pretty far afield and maybe is a little hard to relate to for us. So, I thought maybe I'd write this month about a few things that the ELCA supports that support us here at Fellowship.

First, is the ELCA Mission Investment Fund. Here is their mission statement: The purpose of the Mission Investment Fund is to help build the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and advance God's mission by providing ministry loans, investment opportunities, and support services for ELCA members, congregations, and partners. Investments are put to work to provide low-interest loans to established ELCA congregations, new-start congregations, and ELCA-related ministries.

The Mission Investment Fund is the organization that holds the mortgage on our church. Last year, we refinanced our mortgage with them to help us replace all of our heating and air conditioning equipment and lowered our monthly payments. They helped us build our building in the first place. They also have Church Building Consultants who help congregations work through the process of building a church. They provide their services at no charge to the congregation. They have lots of experience with building churches. We have engaged one of their consultants to talk with us about the process of building a church, the dos and don'ts of building, the process and they gave us checklists and overall recommendations.

Another function of the greater church is its development of churches. In our Southern Ohio Synod, we have a Director of Evangelical Mission, Pastor Katie Kerrigan, who helps congregations grow a new church or renew an existing church's mission and vitality. Pastor Katie has been here at Fellowship 3 times already this year as we work on reinvigorating our mission and helping our leadership team work through the decision of whether or not to sell this building and move. We have been truly blessed that the Southern Ohio Synod is able to support us with that mission. There are things that benefit us from the greater church from the call process we used to call Pastor Robin, to the Lutheran colleges that some of our children attend or have attended, to Lutheran Outdoor Ministries that runs the Amazing Grace Day Camp that we will host this summer.
