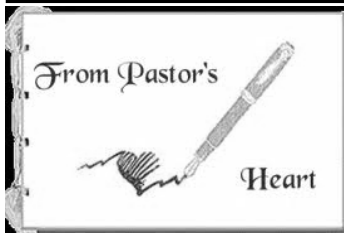

Hopefully by now you've heard that this month we will be celebrating the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. On October 31, 1517, the Reformation began when Martin Luther wrote a document called "Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences" or which is more commonly known as the "Ninety-Five Theses."

Simply speaking, Martin Luther wrote the "Ninety-Five Theses" to question and debate the long-standing practice of selling indulgences. This practice started innocently enough to address or relieve earthly punishment related to the Roman Catholic sacrament of penances but which grew to something beyond its original intention, which Luther could not support. Martin Luther believed that forgiveness of sins through Jesus Christ was the best way to address and relieve sinners. (Please note this is a very simple and quick explanation).

Luther's attempt to question and debate led to a split in the Roman Catholic Church. Although many amazing advances came to the world through the Reformation, it was not Luther's intention to start a new religion. One of the not so amazing things that resulted was some real pain. Through this split, the two sides wrote and took actions against one another with the intention of hurting the other.

Thankfully in the 500 years since this occurred, the two sides have moved toward finding common ground. Catholics and Lutherans have been in dialogue with each other and have found many more issues on which they are in agreement than disagreement. There has been growth in mutual understanding, cooperation, and respect. More unites us than divides us, especially belief in the Triune God and the revelation in Jesus Christ, as well as the basic truths of the doctrine of justification (being made right with God).

On October 22, 2017, the Southern Ohio Synod will hold a synod-wide Reformation Service at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church on Brandt Road in Dublin at 4:00 p.m. And then on November 5, 2017, at 7:00 p.m., there will be a Joint Lutheran-Catholic Prayer Service in Commemoration of the Reformation, at Epiphany Lutheran Church in Centerville, Ohio. I encourage you to attend these services to help celebrate this important occasion.

As we think about the split that resulted 500 years ago during the Reformation, I wonder if we can look at similar things that have happened in our lives or our church. How much pain resulted through these splits - either pain that was inflicted upon us or pain that we might have inflicted on others? Maybe in the spirit of the Reformation, we can spend some time reflecting on our own lives and the practices we have created for coping with the splits we have experienced.

Using the 500th anniversary of the Reformation as our inspiration, may we lean into Luther's work that started it. May we all trust in the love and forgiveness of God through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

“For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another.” Romans 12:4-5 (NSRV)

The next task on the agenda for the Board of Administration is to update our constitution. Our constitution was last updated in 2004. The constitution as currently existed was created in 1992, and updated in 1994, 1996, 2001, 2003, and finally 2004. Much has changed at Fellowship in the 13 years since the constitution was last updated. Bob Abrams who has the task of helping congregations from the Southern Ohio Synod with their constitutions said that your constitution should reflect what your congregation does and what it aspires to be. Right now, our constitution really does not do either as there are many areas that we are no longer following, especially related to board configuration and membership.

The ELCA provides a model constitution that congregations use to develop their own (<http://tinyurl.com/ybc6l3su>). There are 20 chapters (main sections) in the model constitution. There are required provisions in the model that all ELCA congregations must include. Provisions that are not mandatory can be modified or deleted. Other provisions and bylaws can be added as long as they do not contradict required provisions.

It is clear that our constitution generally follows a model constitution that would have been in effect when it was last updated in 2004. The vast majority of mandatory provisions that are in the 2016 model constitution are already in our constitution, though some have some wording changes in them. And, there are some new provisions that did not exist before, especially related to some new ministerial options that have come about recently – Deacons and ordained pastors from other denominations that the ELCA is in common communion with.

The major area that is unique to a congregation is its organizational structure. There are model provisions in this area, but they are not “required provisions.” They can be modified as needed. For example, the model constitution has an organization named the Church Council. The term we use is Parish Planning Council. I imagine some congregations may have some other names, too.

So, just to give an idea of how our constitution lines up with the model, here is a summary of the chapters and the number of required provisions and the number of those provisions that are already in our constitution: (See next page)

Hopefully, this table summarizes what is in the model constitution compared to ours. Most of the differences are in the organizational structure and there are some new ones that relate to changes in things like the ELCA now can have Deacons, and some changes to member discipline procedures that involve the Synod to assure fairness.

As our constitution committee works, PPC has asked them to simplify where appropriate, and align our organization structure to empower congregational members and be “permission-giving” without having to ask PPC or Pastor for permission except where necessary.

We've been told this since our days in Sunday school: We want to give and we need to give gladly. A spirit of generosity isn't enough to guide us in our decisions. What else does Scripture have to say on the subject? Three kinds of financial giving are mentioned in the Bible: offerings, tithes and alms. Understanding what they mean helps us achieve a thoughtful, balanced plan for our cheerful giving.

Offerings and tithes

On the first day of every week, each of you is to put aside and save whatever extra you earn, so that collections need not be taken when I come. (1 Corinthians 16:2).

The faith practice of making a regular financial offering to your congregation is grounded in a “first fruits” philosophy. We might think of this giving as “business as usual.” You pay the rent, you buy groceries and you contribute regularly to help carry out God’s mission in the world. Your generosity isn’t an afterthought; it’s part of your day-in-and-day-out joyful response as a child of God. These offerings first help to support local ministries, outreach and more. Your congregation then shares a portion of your offering—mission support—with your synod and the churchwide expression.

Many Christians talk about their regular contribution as a tithe. This helps them to differentiate between their financial commitment to their congregation and the special offerings they designate to specific causes. Such causes may include ELCA World Hunger, Faith Mission, LSS Food Pantry, or a pan-Lutheran organization such as Lutheran World Relief. We encourage your designated support of these worthy causes. But we also recommend that these offerings are given above and beyond, and never in place of, your commitment to your regular congregational offering.

Alms

Alms are our compassionate, heartfelt response to the people Jesus mentioned in Matthew 25: those “least” of our sisters and brothers who are “less” than we in circumstance only and always our equal in their humanity. This is our most personal and spontaneous kind of giving in response to people in need. Think about the home-less man you see everyday on the corner or the family in your congregation whose home was lost during a fire. Your outreach makes God’s love for them feel very real and very immediate; your kindness reveals Christ’s presence within them as well.

Time and Talent

It’s also important to remember that when we focus exclusively on giving in terms of money alone, we lose sight of the bigger picture. God calls us to be generous in all areas our lives and invites us to explore the many opportunities to share ourselves through our time and talent.

When we ground our giving in a biblical context, our financial generosity becomes an expression of our love for God, for our neighbor and for ourselves. We are new people in Christ: compassionate and eager to share.

We give cheerfully because God has given us so much.

“Every day giving – with a spirit of gratitude” is the theme of our stewardship campaign this year. Please prayerfully consider what you are grateful for and give accordingly. Remember: *The earth is the Lord’s and the fullness thereof. –Psalm 24:1*

This article, <http://elca.org/Resources/Stories-of-Faith-in-Action#General>, caught my eye due to the places mentioned here. Noonan and Wildrose, ND are each about 20 miles from my Grandpa Elmer's farm in northwest North Dakota. I spent a week or so out in those parts every summer when I was growing up.

This story is about Kathi Nygaard, who was ordained in 2015 at St. John Lutheran Church in Dickinson, ND. Her family, friends, mentors and the attendees cheered for her at her ordination. I'm sure Pastor Robin has a similar set of people who helped her along the way.

Kathi says, "The first time somebody said I should be a pastor I was in grade school," She grew up at Zion Lutheran Church in Noonan, ND and was confirmed at Grace Lutheran Church in Wildrose, ND. She heard the comment many times over the years.

She took up social work after college in Dickinson. She became involved in congregational and Synod life. Eventually, she could not resist God's call to ministry. "It just became clearer and clearer that I was being called to equip people to serve," Kathi said.

But she wondered how she would manage the time and financial commitment of seminary. The distributive learning program, https://www.luthersem.edu/mdiv_distributed/ at Luther Seminary provided the answer. This is a unique program that allows a seminary student to do much of their school work remotely and at their own pace. This program allowed her to remain in Dickinson to work and do her seminary studies at the same time.

After graduation, she waited for her first call while continuing to work in Dickinson. In western North Dakota, two rural congregations, searching for a new pastor, eventually called her. Looking back at her journey to pastoral ministry, Kathi is thankful the support she received. It enabled her to finally answer the call that God first put on her in the first place.

"God's pretty persistent, no matter how many times we let the call go to voicemail," she said.

Mission Support dollars help support the financial assistance and seminary programs that aid seminary students like Kathi.
